#### BE SURE TO VOTE

(AN EDITORIAL)

Revival of the Republican Party in Texas has thrown many voters into a state of confusion over interpretation of our State's election code. For many, many years in Texas the only alternative to the voter who desired a voice in the selection of local officials was to vote in the Democratic Primary. Today this voter's plight has been compounded by the advent of the Republican candidates on the political scene at the statewide level. These men of course are going to appeal to some voters who have voted in the Democratic primary all of their lives. The question has arisen then, if it is legal to vote for the local candidates of one party in the May primary and then vote for a candidate of another party for a state wide office in the fall General Election.

There is no legal or moral obligation to support the nominees of a party if one does not believe them to be the men he wants to elect. There is never a moral obligation to vote for the wrong man.

The question of voting in general does not involve a moral obligation though. Our United States Constitution guarantees that the rights and priviledges given to us by God shall remain in our control. Inherent in the guaranteed by the Constitution is the responsibility to vote. We cannot hope to remain a free nation for long if the voting franchise is long neglected.

#### The People Will Not Be Fooled!

We have a great deal of respect for the intelligence of the voters of this county, and we are convinced that an informed electorate will elect the best qualified candidates to public office.

We would not presume, therefore, to try to tell our friends how to vote, but we do believe that it is our obligation as citizens to present you our views concerning races of considerable importance. 


