

Milk Producers **Show Decline** During 1961

During December 1961 there were 401 milk producers on the Central West Texas market compared with 407 during Noverber 1361 and 472 in December 1960. This number of producers during December is the smallest number of producers on the Central West date of the order. Although there were 15.04% fewer producers on year than during December 1960, producer receipts were only 3.21-% less. The average daily delivery per producer during December 1961 was 1,173 pounds compared with 1,029 pounds during Decem-

ber 1960. Class I utilization during December was 12,581,283 pounds, for a daily average of 405,846 pounds compared with 428,452 pounds during December 1360, a decrease of 5.28%.

that Central West Texas produc ch will receive for 4.0% milk delivered during December will be \$5.49 per hundredweight, accord-ing to an announcement by Byford W. Bain, market Administrator. This price is subject to a location adjustment. For each point (0.1%) that the average butter-fat content of producer milk varies from 4.0%, a butterfat differ ential of 7.3 cents applies.



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
