The purpose of this program is to offer the ranchers and farmers in the area an opportunity to meet with men who are directly connected with the industry. Through this, they may share their own experiences with other sheep and goat raisers.

Dr. John Foster, Ranger Veterinarian, will be program chairman.

Campaign Opens To Help Society For Blind People

HOUSTON — "Sight-Saving Month" appeal letters have been mailed today to residents of Texas.

This announcement was made by Senator Criss Cole, Campaign chairman of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

An appeal goal of \$51,000 has been set by the Texas Society to help finance its year-round programs of aid to research, public and professional education and preventive services. The Texas "Sight-Saving Month" campaign is part of a nationwide observance.

The theme for "Sight-Saving Month" in Texas is "Life Is Worth Seeing." "Each of us can personally participate in the fight to prevent blindness by having a regular eye examination and by contributing to the Sight-Saving Campaign of the Texas Society," Senator Cole declared.

Senator Cole advised that contributions to the Sight-Saving Campaign of the Texas Society will make possible an expanded attack against Glaucoma. Free Glaucoma Detection Screenings will be

sponsored by the Texas Society for Prevention of Blindness in various sections of the State, September through November.

The public education campaign seeks to alert residents of Texas to the need for preventing loss of sight among all age groups. "Disease, accidents and neglect have already cost the eyesight of an estimated 24,400 people in Texas," Senator Cole reported.

The Texas Society estimates that there are 66,000 adults over 40 in the State suffering from glaucoma, often called the "sneak thief of sight," blindness without pain or warning. Half of these people do not even know that they have the disease, the prevention of blindness officer said.

Early detection of glaucoma is necessary to prevent loss of sight. A regular eye examination, particularly for those over 40, is the best defense against glaucoma.

Among children, an estimated 613,250 school pupils need some form of eye care and another 5,000 will suffer from accidental eye injuries during the next twelve months, the Society said.

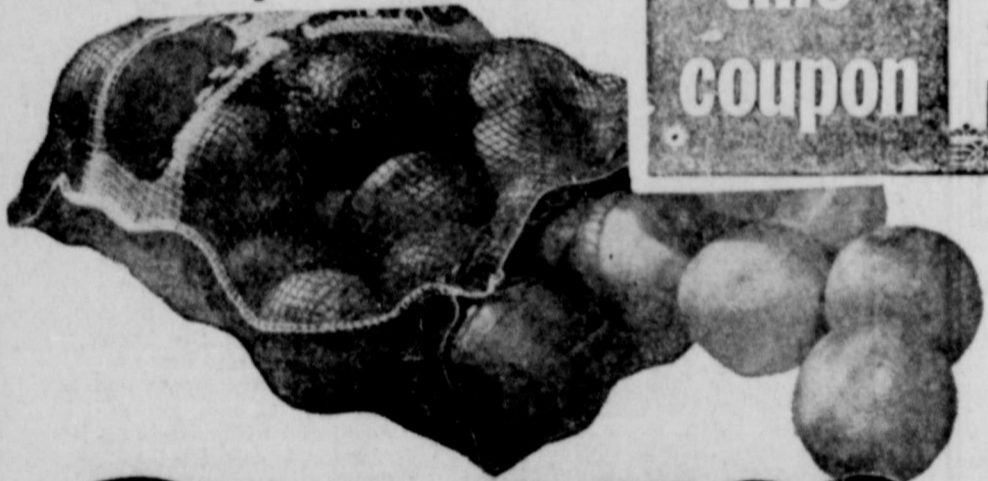

The Charles Crawford Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution observed the beginning of Constitution Week, Sept. 17-23, with a luncheon and program held at the Victor Hotel at 1 p. m. Monday.

The nationwide dual observance of Citizenship Day, Sept. 17, and Constitution Week is proclaimed by the President, under authorization of Congress and with the driving interest of the Daughters of the American Revolution in the background.

Guest speaker was Dr. Theodore F. Nicksick, president of Ranger Junior College, who spoke on "The Constitution and We, the People."

Mrs. F. E. Harrell and Mrs. P. G. Berry were hostesses for the luncheon meeting. Mrs. E. F. Horrigan, regent, presided over the meeting and welcomed the 25 members and guests from over Eastland County and Fort Worth.

Dr. Nicksick was introduced by Mrs. Arthur Murrell of Eastland, director of public relations for RJC, who presented him as "one of the informed citizenry."

Dr. Nicksick spoke on the Constitution, tracing the background leading up to the ratification on September 17, 1787. He read the preamble of the Constitution, emphasizing the fact that the power vested in

the Federal Government was "given" by and not "taken" from the people.

In tracing the work of the 55 men from the original colonies, except Rhode Island, who met in closed session in Philadelphia for three months prior to the writing of the Constitution, Dr. Nicksick brought out the differences of opinions among the colonies and their reluctance to form a central government. Stating that each colony had its own currency, its own laws, its own tariffs, he traced the delicate diplomacy needed to bring the writing of the constitution and its final ratification to a successful conclusion.

He cited similarities in the needs then and now for a central government, stating that even at that time, there was a large national debt, even as today. At that time there was no power to prevent foreign countries from setting up in what is now the United States, and far-sighted

men saw the need for a federal government.

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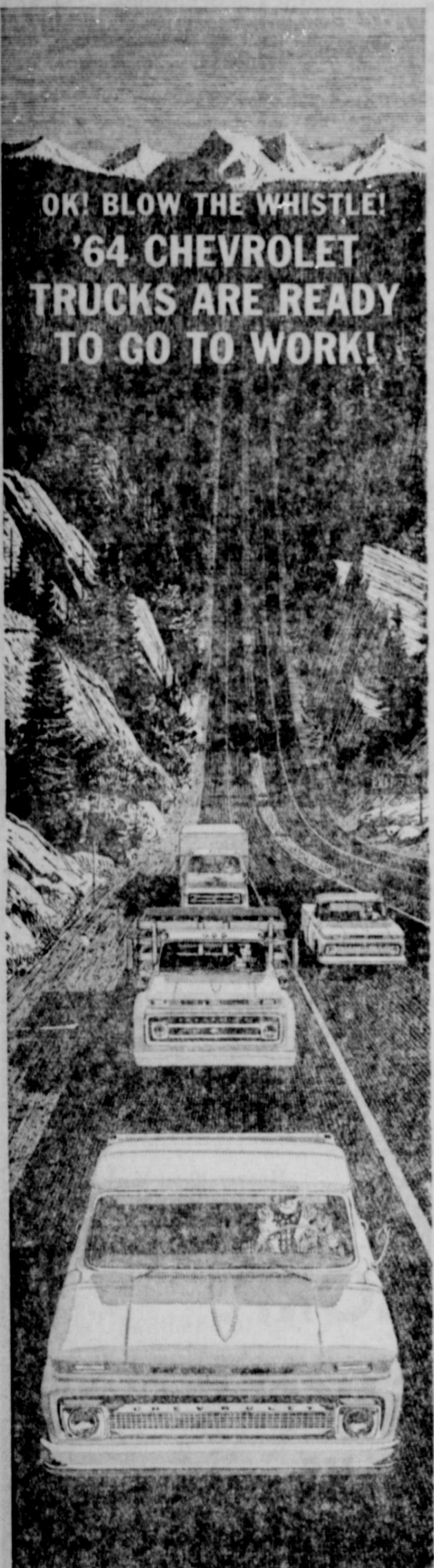

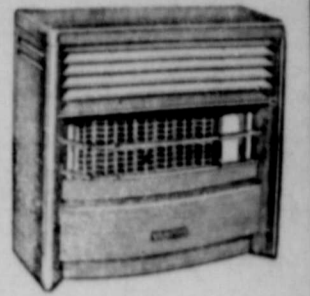

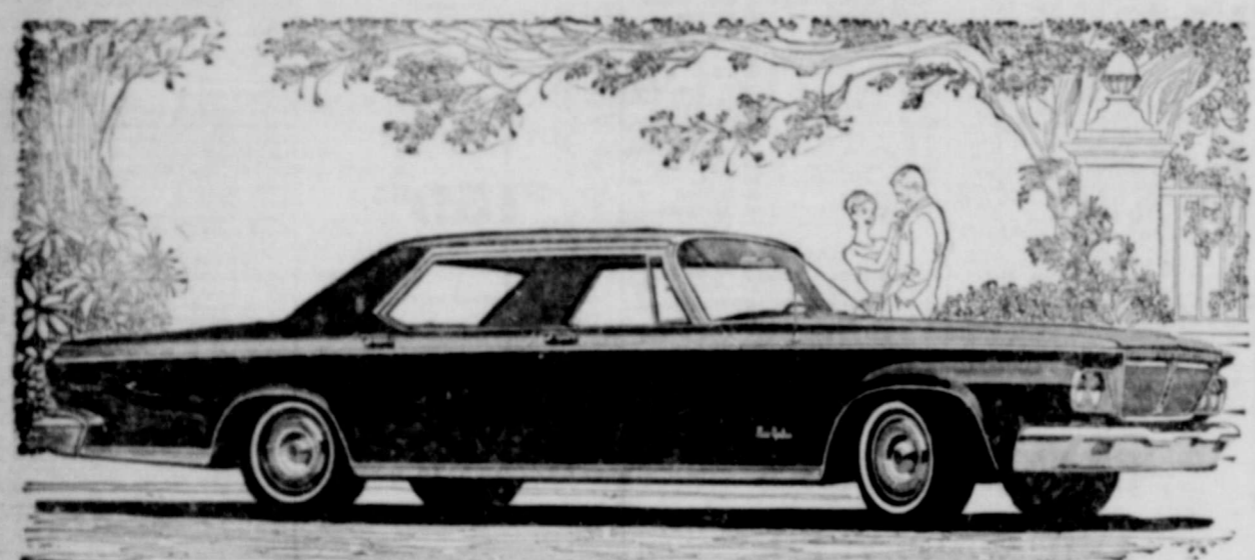
