

## Fire Chief Issues Grassfire Warning

A stern warning was issued to citizens of Ranger today by Fire Chief Charlie Isbell concerning the large number of grass fires

that occurred in Ranger during January.

Isbell said that the fire department answered 14 grass fires during the month of January and 12 of these were caused from persons burning trash in open containers. He said that a city ordinance requires that all trash burning barrels have a cover. He said that all barrels must be covered and that the ordinance would be enforced.

During the month of January the fire department answered a total of 20 fire alarms. Last Wednesday the department answered six fires, five of which were grass fires. On Thursday two more grass fires were answered. During the entire year of 1961, the department had only 57 alarms.

January fires included two houses, one chicken house, two car fires, one caterpillar tractor and 14 grass fires.

Chief Isbell urged everyone to please take extra precautions in burning of trash. He emphasized that all trash barrels be covered and the dead grass cleaned from around the barrel.

## SUNDAY DEVOTIONAL

Roger C. Martin of Fort Worth has been named music instructor and band director of Ranger Junior College. Martin, who comes to Ranger from Polytechnic High School, Fort Worth, will be remembered by people of this area as director of the Poly Marketing One-Hundred band featured in the half-time activities at the annual Peanut Bowl game in Eastland last September.

A 1939 graduate of Texas Christian University, he holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree with a major in music education and a minor in clarinet. He was director of bands of Polytechnic High School from June, 1960, to January, 1962. Under his

direction the Poly High School band won three first division ratings and two "Best in Class 4A" ratings in marching contests a and three "Best in Class 4A" ratings in parade competition; it was a "Class 4A Band Winner" at both the 4th and 5th Annual Cotton Bowl Coronation Parade in Dallas January 1, 1961, and 1962; it has been the official stage band for Tarrant County Miss Flame Contest the past two years; and it was the official stage band for Miss Fort Worth Contest, 1961, and for Miss Texas Contest, 1961, in Beaumont, Texas. The band declined an invitation to represent Fort Worth in the night parade at the battle of Flowers Fiesta in San Antonio, to represent Texas at the Jaycee Convention in Las Vegas, in June, 1962, and to present half-time entertainment at a Dallas Cowboy professional football game in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas.

## RJC Science Department Receives Gift of Herbarium Mounts

The science department of Ranger Junior College is the recipient of 167 herbarium mounts, a gift of Mr. and Mrs. David B. Allsup and their daughter, Sandra. The mounts include specimens of 56 trees and shrubs, 62 weeds, vines, and clovers, some harmful and poisonous, and 29 common prairie and cultivated grasses. Each specimen, mounted on cardboard and sealed with plastic, is dated and identified with both common and scientific names and locality in which found.

The mounts are an important addition to the college science department. Selling for \$1.50 each, they are valued at \$250.50; and according to Mr. Allsup, they measure up to the standard of similar mounts found in the Herbarium of Oklahoma University. The Allsup's gift brings the total number of herbarium mounts the college science department has to more than 200. The mounts are available in the study of botany.

Allsup, instructor of science at Ranger Junior College, began the project of preparing the mounts in the early part of July, 1961, while he was attending Oklahoma University on a National Science Foundation Scholarship. He finished them with the help of Mrs. Allsup and Sandra before the opening of the 1961 fall semester of school.

## WHERE THE MONEY GOES

### Most Spending Is for Food, Cars, In This County, Report Reveals

How are Eastland County residents spending their money these days?

What part of it is going for the standbys, such as food, clothing, automobiles and household operations?

What changes are taking place in local buying preferences? The reports point to definite shifts in consumer tastes. As a result, some of the products that were popular yesterday have given way to new ones. Flashy cars with big fins and powerful engines, for example, have been displaced by simpler models that feature economy of operation.

On the other hand, greater emphasis is being placed on personal services, education, recreation and travel.

The facts and figures are brought out in the new consumer market study released by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It details, for communities all over the country, just how the local retail dollar was apportioned in the past fiscal year.

A breakdown of the spending pattern in Eastland County shows that retail business was good for most types of merchandise, despite the unusual amount of unemployment.

Purchases of food and of automotive equipment and supplies attracted a major part of the consumer dollar locally. They accounted for 63 percent of all retail spending.

Sales of these products in the year amounted to \$16,346,000, compared with the previous year's \$15,868,000.

Stores selling food for home consumption garnered \$6,454,000 of the total.

Another \$6,724,000 went for purchases of cars, boats, motorcycles and other automotive equipment.

Expenditures in gas service stations came to \$2,176,000.

The volume of business reported for other principal retail categories was: general merchandise establishments, \$2,178,000, apparel shops, \$685,000, home furnishings, \$483,000, and drugs, \$1,143,000.

All told, store sales locally in the fiscal year ending July 1, 1961, reached a grand total of \$25,760,000, as against the prior year's \$25,344,000.

It was at the rate of \$3,613 per local household. The best gains were made by the service-type businesses and by those catering to leisure-time activities.

Leggett were the El Rancho Cafe, which lost about \$100 cash, the Labor Temple and the Tip Top Feed Store.  
Leggett told Chief S. E. Parkinson in Cisco that the police car prevented him from robbing the safe at Thornton Feed Mill. The car flashed a light at the building during frequent rounds, he said, and he finally gave up and left. The police car's alley tours prevented them from breaking into Farm & Ranch Supply in Cisco, he added. He entered Graham Motor Co. but owner

Charles Grabb was there and called police. Grabb escaped. Sheriff Lee Horn accompanied the Rangers and Leggett on their tour of Eastland and Ranger. Leggett, 33, is an ex-convict with a long record of burglaries and other crimes. His confessions included more than 200 break-ins in some 75 counties. He was arrested in Austin recently.  
Local authorities said that charges would be filed against Leggett in Eastland County. It appeared doubtful that he would face trial in this county, however, as it was expected that a "habitual criminal" charge would be filed somewhere, and this carries a life sentence conviction.
