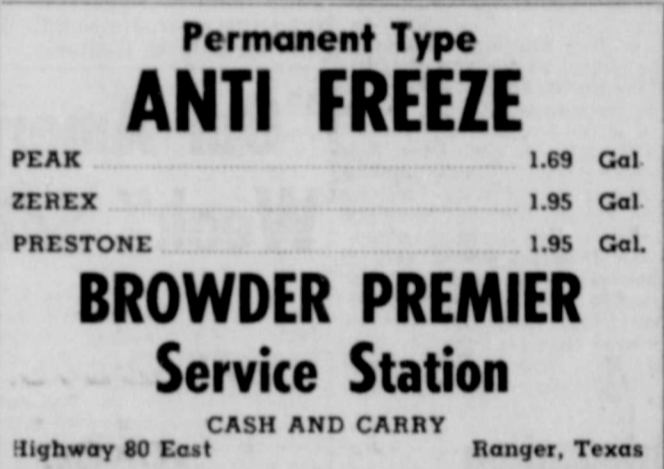

### Train-Auto Crash Damage Suit Heard

"I didn't hear the whistle". That's what Mrs. Jim Patton of 417 N. Green St., told a 91st District Court jury this week in a suit in which Donald Ray Brown and others of Eastland were suing the Texas and Pacific Railway Co. for 130,000.

The suit is the result of a train-auto crash in Eastland last April 23rd.

The accident involved an auto driven by Brown which happened at the Daugerty St. crossing. Mrs. Patton's home is near the

intersection and she told the court that she was in her kitchen at the time.

Later, during cross examination by railway company attorneys she said that she had said in a statement taken by them in October that "it was possible that the train was whistling and that she just hadn't heard it."

The case was being heard in Judge T. M. Collie's court. It took three hours Tuesday morning to pick a jury to hear the case. Attorneys began interrogating prospective jurors at 9:30 and the jury panel was read at 12:30 p.m.

AT GORMAN

First Consolidation Study Reports High Teacher Cost

The "committee of 27"—minus a few absentees agreed on their purpose for being and began "finding facts" during a meeting Monday night at Gorman.

Wendell Siebert, Eastland school superintendent, who was elected chairman of the county-wide organization of superintendents and school board members during a meeting about a week ago, was unanimously elected to head the special study group.

The study group is made up of the nine superintendents, nine school board presidents, and one layman from each of the nine districts.

The nine superintendents and two laymen went into a huddle during the Monday night meeting and after an hour and a half reported back to the group that 45 teachers would have to be hired out of local funds should the districts vote to consolidate the top three grades into a central high school.

During the pupil-teacher ratio study, the chief administrators and the two laymen determined that 178 teachers would be needed and the state would provide funds for only 133.

The 8th and 9th grades at the nine separate districts accounted for the largest demand, they reported.

And the schoolmen were figuring on a schedule equal to what is being offered now, with no enrichment.

(In school jargon, "enrichment" means extra courses such as technical, dramatic, music, etc.—things not ordinarily offered in a straight "three R's curriculum".)

There were 18 men and one woman present, with representation from all districts. All nine

superintendents were present. After Siebert was elected chairman, he led the group in about an hour's discussion of what the group was attempting to do.

Next meeting will be Monday at 7 p.m. at the Eastland High School.

They agreed that they preferred to be called "fact-finding" organization.

Siebert said "It's going to be a long, drawn-out ordeal, but we want to lay the cards on the table, bare the facts, and keep an open mind."

They agreed that their study would be a three-pronged affair—1. consolidation from the standpoint of six districts (excluding Cisco, Scranton and Rising Star); and 2. consolidation as it affects each individual district.

E. C. Johnson, Eastland CPA, who was chosen as Eastland's layman to the study group, was very insistent with the group, asking the purpose of the organization.

I want to know the purpose of the committee. I don't have any facts myself and I expect this committee to supply me with information so that I may cast an informed vote.

"If that's not the purpose of this committee, then I don't have any business on it. As I see it," Johnson said, "this group has got to proceed without and foregone conclusions or pre-conceived ideas."

Dean Kirk, board president from Gorman and secretary of the county-wide group, answered that that was decided at the first general meeting.

Siebert said "Consolidation has some good points and it is

our job to paint the whole picture."

Gorman Supt. Bob Browder said "Let's start getting facts."

Ranger Supt. B. G. Rush countered, "To vote on this, I'd need to know the financial gain or loss. A budget should be set up."

The group decided to begin study based on the premise that nine grades would be left at each of the districts.

Rush said "The best program now being offered in the county will have to be the medium. Eastland has a junior high band, so we'll have to figure on one."

Scranton Supt. Carl Elliott said "We don't have enough students for such as that."

Rush: "What are you going to do?"

Before the superintendents went into their huddle for the first of what is expected to be many long, and involved study's Glyn Covington of Ranger, Lone Star Gas Co. safety man and former Ranger school board member, talked to Dr. Jim Whittington, proponent of the consolidation measure.

Covington estimates that it would cost about \$3 million above present costs to operate the central high school.

Sup. Bill Chambers of Desdemona asked "Are we afraid of Dr. Whittington?"

Mrs. F. W. Hatcher of Gorman answered, "No, we're afraid of an uninformed public voting public."

Before the superintendents moved out of the auditorium, Siebert asked if the remaining eight or nine men wanted to form other committees for study.

Kirk, who took over in the chairman's absence, said "No, we can't accomplish anything without the help of the superintendents. We'd need them to guide us."

Present were: Gorman—Brogdon, Browder and Mrs. Hatcher; Carbon—Spence and McDaniel; Desdemona—Clark and Chambers; Ranger—Rush and Covington; Oden—Hilliard and Everett; Eastland—Siebert, Perry and Johnson; Rising Star—Jones, Clark, Butler; Cisco—Kosch, Wright and Ferguson; and Scranton—Elliott.

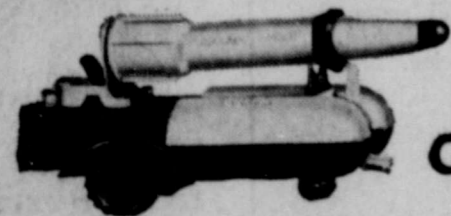

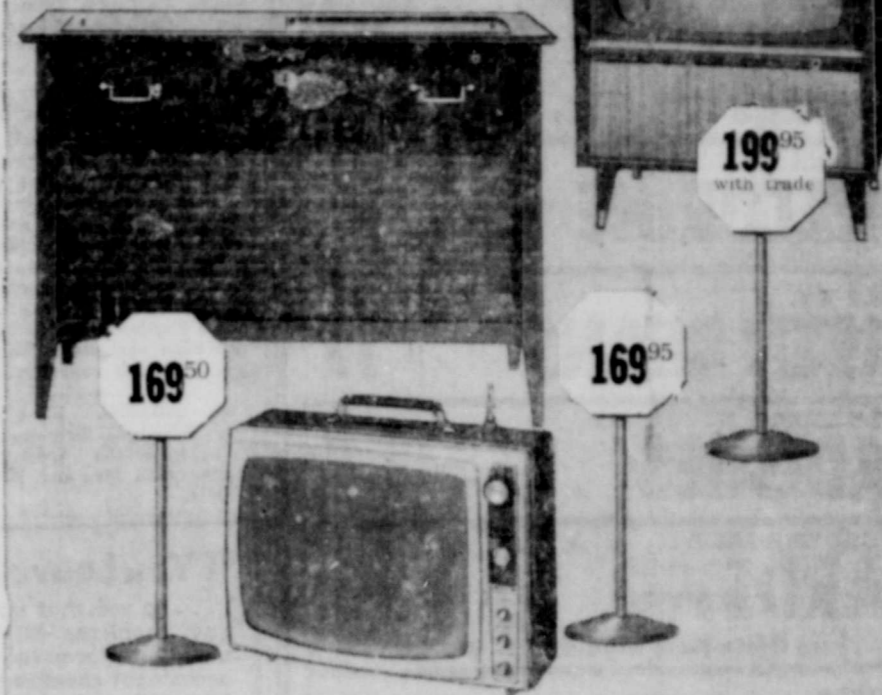

probably wouldn't be permitted to go to the other schools before the next school year, it is understood.

There are 54 Negro students at Douglas in grades one through 12. Of that total, 40 are Eastland residents, and 14 are from Cisco. The elementary grades, including one through eight, have 43 pupils (ten from Cisco and 33 from Eastland), and the high school has eleven students (seven from Eastland and four from Cisco.) It is assumed that if the Douglas school is closed, the Cisco students would be transferred back there.

Estimates are that it would take approximately \$150,000 in improvements and the addition of at least three, and possibly four, additional teachers; to be paid out of local funds at the minimum state rate of \$4,014 each per year, to bring the school to the standards required by the state.

There are three teachers at the school now. It would be reasonable to assume, M. H. Perry, school board president, that these expenses would require an increase in taxes.

The Eastland school system is in the position at this time of being on the state's "warning" list and if improvements aren't made at Douglas School, the district is in danger of ineligibility for accreditation and ineligibility to receive and Foundation Program Funds after this school year, Siebert has said.

have been flour, milk, cornmeal, corn wheat, occasionally rice and beans.

Where these are given to CROP and CWS for distribution there must be available funds to take care of the distributing, handling and transporting costs. These vary by countries and by handling and transporting means. The Halloween program of the young people of Texas helps to make it possible for CROP and CWS to start in distributing surplus stocks released by the government for overseas distribution. Last year Texas young people, numbering at least 14,000, in 200 communities, collected \$55,400 for CROP at Halloween as their part in helping the needy people of the world. This made possible the distribution of 54,792,457 pounds of surplus food valued at \$3,351,453. This was distributed by CWS to needy people in 29 countries.
