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Screwworm Eradication Program Now Underway

Henry Fry, Cisco, chairman of the Eastland County Screwworm eradication program committee says, "Texas stockmen and others have contributed over one million three hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars to the screwworm eradication program." "The goal for the State has been set at three million dollars," says Fry. He urges all of those concerned who have not already contributed to leave their contributions with their banks or at the PCA office in Eastland.

The federal government has pledged to match the producer-raised funds in this all important program. Fry wishes to thank all of those workers who have helped in the fund solicitation campaign and those who have made their contributions.

The screwworm eradication program is a reality and is evidence of what group action can accomplish.

The final hurdle in getting the Southwest screwworm eradication program off the ground was cleared when the contract for building the giant screwworm factory was approved here today. Work began immediately at Moore Air Force Base in the Rio Grande Valley and should be completed by July 1.

By taking this quick action, the plant will be in operation two months earlier than expected and ready to meet the peak screwworm season in midsummer.

Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation trustees okayed the contract at a meeting Monday in Dallas. Brown and Root Construction Company of Houston is handling the job.

The meeting drew representatives from the Oklahoma Cattlemen's Association, Oklahoma Extension Service, Texas House of Representatives, Texas Animal Health Commission, Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, plus Foundation trustees and the organizations they represent.

Marvin J. Bridges of Buffalo was named Executive Director of Operations for the Foundation, and will act as the building site until construction is completed. Co-ordinator for the United States Department of Agriculture is Dr. S. C. Gartman.

In summarizing the program thus far, state and Foundation officials cautioned stockmen against "letting down" in their efforts to raise funds. "The real job still lies ahead," they said. At present, less than half of the three million dollar goal has been reached and there will be a stepped up effort to raise the funds as quickly as possible.

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70 IS AVERAGE Number of Divorces Increases In County

That's about 15 above the average for a year, 91st District Judge T. M. Collie, said this week.

major cause of divorce in this county, according to records, is cruelty—several kinds on the part of both parties.

Only six cases were brought on other grounds. Each of these six involved liquor or drinking.

One divorce was granted for a rather obvious reason—the man was married to another woman at the time of the marriage in question.

June may be the month of marriages, but January seems to be the month of divorces here. There were 11 divorces granted last January, leading all other months.

Of the 85 cases, 13 were filed by the male marriage partner.

The average age of women getting divorces last year was 35 and the average for the men was 35.

The oldest woman to get a divorce was 84. The oldest

involving marriages of less than one year.

The longest marriage brought to an end last year was 33 years.



Well Completed 7 Miles NW Of Eastland

Eastland County had another substantial oil producer this week as W. M. Jarrell and

Tex-Star Petroleum Co. completed their No. 1 Gordon Woods, a semi-wildcat seven miles northwest of Eastland. Production was from the Mississippian reef.

The completion test produced 135 barrels of oil in 24 hours from perforations at 4-

017-28 and through a 10-64 inch choke. Casing pressure was 850 pounds and flowing pressure was 630 pounds per square inch.

The well is a north offset to the same company's No. 1 Exall et al, drilled as a discovery hole recently. Low Drilling Co. of Cisco, a partner in the lease drilled both wells. The Woods from the south and west lines of Section 54, Block 4, H & TC Survey.

The well yielded flowing oil on two drill stem tests higher in the hole but in the same formation, it was reported.

The operators have about 1,000 acres in their block. Plans for further development have not been announced.







4-H'ers Are Honored Nationally And Local Events Are Scheduled

Over 2 million other 4-Hers join Eastland County 4-H Club members this week in celebrating National 4-H Club Week.

The 4-H Clubs organization is designed to help develop girls and boys through different subject matter and leadership activities. At the 40th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Ill., Nov. 27, 1961, Raymond C. Firestone made the following statement: "There is no substitute for individual initiative and I know of no organization that provides more opportunities for the application of talents and the exercising of desire for personal advancement. It is true that some of the personal advantages that occur from 4-H Club work are not easily measured, but they may be even more important in your lives than your material achievements. I am referring to 4-H specifically as a builder of character, integrity, determination, understanding and consideration of others. Because you work to win, 4-H is competitive, but at the same time you learn to be cooperative."

You share your interest and your activities with your fellow members. 4-H was born in America and because it has developed in accord with true American traditions, it helps implant in its members the responsibilities of good citizenship.

This type of training is going on in Eastland County and not just at the level of National 4-H Club Congress. The 76 adult 4-H leaders in Eastland County are doing a wonderful job in their respective communities in training and leading boys and girls to better living. The 800 4-H boys and girls in Eastland County are members of a wide range program which is a part of the agricultural Extension Service for young people.

These boys and girls are taught agriculture and home economic methods in a practical way. Each 4-H Club member has an individual demonstration centering in the home, on the farm, on in the community.

4-H Club members may make clothing, prepare and

preserve food, raise livestock and crops, maintain health, promote safety, enjoy recreation or practice citizenship, or a variety of other tasks.

The success of 4-H Club work depends upon volunteer adult leaders. They are the key persons in every 4-H Club. 4-H Parents plus local 4-H leaders plus County Extension Agents added to interested 4-H members equals useful citizens. This is the 4-H team.

There are seven community 4-H Clubs in Eastland County where the 4-H team is at work: Nimrod, Morton Valley, Olden, Cisco, Gorman, Eastland and Deadendona. Each have an active community 4-H Club. Most of these clubs have enough adult leaders so that every 4-H member has the opportunity to carry a 4-H project in the subject matter the member has chosen.

Once a month the community clubs meet at night with the boys, girls, parents and adult leaders present for an evening of business, education, recreation and food. This type of meeting keeps the interest of boys and girls high and many community projects are carried out during the year.

The subject matter groups also meet once a month in the leader's home for the purpose of receiving information in a specific matter field.

Eastland County also has one girls and one boys school 4-H Club at Rising Star, Car-

bon and Scranton and three boys and three girls school clubs in Ranger. These clubs meet during the school hours and the assistant agents and hold a business and educational meeting. Some of the clubs have adult leaders subject matter groups.

Special activities are held during the year for all of the members. In March each year, the county contests are held. Each summer the girls and boys each enjoy their respective camps. At all of these county, district and state activities, members are given an opportunity to meet 4-H members from all over the state and work together with new and different people as they live and show that they truly mean it when they say: "I pledge my Head to clearer thinking, my Heart to greater loyalty, my Hands to larger service, my Health to better living. For my club, my community and my Country."

Joe Bob Browning of Gorman, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau stated this week that ten dollars is a small fee to pay to protect an investment amounting to thousands of dollars.

Browning announced that the local county organization is staging its annual membership drive beginning March 10th and continuing through March 17th.

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has set a quota of 600 member families for 1962. Last year the organization had 585 enrolled.

Cyrus Justice, county membership chairman, has planned a kick-off breakfast for this community to be held Saturday morning at the White Elephant.
