### Mingus Liquor Store Robbed Tues. Morning

A Mingus store was robbed of \$100.00 Tuesday by a robber who left an employee tied with his hands behind his back in a back room.

Palo Pinto County Sheriff Gilbert Sommerfield said the robber walked into the L&B Liquor store about 11:50 a.m. and asked for some cheap whiskey. The employee, John Roper, of Ranger told the man he did not have any, and then the robber pulled a gun on him.

Taking the money from the cash register, the man marched Roper into the back room and bound him, telling him to wait five minutes after he left, Sommerfield said. He said after the robber left, Roper walked across the street to a cafe and notified authorities.

Sommerfield reported that he man tore the phone loose from the wire before leaving. The robber and another man driving from the scene. The car was described as either a 1953 or 1955 green Mercury.

One of the suspects was described as a white male, about 35, weighing about 165 pounds, with thin hair and wearing a white shirt. The other was a white male, about six feet tall, with brown hair and wearing a sport shirt.

Sommerfield said a suspect, believed to have been driving the getaway car, was being held there after his arrest in Eastland.

Road blocks were set up in the area in an attempt to locate the two men.

## Seventy-five Attend All-Member Chamber of Commerce Meeting

Approximately 75 members and directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce attended an all-member meeting of the organization Monday night at the Junior College cafeteria.

Purpose of the meeting was to acquaint all members of the projects planned by the chamber and also to report progress on the projects.

Dick Henderson, president presided during the meeting. He extended a welcome to members and told them that the Chamber of Commerce is making progress, but a long way from success. He said that success can be obtained only through the cooperation of everyone, and he felt that Ranger is on the road to success.

Morris Campbell, chairman of the membership drive, reported that 47 new members have joined the Chamber in the past few weeks, making a total of 116 members.

A goal of 150 members has been set and a special day will be set aside this month in an effort to reach this goal. If the goal is reached, the Chamber will be able to meet its operating budget. Campbell said that support is needed from everyone, not only financially, but to work on projects.

Continuing Campbell gave a report on the paving project of the Featherlite Corporation road. Approximately 300,000 yards of dirt has been placed on the road at this time as a base. Only one block remains to be completed. After the base is completed, in about three weeks, a seal-coat topping a n d light weight aggregate will finish the paving.

Featherlite furnished all fill material and will also furnish aggregate topping. Only cost will be for seal-coat covering.

County Commissioner Tip Arder, City of Ranger, Featherlite Corporation, C & C Trucking and others, have cooperated with the Chamber of Commerce in this project.

In another report, Campbell said that efforts were being made to contact a rodeo and producing a show in Ranger. He said that a contract would be offered a producer if the producer would take full responsibility for the show and grounds.

Henderson gave a report on progress of the track at Ranger Junior College, which is jointly sponsored by the Chamber and College. He said that the track had been a long process, but that now the completion is in sight. He told of the State Junior College track meet that is to be held in Ranger in the spring. The meet will attract approximately 200 athletes during the three-day event.

At this time, \$750.00 cash is needed to complete the purchase of cinders for the track. Henderson extended thanks to Alvin Woody, manager of the Featherlite Corporation for the work his company has done on the track. Last Friday, Featherlite donated the use of five trucks, a loader and a bulldozer, along with operators for each, and moved many tons and of yard of dirt to complete the leveling of the track.

Dr. Theodore Niekielek said that the State Track meet would include tennis, golf and track and field events.

Dr. Niekielek also explained that the college would offer a night course on Public Relations for adults, offered by the University of Texas Extension Division. A date has not been set as yet. B. H. Penecok said that he attended one session of the course to be offered last week in Olney and he thought that it was one of the best he has ever attended.

Charles Milliken gave a report on the agriculture committee. The committee met last week with representatives of area farmers and ranchers. Conclusions of the meeting, according to Milliken, was that something was needed to stimulate farm trade in Ranger. In conclusion, Milliken said the committee felt that if area farmers and ranchers were extended a welcome, and merchants offered with the right prices, that farm

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Many people have said to me, "You people do not believe the Old Testament, do you?" I hope to make clear in this article that I do believe the Old Testament and that generally the brother all believe it, but we do not believe it is a binding law upon man today. God promised a new covenant in (Jer. 31:31-34), and that covenant is contained in the New Testament. I believe that every word of the Old Testament was inspired (2 Pe. 1:20-21). It was God's law for the Jews for about 1500 years, but it was never given nor meant for Gentiles. Any student of the Bible can see the purpose of the Old Testament if he will study the New Testament. Notice this from (He. 8:13) "Now that which decayeth and waxeth old is ready to vanish away." To the Galatians that could not understand Paul said, "Wherefore then serveth the law? It was added because of transgressions, till the seed should come to whom the promise was made..." (Gal. 3:19). Verse 16 tells us that that seed was Christ. The law was not given for all time, but till the seed or Christ came. We are told in (Eph. 2:15-16) that Christ abolished the Law of Moses that he might reconcile both Jew and Gentile unto God. Also in (Col. 2:14) that Christ nailed the Old Law to the cross. We are also told in (Gal. 5:4) that those trying to be justified by the Law had fallen from grace. The Law of Moses or Old Testament served its purpose, was fulfilled, and passed away as a Law for the people of God. Its purpose today is explained in (Rom. 15:4 and 1 Cor. 10:11) To those that claim they are to keep the Old Testament today I would ask the following: Do you keep the passover according to the instructions given in the Old Testament? Do you offer the many bloody sacrifices of the Old Covenant? Do you keep the feast of tabernacles? You know that you do none of these things, so it is easy to see that you do not believe that you should. About the only command that the denominational preachers are interested in from the Old Testament is that of tithing. But the New Testament teaches that we are to give as we are able. (Acts 11:29; 1 Cor. 16:1-3). Some are able to give nothing and others can give much more than 10%, but I suppose they can get more money out of the poor by the 10% method that was nailed to the cross by Jesus Christ. The Law of Christ, or the gospel is for all men, Jew or Gentile, rich or poor, black or white. It requires all to believe and obey the Gospel and to serve Him according to the ability that God has blessed them with. I would welcome the opportunity to study this matter with you in your home.
