Fred Bennett Named to C of C Director Post

Directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce met Monday night in the Chamber office for a regular meeting. Fred Bennett was named to the unexpected term of Wilson Guest as a director of the Chamber of Commerce.

Bennett is associated with the Social Science Laboratories in Ranger and has been a resident of the City for eight years.

Bennett has worked on many civic groups and served as Scoutmaster of Troop 10 for several years. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Ranger United Fund, serving as campaign coordinator last year, and he is a member of the First Methodist Church.

Plans for jointly sponsoring the State Junior College Track Meet to be held in Ranger on May 1 and 2 with Ranger Junior College were made by directors. President Dick Henderson appointed committees to work with Ranger Junior College officials. Committees appointed were: Concession: Charles Milliken, H. G. Adams Jr., and Dwaine Dennis; Bleachers: Henderson, W. T. Eaton and Morris Campbell; Welcome: T. C. Wylie, David Pickrell, a n d A. N. Larson; Housing: C. W. Sooter, Henderson and Plumley; and publicity, Dennis.

Henderson gave a report on the progress of construction of the RJC track. He said final leveling of the track would be completed Tuesday and curbing should be completed by Thursday. Plans call for cinders to be placed inside the curbing on Thursday or Friday, with final completion sometime next week.

Featherlite Corporation will complete the cleanup sometime this week. They will move and level dirt that was removed from the track proper.

Morris Campbell reported that the Veterans Park, located on Highway 80 East, would be cleaned up in cooperation with the city. The park can be made a very attractive place, a n d ready tables and benches are already there. Trees will be white-washed, to add to the attractiveness.

Roy Plumley read a revised copy of bylaws for the organization. Directors voted to adopt the bylaws as written.

Campbell reported that the road to Featherlite Corporation was complete except for the seal coating. C. W. Sooter gave a report on the Trade Extension Committee. A report was also made that aluminum letter for RJC archway has been ordered.

Henderson asked directors to put forth new efforts in their work in the Chamber of Commerce. He said that more leg work is needed, and urged each director to make renewed efforts to make the organization more effective.

Three Men Injured In Auto Accident

Three Ranger men were involved in a one car accident Wednesday morning, 4 1/2 miles east of Ranger. Passengers in the car were George Mac Perry, Aubrey Love and James Riddling. Perry and Riddling were dismissed from Ranger General Hospital after receiving emergency treatment.

Love was hospitalized with head and face lacerations and possible internal chest injuries. The car, a 1953 Oldsmobile, hit a bridge railing on Russell Creek.

Polls Open At 8 a.m. In 6 School Districts

A record number of voters are expected to march to the polls Saturday to cast ballots in what has become one of the most controversial issues ever to arise in this county.

Polls will open at 8 p.m. in voting places in six school districts in the county to determine if the voters want to consolidate the six districts into one new single district. The election was called Feb. 21st by County Judge John Hart after he had been petitioned by 271 petition-signers.

The election Saturday will be the culmination of a project initiated about two years ago by Dr. James Whittington, Eastland.

Polls in all voting places will be open until 7 p.m. An extremely high number of absentee ballots have been cast in the election. Tuesday at noon, a total of 79 votes had already been cast at the County Clerk's office. Break-down by districts was as follows: Eastland, 42; Gorman, 28; Ranger, 3; Carbon, 2; Olden, 1; and Desdemona, 0.

Voting sites over the districts will be as follows: Carbon, Hamner Funeral Home; Gorman, school house; Olden, school; Ranger, City Hall; Desdemona school house, and Eastland Courthouse.

Election judges will be Ranger, Calvin Brown; Olden, Mrs. O. H. Dick; Gorman, W. G. Baker; Carbon, H. M. Gilbert; Desdemona, L. E. Clark, a n d Eastland, E. E. Layton.

The ballot will be an extremely simple one with the vote choices.

It will read: For Consolidation, and Against Consolidation, with the voter marking through the choice for which he does not want to vote.

Deer Season Extended And Does Okayed

Deer-hunters will get a 30-day season in Eastland County next season and will be permitted to take doe, as the result of recent legislation. The new regulations, which were patterned after Throckmorton County restrictions, were issued during the last session, Rep. Scott Bailey of Cisco said.

Shooters can take doe if they have a 50 cent permit from the County Clerk's office, and permission of the land owner. Bag limit will be the same, and dates will be from Nov. 16th to Dec. 15th, inclusive, Bailey said.

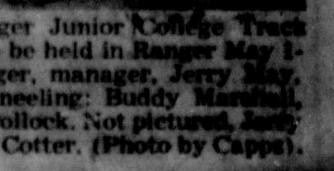
The old regulations were adopted in 1940.

Saturday will be a very important day in the life of Ranger, Eastland, Olden, Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona. On that day, citizens of the six communities will vote on the all-important question of school consolidation.

Citizens have the choice of voting for one high school — location uncertain — to serve children of all six communities, or to keep their schools as they are now.

The importance of the election cannot be taken lightly, because the entire future of each community is involved. The identity of a town is usually associated with its schools. If a town loses its schools, will it also lose its identity?

Advocates for consolidation indicate that the six districts can be debt free in 10 years, through incentive aid. They also say that children will be offered a superior education, one that cannot be offered with the six districts operating separately.

Other reports from the "for" side say that if the population of our area continues to decline as it has in the past years, there is no salvation other than to consolidate the school systems.

On the other hand, what will happen if population continues to drop and consolidation is voted in? If this happens, how will the consolidated school exist without heavy tax increases? It seems only logical to assume that more taxes would be the only answer.

Those opposing consolidation say that the consolidated system would offer no additional subjects that are not offered in the Ranger school system.

Ranger has a lot to be proud of in its present school system. Many Ranger High School graduates have completed institutions of higher learning and become doctors, lawyers, scientists and well-known figures in the business world, to mention only a few.

Opposition has made an estimate that in 10 years, if consolidation is voted in the system will have an operating deficit of \$991,646, instead of being debt-free through incentive aid. You, Mr. and Mrs. Citizen, are the judge and the jury on the issue. We urge you to thoroughly investigate the issue before casting your vote on Saturday, March 17.

By the way, the Ranger Times will be open Saturday night to await election returns. You are invited to drop by and wait with us.

Wooden Key Recalls Interesting Traditions

The re-discovery of an old 13 by 44 inch aluminum-coated wooden key has unlocked a long-forgotten tradition at Ranger Junior College. The tradition was started in 1933 by the RJC Student Council. Every year in May the freshman class would give a May-Day breakfast for the graduating sophomores, at which time the president of the Sophomore class would present to the president of the freshman class the "silver key" signed by each member of the graduating class. The key was handed down from class to class until finally there was no room left for the signatures of the sophomores.

The breakfast was prepared traditionally by the freshman, and as it had to be over in time for students to meet eight o'clock classes, one can imagine what a time the poor, sleepy, head freshmen had getting up and having breakfast ready by six-thirty. The breakfast, prepared in the kitchen of either the First Baptist or First Methodist Church, traditionally consisted of toast or hot biscuits, ham or bacon, scrambled eggs, jelly and coffee and was shared by the sophomores with the freshmen.

A study of the many names on the key is both interesting and revealing. A very familiar name in the class of 1944, one which RJC shorthand students will have no trouble recognizing, is that of Anna McEver, Ranger High School business administration teacher, who was formerly a full-time instructor in the college and is now short-hand instructor in the Ranger Junior College Evening Division.

Doctrine is something that frees man from sin when man obeys it from his heart (Rom. 6:17-18), that is if it is the doctrine of Christ delivered by the apostles.
