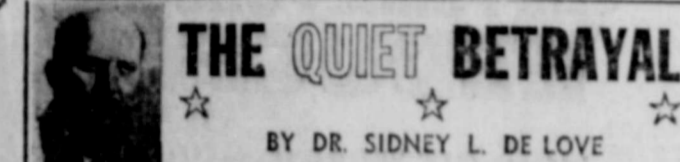

BOYCE HOUSE Texas Institution Ends With Death

Boyce House, pioneer Eastland County newspaperman, was found dead in his Fort Worth hotel last Saturday, Dec. 30.

House apparently died of a heart attack. He had been reading the morning paper in bed. Upon finding a note, a maid discovered his body shortly before noon.

The 65 year old author and editor has written many books about Texas, among the first being "Were You In Ranger?" and "The Quiet Betrayal" during the boom.

He was born in Piggott, Ark. where his father was a printer and the editor of a weekly newspaper. He spent his early childhood in Texas, grew up in Memphis and returned to Texas in 1920.

His first book, "Were You In Ranger?" published in 1935, was followed by "Rising Ranger, the World's Biggest Boom" in 1951.

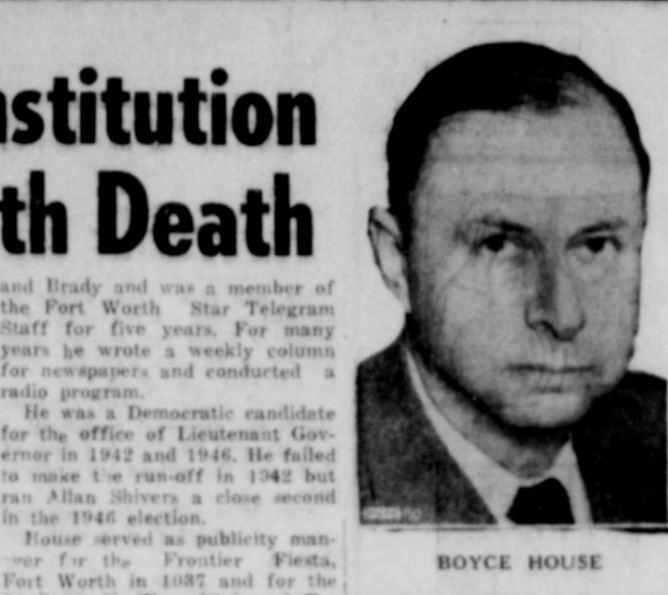

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Bank Deposits Here Show Increase Over Last Year

Economic conditions in Ranger on Dec. 31, 1961 were \$2,697,362, according to an announcement by the Commercial State Bank as any indication of the close of business Dec. 31.

Deposits at the Ranger Bank 1961 were \$2,931,493.82. Year to date some \$229,101 over the end accounting in 1960 showed some period last year. Deposits a total of \$2,734,990.22, for an end of the year in 1960 increase of \$197,493.60 in reserves \$2,468,157.10, and deposits and liabilities during the year.

Also, an indication of a sound economy in Ranger during the last three months of the year is the fact that \$336,836.13 was deposited from September 27, 1961 until December 31, 1961. The September 27 bank call showed deposits totaling \$2,360,422.86, while the December bank call showed \$2,697,258.99 on deposit.

Loans and discounts on Dec. 31, 1961 totaled \$393,674.43. At the same time last year loans and discounts were \$317,790.77. The Commercial State Bank has a capital stock of \$50,000 and surplus of \$50,000. Undivided profits at the end of 1961 totaled \$129,251.03 and reserves were \$4,983.80.

Other resources of the bank include: Banking house, \$1.00; furniture and fixtures, \$1.00; real estate, \$9.00; other assets, \$11,000; stocks and bonds, \$995,000.00; and cash and exchange, \$30,452.15, for a total of \$1,936,454.15.

Wed. Rites Are Held For Mrs. Nancy Hames

Mrs. Nancy Elizabeth Hames, 95, resident here for the past 13 years and a former longtime resident of Stephens County, died at 6 p.m. Monday at her home.

Born Nancy Dempsy, Oct. 10, 1866, in Perry County, Ark., she was married to Nathaniel Page Hames Nov. 10, 1886, in Danville, Ark. Mr. Hames died July 15, 1939.

Livestock Men Meet Tonight In Ranger

Livestock raisers in Ranger and surrounding area will meet in the Vocational Agriculture classroom at Ranger High School tonight at 7:30 to discuss screwworm problems.

A discussion will be held on how to control and eradicate the screwworm, said Norman Richardson, local committee man of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation.

The screwworm, long a dreaded pest of livestock, costs Texas farmers and ranchers a staggering sum each year when their livestock are infected with the screwworm. Infection to animals is caused from eggs laid on open wounds or scratches on the animal. The screwworm works its way into the flesh, and if proper treatment is not given the animal will soon die.

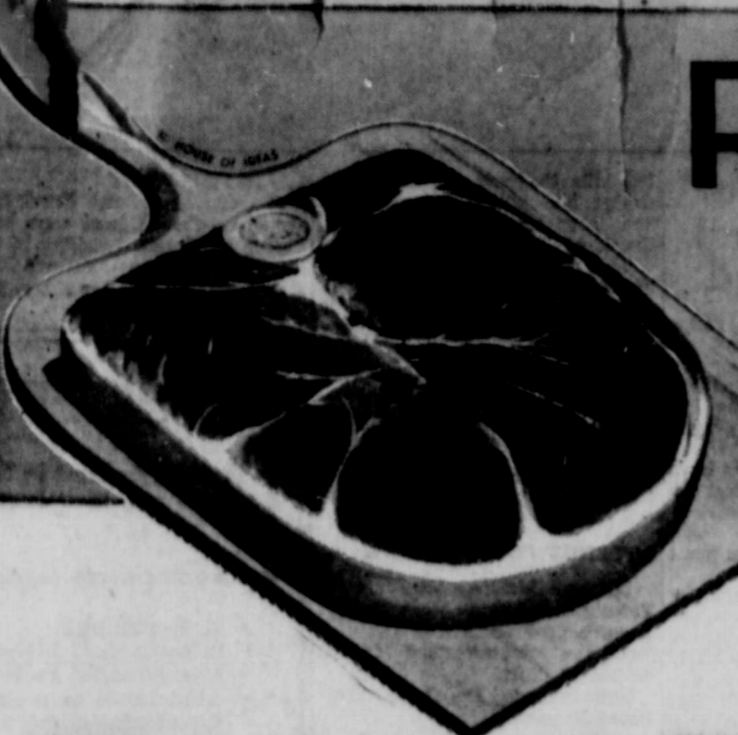

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Deep Plowing For Root Rot Control Is Demonstrated

Over 5,000 Texas cotton farmers are reducing cotton root rot by deep plowing. They deep plowed more than a quarter million acres during 1961 according to year-end reports by county agricultural agents.

iod kills the root rot fungus by drying and killing cotton roots and those of susceptible weeds, Smith explained.

The reports from the counties showed that losses ranging up to 75 percent had been reduced to less than 5 percent by deep plowing. Evaporation is not usually complete because the fungus may penetrate the soil to a depth of 8 feet, Smith added.

Local county agents can supply additional information on root rot control practices, and Smith suggests a visit.

Can you believe that it pleases God for people to reject His word that is revealed to us in the gospel (1 Pe. 1:25) and accept some doctrine contrary to it? And what of the church that the Lord bought with His own blood (Acts. 20:28)? Do you think it pleases God for men to build their own churches, change His teaching, and say these churches we have built are as good as the one the Lord built? The church is the pillar and ground of the TRUTH. (1 Tim. 3:15). Why don't you examine the New Testament and see who is preaching the TRUTH? There is but ONE way to please God, and that is by doing what He has told us to do in His word.
