Horton Installs New Tire Machine

Horton Tire Service of Eastland has announced the addition of another machine that completes the necessary equipment for making perfectly round and balanced tires, according to an announcement by Horace Horton.

The new machine uses a novel method to trim off high spots on out-of-round tires, changing them back to perfectly round tires, Mr. Horton said. After the tire has been trued, balancing weights are properly placed around the wheel for perfect balancing.

"Many motorists are familiar with an out-of-round tire as it causes difficulty in steering, excessive shimmy and thumping," Mr. Horton said. "Many accidents have been attributed to steering difficulty and loss of control due to faulty tires. We are pleased to make this new service available in Eastland County."

Liquor Raids Here Produce Illegal Beverages

Four places in Ranger were raided Wednesday afternoon by seven State Liquor Control Board officers, Eastland County Deputy Sheriff John Willingham and Chief of Police Bob Patterson and Patrolman Mac McGowen.

Two of the places raided produced results. A residence on Blundell Street produced 73 bottles of beer and eight one-half pint bottles of whiskey. Another residence on North Marion Street revealed 12 one-half pint bottles of whiskey.

Occupants of the houses were taken to Eastland to be charged.

Two other places were raided but no alcoholic beverages were found.

Air Conditioner Manufacturing Company To Open In Ranger

E. H. Everett of Odessa, announced today that the New Life Manufacturing Company would start production of fiber glass air conditioners in Ranger in approximately two weeks.

The air conditioner manufacturing firm will be located in North Austin Street, in a building formerly occupied by the Ranger Star Laundry.

Everett said that the all-new air conditioner line will be made of fiber glass except for the blower wheel and the motor. The pump will be made of plastic. He said that it would be the nearest all fiber glass air conditioner that could be made.

The new air conditioner will carry the brand of "The Ranger."

Several types and sizes of air conditioners will be manufactured in the Ranger plant. They will include window, commercial and down-draft from 4000 to 15000

Everett said that the fiber glass construction of the air conditioner was very sturdy and should last indefinitely. The air conditioner will carry a five-year warranty against rust. Weight of the air conditioner will be approximately half as much as a metal air conditioner.

He said that the fiber glass construction would cut maintenance to a minimum and also said that noise usually associated with metal air conditioners, would be eliminated.

In tests conducted by Everett, the air conditioner withstood temperatures of 110 degrees down to 8 degrees with no ill effects. He pointed out that fiber glass does not absorb heat and therefore the new air conditioner will have a much better cooling capacity than a metal air conditioner.

"The Ranger" will be manufactured in a variety of colors to match exterior house paints and will have several designs on the pad covers.

Everett indicated that several other fiber glass products would be manufactured by his firm.

Born in Paris, Texas, Everett conceived the idea for fiber glass air conditioners about two years ago. After building his first model, he secured a patent for the air conditioner.

Everett moved to Odessa in 1939 where he worked for Lone Star Gas Company for many years.

He served in the navy for three years in the Pacific Theatre during World War II as first class master of arms. He was stationed at the San Francisco Naval Base for two years, serving as a secret and confidential messenger. Wounded in action in the Pacific in 1942, he was hospitalized for one year.

Everett is a member of the Ranger Masonic Lodge, Moslah Temple of Fort Worth and the Cross Timbers Shrine Club.
