Lone Star Meeting Set Here Tuesday

An estimated 225 employees of Lone Star Gas Company and Lone Star Producing Company, working within a 35-mile radius of Ranger, will attend a company meeting at 11 a. m. Tuesday, April 30, in the National Guard Armory on Highway 80.

L. T. Potter of Dallas, president, will discuss the company's employee benefits program. Other top executives from the Dallas headquarters office also will attend the meeting.

School Will Train Medical Assistants

A new-type school will open in Ranger on June 4, which will train medical assistants. This project has been undertaken by Dr. S. J. Jones, a practicing physician and is named Medical Assistant Schools of Texas.

The building formerly known as the Brazda Clinic and owned and occupied by Dr. Jones for the past year, is now being converted into the school, which will be able to train from 100 to 125 students at one time.

Courses to be offered, run from three months for training as a Medical Secretary-Receptionist, to two years for training as a Clinical Technician.

In between there are courses for Medical Assistant, basic Medical Assistant, senior Medical Assistant, Senior advanced, Clinic Manager, basic, Clinic Managers, senior, Surgical Technician, X-Ray Technician, Clinical Laboratory, and Medical Management and Accounting.

The more advanced courses require the basic shorter courses to be completed first. Courses require typing and most designate "High School Graduate". The Management and accounting courses require basic accounting and bookkeeping.

Ranger Junior College will offer basic science courses, anatomy, Bacteriology and physiology, etc. in connection with the school. Other courses will be worked out in coordination with the college, where needed, with certificates of completion awarded.

Housing and cafeteria service for as many as forty girl students from the new school will be available at the college during the summer months, according to college authorities.

The new school will be co-educational.



Dr. Theodore Nicksick, president of Ranger Junior College has announced that Dr. Kenneth E. Alford of Austin will be associated with the college, beginning June, 1963, as head of the Music Department. He will teach instruments other than those associated with the band.

Dr. Alford is a native of Ryan, Oklahoma, and graduated at the head of his class from Healdton, Oklahoma, High School in 1949. He has the Bachelor of Music from Midwestern University, with a major in piano and theory. While in Wichita Falls, he was a member of the city's symphony, playing trumpet. In 1951 he traveled extensively in Europe.

He is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music of the University of Rochester, Rochester, New York, majoring in Musicology and Music History. While there he was a member of the Rochester Singers, a professional Madrigal group, conducted by Dr. Irvine A. McHose.

Presently he is completing his work at the University of Texas for the Doctor of Philosophy with a Dissertation: "Serenade Versus Symphony in the Nineteenth Century." At the University he is a graduate teaching Fellow, a member and president of Pi Kappa Lambda, honor a r y scholastic music fraternity.

Dr. Alford has held posts as choir director—organist in churches since 1947 and until recently was choir master of Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Austin.

He is married and has one daughter. The family are members of the Methodist church. They will be in Ranger to visit shortly and to secure living accommodations.

Ranger College To Expand Summer Program

Ranger Junior College Dean, Ernen Haby, has announced the expansion of the summer school program, which will make it possible to offer approximately double the number of courses offered heretofore.

The expansion program calls for classes to be held five nights each week, instead of the previous three nights each week, and the reduction of class time from two and one-half hours to one and one-half hours duration. This will allow for several classes in different subjects to be held each night.

Registration for the summer session has been set for 6 p. m., June 3, with classes to begin at 6 p. m. June 4.

To be offered are American history, freshman and sophomore English, government, a biology lab course, and possibly trigonometry, college algebra, and business administration courses if the demand merits the classes.

No summer courses will be held off the college campus this year as has been done in the past. Graduate study by faculty members will prohibit the outside courses, and the expanded facilities of the summer school will provide for area students.

1963 Business Census Is Planned For This County

It will be the first general trade census on a national basis since 1958. Every establishment will receive a questionnaire calling for detailed figures as to its operations during the year. In addition to the retail and manufacturing lines, the Government will seek data from the service businesses, wholesalers and the mineral and transportation industries.

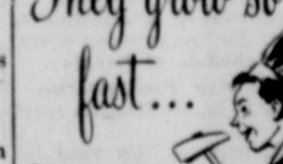

Browsing With Bev

Cheese is an excellent meat alternate.

There are many different products at the dairy display case, but they generally fall into three classes. To refresh your memory, here they are.

The natural cheeses. These are sold just as they are produced, with no additional processing. You will find them labeled "natural cheddar" or "natural swiss" or other terms names. Natural cheeses are apt to be different each time you buy them. The sharpness may be more or less evident. If you plan to buy a large amount of natural cheese at one time, it's a good idea to sample the product to make sure you are getting just what you want.

Process cheeses, the second category, are cheeses made by combining one or more natural cheeses. The natural cheeses are heated, pasteurized and blended together. The same brand of process cheese will taste the same way every time you buy it. Process cheese also melts easier and blends with other foods easier than does natural cheese.

The third group is the process cheese foods or spreads. They resemble the process cheeses, but have more moisture and may also have dry milk solids and seasonings added. As a rule, they are much softer than process and natural cheeses.

Need some help in understanding or interpreting guarantees? Consumers may want to do some research and find answers to these questions about guarantees.

Who is to make good — the retailer or manufacturer?

Must the product be returned to the store, or is it to be repaired at home?

Does the guarantee cover only parts that rarely wear out or the entire product?

Does it cover services for routine maintenance?

Is the guarantee based on "suggested" retail price or on the price paid?

Is the guarantee in writing?

Who pays the labor charge?
