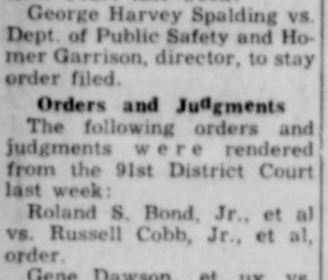

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN — Clean up the roadsides is a message being delivered by the Texas Good Roads Association and the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Project is described as an "important contribution to the pleas of Governor Connally and the Legislature to seriously and systematically promote tourist travel into and through Texas."

Texas Junior Chamber will encourage its members to join in a project to remove debris and litter from city streets, county roads, and state highways.

Texas Good Roads Association will give the junior chambers, money prizes for the best local progress to make their areas more attractive to visitors of Texas.

State loans would be available for building new, or expanding old, factories in Texas, if the House and the voters approved a plan by Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin.

Senator Dorsey B. Harde-man of San Angelo piloted through the Senate a 389-page revision of the code of criminal procedure — the first complete revision in a long, long time.

While legislators begin consideration of tax increases to help finance state government activities, mainly the growth in higher education, two industries are about to get tax cuts.

present criminal procedure. House action is expected, since lawyers from all sides of criminal practice are agreed that reforms are needed.

Texas has come a long way along the road to an attitude of normalcy on racial desegregation.

That's what Rep. Don Gladden of Fort Worth told the House State Affairs Committee. Gladden's Bill, co-sponsored by 49 House members, would abolish the law passed in 1957 requiring that school dis-

tricts get voter approval before desegregation. Under that law, districts which do not call elections before integrating face the loss of state funds. Bill now is in subcommittee.

Both Houses of the Legislature have passed, and Governor Connally has signed, the bill to give the state's approval — and some of its land — to the Padre Island National Seashore project. U. S. Department of Interior will build the vast recreational area designed to pre-

serve 81 miles of Padre Island in its natural state. Texas had to give about 40,000 acres in Laguna Madre as part of the project.

Nathan Curry, 17-year old Cleason, will be tried on charges of murdering Mrs. Florence E. Hussey in Cisco in June, 1961, on June 3 in 91st District Court at Eastland, Judge Turner M. Collier reported today.

The trial date was set after Defense Attorney John J. Watts of Odessa and County Attorney Earl Conner reached an agreement.

A special venire of 100 prospective jurors has been prepared and the list will remain sealed until shortly before

June 3, it was understood. A plea for change of venue was denied by Judge Collier recently.

Young Curry has been at liberty under \$10,000 bond since the murder charges were formally filed at Eastland early in the year.

NATIONAL GUARD TO TRAIN AT FORT HOOD IN SUMMER

National Guardsmen of the Texas 49th Armored Division will return to active duty this summer at Fort Hood, according to an announcement by CWO James Hendrick, administrative officer for the Eastland County National Guard unit.

The 49th Division, which came off 10 months of active duty during the Berlin crisis last year, will be back to its normal two-week field training program July 28 - August 11.

The summer maneuvers at Fort Hood for the Texas tankers will mark the first return to combat training since it became de-activated as a Regular Army outfit at Fort Polk, La., in August 1962.

The 15-day active duty assignment will include the Eastland County unit, Battery C, 3d Battalion, 124th Artillery. Prior to the Army reassignment and reorganization in March there were two units - one in Ranger and one in Cisco. The reorganization gave one unit to the county with the unit headquarters in Cisco and the bulk of the firing section in Ranger. Battery C is commanded by Capt. Winford H. Hogan.

Maj. Gen. Harley B. West of Dallas, Division Command

der, declared the new concept is not expected to slow down the division's training program. He said the new organization is set up much like the armored division has been for the past five years, and anticipates no problem in its new alignment.

Due to the vast outlay of land needed to train an armored outfit, General West said the 49th will split up its five tank battalions and four infantry battalions for field maneuvers.

"Every Guardsman will, nevertheless, spend a minimum of four days and three nights in the field for training purposes," West said.

The 49th Division, which suffered great losses after coming off active duty last year, is already nearing its authorized strength of 8,500, which is 80 percent of its full strength.

Pecan Budding And Grafting School Attracts Good Crowd

Some 30 cities were represented by the approximately 100 persons who took part in the 7th annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School held at Cisco Junior College Thursday, April 18, by County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Mrs. Cooper, veteran orchard expert, discussed the two methods most used in propagation of pecan trees during a morning session lecture session at the college cafeteria. These methods were the inlay graft, used principally in top working trees, and the patch bud, used both for top-working and for nursery budding.

Mr. Cooper had a supply of cold storage budwood to demonstrate how buds are cut, lifted and inserted. He showed the best kind of tools, including a double-bladed knife, for use in pecan budding.

Best time for budding trees is shortly after growth starts in the spring — April 15 to May 15 — for top-worked projects, Mr. Cooper said. This type of work should start with topping the trees during a dormant season.

County Petitioned By 350 To Retain Public Trapper

The decade-old quarrel over predatory animal trapping took on new steam in Eastland County this week. At odds were the livestock raisers of the county and the sporting hunters, it appeared from incidents of the past two days.

Livestock raisers appeared before the County Commissioners Court Monday and asked that the county trapper be retained. He was to be released at the end of this month according to action at a recent court meeting.

A livestock raiser was under \$500 bond Monday charged in justice court with assault on the county judge in Cisco Sunday evening. The case was expected to be transferred to county court.

The man reportedly attacked County Judge Scott Bailey in a restaurant.

Heated arguments arose between members of the Eastland County Trappers Association and other county livestock raisers at a meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners Monday morning.

Bernard Hanna, newly elected president of the organization and spokesman for the group, petitioned the Court to continue giving a total of \$135 per month to go toward the salary for the County trapper Johnny Benson of Morton Valley. He presented a petition containing approximately 350 names.

Members of the Association would also continue to give \$65 per month for the trapper's salary.

At a meeting on April 8, Commissioners passed a resolution which would discontinue the trappers services as of May 1. The resolution stated that in the past number of years in hiring a trapper and poisoner and that no accounting of the success of the program had been made to the Court in the past months.

The order to pay a portion of the trapper's salary was passed by Commissioners in September, 1953.

According to the Court, the order was not binding since the motion, second and passing of the order was not recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

Members of the court added that they were in doubt as to the legality of such a transaction and Commissioner Tip Arther made a motion to obtain a direct ruling on the matter from the Attorney General before making a decision. The motion was seconded by Glen Justice and passed by the Court.

While arguing among themselves, one man stated, "I think we ought to hire a lawyer and make the County pay all of the salary."

Another said he felt that the trapper should benefit the entire county and not just members of the Association.

Several other comments were made as to the pros and cons of the matter.

In other action Mrs. Frank Sayre, representative of the Civic League and Garden Club, met with the Court to seek permission for the club to construct a flowing fountain on the square for its annual project.

She suggested the north side of the courthouse as a suitable location for the fountain and stated that it would be a joint project of the Civic League, the city and the county.

The proposal was taken under advisement by the Court and no definite action made.

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June 10 Deadline For Notary Appointments

Eastland County Clerk Johnson Smith announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee of \$3 and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk's office, of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1963 and May 20, 1963. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The County Clerk further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

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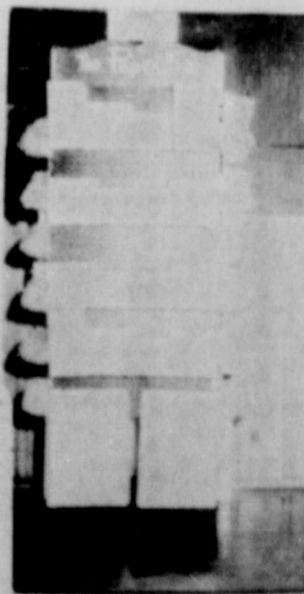
