RJC Advance Registrations Above Normal

Ernen Haby, dean-registrar of Ranger Junior College is asking that students who intend to enroll for the first time at the college, get application blanks from his office (Box 135, Ranger).

The purpose of this is to speed up the registration process of September 11.

Dean Haby said also that a transcript should be on file with the college at the time of registration. These may be mailed to his office.

Advance registrations are above normal for this time of year and according to Dr. Theodore Nicksick, president, all space will be taken by the time classes begin September 12.

If there is an overflow of students, as it now seems there might be, Dr. Nicksick said auxiliary dormitories will be opened.

Band students and football athletes will arrive on campus September 1, to begin practice and training for the football season, which will open with a game with Cisco Junior College in the Peanut Bowl in Eastland September 1, at 8 p. m.

Gerald Williams is the new head football coach. He formerly was coach at Blinn Junior College at Wharton.

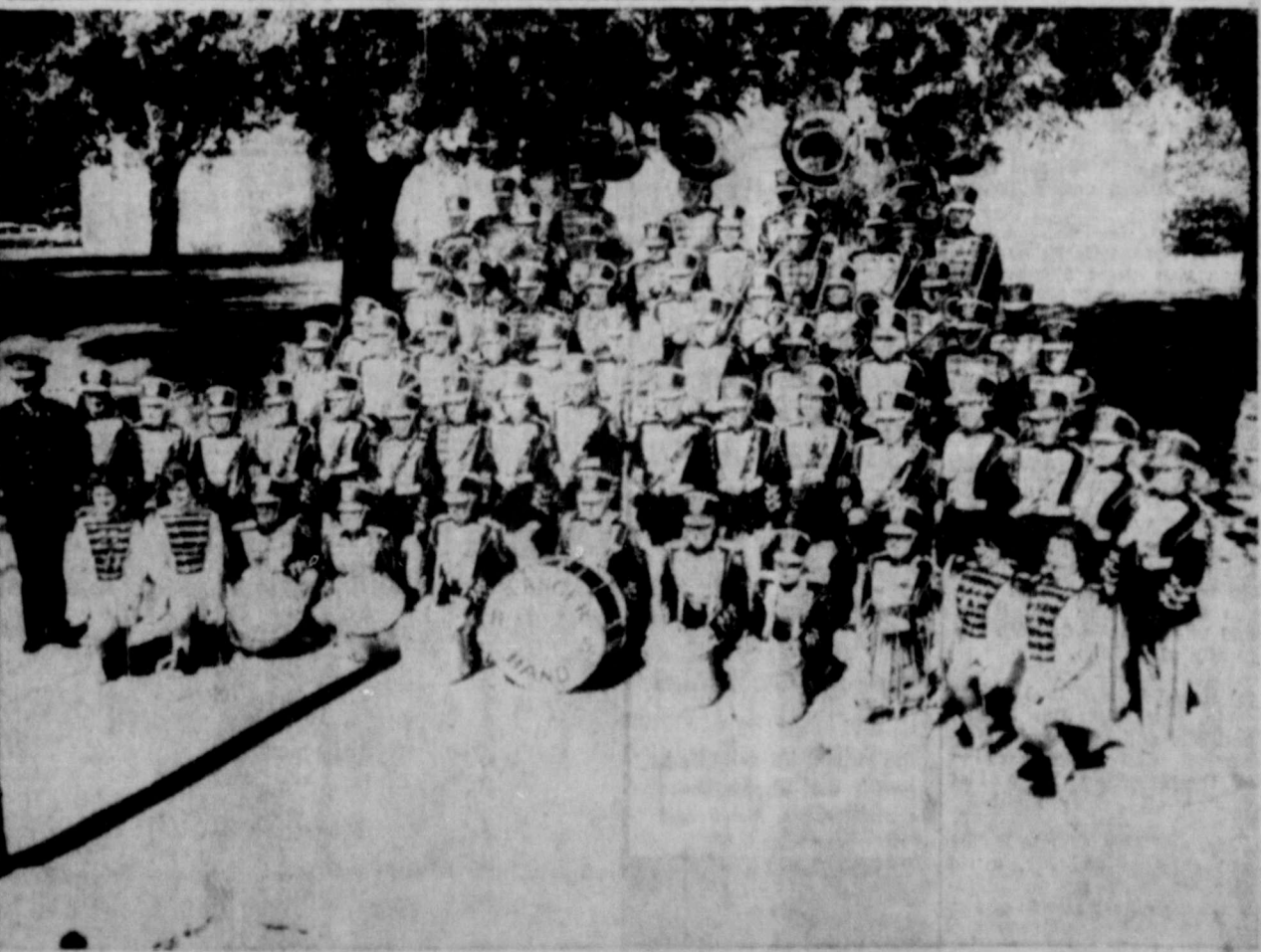
Surplus Foods To Go Out Next Week

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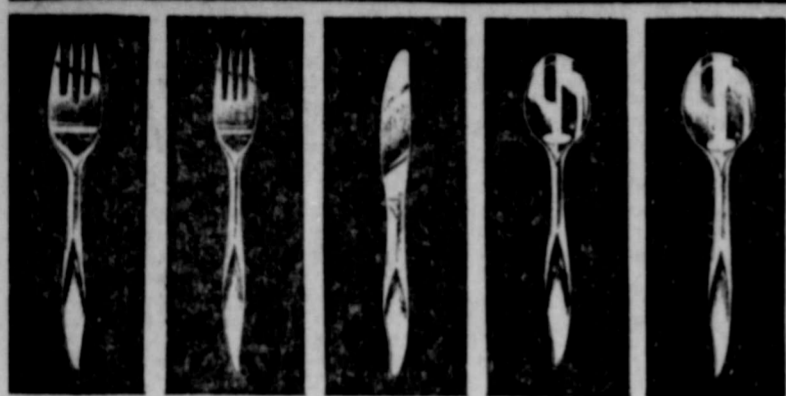

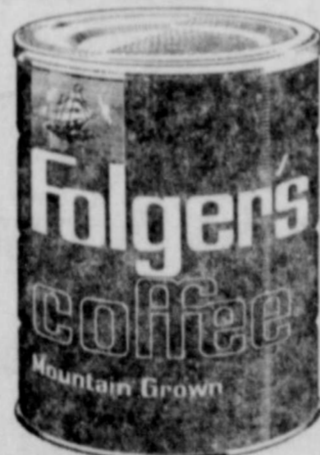

1964 Inspection Stickers Ready At All Stations

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the new 1964 vehicle inspection sticker became available September 1 at all official inspection stations in Texas.

During the summer months, the department has conducted intensive re-training schools for all owners and mechanics of inspection stations. Garrison said "These men are now qualified and they are ready to serve the motoring public in their vehicle inspection needs."

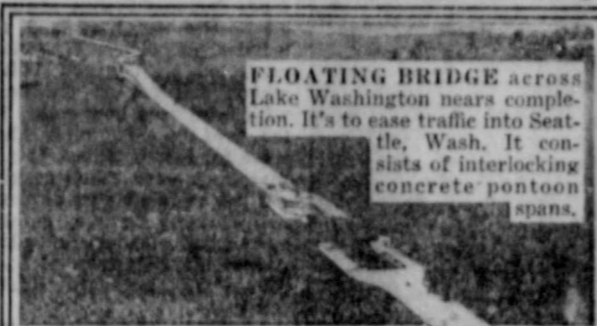
More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official stations between now and April 16, 1964. Operators of vehicles not displaying the new sticker by that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected at the earliest possible time and pointed out:

"Since the vehicle inspection program began in Texas, vehicle defects as causative factors in motor vehicle accidents has been reduced from 13 per cent in 1951 to five per cent in 1962. We have every reason to hope that with continued voluntary compliance with this law, accidents can be further reduced."

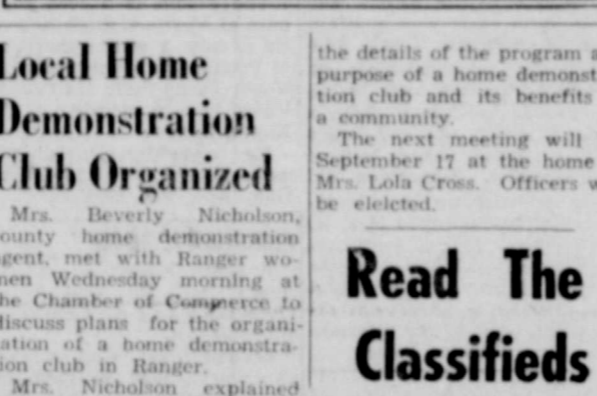
FLOATING BRIDGE across Lake Washington nears completion. It's to ease traffic into Seattle, Wash. It consists of interlocking concrete pontoon spans.

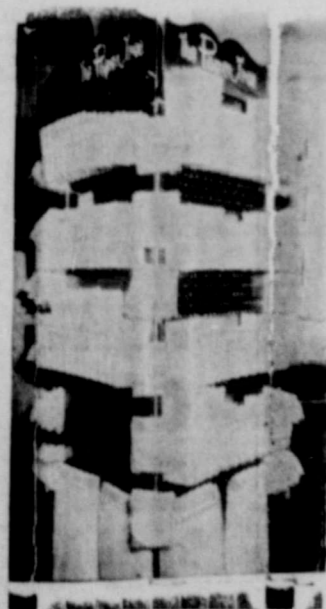

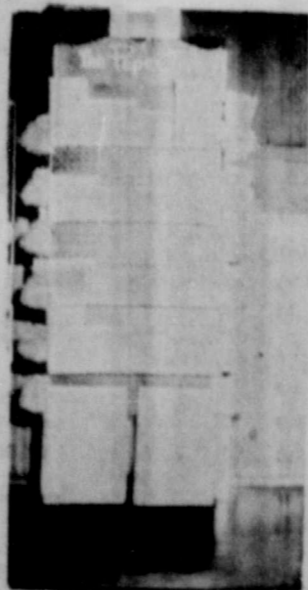

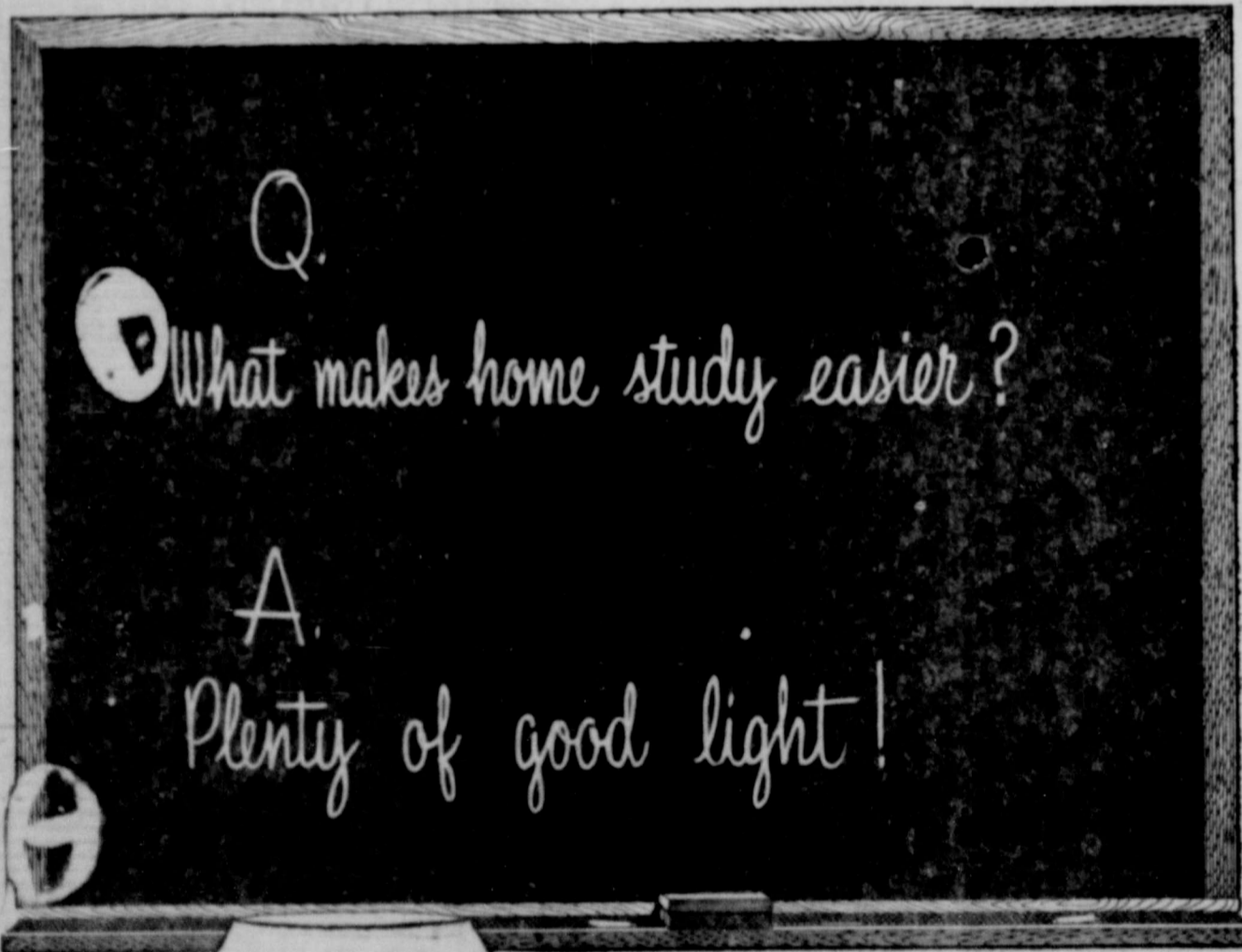
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Homework is hard work for young eyes. Plenty of good light is needed for reading small type, seeing details in maps and charts and performing other close visual tasks. For easier seeing at the study table, a good table lamp with at least a 150 watt bulb or equivalent is recommended. The lamp should be tall enough to spread light evenly over the work surface and properly shaded to conceal the light source from the eyes. A diffusing bowl (or a bulb with its own built-in diffuser) is recommended to soften the light and prevent glare. Check your children's study light now. Make sure they have proper light for easy seeing when they do their homework.
