RANGER JAYCEES TO MAIL SURVEY QUESTIONNAIRES FOR DATA OVER WEEKEND

Five hundred questionnaires will be mailed to a list of specially selected names over the weekend by Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The poll of opinion is being conducted to evaluate all phases of Ranger's economic, educational, civic and recreational facilities.

The results will be made public after the questionnaires have been returned, according to Don Yarbrough, first vice president of Ranger Jaycees and chairman of the project.

In the message heading the form, an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet imprinted on both sides, the survey leader says:

"The Ranger Jaycees are conducting a survey to determine what we might do to help our city. The community attitude is very important to us so that we will know how you feel about Ranger. We would appreciate your answering the questions below to show how you feel about our city. Of course, your name will not be used (you don't even have to sign the paper), but the results of this survey will be made available to the public.

"We hope in this way," the introduction continued, "to determine what we need the most. If you wish to make any additional comments, please feel free to do so, using additional sheets of paper if necessary."

"Your Jaycee organization wants to work for you," Yarbrough's statement concludes, "but we do need your cooperation."

At the end of the detailed questionnaire, Yarbrough added these words: "Please do not think we are being nosy about your personal business. We only need to know how you feel in order to help you. Please help us by completing this questionnaire immediately and returning it to us."

The form has a list of various facilities, services, etc., with spaces by each to be checked according to the opinion of the individual citizen — very good, adequate, inadequate or don't know.

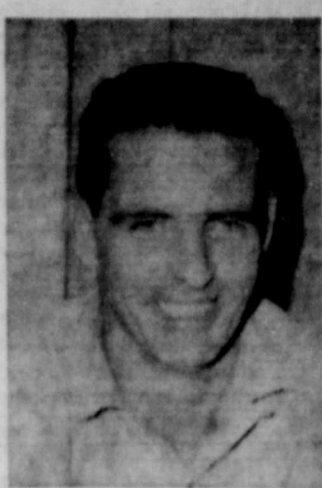

**DURING PUBLIC SCHOOL** week, these "significant facts about Texas Public Schools" were released by Texas State Teachers Assn.: Over half of the 1962-63 enrollment was contained in less than 3 percent of the school districts.

The number of emergency permits issued annually in Texas has increased from 1,121 in 1955-56 to 7,595 in 1962-63.

Texas today has 1,421 school districts; in 1948-49, it had 4,474 districts.

Thirty-four Texas counties operate county-wide school districts.

Of the present 1,421 school districts, 1,036 offer a 12-grade program.

Because of TSTA's concern for qualified teachers in the future, Texas now has 423 chapters involving over 20,700 future teachers in student professional organizations.

Texas NOW needs 7,600 teachers as replacements for those now employed who do not meet the minimum requirements for certification.

The demand for teachers for the next five years will approximate 46,000, an average of 9,200 per year.

Teachers leave the profession at the rate of approximately 6,800 per year.

Research has shown that the rising of certification standards in the state results in a more plentiful supply of teachers.

in Texas," Tatum declared. Scientists have not yet succeeded in controlling the nuclear fusion reaction. Tatum pointed out, although the nuclear fission reaction — the splitting of the atom — has been controlled and a number of atomic fission power plants have been built. However, the cost of generating electricity from atomic fission is not competitive in this area with such conventional fuels as natural gas, the principal fuel for electric power generation in Texas, Tatum stated.

"The electric utility companies of Texas plan to be ready for the use of atomic energy whenever that becomes a better and less expensive way to serve our customers," he declared.

At General Atomic, some of the nation's leading scientists are attempting to reproduce on earth the process responsible for the energy generation of the H-bomb, the sun and the stars. The Texas program will complement this effort.

The research is centered on finding a way to hold ultra-hot ionized deuterium gas (plasma) in a stable confinement long enough for it to be brought to an "ignition" temperature of about 400 million degrees centigrade in order for a self-sustaining nuclear fusion chain reaction to be achieved.

At General Atomic, scientists have been experimenting with "magnetic bottles," containers whose walls are formed by magnetic lines of force, since any container made of a solid material would be vaporized instantly at temperatures of millions of degrees. The problem is not only to produce temperatures many times hotter than the surface of the sun but to be able to contain the plasma long enough for a fusion reaction to set in.

If the energy-producing process of the H-bomb can be controlled, mankind will be provided with a virtually inexhaustible supply of power for thousands of years. This is because deuterium (heavy hydrogen), which is found in almost unlimited quantities in oceans, rivers and lakes, can be used as a fuel for generating electricity through nuclear fusion. The deuterium in one gallon of seawater from the Gulf of Mexico, for example, contains the equivalent energy of 350 gallons of high-octane gasoline.

In the fusion reaction, energy is produced by bringing together the atoms of light elements at tremendous collision velocities and fusing (or locking together) their nuclei. This is in contrast to nuclear fission, in which the nuclei of heavy atoms such as uranium are split and energy is released.

The research projects at the University of Texas will be under the direction of Dr. W. C. Dueterhoeft, Jr., professor of electrical engineering

purpose of evaluating the committee studies and reports. The entire faculty will hear one report each day and will act as a critical board on each report. These daily conferences will last through April 22.

Beginning April 27 through April 30, 4 to 6 p. m., the Steering Committee will meet with each of the committees for final readings of reports.

May 4 has been set as the date when the final report and study will be submitted to the report editors.

Beginning March 2 and continuing through May 4, the Steering Committee will meet weekly to discuss progress of the study and reports.

Dr. Nicksick emphasized the hard work involved and the overall importance of the project.

and Dr. Hans Schluter, associate professor of physics. Dr. Dueterhoeft's research will center around an investigation of injection of plasma into or across magnetic fields. An objective of the investigation will be detailed study of plasma impacted against a perpendicular magnetic field. Plasma "guns" will be utilized to fire super-hot gases into a "magnetic bottle".

The research under Dr. Schluter will concentrate on the heating of plasma by means of electromagnetic fields and how to prevent plasma leakage from "magnetic bottles".

The research at Texas A&M will be under the direction of Dr. Melvin Eisner, professor of physics. The project will concentrate on the investigation of means of analyzing plasma using a giant laser — a very intense and coherent beam of light. A plasma facility will be constructed for this program at Texas A&M.

An initial expenditure of \$85,000 — \$65,000 to the University of Texas and \$20,000 to Texas A&M — has already been made by the Foundation for starting up the program and purchasing equipment, Tatum announced. An additional \$80,000 — \$60,000 to the University of Texas and \$20,000 to Texas A&M — will be expended this year. Another \$80,000 will be expended during 1965 and 1966.

Attending the luncheon at which the research programs were announced were the chief executives of a number of Texas electric utility companies who serve as directors of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation; Dr. Frederick de Hoffmann, president of the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Cor-

poration; Dr. E. C. Creutz, vice president-research and development at General Atomic; and representatives of the University of Texas and Texas A&M, including Dr. H. H. Ransome, chancellor of the University of Texas and Dr. M. T. Harrington, chancellor of Texas A&M.

Others present included G. L. MacGregor of Dallas, president of Texas Utilities Company, and J. S. Osborne of Chicago, president of Central and Southwest Corporation.
