Almost 7,000 persons were immunized against Type I and II during the two previous Club-sponsored Clinics and the project Saturday will round out the protection for those who participate in all three.

Persons wishing to be taken to the clinic, should call MA 9-2423 Saturday. The clinic will open at 10 a. m. and remain open until 6 p. m.

The Type III serum has been declared safe by the U. S. Department of Health and is being given throughout the nation, Mrs. Sayre said.

The serum will again be given on clubs of sugar, as it was in the Type I and Type II clinics, making for a simple, pleasant administration of the potent disease preventive.

Approximately 140 members of the Ranger High School Band, their dates, Junior High Band members and special guests attended the annual band banquet Saturday night in the National Guard Armory.

"Strike Up the Band" was the theme of the program. Invocation and welcome address was given by Bobby Owens, president of the band.

Jim Jacobsen, band instructor of TCU in Fort Worth, was the guest speaker. The former teacher of Mr. Auvenshine delighted his audience in showing film of the marching TCU band and in the showing of film in which Mr. Auvenshine was a student, rather than an instructor.

Action Taken At Court Session

The county surplus food program will be extended a year, bids for a photocopy machine sought, and quarterly financial

statements will be published as the result of action in County Commissioners Court Monday.

The court voted to continue its participation in the food program for another year, under the present set-up of 1,600 individual issues a year. Cost to the county is 36 cents per issue.

Commissioners agreed to buy two fans for the tax assessor's office.

E. L. Jackson of Cisco, president of the Cisco Country Club, appeared before the court and discussed taxes ow-

ing by the club. Property owned by the club had been divided by two highways as well as other property having been sold, and an adjustment was asked on taxes. Mr. Jackson was asked to talk with Deputy Tax Assessor Edgar Alton about duplicated renditions, to see if the amount owned by the club couldn't be reduced.

Abstracts of the club's property are not up to date, it was reported, and do not reflect the true amount of land to be taxed.

The court also opened a bid,

and agreed to purchase a 1963 Ford dump truck, fully equipped. Roach Motor Co. of Rising Star was low bidder at \$3,325.50. The truck will be used in the Rising Star Precinct by Commissioner Buck Collins.

A letter from the state attorney general's office concerning the recent dismissal of the county trapper was read.

The letter said in part: "Department finds that the Commissioners Court has no authority to employ a wolf trapper and pay him a salary

out of county funds, regardless of whether or not same was placed in the budget."

No action was taken on the trapper situation. Commissioner Tip Arthur made a motion for the court to advertise in two editions for bids on a photocopy machine and all necessary accessories to be placed in the county clerk's office.

County Clerk Johnson Smith had repeatedly requested such a machine. Cost is expected to be about \$9,800.

The treasurer's report will be published each quarter in

one of the newspapers in the county. Schedule of publishing agreed upon by the court is as follows: Carbon Messenger, Gorman Progress, Rising Star Record, Ranger Times, Cisco Press and Eastland Telegram.

The court also voted to advertise for bids on a two-ton truck for the Rising Star precinct.

Roy Lee Smith of Eastland was appointed Eastland County Civil Defense co-ordi-

nator by County Judge Scott Bailey.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY AND COLLECTION OF FEES AND THE ISSUANCE OF LICENSES BY THE CITY OF RANGER TO PERSONS ENGAGED IN THE MANUFACTURE OR SALE OF MALT BEVERAGES; MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY

DEALER WHOSE PRINCIPAL BUSINESS IS THE SALE OF BEER TO SELL THE SAME WHERE HIS PLACE OF BUSINESS IS WITHIN 300 FEET OF ANY CHURCH, SCHOOL, OR OTHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION; AND FIXING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS: Section 1. Definitions. All definitions of words, terms, and phrases, as set forth in the Texas Liquor Control Act, are hereby adopted and made a part hereof by reference. Section 2. Manufacturer or Brewer's License. There is hereby levied upon every manufacturer or brewer of beer, as defined by Section 3 (a) of Part II of the Texas Liquor

Control Act, in the City of an annual license fee of said fee the City of Ranger will issue to such person a license, as permitted by the Texas Liquor Control Act. Section 3. General Distributor's License. There is hereby levied upon every distributor, as defined by Section 3 (b) of Part II of the Texas Liquor Control Act, in the City of an annual license fee of \$100.00, provided such general distributor has procured his primary license in a county other than Eastland County, there is hereby levied upon him a license fee of \$25.00 only, and upon the payment of either of said fees the City of Ranger will issue to such a person a license, as permitted by the Texas Liquor Control Act. Section 4. Local Distributor's License. There is hereby levied upon every local distributor, as defined by Section 3 (c) of Part II of the Texas Liquor Control Act, in the City of an annual license fee of \$25.00, and upon the payment of said fee the City of Ranger will issue to such a person a license, as permitted by the Texas Liquor Control Act. Section 5. Retail Dealer's License. There is hereby levied upon every retail dealer, as defined by Section 3 (d) of Part II of the Texas Liquor Control Act, who sells beer in bottles and/or from kegs, barrels or other containers in the City of Ranger, for consumption where sold an annual license fee of \$12.50, and upon the payment of said fee the City of Ranger will issue to such a person a license, as permitted by the Texas Liquor Control Act. Section 6. Retail Dealer's License. (Not for consumption on premises). There is hereby levied upon every retail dealer, as defined by Section 3 (d) of Part II of the Texas Liquor Control Act, who sells beer in the original container direct to the consumer, but not for resale and not to be consumed on the premises where sold, an annual license fee of \$5.00, and upon the payment of said fee the City of Ranger will issue to such a person a license, as permitted by the Texas Liquor Control Act. Section 7. State License Necessary. No license required under the terms of this ordinance shall be issued to any person until he shows that he holds a state license for the particular phase of the beer traffic in which he desires to engage in the City of Ranger, and until the fee required to be paid by said city for such license has been paid to the Tax Assessor & Collector of the City of Ranger.

Section 8. Termination of License. All licenses issued under the terms of this ordinance authorizing the manufacture, distribution and sale of beer shall terminate one year from the date issued, and no license shall be issued for a longer term than one (1) year. Section 9. Location Restricted. The sale of beer by any dealer, whose principal business is the sale of beer, is hereby prohibited in all cases where the place of business of any such dealer is within 300 feet of any church, school, or other educational institution, the measurements to be along the property lines of the street fronts, from front door to front door, and a direct line across intersections where they occur. Section 10. The sale of beer by any dealer on Sunday is hereby prohibited. Section 11. Penalty. Any person who fails to pay any license fee prescribed in this ordinance, or who fails to procure a license as required herein, before engaging in any business for which the payment of a fee and the securing of a license is required by the terms hereof, or who engages in any such business without holding an unexpired and unrevoked license from the City of Ranger, or who shall violate any of the other provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$100.00.

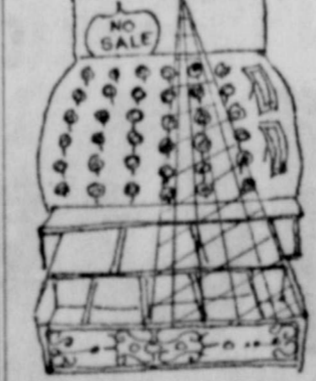

House Approves Junketing Curbs In Burleson Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The House of Representatives has passed a bill sponsored by Congressman Omar Burleson that cracks down on travel by Members of the Congress, including a ban on foreign travel by those who will not be back for the succeeding session. It would affect travel practices of both Representatives and Senators.

The bill imposes the same traveling expense limitations upon legislators that now apply to members of other branches of the government who travel abroad on official business. It also would require the filing of complete expense statements for public inspection, including their use of foreign funds.

Members who for any reason are not returning to the next Congress would be prohibited from arranging trips after Congress adjourns.

The bill was passed by an overwhelming vote, there being only two in opposition. Burleson was asked what he thought the Senate would do with his bill, and simply said no one could speculate on that point, "but certainly they are going to have an opportunity now, the same as the House had, to support these reforms which correct practices recently under much criticism."

STOCKMEN URGED TO FILL OUT ALL OF REPORT FORM

Livestockmen sending larvae specimens to screwworm eradication headquarters at Mission were urged by County Agent J. M. Cooper this week to be sure the information sheet that should accompany the sample is filled out completely and accurately.

Eradication officials have reported that numerous samples have been received with no information included. Some have been identified as screwworms.

Mr. Cooper stated that prompt action is taken whenever an infestation is confirmed. In most instances, additional sterile flies are dispersed over the infested farm or ranch and livestock near the infested premises are sprayed at program expense.

"When samples are received with no information as to where it was collected, no action can be taken," the county agent said. "This could permit additional infestations to develop because no special sterile fly and spray treatment can be given to the area."

Eradication officials report less than 20 per cent as many screwworm infestations have been experienced during the first four months of 1963 as during the same period last year.
