ALTON UNDERWOOD, who farms 11 miles southeast of Ranger, is one of the many ruralists who are benefitting from the fine moisture resulting from the recent abnormally heavy snowfall which covered the area at mid-week.

Moisture, of course, now is the key to profit for farmers and ranchers in Texas and the Great Plains states. Beneficial rains early and late in August help Underwood harvest a better-than-average goober crop.

An 18-acre plot of fresh land — real deep sandy soil, about 4 feet atop the clay and laid out for some time — produced a whopping 60-bushels of peanuts to the acre. The output from that plot graded 73 percent.

On another 10 acres of old land, Underwood harvested a 30 bushel average. It graded 71 percent.

His production compares to the 11 to 16 bushels-per-acre average over a wide surrounding area. He reports his peanut hay was excellent and said that the nuts matured good.

Underwood, incidentally, raised the Argentine type, different from the Spanish peanut. The nut is bigger, so is the hull, but it has a tendency to cling to the vine better, the peanut raiser declared.

"This new year? Rain. If we get the moisture we need," Underwood commented, "we will really have a crop next fall."

## Local Guard Must Enlist New Recruits

Unless Ranger's National Guard unit, Battery C, 3rd Battalion, 132nd Artillery, reaches full strength within 60 days, it will be deactivated, Major Gen. Thomas S. Bishop of Austin, Adjutant General of Texas, told a meeting of Ranger citizens and civic leaders Tuesday night.

The public hearing was held at the National Guard Armory, U. S. Highway 80 west.

Spokesman for the Ranger citizens group was Mayor Morris Newham.

Maj. Gen. Bishop and an entourage of military aides, said at present the unit is composed of two officers and only 11 enlisted men.

Minimum requirement, he said, will be two officers and 17 enlisted men — six more than are now active in the local unit.

Presently one of the Guard officers is from Ranger, the other from Stephenville. Only two of the enlisted men are from Ranger, four are from Eastland, and the others are from further scattered points.

Unless local recruiting activity results in reaching required minimum strength, within the coming 60 days, Maj. Gen. Bishop said, the unit will be inactivated and the property — consisting of land, two buildings and chain link fencing — will be put up for sale to the highest bidder. Total inventory value of the property, it was reported, is \$122,000.

The adjutant general was accompanied to Ranger by half a dozen military aides, including two generals and three colonels.

In addition to Mayor Newham, the delegation of Ranger citizens attending the Tuesday night conference, included Major Calvin Brown, an officer of the State Guard, members of the executive board of Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce, representatives of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, members of the board of regents, administration and staff of Ranger Junior College.

The Ranger armory is now being used — on lease agreement — by the college.

## THROUGHOUT COUNTY Highway Department Has Authority To Buy Interstate 20 Right-of-Way

Over a million dollars worth of highway construction was completed in Eastland County last year, a two million dollar job is underway and prospects for a lot more are in the offing, according to Texas Highway Department reports.

The department now has authority to buy right of way for Interstate 20 across the entire breadth of the county, Resident Highway Engineer R. (Buddy) Haun said this week.

Authority of the section of Interstate 20 west of Cisco, now under construction, and the strip from Ranger east, was granted for the 1963-64 program.

## Highway Department Has Authority To Buy Interstate 20 Right-of-Way

The million dollars plus highway construction in the county last year included 11 miles of primary construction, 16 miles of Farm-to-Market Construction (in three projects), and miles of seal coating of existing highways.

The primary construction was for the improvement and re-design of State Highway 6 from Eastland to Carbon, for a cost of \$700,000.

The Farm-to-Market projects were the strip from Branton Gin F. M., the Cisco Lake Road, and the Morton Valley F. M. Total for these jobs was \$303,681.

Seal coating of approximately 26 miles accounted for over \$200,000.

Type III Sabin polio serum will be given at Strawn and Gordon Sunday, Jan. 19.

It will be the second and final opportunity for residents of those areas to receive the serum-on-the-sugar-cube.

At least 75 percent of the residents of the communities must receive the vaccine before the areas can be considered reasonably safe from a Type III polio epidemic.

At Strawn the serum will be given from 2 until 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the basement of Strawn Methodist Church.

Gordon residents may receive the vaccine at the Legion Hall in that community during the same hours.

## FIVE INJURED IN HEAD-ON COLLISION EAST RANGER

Five persons were injured, two of them seriously, in a head-on auto collision on U. S. Highway 80, 15 miles east of Ranger Wednesday afternoon about 4 p. m.

Involved in the accident on snow-covered pavement was a 1960 Dodge Dart, pulling a household trailer, driven by Joe Benton, 27, of Glenville, Ga., and a 1957 Chevrolet convertible with a service man, Frank A. Loboy of Birmingham, Ala., at the wheel.

According to officers, the Benton vehicle, headed east, was passing a stalled automobile on the crest of a hill when the east-bound convertible suddenly appeared. Both cars, traveling at slow speeds, were unable to stop on the slick pavement.

Loboy, a resident of Birmingham, Ala., serving with the U. S. Navy was enroute to the west coast. He received a cut lip and other minor injuries in the mishap.

Two of the occupants of Benton's car, however — his 6-weeks-old infant son, James, and his 85-year-old mother, Mrs. H. N. Benton were seriously injured. Benton and Jodie, a 4-year-old son, suffered more minor hurts.

The Benton family was rushed to Ranger General Hospital in a Killingsworth ambulance.

The infant received a concussion, skull fracture and broken arm. Mrs. Benton suffered a broken hip and lacerations. They have been transported to a hospital in Dallas.

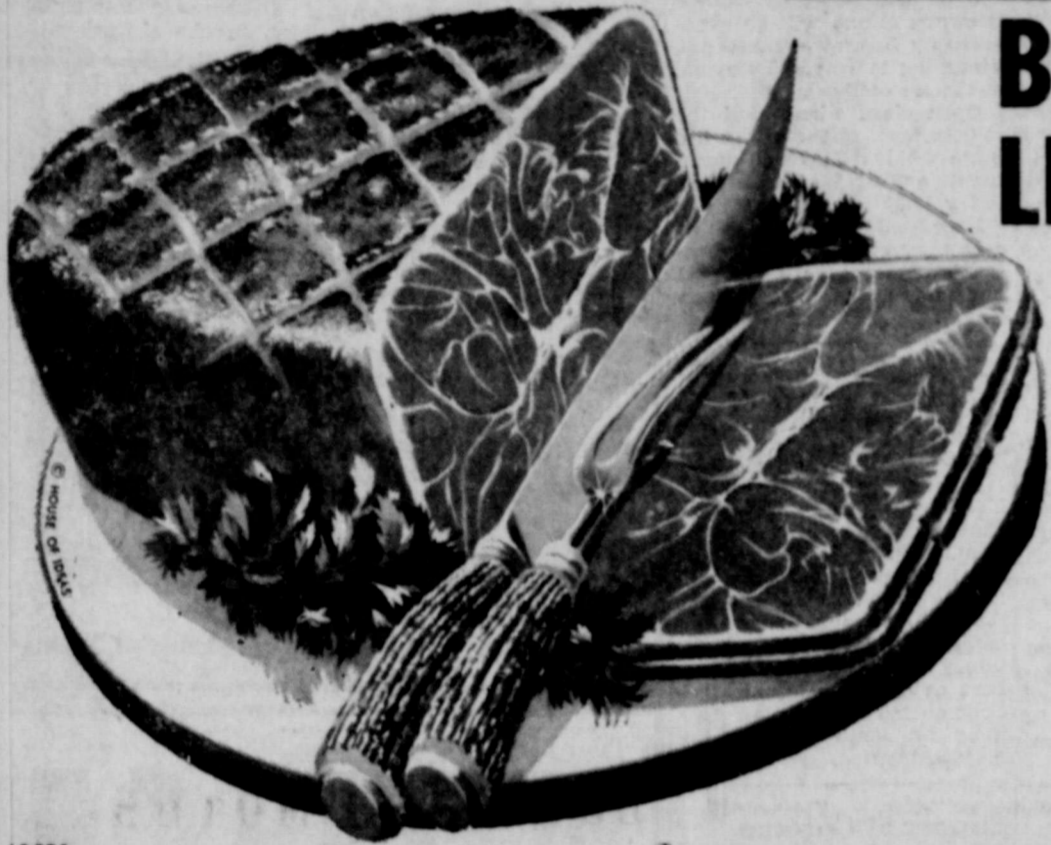

### Couch Assessed Suspended Sentence In Cisco Shooting

A 91st District Court jury Friday found Chester E. Couch, 40-year old Abilene man, guilty of assault with intent to commit murder in the Nov. 15 shooting of Police Chief S. E. Parkinson of Cisco and fixed his penalty as a three-year suspended penitentiary sentence.

The trial used two full days in Judge Turner M. Collier's Eastland court.

Couch was returned to the Eastland County jail following the verdict until he can make a \$10,000 peace bond, which was ordered in Cisco justice court in connection with alleged threats to his family, and a \$5,000 bond in Abilene where he was charged with murder in December.

Attorney A. L. Rhodes of Abilene, who represented Couch, said he expected to have the truck driver's bonds posted by Monday. Couch is expected to face a grand jury this month at Abilene.

Testimony ended in the case at 11:30 a. m. Friday with both Couch and his ex-wife testifying. Mrs. Helen Couch, who said they were divorced Aug. 15, 1963, said she lives with their two sons, 3 and 4, and her sister, Mrs. Madeline Taylor, in an apartment upstairs over the downtown Cisco pool hall where the Parkinson shooting occurred.

Mrs. Couch said that her husband had called her a good many times following the divorce "threatening" her. She added that he had never been refused permission to see the children "if he acted properly."

Couch told the jury that his ex-wife had threatened to "have me put in an institution."

He said he bought the .25 calibre pistol used in the shooting at an Abilene pawn shop. He testified that he was playing with his children when Mrs. Couch pulled a pistol from her purse and quickly put it back.

The man said he had taken the pistol from his pocket and that he was not intentionally pointing it at the child's head, as Police Chief Parkinson had testified. He said that somebody hit him on the head as Mr. Parkinson came into the pool hall and he remembered nothing else.

Couch threatened "to get" Chief Parkinson five days before the lawman was shot in the pool hall, Charles Moad, Cisco policeman, said during testimony Thursday, and Attorney Rhodes, during cross

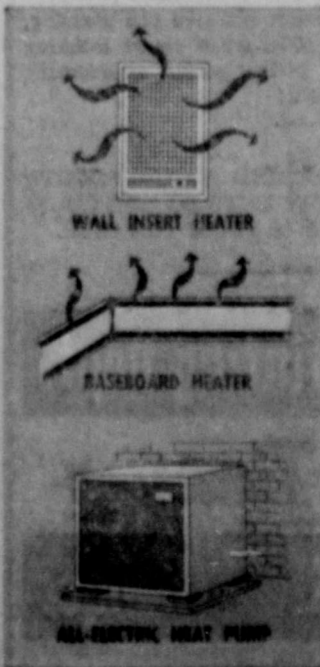
