## Heavy Vote Produces Three Runoffs In City Election

Three runoffs developed in the Ranger city official election Tuesday following a heavy vote of 883.

In the mayor's race, incumbent Morris Newnham will be in a runoff election with Dewey Cox, Jr. Mayor Newnham polled 431 votes and Mr. Cox collected 433 votes. Matthew Roberts, the third candidate in the race, polled a total of 10 votes, enough to force a runoff.

In the street commissioner race, Fred Bennett led the three-man field with 426 votes but will face a runoff with V. V. Cooper, who got 360 votes. O. J. Caraway received 86.

G. C. McGown and Lee Cantrell will go into a runoff for the water commissioner post. Mr. McGown led with a total of 309 votes and Mr. Cantrell polled 297 votes. The third man, Jack Robinson, got 264.

Incumbent W. J. Sipes was defeated by Dr. S. J. Jones for finance commissioner. Dr. Jones polled 490 to 382 for Mr. Sipes.

George Falls defeated Leonard Pounds 522 to 346, for police and fire commissioner.

The heavy vote of 883 is compared to 539 votes cast in the April 1961 election.

Mr. Newnham is seeking his second term as mayor. He was born in Ranger and moved to Longview at the age 15 with his parents. He is a graduate of Longview High School and of Rice Institute. Mr. Newnham moved to Ranger following World War II, after spending two years in service.

## Chamber Membership Drive Now Underway

Final plans for an all-out membership drive for the Ranger Chamber of Commerce were made Monday morning at a kick-off breakfast held in the Ranger Junior College cafeteria.

Following the breakfast, Dick Henderson, president, turned the program over to Dr. W. P. Watkins and Alvin Woody, co-chairmen of the membership committee.

Dr. Watkins and Mr. Woody explained to directors that every businessman and woman in Ranger is needed as a member of the chamber of commerce.

A goal of 150 members has been set by the membership committee, the chairman reported. At present the chamber has a membership of 110.

Several projects outlined for the year include the co-sponsoring of six track meets at the new Ranger Junior College track; erecting of highway signs inviting people to Ranger; new street signs; improvement of airport facilities; more information and public relations about Ranger; help with the Eastland County Livestock Show; sponsor a Sheep and Goat Field Day; sponsor the Annual Pecan Show; promote civic pride and trade in Ranger; the annual Christmas program and many other projects.

Slogan for the membership drive is "Help us help you, Talk Ranger UP, not DOWN."

Each director was given names of prospective members to contact. The drive started immediately following the meeting. Progress reports will be made each day by the workers, it was reported.

## 4 CANDIDATES School Board Election Set April 6

Elections will be held Saturday for two vacancies on the Ranger Independent School Board of Education. Ballots will be cast in the school tax office.

Four citizens, incumbent Lonnie Stephens, Dr. Luther Gohlke, Bill Guess, and Mrs. Dewey Cox, Jr., will vie for the positions created with the expiration of the terms of Gaston Dixon and Mr. Stevens. Mr. Dixon is not seeking reelection.

Mr. Stephens was appointed to the board of trustees in 1959 when Walter Arterburn resigned. In 1960, he was elected to a full term of three years. He is currently serving as vice president of the board of trustees. Moving here in 1952, he is superintendent of the Lone Star RCF Plant in Ranger.

Dr. Gohlke, associated with the Ranger Clinic since 1960, is seeking his first term with the board. He recently returned to Ranger after serving 10 months active duty with the 49th Armored Division at Fort (Continued on Page Three)

## Around Town

Ed Maher of Dallas and formerly of Ranger, has sent us a clipping from the Detroit Free Press, concerning the death of Morris Leveille of Ranger.

Mr. Maher was in partnership with the late Mr. Leveille in Ranger in the Leveille-Maher Motor Company here until 1930. Mr. Maher moved to Dallas in 1930, where he operates the Ed Maher, Inc., a Ford dealership.

Following is a copy of the story that appeared in the Detroit newspaper:  
**MAN WHO DEFIED HENRY FORD DEAD AT 85**

The young test driver's hand trembled as he placed the cigar in his mouth and lit it. Morris J. Leveille knew that his future with the newly formed Ford Motor Co. could very well go up in one puff of smoke from the cigar.

But Leveille, like so many early pioneers of the auto industry, was cocky.  
"I knew Henry Ford didn't like anybody to smoke in his presence," Leveille once recalled, "but I wanted to smoke regardless of what happened."  
Instead of ruining his future, Leveille sparked a career that eventually made him a rich Ford dealer in Ranger, Texas, before he died there Saturday at 85.

The late Henry Ford admired strong-willed men. Shortly after the smoking incident, which occurred while Leveille was driving him home one day, Ford put Leveille in charge of his new Dallas assembly plant.

The plant, opened in 1909, was on the second floor of a Ford Salesroom located on the present site of the Statler-Hilton Hotel.

The operation consisted of placing the wheels on the axles and bolting the chassis to the frame.

The parts were shipped from Detroit by rail, and Leveille and the plant's other five employees would go to the Dallas railroad yards and put the wheels on the chassis.

Then they would drive the chassis to the assembly plant. There they would lift them to the second floor by a hand-operated hoist and put on the bodies.

Leveille and his crew became so efficient that they soon were able to assemble a complete car in 24 hours.

The entire plant payroll for 1910 was \$6,250.59.  
In 1919 Leveille heard about the oil boom in Ranger and opened a Ford dealership there with a friend, Ed Maher.  
"We figured we would sell about 300 cars a year," Leveille recalled later. "But we sold more than 800 cars that first year because everybody had money and everybody wanted an automobile."  
"There was such a demand that we sold the cars faster

## District 10-A Track Meet Set Here Saturday

In the senior division 100-yard dash, Alton Brannon of Clyde is favored for first place honors. Last Saturday on the Ranger Track he ran the 100 yard dash in 9.9, the fastest time turned in by any of the 28 schools entered in the Red Dog Relays.

Ranger's one-mile relay team, composed of L. H. Pounds, Melton Kennedy, Arthur Mendoza and Kyge Edmonds, is expected to make a bid for second or third place in this event.

**CONTROVERSIAL BILL HAS INTERESTING EXPERIENCES**

By WAYNE GIBBENS

The sponsor of a controversial bill in the Legislature has, to say the least, some interesting experiences. As author of House Bill 510 I am receiving mail both for and against the bill. In general, the proponents seem to have more personal knowledge of what the bill attempts to do than the opponents.

This fact encourages me to think that much of the opposition to House Bill 510 is based on lack of information, or misinformation.

The reasons for having a pooling law in Texas are fairly simple. I would phrase them as follows:

1. The Texas oil industry is sick; it needs help. Responsible oil operators say a pooling law would help. And what helps Texas oil is bound to help Texas, in the form of jobs, money and taxes.

2. Recent court decisions made it clear that there is a missing link in an otherwise strong oil and gas conservation code in Texas. The Railroad Commission does not have specific authority to deal with problems caused by small tracts of land in a common reservoir. Great inequities have resulted in the past when small-tract wells were allowed to over-produce. The courts have now invalidated that practice.

3. The legal and moral question remains of what to do about the small tract. Allowing it a well which would drain oil and gas from neighbors' tracts is wrong. Leaving it to be drained by neighboring wells is wrong. The only equitable answer is an arrangement for putting acreage together with the owners splitting costs and proceeds in proportion to their holdings. This is the method proposed in House Bill 510.

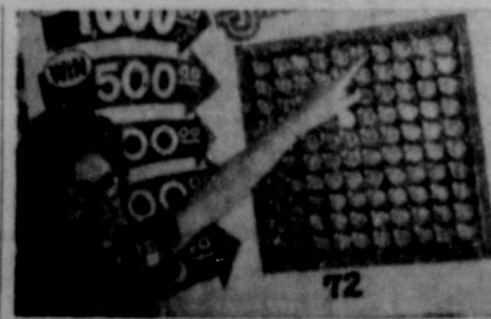

tornadoes and 383 other severe storms which resulted in millions of dollars of property damage, 85 deaths and 668 injuries.

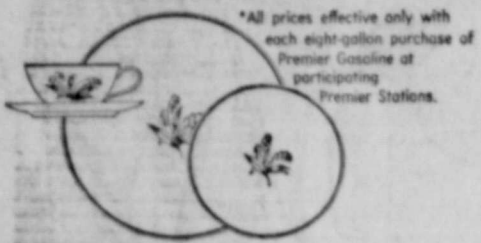
With tornado season soon to be in full swing, the Office of Defense and Disaster Relief of the Texas Department of Public Safety has issued a special leaflet containing safety information for coping with these destructive storms. Titled "Tornado Precautions," the leaflet details procedures

to follow when tornadoes threaten, whether in open country, in cities and towns, schools, factories or industrial plants. Knowing a few basic rules of what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death.

The leaflet also contains descriptive material on occurrence, frequency and weather conditions most apt to produce tornadoes.

## ABOUT YOUR HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health, HENRY A. HOLLE, M.D., Commissioner

For civilized man, the toothbrush does for the teeth what raw, coarse and massaging foods did for the teeth of primitive man.

It removes the food debris in which the acid-producing bacteria of the mouth thrive. The function of the toothbrush is to clean the teeth and to help maintain the gums in a healthy condition.

There are three conditions that must exist in the mouth before decay results. These include bacteria, easily fermentable foods like sugars, and sheltered places which

maintain the food debris long enough for the bacteria to work on the food and build up acid of sufficient strength to attack the tooth enamel.

The duty of the toothbrush is to interrupt these conditions by removing sugar residue before the decay-producing acids can be formed from them.

Another function of the toothbrush is to prevent deposits of debris, known as tartar or calculus. For a few hours, these deposits remain soft enough to be removed by the brush. But afterward, they become hardened to the extent that a dentist's steel instrument is necessary to scrap them off.

If tartar is left to accumulate, the gum tissue becomes irritated. This can lead to serious disturbances in the gums and supporting tooth structure.

Dentists emphasize the importance of correct toothbrushing procedures to minimize injury to the gum tissues. Often, vigorous or improper brushing may cause the gums to bleed, but dentists say that there is no harm if this condition continues only a few days.

The tissues covering the gums will become toughened and thickened, just as calluses form on a hand doing hard labor. If, however, the bleeding persists from brushing, the condition should be checked by a dentist.

Brushing correctly is important. Equally important is regular brushing. It is the responsibility of parents to develop the habit of regular brushing after meals in each child so that regular brushing will become a natural pattern of his life. Check with your dentist concerning the proper size toothbrush and grade of bristle. Also change toothbrushes when they become too soft.

Let's face it we don't eat the coarse, raw or abrading foods of primitive man, so we have to brush our teeth. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

### Advantages Of Soil Testing

With one crop year just behind us, Texas farmers are already planning steps for starting the circle all over again.

One important step that can be taken now is to send soil samples to laboratories for analysis. This early sampling helps assure the farmer of getting the best results from their soil during 1963. And early testing gives plenty of time to place orders for the proper types of fertilizer which the soil may need.

A number of state and federally-operated laboratories, as well as private concerns, offer this service to the farmer. Those who want to get a diagnosis of their soil needs can consult their county agent for the location of the nearest laboratory. The test

## Lone Star Gas Gives Report On 1962 Earnings

DALLAS — Lone Star Gas Company and its wholly-owned subsidiaries — Lone Star Producing Company and Lone Star Gathering Company — had a consolidated net income of \$17,268,033 in 1962, the largest ever attained. This was \$1,672,129, or 10.7 per cent more than net income for 1961, according to the annual report to shareholders.

After deducting dividends of \$68,172 paid on the convertible preferred stock, net earnings applicable to common stock were \$1.18 per share, based on 14,547,396 common shares outstanding at the end of 1962.

This compares with \$1.07 on 14,523,152 shares outstanding at the end of 1961. The slight increase in the shares of common stock outstanding is due entirely to conversions of the 4.84 per cent convertible preferred stock.

Operating revenues of the companies are derived from the sale of natural gas, oil, gasoline and other petroleum products and were \$140,970,938 in 1962. This is an increase of \$3,248,890 over 1961.

Revenues from sales of natural gas were \$124,328,294, a gain of \$5,427,401 over 1961. A portion of this increase is due to additional customers served and a substantial increase in sales to and revenues from industrial and electric generation accounts.

can pay off in richer yields on less land this year.

Instruction sheets may be obtained from local branches of the Soil Conservation Service or direct from the testing laboratories. The practice varies in different areas but a composite sample from cores or slices of soil taken from 15 to 20 different spots is usually the rule. Small areas that differ in color, texture or drainage should be voided or sampled separately.

Soil testing should be considered on a crop rotation basis where it is possible. Sampling soils every three to five years, or once during a rotation cycle is sufficient to maintain an adequate mineral level and make necessary adjustments in fertilization practices.

The value of maintaining a healthy soil cannot be overestimated. Just like humans, soil can get "sick" due to deficiencies in its "diet". When planning crops for a certain plot of land, the farmer should know what that soil needs in the way of proper fertilizers. The initial cost will be returned in better yields.

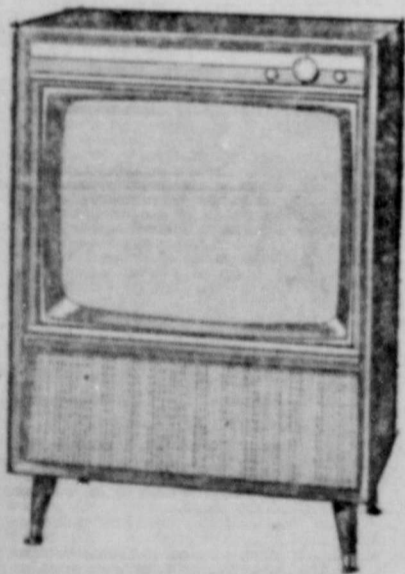

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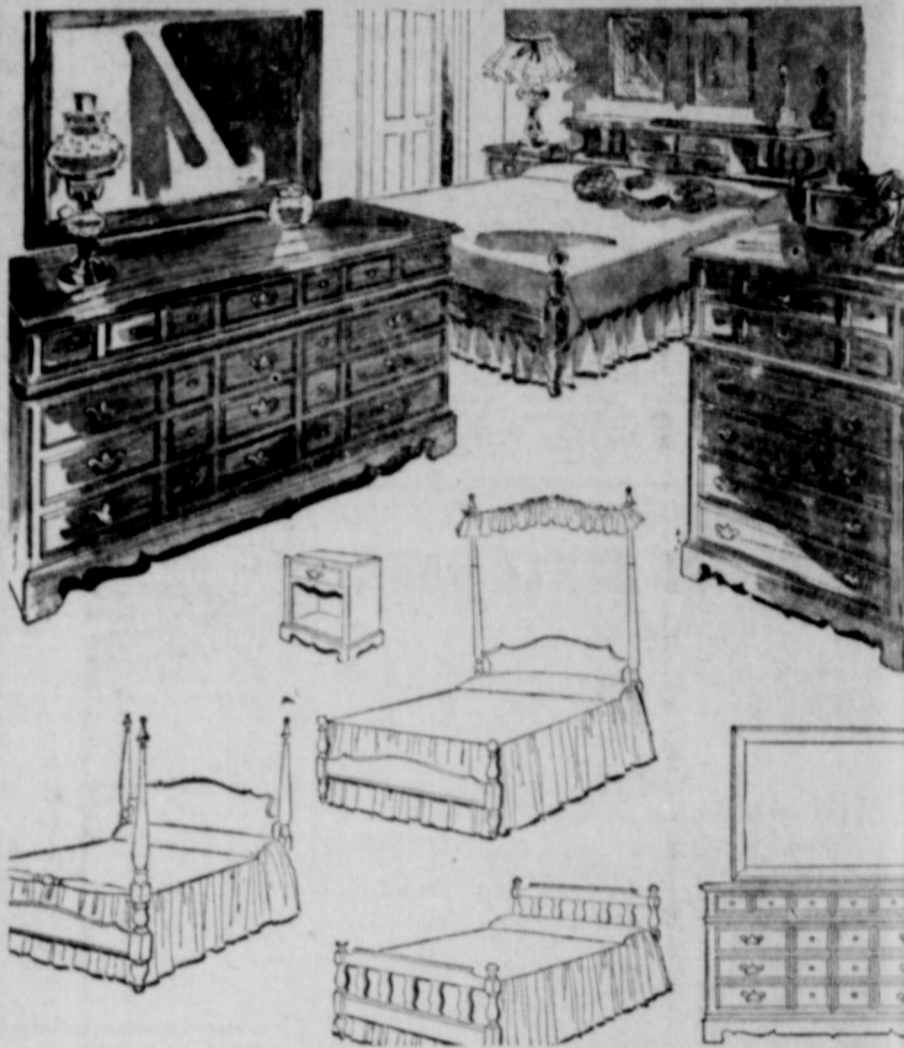


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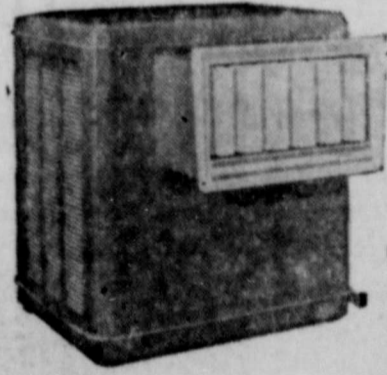
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
