THE 102-FOOT long laminated wood arches of the Ranger Jr. College gymnasium, now under construction on the campus on Highway 80 west, Ranger, are the largest ever manufactured by the Arkansas firm which contracted production.

Because of their abnormal length, oversize truck beds had to be constructed to transport them from Magnolia to Ranger and a special route had to be chosen over which they could be hauled. The arches were accompanied by special police escort because of the traffic problem they created.

The two appointments were made at the regular meeting of the board held Thursday, Feb. 13, on the RJC campus. Chairman Henderson said. Vacancies existed on the board of regents following the resignation of James Townzen, transferred to Bowie by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., and the death of Dr. W. L. Downtain.

Announcement of the appointments was delayed, Henderson stated, pending acceptance by Brooks, district superintendent for Texas Pacific Oil Co. with offices in Ranger, and Dr. Foster, local veterinarian. The Brooks family has lived in Ranger for about 20 years and their daughter, Brenda, is a graduate of RJC, later receiving a degree from Hardin-Simmons University. The family are members of First Baptist Church.

Dr. Foster is a 1960 graduate of Texas A&M University, College of Veterinary Medicine. He is a director of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and vice-president of Ranger Rotary Club. He, his wife and two children attend the Methodist Church. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. I. L. Foster of Kingsland, in Llano County.

Educator H. R. Garrett Buried In Funeral Rites In Eastland

Funeral Services for County School Superintendent H. R. (Pop) Garrett, 67, were held at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday in the First Methodist Church in Eastland. The Rev. Ray Cameron, pastor of the First Christian Church of Eastland, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Alvin Martin, pastor of the Cisco First Christian Church.

Mr. Garrett died at 3:30 p. m. Sunday in Eastland Memorial Hospital. He was hospitalized Nov. 25th following a heart attack but had returned home. He suffered a second attack Saturday night and returned to the hospital.

County superintendent for the past 10 years, Mr. Garrett, known affectionally all over this county and area, as "Pop," was a veteran educator.

Burial was in Cisco Cemetery under the direction of Hamner Funeral Home.

Born March 4, 1896, in Milligan, Tenn., Mr. Garrett attended Texas Christian University and was a graduate of Lincoln Memorial University and earned his MA degree at Howard Payne College. He did graduate work at the University of Michigan and at Hardin-Simmons University.

In 1942-43 he taught at Riverside Military Academy at Gainesville, Ga. He moved to Cisco in 1927 and was coach of the girls basketball team at old Randolph College (now Cisco Junior College) that won the National AAU championship that year. He was a TCU letterman in football, basketball and tennis.

Ranger Guard Will Intensify Recruit Drive

The Ranger National Guardsmen will intensify recruiting efforts during the coming weeks using as a springboard the Feb. 22 observance of George Washington's birthday, according to First Lt. Jimmy Pittman, unit commander.

The observance — actually to be held next Monday, Feb. 24 — is a date symbolic of the establishment of the home militia.

Lt. Pittman outlined plans for a six-week long program to acquaint young men with the National Guard and more specifically the role the Ranger unit plays in the nation's defense. The goal will be a sufficient number of enlistments to bring the Ranger unit to its authorized strength.

The Ranger Guard unit is a part of the 49th Armored Division's 3rd Battalion of the famous 132d Artillery. Its history traces to the Civil War times with services in every Cold War call-up of the 49th Armored Division in 1961.

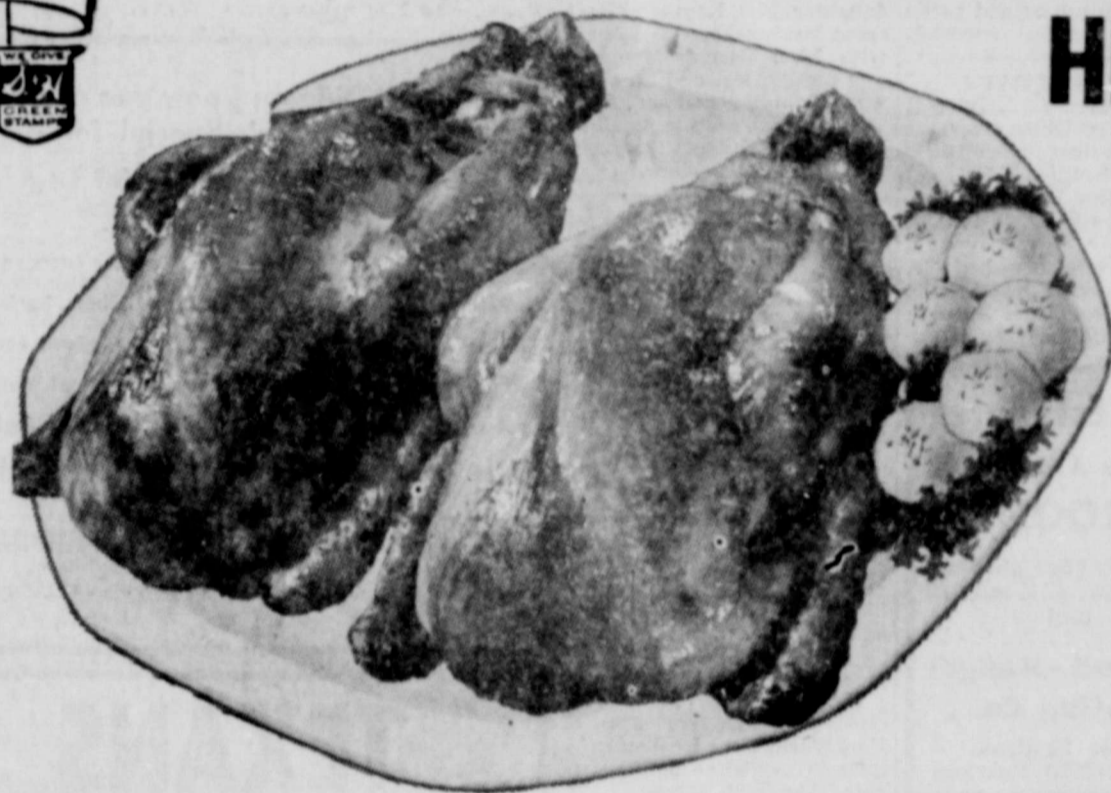

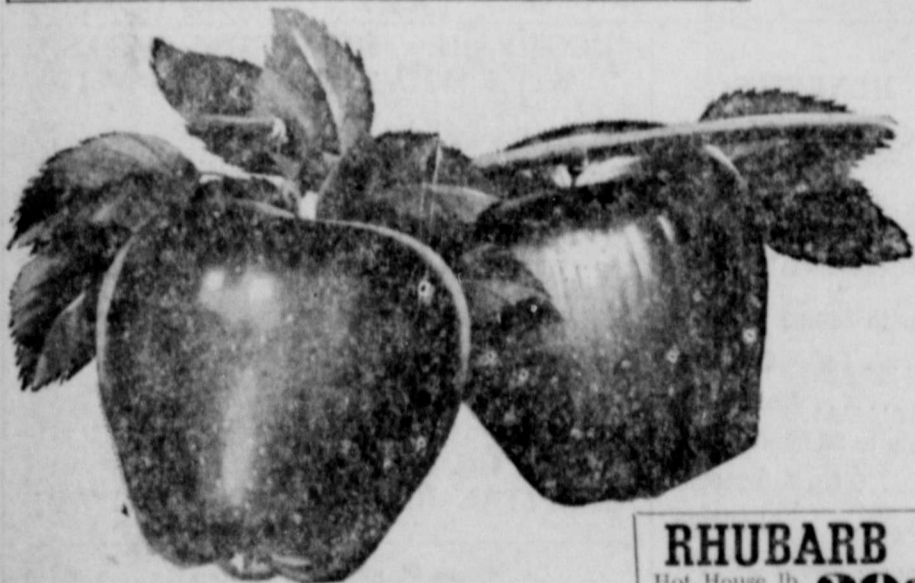
