Millie Jones, 37 year old grandmother, was assessed a five-year prison term and her boy friend, William Splawn, 40, got a 10-year term after they pleaded guilty to robbing the Ranger Worth Food Mart before a jury Monday in 91st District Court in Eastland.

John Blackwell pleaded not guilty and was given a 5-year suspended sentence by a 91st District Court jury Tuesday. He had been indicted as an accessory to the grocery robbery.

Prosecuting Attorney Earl Conner, Jr., told the jury of 11 men and one woman that the state was waiving maximum punishment in the case, which is the death penalty under an armed robbery conviction.

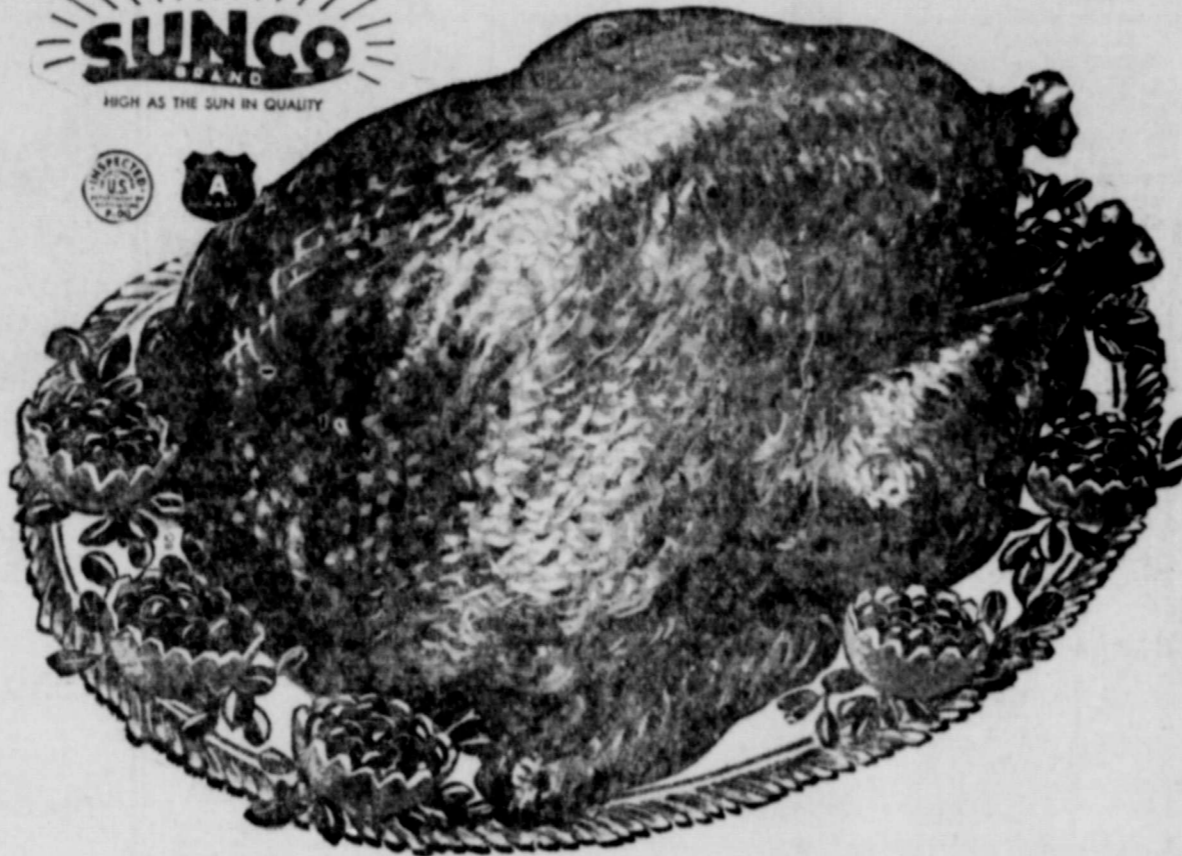
