

JAYCEES READY TO LAUNCH COMMUNITY POLL BY MAIL; SURVEY TO DEVELOP DATA

Within the near future the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce will conduct a poll of opinion relating to all facets of the city's economic, educational, civic and recreational facilities.

Five hundred detailed questionnaires will be mailed to

specially selected names which will represent all strata of Ranger citizenship. The results will then be projected and will be accurate in making a sound evaluation of the opinions of the community as a whole.

Chairman of the project is Don Yarbrough, immediate past president of the Jaycees and cashier of Commercial State Bank.

He said the questionnaire forms will be mailed as soon as the master list of recipients has been compiled.

In the message heading the form, an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet imprinted on both sides, the survey leader says:

"The Ranger Jaycees are conducting a survey to determine what we might do to help our city. The community attitude is very important to us so that we will know how you feel about Ranger. We would appreciate your answering the questions below to show how you feel about our city. Of course, your name will not be used (you don't

Coach Jack Duval's classy Ranger High Bulldogs turned in their point-making power in the last half to rack up a 47-38 win over the Baird High Bears at Baird Tuesday night to win the 1964 District 10-A cage title.

At the end of the first quarter, the Bears—gunning for an upset—led the visiting Ranger quintet, 9-6. And at the end of the half the hard-fighting Bruins held the favored Bulldogs to a 21-21 tie.

The RHS crew waxed hot in the third period, however, to lead 37-28. Both quintets scored 10 points each in the final stanza of the hardwoods duel.

RJC Dean Attends Conference Junior Colleges At O. U.

Decatur '5' Outscores RJC, 59-27

The Ranger Junior College Bulldogs gave the classy Decatur Baptist College five — currently third-ranked junior college cage crew in the nation, a real run for their money on the hardwoods at Decatur Monday night.

And the peppery Purple & Whiteners, by their potent play, firmed up their strong bid for second place in the northern zone of Texas Junior College Athletic Conference.

The Baptists wound up the evening with a 59 to 27 victory, but they had to earn every point the hard way.

The Rangers drew first blood shortly after the starting tip-off when Gary Watson meshed a free throw to put the visiting RJCers ahead, 1-0. That was the only time the Purple & Whiteners ever got out front of the Decatur quintet, which has a record of 21 wins against no losses and is setting the pace in the six-member northern zone loop.

At the halftime, the Baptists were out front 33-20.

The Rangers rallied late in the game and at one point they cut the Decatur crew

ENTHUSIASM, OPTIMISM HIGH AT FIRST C-C MEET; MANY PROJECTS PLANNED

A spirit of enthusiasm and optimism keyed the first regular monthly meeting of officers, directors and committee heads of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce at the organization's offices Monday night.

W. E. Eaton, newly-installed 1964 president of the city's leading civic group, presided during the session which featured plans for an intensive membership campaign and a review of a number of constructive projects planned for the year.

W. L. (Bill) Marslander, co-chairman of the membership committee, outlined plans for a whirlwind, city-wide 4-hour member-getting push scheduled for next Wednesday morning, Feb. 19, following a kick-off breakfast at 7 a. m. at the Ranger Junior College cafeteria.

Featured speaker at the breakfast will be Ralph Duncan of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Abilene. Duncan, who is a specialist in community affairs and C-C membership, will re-emphasize the importance of a Chamber of Commerce to a community. He also will explain how local chamber organizations are most effectively supported.

Also during the breakfast, President Eaton will review the Ranger organization's accomplishments during the past two years and outline projects planned to be carried out in 1964.

The final segment of the breakfast program will feature instructions to workers by Co-Chairmen Marslander and Lee Cantrell of the membership committee.

Other members of the important group are Stanley Owen, Joe Voss, Gaston Dixon, Mrs. D. E. Pulley and Jess Weaver. Each committeeman will secure the volunteer services of five other members to work to complete

the canvass of business men by 12 noon.

It also was reported that Mayor Morris L. Newham will issue an official proclamation designating the week of Feb. 17 through 22 as "Ranger Chamber of Commerce Week."

Jay Bethany, publicity chairman, said that an intensive chamber-boosting public relations campaign will continue through the year vigorously supporting projects sponsored by the C-C organization. He said "The Ranger Times had pledged its full support to the effort." (Continued on Page Two)

Towns Are 3-1 to Keep Offices on 5-Day Week

Residents from four towns talked with the Eastland County Commissioner's Court Monday afternoon about keeping the courthouse open on Saturdays.

Representatives from three towns asked that it not be opened, with only those from Eastland requesting Saturday opening hours.

James Smith of Eastland, spoke first and told the group

"The courthouse has been open in the past on Saturdays and we request that it be kept open on Saturdays again because it would benefit people all over the county. It works a hardship on people in other parts of the county not to be able to conduct courthouse business on Saturdays. Many work from 8 a. m. until 5 p. m., and are unable to go to the Courthouse to handle their matters there," he said.

W. T. Eaton, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, expressed opposition to opening the courthouse on Saturday. "It's our courthouse, too," he said, "and we are opposed to Eastland's in-

"We hope in this way," the introduction continued, "to determine what we need the most. If you wish to make any additional comments, please feel free to do so, using additional sheets of paper if necessary."

"Your Jaycee organization wants to work for you," Yarbrough's statement concludes, "but we do need your cooperation."

At the end of the detailed questionnaire, Yarbrough added these words: "Please do not think we are being nosy about your personal business. We only need to know how you feel in order to help you. Please help us by completing this questionnaire immediately and returning it to us."

The form has a list of various facilities, services, etc., with spaces by each to be checked according to the opinion of the individual citizen — very good, adequate, inadequate or don't know. The list: Water supply, sewage disposal, water drainage, garbage collection, gas for heating, electricity, telephone, postal service, newspaper coverage, TV and radio, fire protection, police protection, court services, legal counsel, medical service, dental service, hospital service, health department, social problem agency, public transportation, street systems, cleanliness of streets. Recreational opportunities for children, teenagers, adults, older folks, swimming facilities, golfing facilities, playgrounds for children, outdoor sports area, parks and picnic areas.

DO YOU feel that the United States government should attempt to settle the Panamanian question by taking troops into the Panama Canal Zone?

That's a currently interesting question. Town Talk doesn't know the consensus of opinion of Ranger as a whole, but we were quite interested in the quotes of students and profs of Ranger Junior College.

Members of the RJC journalism class collected these opinions: Dale Wibbert, Del Rio: "No. Arbitration would better than a show of force because the Communist propagandists would use this to show the United States as a brutal nation ready to take advantage of smaller countries."

Ronald Austin, Fort Worth: "No. Taking in troops could cause an all-out war, if the demonstration were Communist inspired. It could also cause hard feelings between the United States and South American countries."

Larry Vowell, Fort Worth: "Yes if the United States lets all countries do what they want to, eventually they will destroy us." Ronnie Smith, Fort Worth: "No. Arbitrate, if it can be done."

Kenneth E. Alford, Chairman of Fine Arts Department: "No. Arbitrate over table, not over run. Small countries have rights regardless. If no troops go down to Panama, no one can bring in other troops." Sanya Sullivan, director of student personnel: "I feel that the U. S. should keep Panama out of Communist hands. I do not think it would be the proper solution to send troops at this stage as it would only incur the wrath of Panama's citizens and make the U. S. appear militaristic. Instead we should work with the people of Panama toward solving the problem and creating better relations."

Jack Allen, business manager: "Yes. Limited police action would probably be the best solution. This is a situation where the U. S. is between a rock and a hard spot. Panama will be mad if we don't send troops, and they will be mad if we do."

George Geldard, Kermit: "Yes, definitely. If they try to take the Canal, I'll go myself." Jerry Palazzolo, Fontana, California: "I feel that we should keep Panama out of the hands of Communists and Right Wingers. If it takes troops to do this, then I feel that we should."

Narry Record, Fort Worth: "If it comes to that, then I see no other solution. I just hate to see it wind up like Korea where we lost a lot of boys and nothing was accomplished."

Mike Butler, Fort Worth: "The U. S. should use force if necessary to honor our treaty." Terry Logan, Graham: "The U. S. must not back down, because it will give the Soviets something to work on and illustrate a definite weakness."

Boyd Brazel, Graham: "The U. S. must uphold the treaty because treaties are made between nations, not men."

John Sullivan, Irving: "The U. S. should exert force to uphold the treaty and keep the Canal." James Davis, Fort Worth: "We can't back down; so we must use force to insure our position in the Canal Zone."

(Continued from Page 1) ducing our customers to Eastland with the courthouse."

Precinct One Commissioner Tip Arther explained that the option of closing or keeping the offices open rested with the individual office holders. Mrs. Jeannette Harris of Eastland said that the courthouse belongs to everyone and that by keeping it closed, many of the county people are being denied the right to conduct their business. "Many people tell me that they would like for the courthouse to be open on Saturdays and that's the only reason we are here, to request that this service be made available for them," she said.

Roy Plummley, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, said that the courthouse is to serve the people, and that he is in favor of the people being served, but that he opposes using the courthouse for promotional purposes.

Mr. Arther told the crowded commissioner's courtroom audience that he had heard several complaints about the courthouse being closed.

Bruce Pipkin of Eastland asked about keeping a clerk in each office on Saturday morning, and Everett Plowman, also of Eastland, cited examples when certain deadlines (poll taxes and car tags) fell where the keeping of the offices closed on Saturday was a hardship. "Many times," he said, "if the courthouse were open on Saturday, more business could be attended to."

Check Smith of Gorman told the group that if the courthouse were open on Saturday, it would make a "hardship on us." "Let's let the kids off on Saturday," he said, "and we should air condition this courthouse."

"To open the courthouse on Saturday would be a step

backwards," Richard Moore of Cisco said. "The majority in the state close, and with the 40-hour work week, the female employees need the time off. In Cisco, our banks, the city offices and utility companies are closed on Saturdays and we find that it works quite satisfactorily. If you keep sending poll taxes and auto licenses to us, we can do quite well with the courthouse closed on Saturday."

Tom Stephenson, Cisco chamber manager, echoed Mr. Moore's remarks, and said that Saturday closings are the modern, progressive way to do business.

Mrs. Harris answered that many of the progressive places are now opening on Saturdays, including banks. County Clerk Johnson Smith, County Treasurer Ellen Justice and Tax Assessor-Collector J. C. Allison attended the meeting.

Smith said he had "no comment," and then explained that his office and others are always available in cases of emergencies. "We send more people to Wichita Falls late on Sunday nights than on Saturday mornings," he said. The meeting adjourned.

If you've finally convinced the man of the house it's time to go shopping for that new suit, help him choose carefully. Clothes may not make the man, but quality in a suit pays dividends in long-lasting good looks, comfort, and low cost of upkeep. Much that affects the quality is hidden, and there is no sure way to tell by appearance whether a suit is the best buy for the money. But here are some tips on selecting a suit.

FABRIC Check the fiber-

content label. Individual taste and way of life will influence choice of a fabric. Try to pick the best one for your man's needs. Flannel is serviceable; sharkskin is neat and sturdy, good for office wear. Gabardine wears well and holds creases but becomes shiny with wear and cleanings. Cheviot stands rough wear but does not hold creases and shape. Twist is extra hard wearing. Cord and seersucker are light and cool for summer wear. Tropical worsteds, designed for spring

and summer but gaining favor for year-round wear, resist wrinkles and give good service. Man-made fibers do best when combined with each other or with natural fibers, emphasizing the best features of each fiber.

WORKMANSHIP Look for a tag or pocket stuffer that gives facts about the lining. Good quality linings are closely and firmly woven, yet supple. Pocketing should be closely woven twill cotton, heavier in the trousers than in the coat. Squeeze the coat front in your hand; it should feel soft and springy and resume shape quickly when released. Pockets should be flat and neat and reinforced at the openings. Sleeves should not pucker at the shoulder seam and should hang so that the front fold comes to the middle of the coat pocket. In trousers, look for a waist interfacing of linen, which preserves fit of the waist. The crotch of good trousers is not panned. All seams should be stitched with silk thread for strength and elasticity and should be generous for letting out. In striped and patterned material, check the pattern matching at back coat seam, front coat overlap, and waist pocket. Although matching doesn't improve the serviceability of the suit, it usually means quality workmanship throughout.

Look for a label or tag that tells how to care for the suit and follow it carefully.



Burleson Makes Perfect Record For Attendance

Washington, D.C. — A review of the record of the First Session of the 88th Congress that adjourned in December, shows Congressman Omar Burleson, 17th District of Texas, to be one of only 15 members of the House with a perfect attendance record on recorded votes. He was one of an even smaller group who did not miss a quorum call during the Session.

There were 119 recorded votes during the Session and Burleson was present and is on record with a "yea" or "nay" on each. There were 137 quorum calls, and he was present in every instance. Of the 435 members of the House, the average voted on 84 per cent of the roll calls.

Couch Back In County Jail; Faces 'Threat To Kill' Count

Chester Couch, 40, convicted of assault to murder in this county last month, was back in the Eastland County jail today facing "threat to kill" charges in adjoining Palo Pinto County.

No stranger in the county jail, Couch was found guilty of assault to murder Cisco Police Chief S. E. Parkinson, and is currently under a three-year suspended sentence.

Couch reportedly telephoned his ex-wife in Cisco Sunday night, threatening her. He was in Strawn at the time and was arrested in Eastland later the same night and was being held on a drunkenness charge.

Mrs. Couch contacted W. L. Lewis, Cisco justice of the peace, and attempted to file

charges against her former husband. Charges were filed in Palo Pinto County since the alleged threat was made from that county.

Mrs. Couch and an Eastland attorney appeared in Palo Pinto Monday afternoon to complete the charges.

Revoking of the suspended sentence would result only from conviction of a felony, which the threat to kill charge is not, officials said.

The man was convicted in this county last month for the Nov. 15 wounding of Chief Parkinson in Cisco. After being released from the county jail on bond, he was involved in a fight in Abilene which resulted in the death of an Abilene man. Couch was "no-bill-

ed" by an Abilene grand jury after being charged with murdered in connection with the incident.

Eastland Police Patrolman Neal Seabourn arrested Couch late Sunday. He was reported "hidden" in a west-bound auto covered with bed clothing, accompanied by three men.

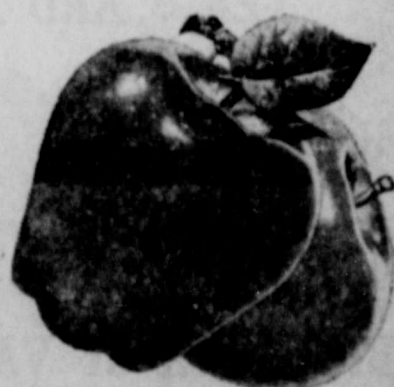
