RJC Golf Team Wins At Lone Cedar

Match play in the Texas Junior College golf meet held at Lone Cedar Country Club Monday was won by the Ranger Junior College team with a score of 301 to 302. The Ranger team won over a team from South Texas Junior College of Houston.

Billy Wiggs and Craig Adams of Ranger had a combined team score of 301. Harris Greenwood and Milton Geismar of South Texas had a team total of 302. Wiggs shot a 74-80 and Adams had a 73-74.

Ranger's second team composed of Gary Bradshaw and Bill Sipes, beat the Navarro Junior College team by a score of 313 to 314. Sipes had a 26-hole total of 159 and Bradshaw shot 155 for the day.

Navarro team members were Wayne Mayo and Glen Lively. Craig Adams of Ranger won medalist honors Tuesday when he shot a 203 on 36 holes.

Next in line was Hoffman of San Antonio with 310 and Bradshaw of Ranger with 311. Others in the medalist play were Sprole of Cooke; Wiggs, Ranger; Rowland, Greenwood and Giesman, all of South Texas and Mayo of Navarro.

- Class 4 "Spring flowers and foliage on a base."
- Class 5 "Spring Beauty from the Roadside" A composition featuring weathered material, shells, rocks, etc., combined with spring flowers, foliage or other fresh cut plant material.
- Class 6 "Spring Meditation" A composition using spring flowers.

Junior College Administrators Elect Officers

The annual business meeting of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference was held at 9:00 A. M., April 30, at Lone Cedar Country Club, with Dr. Theodore Nicksiek, Jr., Ranger Junior College, presiding.

A committee was appointed to study the request of some junior colleges in the conference to participate in only one sport and still maintain conference membership. President Jim Atkinson, Blinn College, was named chairman of this committee, which will report next year's conference meeting.

President Grady Hogue, Cisco Junior College, was appointed chairman of a committee to study recommendations made by coaches and athletic directors concerning method of running off the spring track meet, method of running off conference basketball tournament, prohibiting transfers from participating in athletics, and assigning of basketball referees.

No Fatalities Reported In 2 Month Period

No fatalities were reported resulting from the 21 accidents on Eastland County highway during the months of February and March.

Eight persons were injured in accidents during the two months resulting from six personal injury accidents. Fifteen property damage accidents were reported with a total of \$6,940 worth of damage done.

POLLS OPEN AT EIGHT

Heavy Vote Is Expected

Absentee voting is up about 25 per cent this year for the Saturday primary.

At 5 p. m. Tuesday the County Clerk's office reported 191 Democratic votes and 2 Republican votes cast in absenteeism.

Two years ago, the first year of the early primaries, absentee voting dropped off by about 50 per cent, records show, and approximately 150 votes were cast in absenteeism.

The total county vote that year was slightly over 4,000. Eastland County voters are getting their money's worth out of their current poll taxes. The tax receipts earned votes on school, city, consolidation and now primary and later general elections, for counties.

Ranger voters may get an extra vote out of theirs if the beer-wine election is called. Petitions with over 300 signatures are now in the County Clerk's office being checked, but at mid-week there was no indication as to when they would be turned over to the Commissioner's Court. The Court meets next on April 14th.

Some might contend that there's enough on the ballot to justify the price of a poll tax—even though there's a constitutional amendment proposition on the ballot, which if passed, would be an invitation to the Legislature do away with the poll.

Democratic voters will have the choice among six candidates for governor; five candidates for lieutenant governor; six candidates for attorney general; seven for congressman at large; three places to fill on the State Supreme Court; one judge, court of criminal appeals; two railroad commissioners; the un-contested offices of comptroller, treasurer and land commissioner of agriculture.

Blinn JC Takes First Place in Track Meet

The Texas Junior College Track and Field Meet held at the new Ranger Junior College track on Monday and Tuesday, was considered a big success by college officials. The track was completed only a few days before the meet got underway.

Strong north winds greeted the trackmen on both days of competition. The layout of the track made it necessary to run most of the events directly into the wind.

Blinn Junior College of Brenham accumulated a total of 72 points in the events to win the meet by a large margin. Coming in second was Schreiner Institute of Kerrville with 50 points. Next in line were: San Antonio College, 31 points; Lee College of Baytown, 30; Cooke County Junior College of Gainessville, 21; Ranger Junior College, 15%; Cisco Junior College, 12%; Temple Jr. College, 5 and Navarro Junior College of Corsicana, 3.

Blinn took the lead early Monday and continued to pile up points as the meet progressed. Four events were completed Monday, with Blinn capturing 23 1/2 points for the day. Ranger was running in second place at the end of the day on Monday with 11 1/2 points. Finals held Monday were: the broad jump, shot put, discus and high jump. Preliminaries were held in the 440 yard dash, 440-yard relay, 100-yard dash, 220-yard low hurdles, 120-yard high hurdles and the 220-yard dash. Following is a complete list:

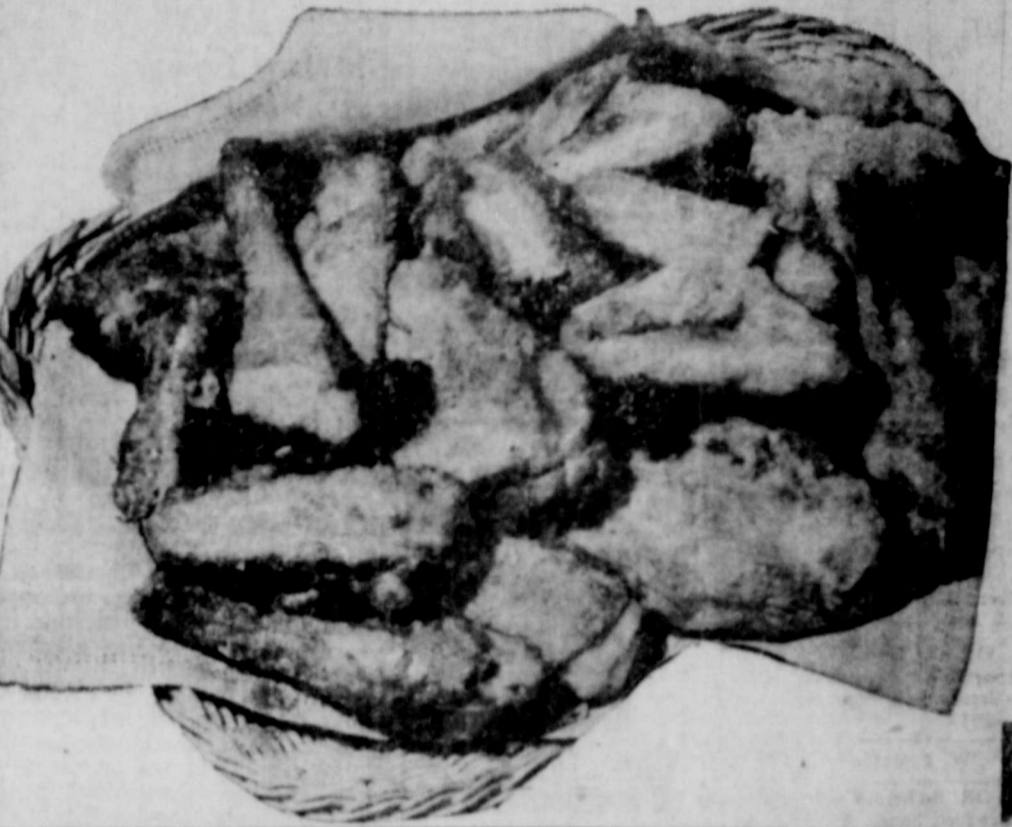

things a reality, will seek a second term and no more as I do not have in mind a dedicated tenure.

My age is 58, High School Graduate, two years college, majoring in business and law.

As your County Judge, Chairman of the Commissioners' Court as well as having jurisdiction in Probate matters and certain criminal and Civil cases, my initial procedure will be as follows:

1. My first official act, after taking the oath of office and organization of the Commissioners' Court will be to re-

quest the Court to place of record and order dispensing with the \$100 per month now in effect designated as expenses for the County Judge's Office, which is not now itemized.

2. My recommendation to the Court, affecting each and every employee paid from our treasury, will be to place an order of record as of January 1st, 1963, to pay each employee doing like work, the same salary in the respective fields of employment.

3. The responsibility of the Commissioners will be respected in their duties to control finances, set tax rates, control internal affairs of the county, make policies of expenditures from our tax revenues, author-

ize such trips concerning roads and other matters on approved order of the Court.

4. As your Judge I shall recommend to the Court, like treatment, expenditures and favors to every person on all matters affecting their well-being.

5. I have no one to punish and no special person or persons to reward. If you will elect me, I pledge you my best efforts as your County Judge to co-operate with all of our officials at every level, looking to making our county the best, with service to all alike.

On this basic statement, I solicit your vote and support.

Revival of the Republican Party in Texas has thrown many voters into a state of confusion over interpretation of our State's election code. For many, many years in Texas the only alternative to the voter who desired a voice in the selection of local officials was to vote in the Democratic Primary. 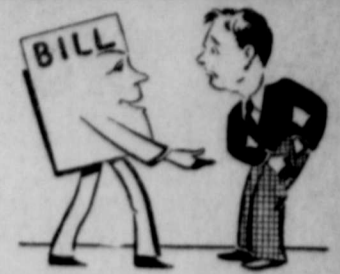
