



# **Eve Protection** In Class Rooms Is Being Urged

HOUSTON-What may be the first step toward a Texas law to require safety eye protection in school laboratories was taken Friday at a meet-ing in Houston of the execue corenittee of the Texas Society for the Prevention of

The group unanimously pased a resolution that the State Legislature should enact a law 'require eye protection for teachers and students in all public s c h o o l classes in inrendes and chemical-physical laboratories."

The Society has asked State Senator Criss Cole, general chairman of the Texas SPB, to introduce such a bill when the legislature convenes in January next year.

Roman Boerger, Dallas, president of the Texas SPB aid that mishaps in school labs and shops ruin many ung eyes every year.

"Just as with a worker in an dustrial laboratory," Boerger said, "the differ-ence between blindness and sight for a youth can simply mean the wearing of safety goggles or glasses made with safety lenses in the school lab or workshop."

The proposed bill would be patterned after one recently eassed by the state of Ohio Sen. Cole said.






