## Ranger Rodeo Arena Nears Completion

Recent rains have caused delays but has not dampened the spirit of the Ranger Jaycees as work on the Rodeo Arena continues.

The work which is being done has required many long hours by members of the Jaycees and non members who are interested in seeing the rodeo program carried out.

Half of the lumber which is being used to complete the stands has been delivered with the other half on order to be delivered soon. Thirty thousand feet of lumber will have been used when the project is completed. The hardware used to hold the lumber in place will total about four thousand bolts and nuts, not to mention the large quantity of nails.

To make up the seats, two 2 x 10 pieces of lumber will be installed on each seat level and bolted in place.

The plan calls for the seating now under construction to last three years. At the end of this time, new seats will be installed, using redwood or some other durable material.

The holding pens, which will be used to control the stock being used for the rodeo, are also nearing completion. The materials used in construction of the pens, are large pipes set in concrete with steel rods

welded to the pipes at about six inch intervals.

The work that will remain after the seats and the stock pens are completed will consist of many small details which I am sure will keep all concerned busy until the last minute.

## Open House, Dedication Set For Sunday at Western Manor

The formal opening of Western Manor, convalescent and nursing home, will be held Sunday, June 2, Dr. and Mrs. W. P. Watkins, owners and operators, cordially invite residents of Ranger and the surrounding area to attend the dedication and open house which will be held from 3 to 5 p. m. At 3 p. m. a dedicatory prayer will be given by Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of First Baptist Church.

With a 30 patient capacity, the home is equipped to take care of ambulatory and hospital bed patients with any type illness. Equipment includes oxygen and supplies for intravenous infusions, etc.

Patients eligible for state nursing aid, as well as private patients, will be accepted. The nursing home provides 24-hour nursing care by registered nurses, licensed vocational

nurses, and nurses aids. Patients may choose their own doctor, and medication will be administered according to his directions.

The building is of brick veneer construction with central heating and refrigerated air-conditioning. All meals will be cooked in the modern, electric kitchen, and dining room facilities are available for ambulatory patients. The bedrooms are furnished in Early American, and the living room, sun room, and dining room are furnished in Danish modern.

A call system has been installed to enable each patient

to receive immediate attention from the nursing station. All safety and fire regulations have been observed, and the nursing home has been approved by the State Department of Health.

### Browsing With Bev

Does your mattress meet the size requirements set up by bedding experts? If it does not, you may be robbing your family and yourself of necessary physical rest and mental relaxation. Bedding authorities report that a mattress should be 6 to

8 inches longer than the person who uses it. Since the average man is 5 feet 9 inches or over, many regular-length mattresses are not long enough for adequate restful sleep. Minimum width for adult sleeping comfort is 39 inches. As a result of these research findings — combined with the fact that the average height of Americans has increased one inch during the past 25 years — a growing interest has developed in longer and wider sleeping equipment. Supersize bedding and mattresses, 78 inches wide compared with the average 54 in-

ches wide, can now be found in most stores and in many standard brands. The degree of firmness also is important. Research shows that you rest best on a mattress scientifically constructed to give firm support with the right amount of resiliency. A newly developed cotton batting promises an even more comfortable mattress in the near future. If your present mattress is between 10 and 15 years old, its probably time for a new one. Check for broken stitching, depressions and lumps, and sagging borders. Infants and children need the best

bedding you can buy. A must for the homemaker who wants to protect mattresses against soil is a cotton mattress pad. Check to see that the mattress pads have been preshrunk, as they should be laundered periodically. There's more to selecting a dining room set than simply picking out an attractive grouping. If you intend to really use the furniture, the chairs should be comfortable. Since chairs are built for people of average height and weight — and few of us are truly "average" — there's

only one way to judge a chair. That's to sit in it. Take off your coat and sit down just as you would at home. Pull the chair up to the table. Do your legs fit underneath? Does the chair support your body in a comfortable, relaxed position? Could you sit in it for a long time without feeling cramped? If the chair meets this test, chances are that it will prove comfortable. Of course, the chair should harmonize with other furnishings in the room.

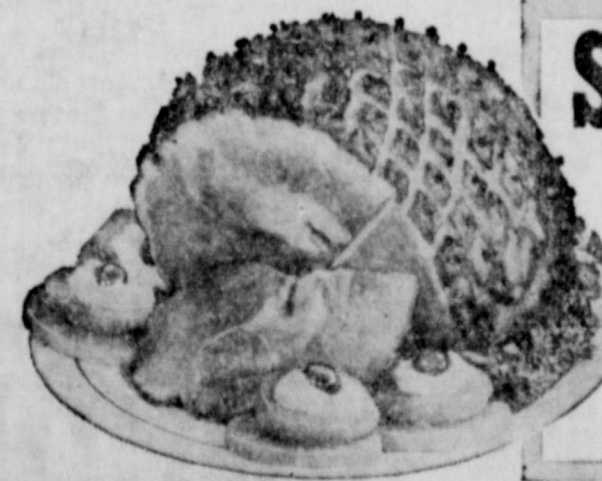

### Mrs. Alworth's Travels Continue In Istanbul

Editor's note: This is the fourth article in a series of the travels of Mrs. C. W. Alworth in Istanbul.

Friday, March 29th, our

"guide" turned up. He knew me, having met me and played bridge with me at his sister-in-law's at Athens, but I saw at once from his startled look that he did not know that three women were descending on Istanbul and him. Vitto was an extra one! However, he rallied quickly, and proposed quite an interesting itinerary for us during our stay. By this time, it was

pouring down, but off we set for the Museum, which is a very large one. It was as cold as the tomb, of course, but we were spartan and stuck with it. Saw some wonderful sarcophagi, one in particular, a most magnificent thing in spectacularly carved marble, the Tomb of Alexander himself. Incidentally, the Moslems do not put the body actually in the sarcophagus, but in the earth underneath it. So there were few remains found of Alexander himself. We then went on to see the Sultan's Palace, which is an immense rambling structure, and in its heyday housed 3,000 people—the Royal family, which of course was numerous, court officials, retainers, hangers-on and servants. The kitchens are enormous and so are the cooking utensils. I would not have liked to be the head chef! He must have had a permanent headache. Some of the loveliest things we saw were in the collection of porcelain and what stacks there are too. Unfortunately I was unable to pick a piece up. We saw the treasure— an astounding room of jeweled brocades, and also jewelry itself. It takes your breath away, and you even wonder if all the stones are real. Of course, they are. Then we went to the Bazaar which is a huge covered market, and

sells everything you can think of. It is in sections, each one for that kind of goods. The jewelry section, which also contains the antiques and all brass, copper, and bronze work is of course the most interesting to visitors. And that was where we spent the most time. Saturday, March 30th. The day was at least fine, but there was a biting south wind, and we all just about froze to death. Mr. Mamboury was far too enthusiastic for us and we moaned and groaned, but he urged us on with the promise of ever more interesting things. We first saw St. Sophia. This is the most important church of Christendom—older than St. Peter's. I think and certainly just as impressive if not more so. It is built in the Byzantine style with a huge dome and circular centre part with the usual aisles and galleries. It really is an awe-inspiring sight. To think that it has survived fire, flood, Turks, and an earthquake since the 4th century is something. When I was in Istanbul before the war, it was still used as a Mosque, and I remember seeing a Moslem service in progress. At that time, the walls were just being cleaned of a thick coating of plaster, as the archeologists knew that underneath there were mosaics, which were the main decorations of the Byzantine Church, as it is to this day. Not that it is a Museum only though the sign of the Moslem Faith has not been removed. times — ASS MRS. ALSWORTH

From there, on to the Blue Mosque, so called because it is tiled throughout in blue, and some lively tiles there are. It is one of the oldest, through not quite the biggest. The Mosque of Suleiman the Magnificent is the grandest. The Moslem religion forbids the use of human and animal figures, as it is idolatrous, and the tiles all have a recurring theme of the tulip, the marguerite and the carnation wherever you go. There are some lovely blues and greens, green being the color of the Prophet, and very holy. Mr. Mamboury then took us to see a tessellated pavement which had been discovered by his father, who was a noted archeologist in Turkey. It is the road from the stables down by the Bosphorus by which the horses came up to the famous Hippodrome of Constantine the Great. The colors are still marvelous and the scenes the artists depicted are true today. There are scenes of a boy offering a carrot to a donkey; men fishing; animals

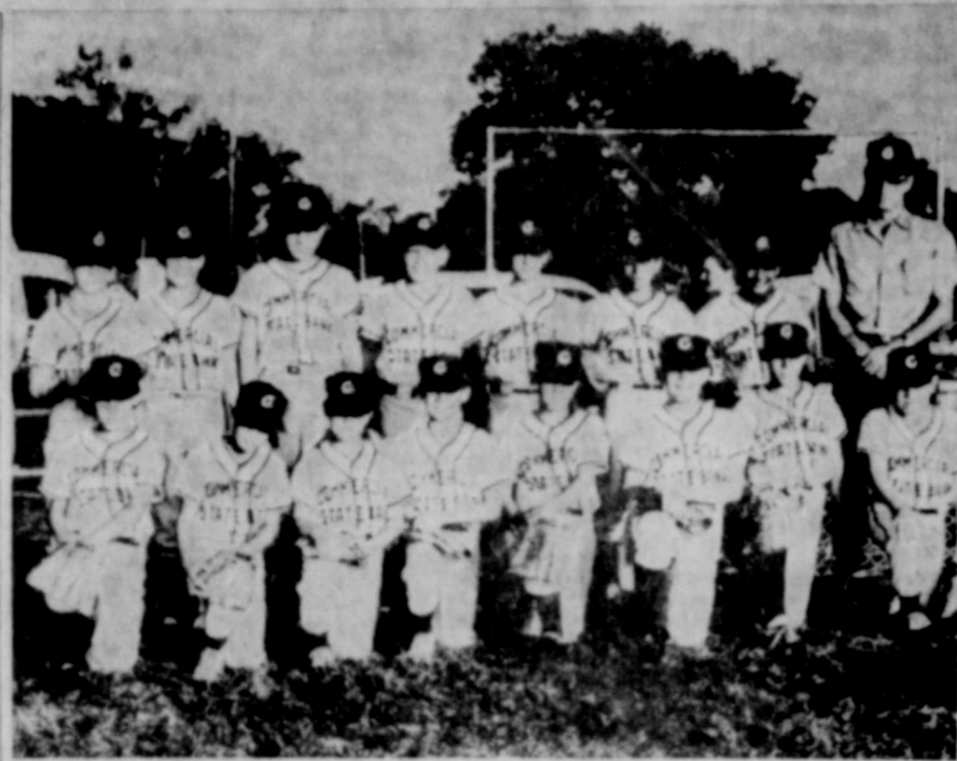
