Most every student that leaves Ranger and goes to another school will tell you that Ranger has one of the finest systems in the state.

The latest heard was comparing our Junior High Band with the one of another school. This student reported that the "other" school met for classes, but the comparison ended there. The student said that the class is generally in a turmoil all of the time and that band students had very poor discipline. This certainly speaks well of our band director and also of our schools.

A new type of material, Ensolite, is now used in the manufacture of athletic equipment, he said. He said that the material will cushion shock of contact much better than the old type materials used. The Ensolite also makes equipment 30 to 40 percent lighter than the old style pieces, he reported.

He said that the majority of manufacturers of athletic equipment have the interest of the boy at heart and manufacture equipment that will give maximum protection to those participating in various sports.

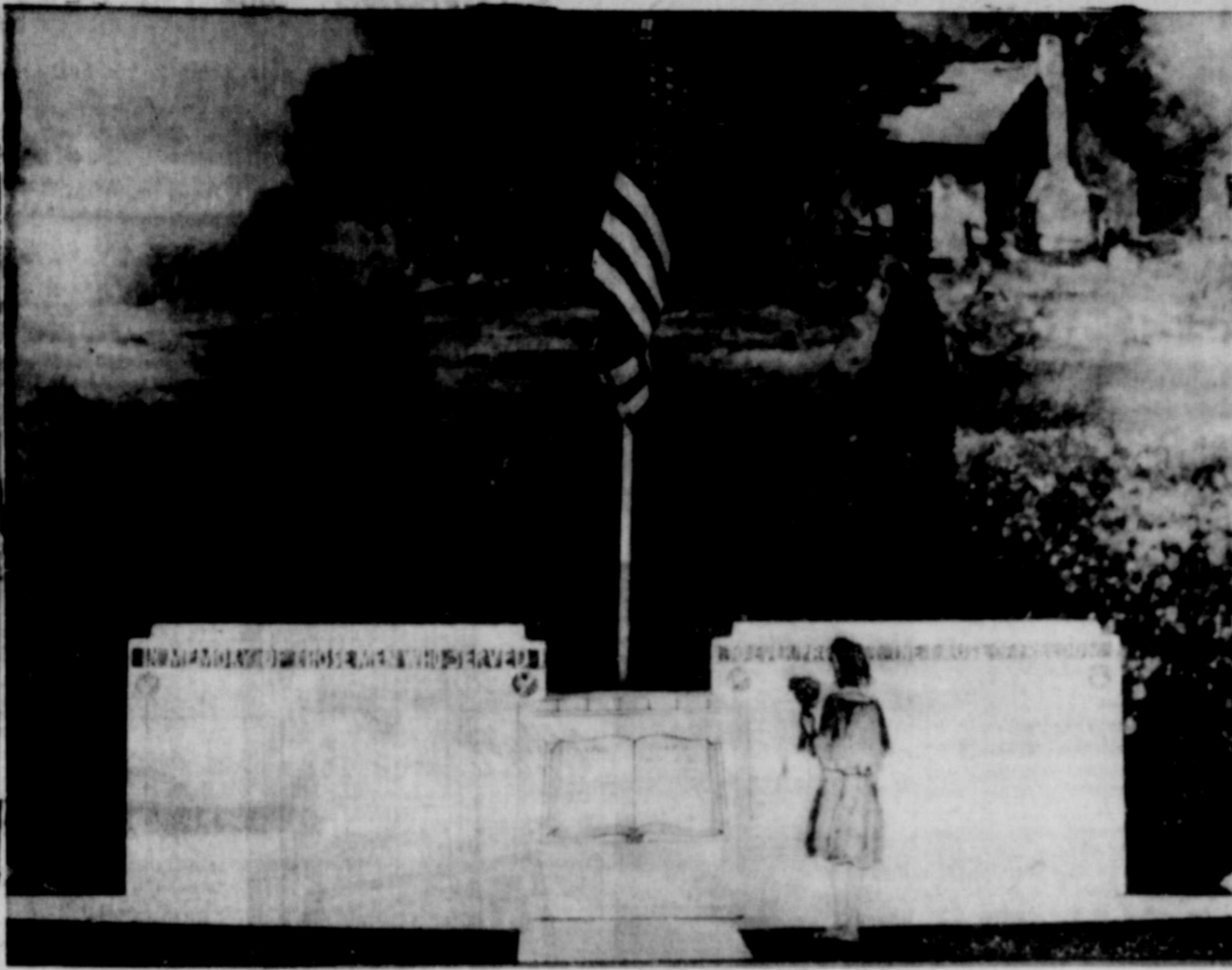
It is quite an honor for our college band to be chosen for the opening ceremonies. We can be justly proud of each member and the director, Roger Martin.

FUNDS NEEDED

Legion-Auxiliary To Erect War Memorial

Some 30 year ago the Ranger American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary of Carl Barnes Post No. 69 dedicated a plot in the Evergreen Cemetery in Ranger to honor the men of Ranger who had served in the armed forces of the United States. Each year in this plot wooden crosses have been erected in memory of those veterans who had died during that year. These crosses have been temporarily used until that time when a permanent and beautiful memorial could be placed in the cemetery.

Now, the desire of thirty years is about to be fulfilled. A truly fitting and lasting tribute will be placed on the Legion Plot in the cemetery for dedication on Memorial Day of 1963.

At the present time there are some 219 crosses on the plot and many of these are in bad state of repair. These will be removed and in front of the flag pole will be placed an imposing

monument, of Crystal White Granite, which will be four feet high and fifteen feet long. Names of deceased veterans will be inscribed on the monument. Plans also call for the plot to be beautifully landscaped.

Financing of the project will be accomplished by donations from relatives and friends of deceased veterans, it has been announced. Cost of placing names on the monument has been set at \$10 each. However, it is noted that it will be impossible to contact all relatives and friends of deceased veterans and it will be necessary for others to aid financially in order for the memorial to be erected. Donations to the project may be made by sending a check payable to American Legion - Auxiliary Monument Fund, Carl Barnes Post No. 69, Ranger, Texas. Any amount of donation will be greatly appreciated.

Bob Patterson is commander of the Ranger Post and Mrs. A. H. Powell is Auxiliary president.

W. K. Gordon Jr., Fort Worth, son of the late W. K. Gordon, driller of McCleskey well No. 1 the discovery well that started the Ranger oil boom back in 1917, will erect a memorial monument on the site of the well in the near future.

Mr. Gordon contacted the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and asked that research be made on the possibility of having the marker erected. Through efforts of the chamber of commerce, the marker has been ordered and will be placed on the site in the near future.

The inscriptions will read as follows: "On the site of the first oil well drilled in Eastland County, the J. H. McCleskey No. 1, discovery well of the Ranger Pool was drilled by Warren Wagner under the supervision of W. K. Gordon of the Texas and Pacific Coal and Oil Company, July 2, - Oct. 27, 1917. Initial production was 1600 barrels of oil with 3,000, 000 feet of gas. During the life of the well, it produced 275,000 barrels of oil. Erected 1963.

Mrs. William Ray Todd, owner of the property where the well site is located, has given permission for the erection of the memorial. Mrs. Todd makes her home at 108 Cypress St. in Ranger.

The grand champion ram of the junior breeding show, was exhibited by John Baker, Eastland 4-H, and Ivy Ferguson had the reserve champion. The 4-H members are under the supervision of County Agent, J. M. Cooper and Assistant Roger Blackmon.

In the open show the champion ewe, a Corriedale, was exhibited by L. M. Cowley of Cisco and the champion ram was shown by Buster Pharis of Cisco.

The hottest competition Friday was in the fat barrow division. Dr. Ray Anderson of Fort Worth, who has judged the ewe in several previous shows, said he was greatly impressed by the vast improvement he observed in the show.

He was especially complimentary of the finishing out of the barrows.

The Cisco FFA Champion, which VA teacher Charles Donald is prime hog raiser, showed both grand and reserve champion barrows.

Victor Plambeck, whose Hampshire was named grand champion last Saturday at the Cisco Stock Show, captured the top county barrow title with the same Hampshire.

Three In Race for City Street Commissioner

Three Ranger men have filed as candidates for the city's only open post—that of street commissioner, James Higginbotham resigned from the position some time ago.

Two of the candidates, Fred Bennett and O. J. Caraway, own businesses in Ranger. The third, V. V. Cooper, is employed by the Ranger Housing Authority.

O. J. Caraway, owner and operator of the O. J. Caraway Truck and Tractor Shop on Highway 80 East, was born and raised in the Lucas Community. He is married to the former Miss Dora Elder of East Texas. They have two sons, O. L., Jr., 14, and John Wayne, 13.

He is a member of the Second Baptist Church. During World War II, Mr. Caraway worked in defense work in Davenport, moving to Breckenridge later. He was shot foreman for Featherlite Corporation of Ranger about two years.

Mr. Caraway at this is his first time to seek public office and that he has had 25 years experience with heavy equipment and contracting on the maintenance and operating same.

Fred Bennett, shop foreman of Social Science, Inc., was born and raised in Gorman where he graduated from high school. He is married to the former Miss Peggy Bell and they are the parents of two boys, Gary 11 and Mike, 6.

Mr. Bennett is well known in this area for his work with the Boy Scouts for the past eight years. He is a committeeman on Explorer Post 10, a member of District Scout Master Training Team and Scout Master of Boy Scout Troop 10.

Mr. Bennett holds membership in the Ft. Worth Club of the Printing House Craftsmen, serving on the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce. He served in the air force for two years.

He and his wife are owners and operators of the Bulldog Grill.

This is his first time to enter politics and made this statement, "I am an independent candidate, and will serve on my own merits. I ask only for the opportunity to serve the people, if they desire me to. I have had no previous experience in this capacity, but will strive to give fair and honest service."

Following is a direct quotation of Mr. Cooper regarding his reasons for filing and his qualifications.

"In announcing for Street Commissioner I realize it is a very responsible position. Several years ago I served in same capacity and enjoyed it very much, even though it is a problem to do as much as needs to be done with limited finances.

For the past year I have been retired from the City of a Company, after 38 years of service with the City. I am a native of Ranger having spent all my life here. Mrs. Cooper was Vera Bluewell before our marriage. We have one daughter and her family Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Horton and three grand children, Sharon, Jimmie and Jeff of East Brunswick, New Jersey.

Have been on Board of Regions, Ranger Junior College for past few years. I believe in the future of Ranger and would like to be of service in any way that will help the growth of this City and Community."

Personality of the Week

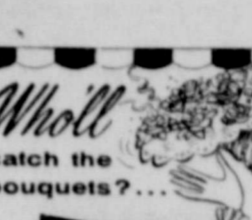

Black pepper is the dried fruit or berries of the pepper vine, which is found in tropical climates. The berries are picked while still green and dried in the sun. White pepper is the ripened seed of the berry which is fermented, then washed to remove the skin and pulp and spread in a thin layer in the sun.

Most of the pepper we use comes from the Far East. It is a well-known and well-used spice and may be delicately added to all foods with the exception of sweet desserts.

How Much Is Your Name Worth? On A Mailing List That Is

How much is the name and address of an Eastland County resident worth? On a mailing list—plenty.

Just how much, depends on his position, economically and otherwise. If he is wealthy and is thereby a good prospect for a cabin cruiser or for membership in an exclusive club, his name is worth quite a bit.

However, if his name is a readily-obtained one, it is the case with school teachers, doctors, lawyers and the like, or if his buying power is low, it brings less.

There are about 250 firms that compile such lists and lease them or sell them to companies that wish to approach prospects by mail or by direct solicitation

either in person or by telephone. The price may range anywhere from one cent per name to as much as a dollar for each time it is used.

The majority of Eastland County residents are on a number of such lists, as is evident from the amount of letters they receive from all sorts of organizations.

Some 231 of them, for instance, are on lists that contain the names and addresses of local families with incomes over \$10,000 a year.

Among those who purchase and use such lists are resort operators and automobile dealers who handle expensive types of cars.

On the other hand, a book publisher with a special edition of Shakespeare's works in a year want to limit his approach to college graduates. A listing of this group would yield 456 names in Eastland County.

There are some 65 men in the county who own yachts and are on lists of such owners and others interested in such people. They are willing to pay for a list of them.

Companies dealing in baby products, laundry services and beauty-care preparations in a year feel that married women in the 25 to 34 age category are their most likely prospects. They would want the names of those in the local area.

Many other specialized lists are prepared for firms that want to aim at specific targets with their products and services. Among them are lists of recent brides, new home owners and two-car families.

Be Sure to Read This One -

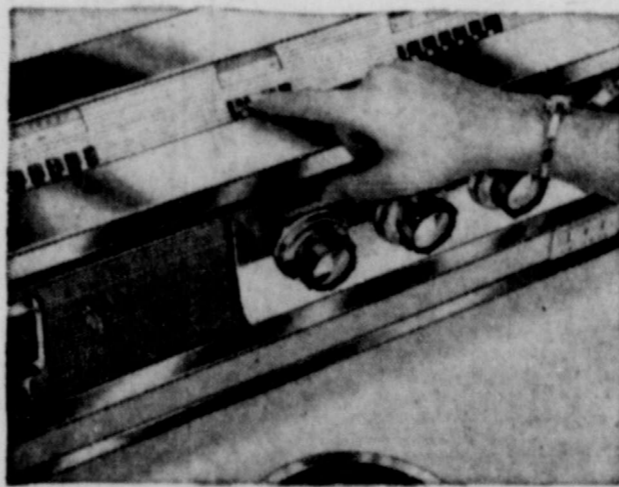

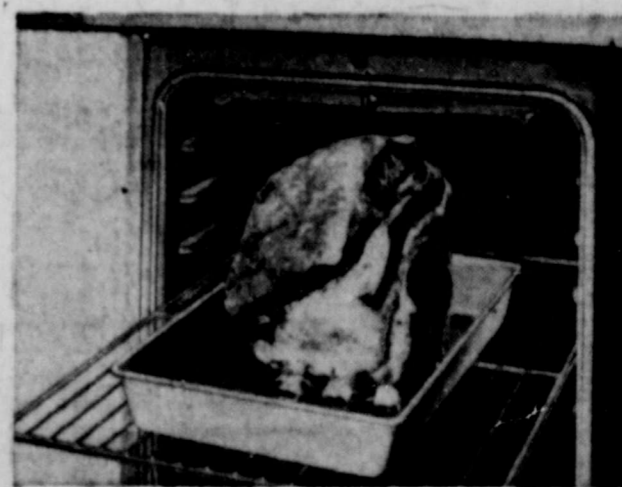

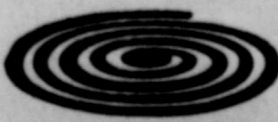

It's The Law

FUGITIVE

In recent years, encouraged by easy travel, a number of people in trouble with the law have skipped out and gone abroad. The law, or rather the lack of law, also serves to make such a trip attractive. For international extradition is rare, and world-wide extradition has not yet caught up with the jet age.

When a fugitive runs to another state, extradition is fairly easy: One governor asks the governor of the other state to

send the fugitive back home for trial. After a short hearing, the governor usually does this.

But when fugitives flee abroad, international treaty governs extradition. If a treaty with the foreign country fails to cover the offense, extradition may not be possible since each country may interpret treaties in its own way.

One rule most often applied is that of "double criminality" by which the offense must be a crime in both the requesting and the asylum nations. Many countries, especially underdeveloped ones, do not deal with the same kinds of "business crimes" that we do. Exports where murder and robbery are crimes; but not violations of banking laws, or other kinds of business regulatory crimes and taxes.

Many countries do not extradite for political crimes, but they may grant asylum. In one case Russia sought to get its hands on an escapee charged with murder and arson which occurred in connection with a political uprising. The U. S. turned down the request claiming the charge was "political in character."

In 1934 Germany sought to extradite a Jew for criminal trial. Again the U. S. refused because the Jew would not be likely to get a fair trial.

Under our system of government, two distinct levels of law—federal and state—may govern what we do.

State laws have traditionally governed certain fields; for example, the law of wills, estates and transfers of property upon death. Each state has its own rules on death transfers, how to make wills, and what happens when a person dies without a will.

But the federal government has some power in this field, especially when federal money went to the decedent or when it involved a national policy.

In a dispute between the United States and a State over a decedent's estate, the U.S. Supreme Court set forth some of the federal powers: A war veteran died in a veterans hospital without a will or heirs. He had some personal property. Under the state law property escheated to the state. Under federal law the property goes to the U.S.

The U.S. Supreme Court handed the estate to the U.S. under its war powers. When patients die without wills all property goes to keep up veterans' hospitals and recreation programs.

Other veterans' laws have cut into the states' property rights even though premiums came from community funds.

As a rule people who live in federal enclaves within a state must obey state laws. Thus, Texas law governs civilians on military and scientific areas, or workers on a federal reservation as to wills, property, marriage and divorce. In the case of crimes there may sometimes be concurrent jurisdiction.

But the federal government may pass laws to avoid conflict between state laws and a national policy.
