Gas Industrial Cooling Rates Reduced By LSG

DALLAS—A reduction in natural gas industrial summer cooling rates available to Lone Star Gas Company's industrial accounts in Texas has been announced by L. T. Potter, President. He said the reduced rates will make natural gas for cooling available to smaller industrial consumers at approximately the same price as large consumers have been paying.

"The Company's policy of continued study of all areas of operation resulted in a recently completed analysis that projected potential additional earnings through increased use of gas air conditioning," Mr. Potter said. "The rate reduction was made because the study showed great potentials in the sale of gas under industrial rate schedules for cooling apartment houses, hotels, motels, dormitories and other large buildings used for living quarters, office buildings, nursing homes and hospitals, and other structures qualifying for such rates. Although use of gas by these customers for cooling has been available at special industrial rates, the new rate reductions will be substantial and will make the operating cost of gas air conditioning equipment even more economical. Public schools will also get a summer cooling gas cost. Lone Star believes all school

buildings eventually will be cooled as well as heated."

Lone Star has adequate facilities to provide natural gas for cooling in summer, Mr. Potter said. He explained that, before the advent of gas cooling, the large pipeline capacity needed to meet the heavy demand for gas during the winter months was not fully used in summer. As the demand for natural gas has accelerated with increased summer air conditioning, more of the available pipeline capacity has been used.

"As we keep our operating costs down so that maximum efficiency and economy are attained, increased gas sales will benefit all customers, including residential," Mr. Potter said. "With greater availability of gas air conditioning equipment from leading manufacturers, the considerable and continuing improvement in such equipment, and this rate reduction for industrial air conditioning customers, increased sales volumes are anticipated."

District Manager G. W. Abbott said the new summer cooling rate will be effective in Cisco on March 1, 1964 and was announced at this time by Lone Star so that customers planning to install gas air conditioning for use next summer can estimate future operating costs now.

He also said that "to assist Lone Star's larger industrial customers in their long term planning, a new long term contract is now available at firm prices for gas through June 30, 1968."

Winner Many Events

Although it was his first time to win three trophies in one action-packed day, bringing home top speed awards is nothing new to Hart, a paint and body expert employed by Anderson Chevrolet Co. During the 10 years he has been in hot-rodding competition, he has won about 80 trophies, also numerous cash prizes and U. S. Savings Bonds.

"Hot-rodding really gets in your blood," Hart admits. "I've quit two or three times, but — well, I just can't seem to completely give up the fascinating sport."

It's more than mere fascination, however. The fact is, Hart is rated as a top driver. And he's never had an accident.

About 100 other hot-rodders from Fort Worth, Dallas, Stephenville, Midland and numerous other Texas cities completed in the Mineral Wells event.

The Challengers' Raceway speed contests were conducted in compliance with the rules of the National Hot-Rod Association.

Prior to wheeling the 1962 Bel Air, Hart racked up several first places at several dozen drag meets in a hopped-up speedster with which he held a national NHRA elapsed time record for one year. He was officially clocked at 12.27 seconds from a standing start to the end of a quarter mile.

That hotrod, which hit a maximum speed of 120 miles per hour in several races, was powered by a 1957 eight-cylinder motor on the chassis of a 1932 pickup.

Hart's Mineral Wells triple triumph winds up his drag strip competition for the year, he said.

But the 35-year-old Ranger mechanic and racer, backed by his enthusiastic sponsor, employer Bill Anderson, is planning more ambitious action next spring. In the meantime, the pair plan to make new modifications to further hop-up horsepower of Anderson Chevrolet's entries.

Hot-rodding, incidentally, is one of America's fastest-growing and most thrilling sports. For example, at the AHRA's national meet recently held at Green Valley Speedway between Fort Worth and Dallas, there were over 950 entries and the spectator attendance totaled 15,000 per day.

Little wonder, some of the drag racers reached sizzling speeds of 207 miles per hour, and 70 percent of the entries moved at such torrid rates that parachutes were used to end of the strip. That means thrills aplenty for those in the stands as they watch the spinning rubber burn.

The rapid growth of the speed sport is resulting in more and more community dragstrips over Texas and the nation.

"Drag strips are very important," emphasizes Anderson. "They take hot-rodding and drag-racing off streets and highways, averting an untold number of tragic and fatal accidents."

Little wonder, some of the drag racers reached sizzling speeds of 207 miles per hour, and 70 percent of the entries moved at such torrid rates that parachutes were used to end of the strip. That means thrills aplenty for those in the stands as they watch the spinning rubber burn.

The rapid growth of the speed sport is resulting in more and more community dragstrips over Texas and the nation.

"Drag strips are very important," emphasizes Anderson. "They take hot-rodding and drag-racing off streets and highways, averting an untold number of tragic and fatal accidents."

"Rigid safety rules also enforced at strips," he added, "further eliminate dangers which would otherwise threaten teen agers and speed-lovers who participate in the popular sport."

There are, explains Hart, eight basic methods for increasing horsepower — and speed — of conventional automobile engines.

These include modifications relating to carburetion, breathing areas, raising the compression ratio (one of the oldest methods of hopping up engines), bore and stroke, cam and valve gears, friction and balance, ignition and supercharging and fuels.

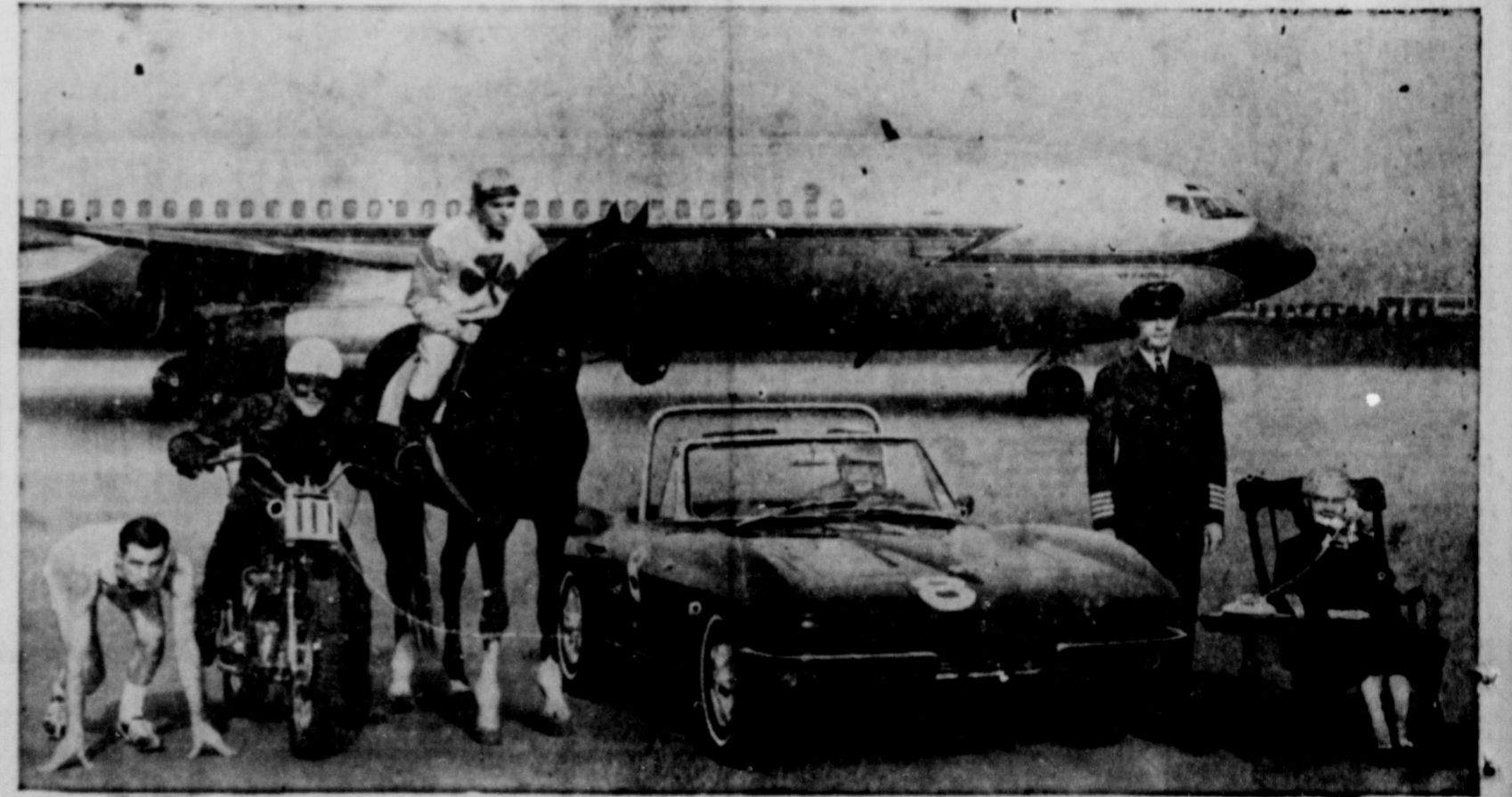
