Chief Warrant Officer J. O. Hendricks of the Cisco unit of the National Guard will be at the Armory, U. S. Highway 86 west, Ranger, every Wednesday afternoon to interview young men desiring to enlist in the Guard.

Unless more enlistments are secured for the Ranger unit within the next few weeks, it will be inactivated.

Outgoing mail from the Ranger postoffice no longer carries the hour on the stamped postmark.

The simpler postmark procedure went into effect Friday at midnight.

Only an "a.m." or a "p.m." designation along with the city in which the letter is mailed now is on the items, Postmaster Max Ohr said.

The Postmaster General's office in Washington, D. C., has authorized the change-over. It is designed to speed up postmarking operations, according to Ohr.

With the new procedure, it is only necessary to change hand stamping equipment and automatic cancelling machines twice daily — midnight and at noon. In the past, it was necessary to change the postmark more frequently.

"We feel like, maybe not so much here, but across the nation, many hours will be saved," said Ohr.

RJC Squeaks By Temple, 75-74 Tuesday

Coach Jim Lewis and his RJC Rangers are riding in second place in the North Zone of junior collegiate cage competition after squeaking by the Temple Jr. College Cougars, 75-74, at Temple Tuesday night.

The victory margin was just as thin as it could get. The tilt was a nip-and-tucker all the way. The Cougars were never able to move more than three points ahead of the Purple & Whites and the Rangers' lead — always temporary — never stretched beyond five points.

In the dying minutes of the scrap, the RJC crew was fouled twice as they lagged one point behind the Cougars. Three of four three throws were cashed to put the charges of Coach Lewis ahead by two. Then Ranger fouled Temple. The first free throw was a bulls-eye, but on the second Ranger took the rebound. And that was it — final 75-74.

Gary Watson of the Rangers garnered top scoring honors of the night, bucketing 23 points. Mate Richard Hooper racked up 18.

For the Cougar cagers it was Ronnie Hinze who set the scoring pace with 20 points, followed by Temple's Tommie Dudley with 18.

At the halftime intermission, the RJC quintet was out front, 38-25.

Perry T. Brown Announces For DA Position

Perry T. Brown, Rising Star attorney, has authorized this newspaper to announce that he will be a candidate for the office of County and District Attorney of Eastland County, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary on Saturday, May 2.

Mr. Brown, a native Texan, is a university graduate with the degrees of bachelor of science in education and master of arts. He has been a member of the Texas Bar Association for 28 years, and his 15 years experience in the practice of law have included five years as a county attorney.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Brown and his wife, Frances Ruth, have three children: Frances, a teacher in the public schools at Fabens; Cynthia, a student at Tarleton State College; and Mary Carolyn, a Rising Star High School sophomore.

Mr. Brown is the brother of the late Edward Brown, long time Cisco attorney.

During World War II, Mr. Brown served on convoy duty off the Atlantic coast, participated in the invasions of Sicily and Salerno, subsequently serving as assistant legal officer of ComSevTen Ten with headquarters at Ulithi in the Pacific Theater, and as commanding officer of a tanker.

Mr. Brown said he would issue a formal statement in connection with his candidacy in the near future.

Great Western Drilling Co., Midland, has announced drilling in Eastland County of a 4,990 foot rotary wildcat.

No. 2 Roane is located three miles north of Gorman.

Drill site is spotted 330 feet from north and 1,800 feet from east lines of Lot 1, Theresa Tyler Survey 51 and a 98-acre lease.

Great Western is operator of the water-flooding project at Lake Eastland.

C. D. Turner No. 1 Martha N. Thorp, Section 454, SPRR Survey, Wildcat Six Miles North of Cisco, Total Depth of 3,892 Feet, Was Reported as a Dry Hole.

He cited the other alternative facing young men in meeting their military obligation: When a youth is 18 he is required to register with his local draft board, and is then drafted usually between his 22nd and 23rd birthday. The draftee at present serves two years of active full-time duty, two years with the ready reserve and two years with the standby reserve.

Lieut. Col. Fisher further explained that when a youth joins a unit of the National Guard it is with the understanding that he will report for active duty training within 120 days. Exception to this rule is the under-graduate in high school who may defer active duty until after graduation.

National Guard Officer Speaks To 35 Students

Lieut. Colonel Fisher, National Guard officer of Wichita Falls, addressed a group of 35 area high school seniors and Ranger Junior College students in the Ranger High School auditorium Tuesday afternoon.

Lieut. Col. Fisher, introduced by Mayor Morris Newnham, urged enlistment in the Guard. He explained that if a young man is 17 years of age, wants to finish high school and then go to college—or if not to college but on to work—then the National Guard "is made to order" for him.

He outlined this procedure: "1—You can enlist now and at the same time complete your senior year of high school."

"2—You will be paid for attending two nights a month and on Sunday a month drill sessions."

"3—After graduation, you will go on active duty for just six months—at Fort Polk, La. and Fort Sill, Okla."

"4—Once back home, you will be completely free to pursue educational or employment plans."

"5—With National Guard drills and two weeks a year at summer training camp, you can meet your reserve obligations in your community."

"6—Headquarters of the Ranger unit, the local Armory, is a fine plant, fully equipped and valued at about one and a half million dollars."

Couch Freed From Bond By Abilene Judge

Chester Couch, 40, convicted in Eastland of assault with intent to murder without malice in the Nov. 15 shooting of Cisco Police Chief S. E. Parkinson, was released from Taylor County Jail Thursday.

Couch was ordered discharged from a \$10,000 peace bond set in Cisco after an application for a writ of habeas corpus.

"I'm found guilty in 91st District Court in Eastland during the January assault-to-murder trial, Couch was found guilty and given a three-year suspended sentence.

However, he had been unable to make the \$10,000 bond set against him in connection with his Cisco marital difficulties.

An Abilene grand jury failed to return an indictment against him Wednesday after he had been charged with murder in the Dec. 13 death of Louis Edward Kinney — Kinney died when his head struck a cold drink box during a fight with Couch at the American Legion Hall a few hours after he (Couch) was released on bond in the Cisco shooting.

Couch and his attorney, A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes of Abilene, testified at the Thursday release hearing that Couch was not brought before Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis of Cisco before the bond was set.

HASKELL NATIVE IS NAMED TPA'S 'TEXAN OF THE YEAR'

Charles Bates (Tex) Thornton, industrial tycoon from Haskell, has been named "Texan of the Year" by the Texas Press Association.

Presentation of the award signifying the honor was made at the Honor Banquet Saturday evening during the Association's 17th Annual Mid-Winter Convention at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin.

Introducing Thornton was his hometown publisher Jetty V. Clare of the Haskell Free Press. Presenting the award, a 14" x 17" copper engraved plaque, was TPA President William E. Berger, Hondo Avon Herald.

The 49-year old Thornton was described as an "intuitive genius" who has guided Litton Industries in 10 years to one of the fastest growing companies in the entire United States.

Thornton, with his soft Texas drawl, ready smile and easy manner, has developed Litton Industries from a tiny

microwave-tube company into a sprawling giant encompassing 71 plants in the USA and 12 other countries. Its 200 products range from cash registers to searching for oil beneath the North Sea.

The complex mind of Charles Bates Thornton is dedicated to a relentless pursuit of the future. No time for useless leisure Thornton will take a solitary horseback ride over 30 or 40 miles of mountains to, as he says, "look at the world beyond..." and clear my head of the traffic of everyday business.

Thornton's career began when he landed a clerk's job in the Department of the Interior. A single assignment, the job of writing a report on the financing of low-cost federal housing, unveiled his tremendous ability for basic sciences.

From the Department of the Interior to the military service, he became one of the youngest full colonels in the

Army Air Forces. He was on the Secretary of war's list for promotion to brigadier general at the end of World War II. The Distinguished Service Medal and the Legion of Merit are among the numerous decorations Thornton received during his military career.

Following his tenure with Uncle Sam, Thornton developed a system of "Statistical Control" that set up the famed Whiz Kids. At Ford Motor Company the group established modern management techniques that still are used at Ford today.

Thornton moved from Ford to Hughes Aircraft as vice president and assistant general manager.

In 1953, Thornton and two other young executives, purchased Litton Industries. And so began his illustrious career as the guiding hand of the powerful, fast-growing company of Litton Industries.

Last February Thornton presented the 1963 Merit Award by the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at Yeshiva University in New York City.

TPA's Texan of the Year award was presented for Thornton's "accomplishments in a great new technological era, and for the fame he has brought to the Lone Star State."

Award goes annually to a native-born Texan no longer a legal resident of the state.

Court Okays Utility Pacts On 206; Names Constable

Moving certain utilities on the right-of-way for Highway 206 (Coleman to one mile west of Cisco) will cost Eastland County approximately \$3,000, it was reported at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court at Eastland Monday.

The commissioners agreed to enter into agreement with the Humble Pipe Line Co. and the Comanche County Rural Electric Co-Op for the movement of certain facilities along the route.

The county will pay Humble about \$3,000 and the Co-Op some \$3,500. The state, in turn, will reimburse the county for half of the expense.

Jack Kirby of Brownwood, District Highway right-of-way engineer, met with the court Monday, and helped handle the arrangements. The utility work will be done under the supervision of the Texas Highway Department.

The court appointed J. D. Jordan of Cisco constable of that precinct, replacing J. J. (Jake) Honea, long-time Cisco constable. Mr. Honea announced on Dec. 31st that he would be a candidate for sheriff of this county, and according to the spokesman of the court, the state attorney general's office has ruled that any public official who announces political plans for another office before the first of the year, is automatically removed from office.

Permission was voted by the commissioners to pay the City of Carbon \$50 a month for rural fire protection. The county had been paying that city only \$25 a month. Carbon recently bought another newer and better fire truck.

The court formally said "No" to Melvin Coley, of Stephenville, court reporter in the recent Palo Pinto County Hussey murder trial, who had asked this county some \$400 in expenses. The court agreed to pay Mr. Coley's mileage and meal expenses.

County Women And Girls Learning Clothing Skills In HD and 4-H Clubs

"Over 75 percent of the homes in Eastland County have sewing machinings..."

This statement was taken from Your County Program, a study of Eastland County, developed by the Eastland County Program Building Committee.

Through Home Demonstration Club and 4-H Club program, approximately 309 Eastland County women and girls improved their skills in selecting and buying clothing and accessories and clothing construction and grooming.

Through Home Demonstration Club programs, the women learned how to "Select a Street Dress" and the "Care of the Feet and Selection of Shoes". They also studied "Grooming" and "Up-Dating a garment".

In September, the club members, and several other interested persons, attended a program on "Laundering Special Fabrics" where they learned the latest and best methods of laundering clothing.

Through the 4-H Clothing programs, the girls enrolled in the nine community 4-H Clubs and the two school 4-H

Clubs, learned how to sew, plan and buy their clothing and to take care of their clothes and be well groomed. Thirty-nine of these girls modeled their garments, made during the year, in the County 4-H Dress Revue in April. The garments modeled ranged from simple-to-make, gathered skirts to completely lined dresses and suit ensembles.

Clothing was just one of the many phases of homemaking studied by the Home Demonstration and 4-H Club members in the county during the past year.

Home Demonstration Clubs and 4-H Clubs are just one of the many groups or audiences with whom the County Home Demonstration Agent and the Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent worked with during the past year. The agents worked with all groups of interested persons — urban as well as rural.

Home Demonstration Club membership is open to any homemaker, urban and rural who is interested in learning and developing new and better skills in homemaking. During 1963 approximately 139 women actively participated in the activities of the eight Home Demonstration Clubs throughout the County.

Membership in 4-H Clubs is open to girls and boys between the ages of 9 and 21 who are interested in Home Economics and Agriculture and their related fields. Approximately 170 girls actively participated in the 4-H Club program during 1963 in Eastland County.

During 1964, the Home Demonstration and 4-H Club members will continue to study and improve their homemaking skills as a result of their club program.

IT'S BACK TO THE ENGINE ROOM FOR LESTER TROUT

"I've been in an engine room for about 40 years, and following retirement will take a short vacation and then go back to another engine room," says Lester Trout, operator in Lone Star Gas Company's Ranger Compressor Department, who retired January 31 after 20 years with the Company.

Browsing With Bev

Honey and maple sirup are two natural sweeteners that blend very well. The flavor of one enhances the other. Add a few nuts and you've got some of the best chewy candy there is.

Right now U. S. Department of Agriculture statisticians say honey supplies are at record levels. The pecan crop is more than four times that of last year, and there are large crops of walnuts, almonds and peanuts in the offing.

Only the maple sirup crop is off. You may have to pay a little more for maple sirup this year, but the quality is excellent.

Here's a home-type recipe that combines honey, maple sirup and peanuts in a delicious candy. Other nuts may be added or substituted for the peanuts. You can even add 1 cup coconut or 1 1/2 cups puffed wheat, if you like. Be sure though, you make the candy only during the colder months. It will absorb moisture if exposed to a damp atmosphere.

PEANUT CHEWS

1/2 cup honey
1/4 cup maple sirup
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup roasted peanuts

Pour honey and maple sirup into pan and cook until the temperature reaches 252 F. (the hard ball stage). Remove from heat, add soda and cream of tartar. Mix thoroughly.

Add nuts and mix until they are coated.

Pour into buttered pan. When cold, cut into squares.
