has brought about major changes in the advertising picture. It has been an aggressive competitor with the other media, and its appetite for the advertising dollar, with the cost of producing even Grade B programs running to comparatively astronomical sums, seems insatiable.

But the power of the written word still gets top recognition. An announcement from Sears, Roebuck and Company will interest those who like to read as well as to stare. Last year the figure was \$58 million, which represented 71.2 per cent of Sears' total retail media expense. The balance went to advertising through circulars, magazines, radio and television, and other media.

A spokesman tells the story: "This is tangible evidence of our continuing faith in the potency of newspaper advertising. From the day Sears opened its first retail store, the company has made greater and greater use of newspapers. It is obvious that Sears store managers continue to regard the newspaper as their major medium for more than historical reasons. Their evaluation is based on the day-to-day results in their stores."

Television advertising is a catch-as-catch-can affair - you have to be looking at the set at the moment and it's gone in an instant. Print is durable and the prospective buyer can scan and consider it at his leisure.


