Many New Books Now At Cooper Library

Many new books have recently been added to Cooper Library, Ranger Junior College. The new titles include books in all fields, and a great effort has been made by teachers to select books which will support the college curriculum.

One important field of study emphasized with recent purchases is adolescent psychology. Two hundred thirty books were purchased in this field. In addition, the library received as gifts ninety-eight books on adolescent psychology. Representative of titles in this field are the following: "Psychology of Adolescence" by Louella Cole; "Youth" by Arnold Lucius Gesell; and "Adolescent Character and Personality" by Robert James Havighurst.

Many new titles are also to be found on the mathematics and science shelves. Some of the new math books are "Naive Set Theory" by Paul Halmos; "Axiomatic Set Theory" by Patrick C. Suppes; and "Biography of Physics" by G. Gamow. Readers interested in science will be attracted by these titles: "Brighter Than a Thousand Suns", a personal history of the atomic scientists by R. Jungli; "The Fossil Book", an attractive record of prehistoric life by Carroll Lane Fenton; "Securebook On Atomic Energy", a sourcebook on the atom telling about first discovery and development to the present, by

Samuel Glasstone; a new "Introduction To Nuclear Science", a sound survey of nuclear science and experiments that have been tested, by Alvin Glassner.

Of the many books added in fiction, the following titles are typical: "Tenderloin", a political novel, by Adams; "The Thunder", a romance of Napoleon and Josephine, by Lily Beck; "Europe", the days of ignorance, by Robert Briffault; "God's Angry Man", by Leonard Ehrlich; "When The Kinging ad To Stop", by Fritz Gibbon; "Escape", by Grace Stone; and "The Braintrust Mission", a fictional narrative of London and Boston, 1770-1771, by Nicholas Wyroff.

The suspect was being held in Hobbs, New Mexico on possible kidnap charges and possession of a gun.

Bradford, Deputy Sheriff Raymond Blue, Roper and Minnick were in Hobbs Friday, where they made the identification.

Mrs. Pulley Attends Cancer Meet Thursday

Mrs. D. E. Pulley, of Ranger, secretary of the County Cancer Society, and Sam Kimmell, of Cisco, president of the County Society, attended the area Cancer Conference in San Angelo Thursday, Feb. 1.

Keynote speaker for the meeting was Dr. G. V. Brindley, Sr., 1962 Texas Crusade Chairman.

Dr. Brindley told the audience that the progress of a cancer cure is a two-fold purpose: 1. To educate people to live so that they do not contract cancer in the first place, and 2. To eliminate cancer by research.

He said that the seven causes of cancer are: 1. Poor diet of those chronic diet; 2. Poor sex and redness, vitamin deficiencies, the air and radiation; 3. The growth of cells; 4. Poor care; 5. Poor care; 6. Poor care; 7. Poor care. He said that the primary cause of cancer is yet unknown.

Dr. Brindley said that progress is being made through early diagnosis of cancer, professional education and better examination, x-ray diagnosis and improved treatment.

Dr. Harold Bertman, president of the Fort Worth County Cancer Society, said that 99 percent of cancer of cervix can be cured if detected early enough. He said that cancer now strikes two out of three families and that in 1962, 820,000 cases of cancer will be diagnosed.

According to statistics, 760 persons per day will die of cancer during 1962. Out of every six deaths, one will be a cancer victim.

The Cancer Crusade for 1962 will be launched April 17.

Many FFA activities are designed to stimulate the interest of the boys in their study and work.

The program of vocational agriculture and FFA is designed to increase the student's proficiency in farming, and thereby his future success. While not all students actually become full time farmers, most of them do find careers in some phase of agriculture. Many continue their studies through agriculture colleges. Their experiences in vocational agriculture and the FFA serve well to help them to success.

Mr. Boggus started with the Company in 1924 as a laborer in Gordon. He transferred to Brazos Plant and worked there until early in 1926. It was there he began helping welders. When they moved to Ranger at Plant 2, he was a relief welder while others were on vacation. While he was there a welder he had worked with asked for him to help with a welding job at Ithex.

"My boss told the welder that I was needed in Ranger, but when I got back to my hotel room, there was a note to report for work at Ithex at 7 a.m. the next morning," he worked along side another Lone Star employee who retired recently—A. P. Rowland.

Black has been a parts and service dealer for International Harvester for the past three years. He was a mechanic for a trucking firm here before opening the Ranger Garage.

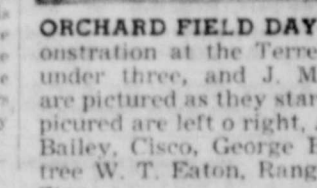
Farmer's Union To Be Chartered Thursday Night

The Eastland County unit of Texas Farmers Union will be chartered at 7:30 p.m. in the Gorman High School Auditorium, Thursday, February 22. All members and prospective members are invited to attend this important meeting.

What is Farmers Union? A lot of people in central Texas are asking that question these days. It is paradoxical that they are asking this since Farmers Union was organized in Texas almost a half century ago.

Ten men got together in a little town in Texas, to be more specific, Point, and founded the Farmers Educational and Operative Union of America. The date was Aug. 28, 1902.

Point, has disappeared from the map but its legacy in Farmers Union has remained. Today Farmers Union has over half a million voting members. It has cooperative enterprises with a net worth totaling \$50,000,000 and is operating in 22 of the 48 states. In some states like Indiana, Farmers Union is relatively new. In others like Oklahoma, it is older than the state itself. Oklahoma boasts the largest membership in Farmers Union with some 70,000 family (Continued on page 4)

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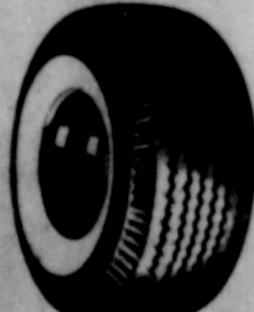

Secondly, it is for young men currently enrolled in high school who desire to complete their schooling before departing for active duty.

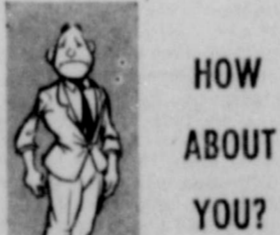
And finally, it is for the young man who wants to enlist, but needs an additional three months at his current employment to bring his affairs up-to-date.

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Archers Report 65 Deer Killed In Texas

Members of the Texas Field Archery Association reported a total kill of 65 deer in the 1962 hunting season, according to a letter received by E. A. Walker, director of program planning for the Game and Fish Commission. The report was made by Jimmie D. Dickens, secretary-treasurer of the archery organization.

Survey information on 35 of the deer showed there were 21 bucks and 14 does and they averaged out 74 pounds each, field dressed.

There were 13 killed in the October special season hunting; 12 in November, and 10 in December. There were 33 killed on stand hunting and 2 in walking. The hunters got 15 standing; 16 walking and 4 running, with only one shot per deer required for 32 deer, and 2 arrows on three deer. The average distance of the shot was 26 yards. The average distance traveled by a deer after being hit was 71.5 yards.

All hunters used laminated fiber glass recurve bows, averaging 48.6 pounds, pull. Fifteen used wood arrows, 15 fiber glass and 4 aluminum. The average number of years of hunting experience per hunter was 5 1/2. Twenty hunters made their first deer kill with a bow and arrow. Three women were successful shooters. Thirty other deer kills also were reported by bow hunters, but without details.
