



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

Someone might say, "I believe what I believe and nothing will change me!" No one should take this attitude if he is seeking the truth of God's Word. For by saying this we are admitting that there is nothing else we can learn and we are prejudiced even to the truth of God's Word. We ought always to be ready to put that which we believe to the test. If it is truth it will shine forth; if it is error it will fall to truth.

What About Romans 1:29 and II Corinthians 12:20? In hose two passages the King James version speaks of debating in a bad sense. The original word in these passages does not mean what our word "debate" means. It means rather "strife" and the identical word is so translated in Rom. 13:3; I Cor. 3:3; Phil. 1:15 and I Tim. 6:4. A public debate is not necessarily strife even though it can become such; but then so can any kind of a discussion if the disputants or the people involved do not behave themselves as gentlemen.

The kind of a discussion that this will be is authorized by what Jude says Jude v. 3. "Beloved, while I was giving all diligence to write unto you of our common salvation, was constrained to write unto you exhorting you to contend sarnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints." (ASV). The word "contend" literally means VERBAL DEFENSE.

WHAT WE HOPE TO ACCOMPLISH BY A DEBATE:

First of all we believe that when truth is laid alongside error people can see the difference. We also hope to generate some desire on the part of the people in this city. STUDY God's Word.

We commend the people of the United Pentecosts Church because they are willing to defend that which the believe. We wish that others would do the same for even some members of the Lord's church seem to be afraid to defend that which they say God's Word authorizes.
