Ranger Woman's Son, Grandson

'Drown In Mishap'

The son and grandson of a Ranger woman, Mrs. Margaret Perdue, of the Julia Sheppard Nursing Home, were drowned in a boating accident in Lake Graham Sunday afternoon about two o'clock.

The victims were Albert E. Perdue, 52, and his 14 year old son, Albert R., both of Wichita Falls.

Mrs. George Williams of Ranger is a sister of Mr. Perdue.

According to reports, a Graham woman, Mrs. Howard Bigham, and her three children say Mr. Perdue and his son fall into the water when their outboard motor boat apparently hit something and suddenly tilted. The Bigham family were fishing on the bank when the accident occurred and she ran up an embankment to where her husband and another Graham man, Lonnie Love, were working on a fence near the lake. They saw the two victims sink from sight in water which was about 25 feet deep.

Graham Police Chief Raymond Burkett, who was also fishing nearby, overtook the empty, runaway boat and secured it to the bank, unaware of the drowning accident.

Rescue operations were completed when Mr. Perdue's body was recovered about 4 p. m. and his son's body about 30 minutes later.

Funeral services were held in Wichita Falls, Tuesday afternoon at 4 p. m.

The Community-wide and mother and her other four children, one of whom is a twin sister of the younger drowning victim.

Miss Claudia Faye Perdue of Abilene, who lived in Ranger for a number of years, is also a sister of the elder Mr. Perdue.

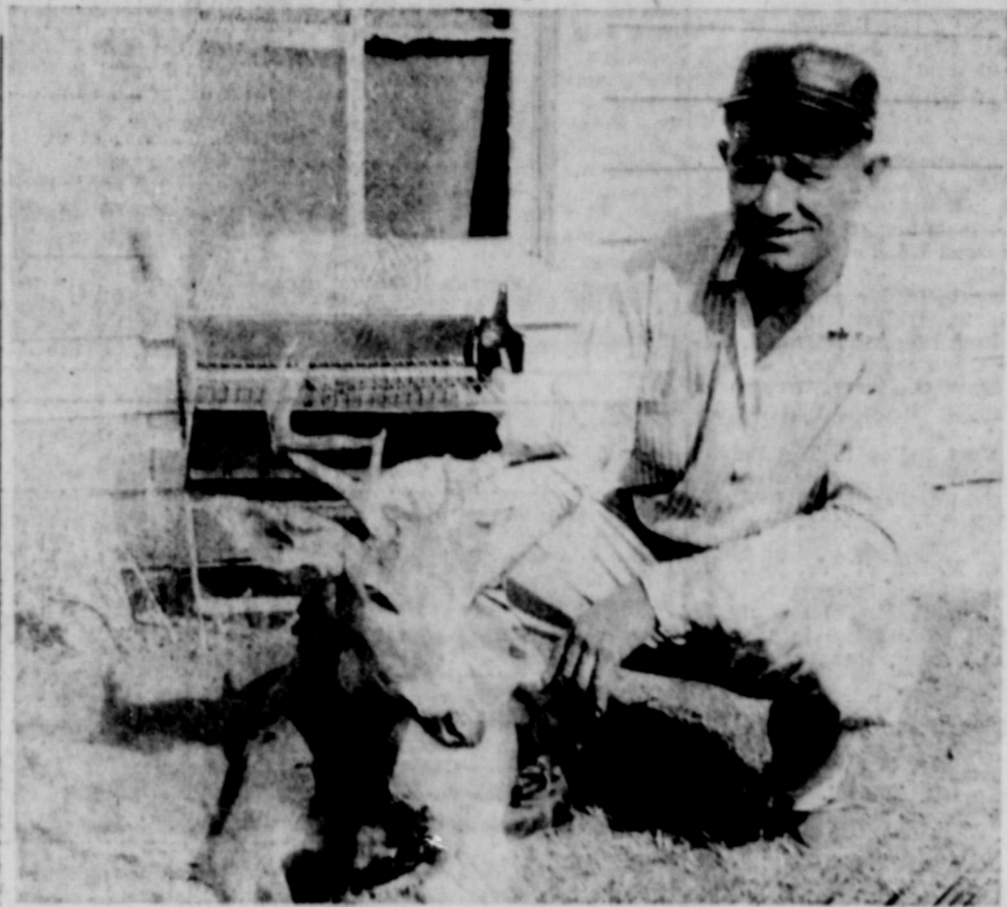
Nurses Association Will Meet Nov. 21

A. E. Thompson Scores Early In Deer Season

Among the first of many successful hunters to report a kill opening day was Mr. A. E. Thompson of Ranger, bringing down a nice buck minutes after the season was legally open.

Mr. Thompson, hunting on Jasper Williamson's farm, five miles south of Ranger on the Gorman highway, Saturday morning.

Late Tuesday evening, four days after the season opened, the Ranger Frozen Food Locker plant reported 17 deer in their plant for processing and storage.

The Nantz-Robinson plant, West of Ranger had 39 for processing.

The largest deer reported in either plant was a 133 pound, 10 point buck brought into Nantz-Robinson by Willard Seymour of Ranger.

Hunters from Fort Worth, Hamlin, Mobile, Alabama, Abilene, Arlington, Dallas, Odessa, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Houston, Childress, Beaumont and Sweetwater, were in the Eastland, Stephens, and Palo Pinto County area to take advantage of the good hunting.

The Eastland Locker plant reports deer having been received for processing and storage.

Based on the early reports, hunters in the Eastland County area will have the most successful season they have known in some time.

Rangers End Season, Play Navarro Saturday Night

The Ranger Junior College Rangers will draw the final curtain on the Texas Junior College Conference football play Saturday night as they travel to Corsicana for their last game with Navarro.

The Rangers had an open date following the homecoming game with Wharton November 9.

Writing an end to a season that has been plagued with injuries, the Rangers can look to next year when they will be playing in a new conference, now in the proposal stage.

The proposed conference will be a combination of the Texas Junior College and Texas Eastern Conferences making up a nine team schedule. The Texas Eastern conference will add Tyler, Kilgore, Texarkana and Henderson County colleges to the present, Ranger, Cisco, Navarro, Wharton and Blinn.

RJC Member Of New Football 'Big League'

Delegates from nine junior colleges who field football teams voted Thursday to form a single conference. The meeting was held in Waco.

Representing the Texas Eastern Junior College Conference were Kilgore, Tyler, Texarkana, and Henderson County of Athens.

Representing the Texas Junior College Conference were Navarro of Corsicana, Wharton, Blinn of Brenham, Ranger and Cisco.

The group voted 7 to 2 in favor of forming a single conference in which all football teams would compete.

A spokesman said it is not expected at this time that such action would alter the schools' basketball team alignments.

He said the conference would follow the Southwest Conference's schedule system — each member playing each other on a home and home basis.

The spokesman said formation of a single conference would shorten distances teams go to play and also increase fans' interest.

Representatives from two schools from each conference remained in Waco, after the meeting to form a four-man committee to work on proposed eligibility requirements, rules and regulations. Their proposals will be presented to the entire group in December.

The new merger will become effective in September, and will not conflict with the Spring athletics to be held on the campus of RJC next April.

Grady Pipkin County Civic Leader, Is Buried Tuesday

Grady Pipkin, 74, Eastland civic leader and former grocery chain owner, died at 7:15 Sunday in Sunrise Manor Nursing Home in Eastland. He had been hospitalized since April 1, 1962.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2 p. m. in the First Methodist Church with the former pastor, the Rev. J. C. Oglesby of Eules, officiating, assisted by the church pastor, the Rev. Cyrus Barcus. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery, with Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

Born June 1, 1889, in Ferris, Texas, he came to Eastland in 1919 from Plainview. He was married to Clyde Turk, January 14, 1913 in Hillsboro.

Mr. Pipkin had owned and operated Pipkin Grocer Inc., with headquarters in Eastland, and had maintained a chain of 13 Piggy-Wiggly stores in West Texas until his retirement in 1956. He had been one of Eastland's outstanding civic leaders and a lay leader in the Methodist Church where he had been a member of the Board of Stewards of the Eastland Church for 40 years.

Mr. Pipkin served as a commissioner of the Methodist Home in Waco for 15 years. He had been an official in Scouting for 34 years and served as finance chairman of Comanche Trail for 25 years. In Eastland, he had served as director of the Chamber of Commerce for 35 years and was one of the original members of the Eastland County Water Board, serving in that capacity until one year ago. He served as president of the board one year.

He was a charter member of the Eastland Rotary Club, a Mason, and a Shriner since 1922. Mr. Pipkin was a past director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and served on the Eastland school board for 10 years, beginning in the early 1930s.

Survivors are his wife; three sons, James and Bruce, both of Eastland, and Raymond of San Angelo; nine grandchildren; one great-grandchild; and one sister, Mrs. Euna Wilson of Pryor, Oklahoma.

Pallbearers were M. H. Perry, Veon Howard, Charles Freyschlag, Tom Leslie, Homer Meek, Bill Leslie, Pat Miller, all of Eastland; and Buck Pickens of Fort Worth.

RANGER BAND WINS STATE RECOGNITION AT REGIONAL

On Saturday, November 16, the Ranger High School Band competed at Region II Marching Contest in San Angelo. Competing in an inspection and marching contest, the band received a rating of First Division in both areas. The first division is interpreted by the Texas University Interscholastic League, which governs high school competition in all extra curricular activities as superior in performances. This places the Ranger High School Band in the top 5 percent of all class A bands in the state of Texas. The award received was the highest rating a marching band in Texas can earn. This was the first time in 11 years (since 1952) that a Ranger High School band had received a superior rating in a UIL sponsored marching contest. In 1962-63 the band received a first Division in concert playing and in sight reading in UIL competition but was not for the Sweepstakes award because that same year they had received Second Division in marching. This year, the band is eligible for the Sweepstakes since the marching contest is the first of the three state sponsored contests for bands. Band director is Bill Auvenshine.

Eastland County has been approved as a disaster county, Cong. Omar Burleson informed the Telegram by wire this week. The designation will enable county farmers and ranchers to purchase surplus feed grains for feeding purposes this winter.

Ironically the approval came on the day on which the heaviest rain had fallen in several months.

Implementation of the program will begin as soon as administrative steps are taken. Emmett E. Powell, County Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee office manager, said Tuesday.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture Disaster Committee had requested the designation because of the drought conditions which many believe will result in one of the worst winters ahead in many years. Stockmen in the county will be able to buy milo for \$1.87 a hundred from the Commodity Credit Corp. warehouses, it is reported. Other feeds may be available later.

The USDA Disaster committee is made up of E. E. Blackwell, ASC chairman, County Agent J. M. Cooper and County Farm Home Administration Manager Homer Cole.

Other counties in the area now under the program are Brown, Comanche and Erath. Stephens and Callahan are under consideration, it is reported.

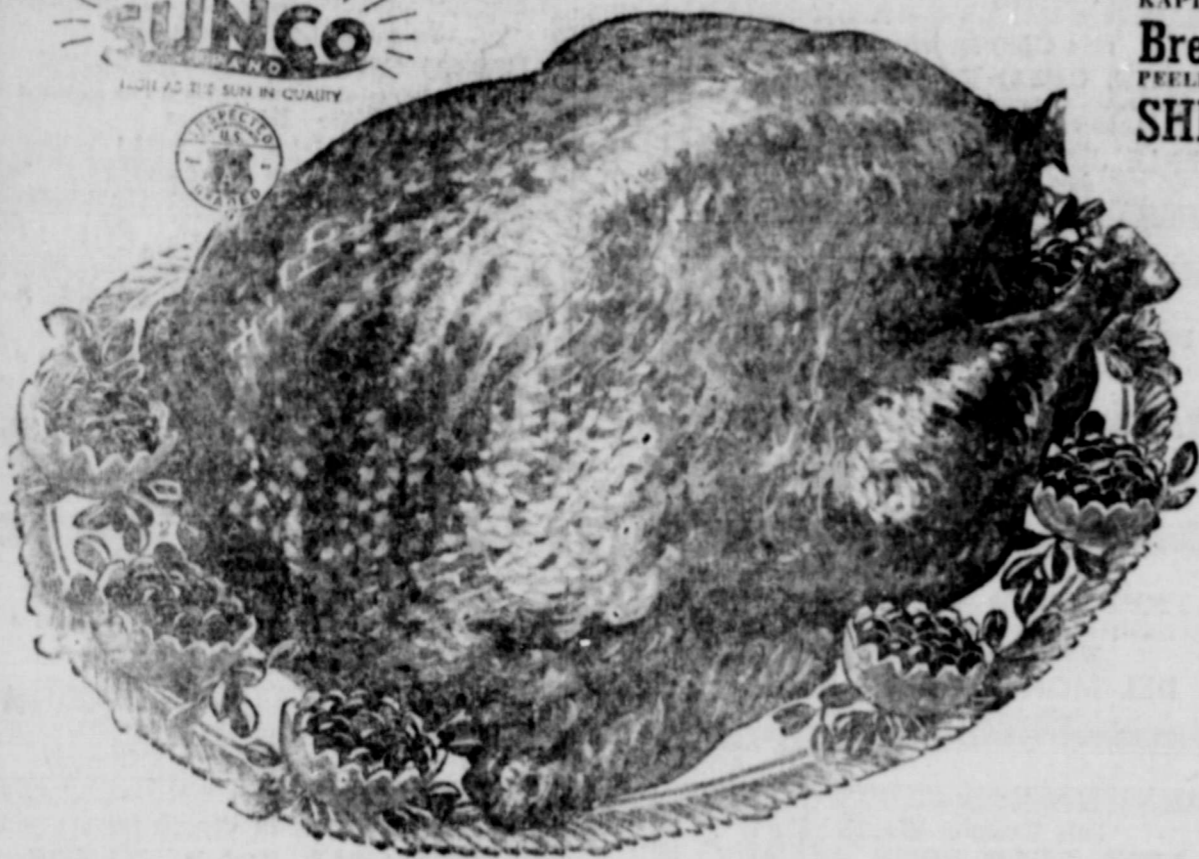

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Country Editor Goes To Sea . . .

Take a country newspaper editor and expose him to Navy tradition and treat him like a V. I. P. on a Naval base and a sailing vessel, and you are sure to come up with a died-in-the-wool Navy fan—even if the raw material had always been a landlocked ex-G. I.

As guest of the Navy, we left Eastland late last Monday evening ("taking the bus, and leaving the driving to them"). Sat by Pat Moseley who was going down to Fort Worth for the annual Farm Bureau convention. East of Ranger we saw fall-painted foliage and several deer, which aren't there now, which aren't there now.

At the Dallas Naval Air Station, at Grand Prairie, we

joined other members of the 36-member "cruise," and spent the night on the station. The party was air-lifted early Tuesday morning to Pensacola NAS, flying over Tyler, Alexandria, Baton Rouge, New Orleans and Mobile.

The Texas party and a similar group from Oletha, Kansas, really got the "red carpet" treatment on landing at Pensacola—band, banners, Marines, Waves and three admirals. Then a busy schedule began with lectures, demonstrations and orientations—all to show us civilians how Navy aviators are trained. Taking men from many sources—the fleet, college campuses and graduates—the Navy exposes them to a rigid 16-week program. Fourteen weeks are in "pre-flight" ac-

demies, physical fitness and familiarization with aircraft. Then they are put into planes and learn to fly, by flying.

Our first Navy day was topped off with a gigantic fish fry, and the next day began early (5 a. m. when we went aboard the Aircraft Carrier USS Lexington, a World War II carrier that is used exclusively for training pilots from Pensacola and Corpus Christi Naval bases. After breakfast aboard while the ship steamed into the Gulf, we were given vantage points on the bridge to observe first hand the landing and launching of planes on the carrier's angled deck. Twelve student pilots, six in propeller-driven trainers and six in jets for a lot of big-eyed civilians. Picture yourself landing a high performance airplane on a forward moving rolling and limited strip.

We spent the whole day aboard, visiting every nook and

cranny of the sea-going giant, and in fact had lunch with the enlisted men somewhere deep in the ship. Docking late in the afternoon, we barely had time to wash the salt out of our ears before we were off to a banquet with Vice Admiral Fitzhugh Lee, Chief of the Naval Air Training. During a brief talk, the admiral stressed the importance of mobilizing carriers to our national defense. In a day when it is getting increasingly difficult to locate bases on foreign soil, the carrier provides for the strength for defense, he said, either by a simple "show of force," or actual combat.

The Navy's big problem? Keeping men. The Navy spends millions training men, only to have private industry lure these trained men with higher salaries. Training programs run in high gear all the time, just to keep up.

The Texas group was made

up of a mixture of interests from several sections. A weekly editor from Seagraves was the only other newsman. The party consisted of educators, attorneys, architects, etc. Dr. Rhea Williams of the University of Texas, who heads the State of Texas' Inter-scholastic League program, asked us to give his regards to Eastland friend Supt. Wendell Siebert and Board President M. H. Perry . . . W. T. Kirk Jr., a Dallas insurance executive, asked to be remembered to Mr. E. E. Freyschlag, a former associate . . . Our own roommate was a small manufacturer (pre-fabricated concrete steps) from Paris. He buys his aggregate in Eastland County. A city commissioner there and active chamber of commerce member, he shared ideas about expansion during a long background and the report he gave us on Paris will be the subject for a column soon, by the way.

There's no question about

it—our respect for the Navy, was increased from our brief visit with the fleet.

bride, was best man.

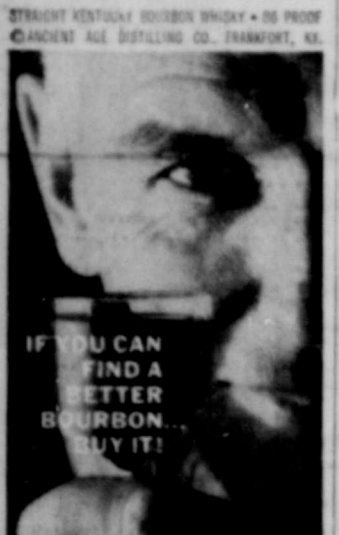
The bride wore a fur-trimmed two-piece suit of champagne brocade and her accessories were of white carnations.

Parks & Wildlife Reports On Deer In Edwards Area

Demonstrating the services performed by the State Parks and Wildlife Department is a report just released on the deer population in the Edwards Plateau.

The report is as follows: Rod Marburger, Wildlife Biologist, reports that the recent deer census indicates an overall increase in the deer population for the 21 county Edwards Plateau District. Of particular interest was the high Fawn production, which ran as high as 97 per cent of the total population in one county.

Because of the findings during this years census, antlerless deer hunting permits are being issued for the 1964 hunting season in greater numbers than were issued for the 1962 season. Some new areas are expected to be added to areas which were hunted last year.

Marburger also reports the deer generally will reach the hunting season in only fair condition. Many deer in the granite county, where the dry weather was prevailed over most of the growing season, are in less desirable condition than those in the limestone area. If the drought continues over the region the deer will

very likely suffer extreme losses from cold weather and development is better in most areas this year because of early spring rains that provided food during the time antlers were developing. Antlers were already formed when dry weather started.

It is interesting to note that the highest increase in the fawn crop in 1963 occurred in Llano, Gillespie and San Saba Counties, where die-offs occurred in 1962. This shows the ability of deer to bounce back after the population has been reduced.

Wider Bridges Being Made In State Program

AUSTIN — The headlights
of two automobiles hurtling to-
ward each other at an aggre-
gated 140 miles an hour
pierced the night on a lonely
stretch of highway in East
Texas. The beams fuse mo-

mentarily at the center of a
bridge as each car inches to the
right. Meeting at the bridge,
the cars whoosh by one an-
other without incident.

Run-of-the-mill as such an
episode may seem — it oc-
curs thousands of times each
day and night — an accident
has nevertheless been prevent-
ed. It has been prevented by
the widening of the bridge to
allow cars an additional mea-
sure of meeting room.

The widening of narrow
bridges, and many another
measure to make Texas high-
ways safer, is part of the State
Highway Safety and Betterment
Program of the Texas
Highway Department. In a

relatively unglamorous way, the
program accounts for the sav-
ing of many lives on Texas
highways every year.

A \$20 million installment in
this program to make \$4.5
billion worth of existing Tex-
as highways better and safer
was approved today by the
Texas Highway Commission.

The Commission authorized
the \$20 million expenditure
during the coming year to im-
prove about 2,300 miles of U.S.
and State highways under the
1964 State Highway Safety
and Betterment Program.
The annual program systemat-
ically upgrades the 65,000 mile
Texas highway network, con-
struction of which has cost

\$4.5 billion since the Highway
Department's inception in 1917

Work will be done on about
45 projects in some 150 Tex-
as counties in the 1964 pro-
gram. The projects include
such improvements as recon-
struction of traffic lanes, widen-
ing and widening of bridge
and drainage structures and
approaches, base strengthen-
ing, and rebuilding of should-
ers.

Such items are counted a
significant factor in a de-
crease of more than 25 per
cent in the fatality rate on
primary highways in Texas
during the last decade.

Television advertising is a catch-as-catch-can affair — you

an instant. Print is durable and the prospective buyer can
scan and consider it at his leisure.
