Cisco Downs Ranger 26 - 0 In Jaycee Gridiron Tilt

Charles Lipsey, 160-pound quarterback, and a band of inspired Cisco Jaycees routed a Ranger Jaycee grid crew, 26-0, in the "Has Been Bowl" clash at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger Saturday night.

The Ciscoans' performance was impressive, and Lipsey, a former Cisco High grid great, proved to the crowd of 500 shivering fans that he still is adept as a slick ball-handler.

The contest — understandably — was slow and sluggish. Scoring action didn't come until the waning seconds of the first half.

With time running out in the second quarter, Cisco clicked off 62 yards on 10 offensive stabs to roll down to the Ranger 8. From there quarterback Lipsey hit End Jim Webb with a pass for the first touchdown of the night. An attempted heave by Lipsey for the conversion was off target.

Following the halftime intermission, both teams fought to a standoff in the third quarter. Play was slow. The out-of-shape and tiring young businessmen of both cities were able to unreeel only 19 plays in that period.

Two plays deep in the final third quarter, Lipsey hit backfield mate Larry Kelso with another jackpot pitch from the Ranger 6. Lipsey tried to sweep right end for the conversion, but was nailed far short.

A pass interception two plays after Cisco had kicked off to Ranger again gave the Ciscoans possession on the

hosts' 25. Don Johnson was smeared for a 17-yard loss, putting the oval back on the 42, then he bulls-eyed End Askins with a pass for 13 yards. From the 29 Johnson tried another pitch, but it was incomplete. Ranger drew an offsides penalty, moving the ball to the 24, and from that point Johnson's pass to Askins was cashed for touchdown No. 3. Big Charles Lavery slammed over center to annex two after-TD points.

Six plays later the Ciscoans were on the move again from the Ranger 38. Lipsey shot a pass to Askins for a gain of 13, three aerial tries were incomplete, and then on fourth down Lipsey slanted off right tackle for a 16-yard pickup to reach the nine. Lipsey connected with Teddy Anderson with a pitch good for four yards, failed on another air attempt, and then from the four the Cisco flogger arched a throw to Askins for the final tally of the night. Lipsey aimed for Sam Davis with a pass to convert, but the toss missed its mark.

The victorious Ciscoans sparked offensively and defensively. They stacked up 224 net yards via ground and air, racked up 13 first downs and completed 11 of 24 aerials. The pass completions averaged 13 yards. The Cisco defense held their foes to 67 net yards rushed and only three first downs.

The losing Ranger Jaycees only made one serious threat. That was early in the second quarter when they took over on the Cisco 27 after Lipsey had punted from the end zone. Ranger Quarterback Jim Lewis picked up 15 and a first down on a blast around left end, then knifed through center for five to reach the Cisco 10. Randall Hoover was stopped for no gain on a try over the middle. Lewis hit Dick Fletcher with a pass good for three, but the drive ended on the Cisco six after Lewis had gained a yard around left end.

Ranger's punting was outstanding, averaging 38.3 yards on three boots.

Airmail Now Deadline Near

Christmas mailing deadlines are looming closer day by day, Max Orr, Ranger postmaster, reminded today.

Tuesday, Dec. 10, is the deadline for mailing airmail parcels for overseas armed forces personnel, members of their families and authorized U. S. civilians employed overseas.

Gift parcels for distant states should be mailed this week. Postmaster Orr said, and gift parcels for local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than Dec. 14.

Complying with those suggested deadlines, he explained, will insure that all mail and packages will arrive at destinations prior to Christmas. Cooperation of postal patron will also avert last-minute congestion and putting additional burdens on overtaxed workers.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10 and those for local delivery not later than Dec. 15.

First class mail is recommended, Postmaster Orr said, to insure that the greeting card is forwarded to the right address.

MISSIONARIES TO VENEZUELA SHOW SLIDES SUNDAY NIGHT

Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Kimbler, Southern Baptist missionaries to Venezuela spoke at the First Baptist Church Sunday night, December 1, and showed some very interesting slides in regard to their work in the South American continent.

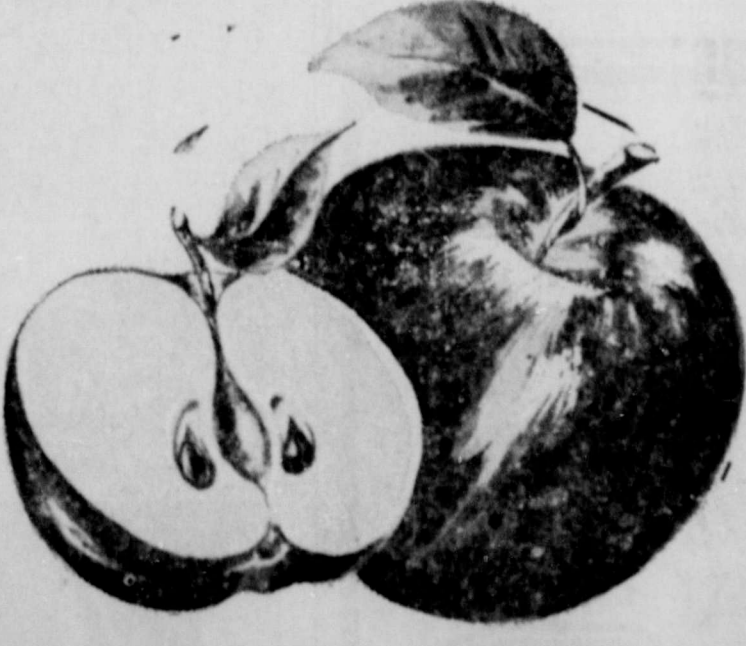

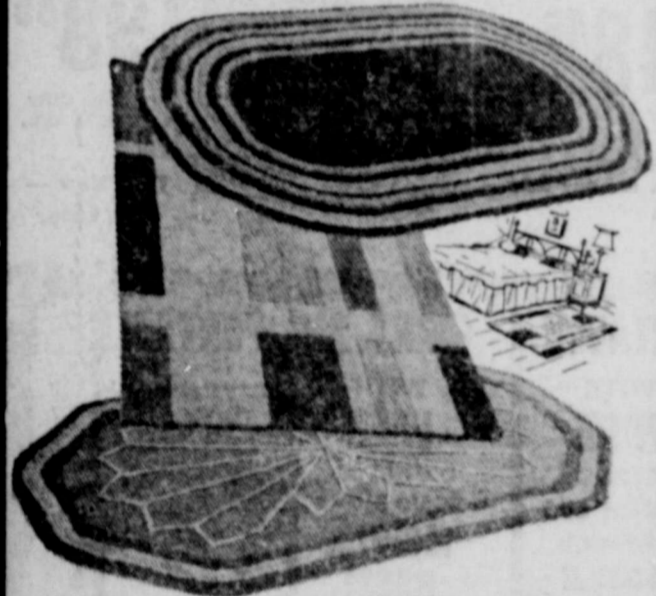

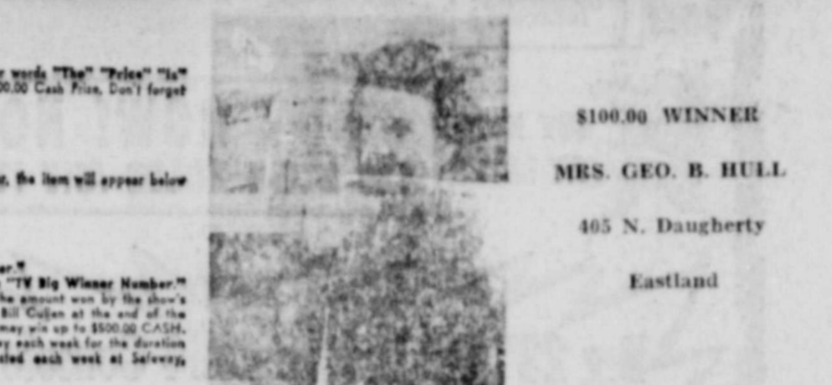
