# APPROXIMATELY 300 ATTEND SOUTHWEST C. B. JAMBOREE

More than 300 people registered for the Southwest C. B. Jamboree in Eastland, Saturday, November 2nd. Registration began at 7:30 a. m. in the lobby of the Village Hotel.

Abilene was the first town to register other than Eastland, and other towns registering during the day were Dallas, Bedford, Waco, Denton, Arlington, Amarillo, Stephen-

ville, Lake Dallas, Louisville, Auto, Eastland Telegram, KERC Radio, Robertson TV, Cisco, McKinney, Irving, Carbon, Graham, Snyder, Jacksboro, Cleburne, Olney, Gorman, Brownwood, Ranger, Comanche, San Angelo, Olden, Grand Rapids, Michigan, Fort Worth, Hamilton, Lubbock, Plano, Whitney, and Abilene.

Manufacturers and dealers set up displays of equipment and accessories Friday night and everyone spent most of Saturday morning looking over the newest equipment and asking questions about it.

Following a short recess for lunch, activities resumed at 1 p. m. Roy Smith, Ten-Ten comed the visitors to Eastland and the Southwest C. B. Jamboree.

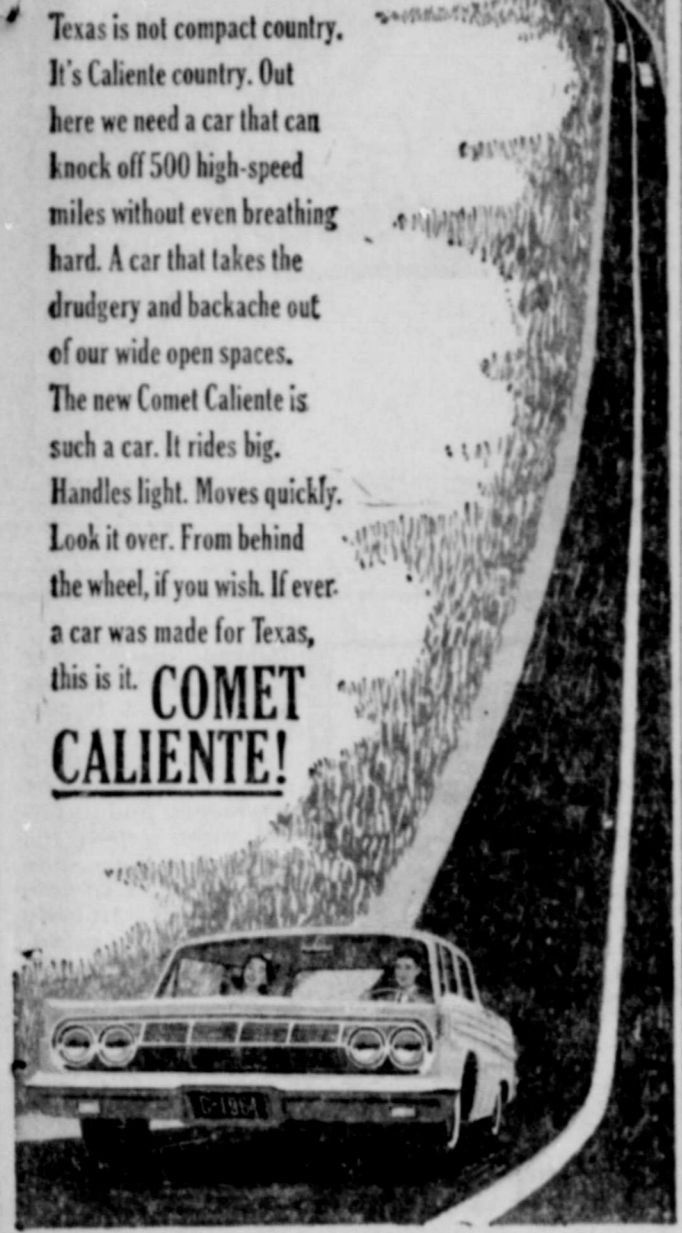

## SOCIALIZED MEDICINE IS DISCUSSED AT LEAGUE

Dr. H. J. Bulgerin described the effects of socialized medicine on economy and on people in a speech to the Civic League and Garden Club in their 3 p. m. meeting Wednesday in the Woman's Club.

He said that there will be a great push for socialized medicine during the next year and its main argument will be "political as well as a national emergency."

The program speech was a part of "Operation Home-town," a nationwide effort by the medical profession to present the facts concerning government interference in the practice of medicine.

He compared the trend here toward socialized medicine to the unsuccessful "English Health Service" and said that the Medical Association hopes to at least hold it at the present level.

He said in ten years the proposed medicare bill could be twice as expensive as our present defense budget, as well as leading to governmental control of a great many things.

He said the cost would be prohibitive to the individual as well as our whole economy and put a drain on hospital re-

sources.
