The 60-room hostelry, under many ownerships since it was first erected at the corner of Main and Rusk streets back during the prosperous oil boom era, is being liquidated to settle an estate

The structure is 50 by 140 feet and is three stories. All rooms are completely furnished. The coffee shop and other first floor business rental locations are included in the offering.
