Murder, Suicide Verdict Given In Deaths

A verdict of murder and suicide was given by Justice of the Peace, Ruby Springer, of Ranger Wednesday afternoon in the death of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Richardson of Lake Leon.

The bodies of the couple were discovered by Perry Vinson of Ranger. Ranger Police arrived at the scene at 1:20 p.m. Wednesday. The bodies were found on the floor of the couple's bedroom.

Officers said evidence indicated that Richardson shot his wife and then turned the gun on himself.

Investigating officers said that Mrs. Richardson was evidently seated on the bed when shot in the chest. The bullet passed completely through her body and lodged in the mattress. Richardson was shot in the right temple. The bullet was found lying on the floor in a room adjacent to the bedroom.

Cancer Contribution Uses Explained By J. W. White

J. W. White, publicity chairman for the American Cancer Society in Texas, has released the following article concerning the Cancer Crusade that will be held in Ranger and the County on April 17.

He said that for every dollar that was contributed to the American Cancer Society in Texas in 1961 in all phases—memorial, crusade, special projects and unsolicited funds—the following amounts will be spent in Texas by the Society in 1962:

40c—For cancer research in Texas Research Institutions.

17c—For professional education and services keeping physicians informed of up-to-date developments in care and treatments of cancer, providing clinical fellowships, supporting Tumor Clinics and Cancer Registries, supporting professional conferences.

24c—For public education—informing Texans of Cancer's Seven Danger Signals in order that they may guard themselves and their families against cancer.

11c—For service to patients—providing cancer patients with dressings, loan closet and comfort items, and other volunteer services on the local level.

5c—For administration and development of program.

8c—For campaign—to provide materials to reach three million Texas families during April Crusade and in memorial, legacy and special gifts programs for dollars to support continuing cancer control program of research, education and service.

Continuing, White said, due to the high level of national research grants being made in Texas, the Society will in 1962 spend more money in Texas Crusade and other activities.

For every dollar raised, the Society will spend, as shown in the above breakdown, one dollar and ten cents.

Ranger Junior College has had a chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, national honorary scholarship society, for seventeen years. Delta Tau chapter having been chartered February 17, 1945. 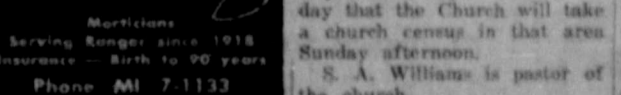

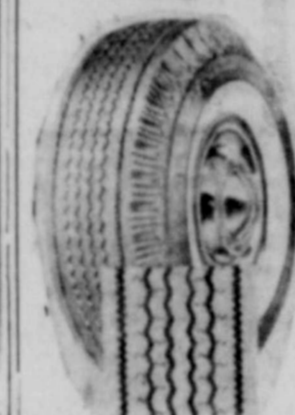

helping with every project for the improvement and betterment of Ranger.

Among the projects of the club was the building of the first tourist camp in this section, which was located across the street from the Willows swimming pool. Members of the club and a number of high school boys carried rock and other material and built a stone building which served as a cook shack and a shelter in bad weather.

The organization of the Ranger County Club was another undertaking that was outstanding. Members of the club hauled rock and timbers to build the substantial club house, and the club fastened the new organization until it was able to operate on its own.

The Lions Club acquired the block on which the Willows park and swimming pool is located at no cost to the city, and later . . . saved the building of the first Willows pool, also operated it for some time. Later, with the city, sponsored the building of the present modern pool.

The club for a while sponsored a community Christmas tree, marking the streets for parking, has an annual pancake supper for the March of Dimes, furnished hundreds of pairs of glasses for needy persons; sponsored the organization of the Carl Barnes Post, American Legion, the American Building & Loan Association, also sponsored the organization of the Strawn Lions Club, and has been consistently supporting the Crippled Children's Camp at Keeville both financially and morally.

Just recently the club participated with other clubs in this zone in a program to collect eye glasses frames, which were sent with the others to Columbia, South America and Pakistan. A total of 168 frames were collected by the local club. Almost every year the club has conducted light bulb and broom sales and other fund raising projects.

The club has a fine membership with almost 40 years continuous membership; one with 36, and one with 30, and a perfect attendance record for the entire 30 years, each of whom has served as president of the club. We doubt if any club in the district can match these records.

Unfortunately we are unable to give you a list of past presidents and other officers, due to the fact that old records and minutes are not available, and the information in this brief and scant history of the Ranger Lions club has been gathered by research of the files of the Ranger Times and from the memory of older members.

It is the hope of the local club to have been to unite its members in the closest bonds of friendship and promote a closer business relation and social union among the membership, promote commercial, industrial and civic betterment; to lend all encouragement possible toward education, to uphold the principles of good government and bring about a better understanding among men and to teach that organization, cooperation and reciprocity are better than destructive competition.

We wish to express thanks to those who have assisted in compiling this brief history, and the Ranger Times for the privilege of using its files.

Red Cross Offers Safety Courses in Texas

Efforts of the Red Cross to provide instruction in first aid, swimming and lifesaving, and all craft safety to Texas families resulted in a total of 140,999 residents receiving instruction in these courses during the past year. A report released last week in St. Louis, by Philip Schenkberg, manager, Midwestern Area Office, also noted that 149 residents have been awarded Certificates of Merit for applying Red Cross safety training to the saving of human life since the program was

established over 50 years ago. Schenkberg said that renewed emphasis was given to first aid training among industrial workers, police, firemen, youth, families, and community groups, and efforts to widen public knowledge of the simple and effective mouth-to-mouth resuscitation method were continued both in formal courses and through news media. Formal first aid training was completed by 53,779 persons.

In the field of water safety, Texas Red Cross chapters offered parents a home instruction course, Teaching Johnny to Swim, for their children and focused attention on using the rapidly growing number of farm ponds and residential pools to teach the safe use of these facilities. Throughout the state, 73,678 residents also received certificates for completing swimming classes, and 12,272 successfully completed formal instruction in lifesaving.

As part of the national emphasis on physical fitness, the Red Cross has initiated the new swim and stay fit program, designed to encourage regular and frequent swimming. The ultimate goal for participants is to swim 50 miles, accumulated in segments of one quarter mile with certificates issued for each 10 miles covered. The program has met with great success. Throughout the nation, many have already completed 50 miles and are working toward additional awards, proving that swimming can be not only good recreation but also an important factor in a total physical fitness program.

The increasing need for safety training in the use of small boats also received the attention of local chapters, and 582 Red Cross certificates were issued to persons completing these courses. The need for ed-

ucation in the safe use of small craft is so great that, with more than 40 million boating enthusiasts throughout the country, Red Cross is placing emphasis on this program.

In addition to the individuals who received formal instruction in these Red Cross safety courses, Schenkberg indicated that more than 240,717 were given some kind of informal first aid, water safety, or small craft instruction through demonstrations, film showings, and educational talks.

These essential programs depend upon voluntary contributions of funds, Schenkberg said, and it is vital that the 1962 campaign goal be met in order that such services may continue for safety's sake in Texas.

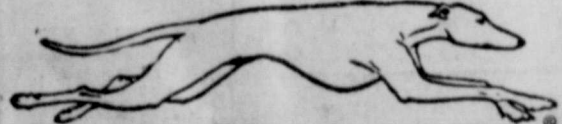

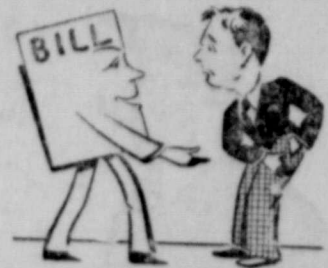
