Albert A. Talley, 43-year-old Strawn resident, was killed Thursday at 11:45 a. m. when he was accidentally run over by a company truck at the plant of the Featherlite Corporation in Ranger while in performance of his duties as a mechanic.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at First Methodist Church in Strawn with Rev. H. H. Barnett, pastor of the church, officiating.

Interment was in Mount Marion Cemetery, Edwards Funeral Home, Strawn was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Talley had been employed by the Ranger lightweight aggregate plant for 12 years.

He was born in Galveston on June 15, 1920 and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Leonard H. Talley.

He attended the Fort Worth Public Schools and on Sept. 26, 1939 he was united in marriage with the former Miss Sylvia Lane of Strawn.

Mr. Talley was an Army combat veteran of World War II and was a member of the American Legion and the Veteran of Foreign Wars. He also was a member of the Methodist Church.

He and his family had been making their home in Strawn since 1944.

An intensive campaign to strengthen the Ranger Chamber of Commerce will be launched next week according to W. T. Eaton, president of the business men's group.

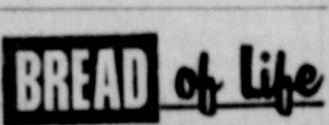

"There are not many doctors who will tell their patients to quit smoking although most of them will admit frankly and openly that such habits are damaging to any man or woman's health. Smoking in any form is fraught with many dangers and nobody knows this better than those who are addicted to the habit. However, it seems strange that few of those who smoke want to give up the habit regardless of what the doctors say.

"We have rarely ever heard anyone question the right or wrong of the smoking habit. Frankly, the only bad part of it is the damage it does to our good health. Many who gave up the habit will testify that they feel much better physically after they got away from the satisfying habit. And to make matters worse, children are taking up the habit during this modern age. It is not at all uncommon to see teenage youngsters completely addicted to the habit.

"We have no desire whatsoever to try to give anyone any medical advice about their personal habits. That's a responsibility that belongs to the doctors. We do know, however, from actual experience that smoking is not at all conducive to good health. We may be guilty of many infractions of one kind or another as far as our good health is concerned — but smoking is not one of them.

"And we might say further, if there are those who wish to be technical about smoking, we can testify that over a period of 40 years our tobacco bill totaled about \$5000. We could use that money today — and perhaps for some good cause."

Upper Leon Conservation District Make Coastal Bermuda Report

Elaborate plans are being made for acres and acres of Coastal Bermuda planting this spring. Several local farmers plan to purchase new springing machinery.

The Upper Leon District has two one row machines which will be planted, and the Palo Pinto District has a two row planter which will be running in the east part of the county. In addition, some six or eight commercial contractors will be planting. There is a good possibility three to four thousand acres will be planted. Some 1,200 to 1,300 acres is scheduled to be planted under the Great Plains Program.

In all probability a like amount will be planted under the A. C. P. Program.

Much land was plowed before the January snow in preparation for planting. At present, most land is too wet for seedbed preparation which is a most welcome change from the situation a year ago. A few more days of sunshine and many tractors will be running. Coastal is becoming a popu-

lar crop in this area largely through the general trend toward grassland farming. High production costs in row crop farming is forcing farmers to turn to livestock and grazing crops. Where it is adapted Coastal Bermuda has a very high potential of production provided the management and fertilization program is adequate.

It fits our livestock operations in that it reaches its peak of production in late spring when our native grassland is on the decline in palatability and production of green forage.

It fits our conservation programs in that it furnishes first class grazing during the very period our native grasses need a rest for seed production and recovery from grazing.

In addition Coastal Bermuda is an excellent soil builder. Under proper management it furnishes complete protection of the soil from the elements and so erosion becomes only past history on coastal land. The rebuilding of land with

Coastal was recently illustrated by a series of soil tests in the Desdemona area.

These tests indicate that Coastal will more than double the organic level in our local sands in a relatively short period. The soil tests were made by the Stephen F. Austin Soil Testing Laboratory in cooperation with Desdemona farmers and a local fertilizer dealer as fertility tests for fertilization recommendations. In the analysis of some half dozen fields all showed an organic matter level of 1-10 to 2-10 of 1 percent.

One Coastal planting made in 1960 showed an organic level of 4-10 of 1 percent. An eight year old planting showed an organic level of 1 and 1-10 percent (1.1 percent).

Also of interest was one field in which common bermuda was destroyed last year and the land returned to peanuts. This field showed an organic matter level of 3-10 of 1 percent. Organic matter level is our best indication of the fertility and health of our soil.

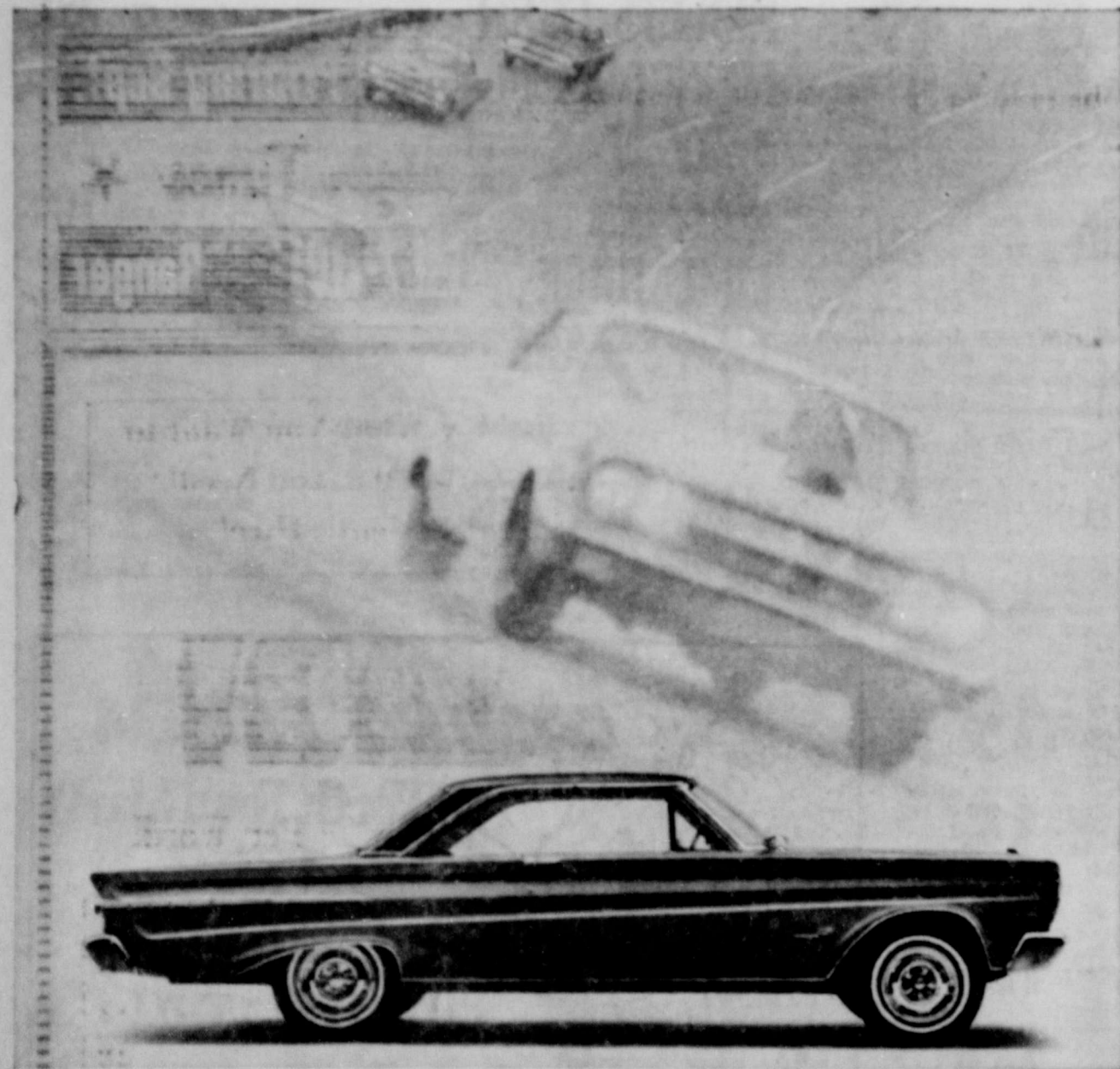

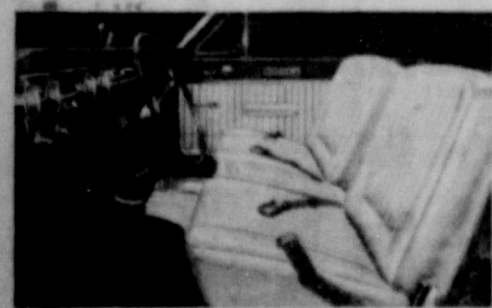

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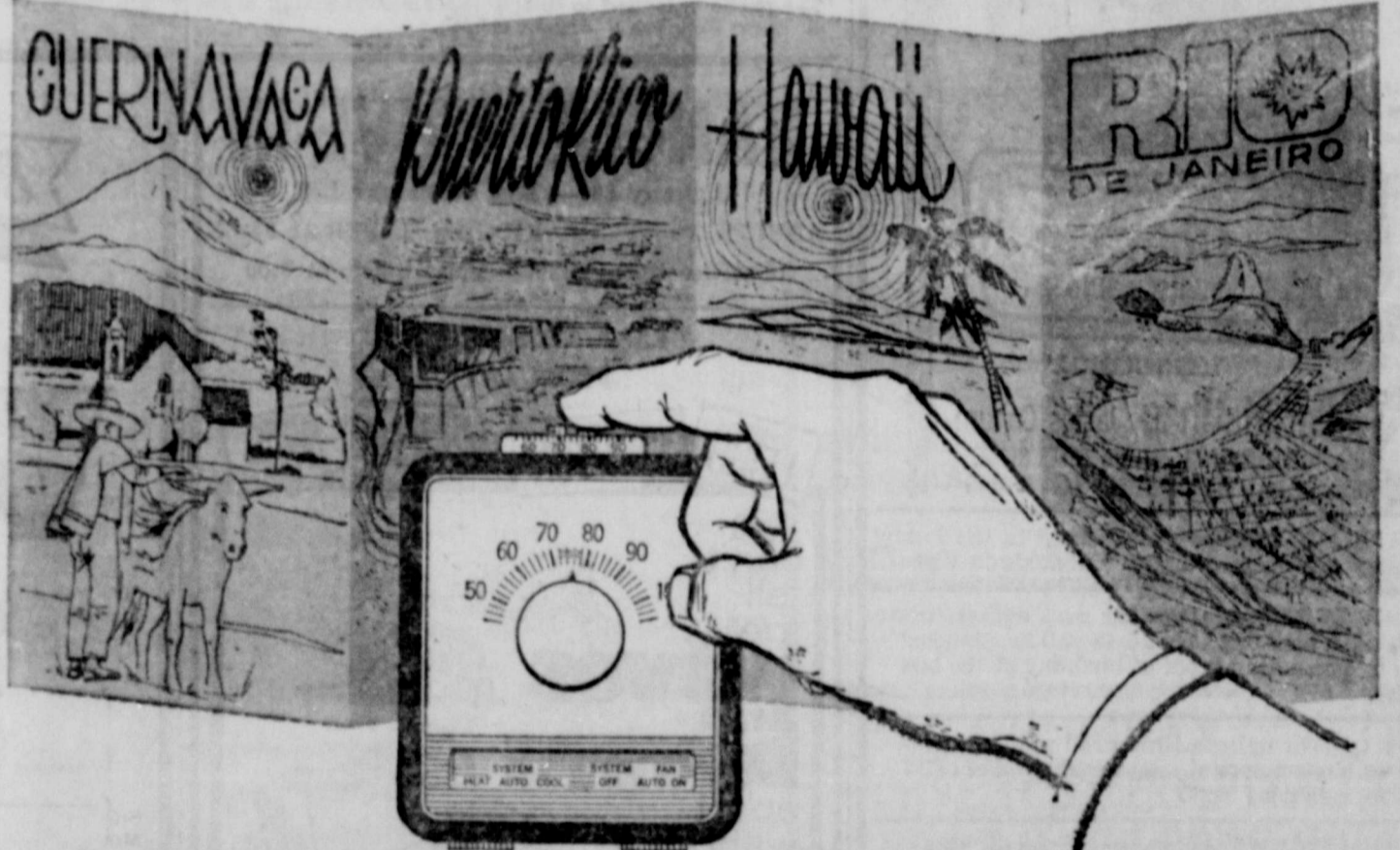
