Sheep & Goat Field Day Is Big Success

Increasing importance of the sheep and goat industry to the agricultural economy of this area was emphasized during the program of the third annual Eastland County Sheep & Goat Field Day held here Tuesday.

The event, sponsored jointly by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and J. M. Cooper, county agricultural agent of the Texas Extension Service, was held at the old Tiffin Gas Plant near Ranger.

Dr. John W. Foster, Ranger veterinarian and chairman of the agriculture committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, presided during the day's program which was recessed for an hour at 12:30 noon for a ranch style lunch.

The morning program was opened with a brief message of welcome by W. T. Eaton, president of the Ranger chamber.

Demonstration on the selection of breeding animals for greater profit was conducted by Jim Gray, animal husbandman, Agricultural Extension Service, San Angelo.

Then came what probably was one of the most interesting portions of the day's program. John G. McHaney, agricultural economist of the Texas Extension Service, A&M University, College Station, discussed in detail and with latest statistical data the price outlook for wool, mohair and mutton. McHaney emphasized the importance of goat

Ranger Negro Is Indicted in Slaying

James Will Battle, 49-year-old owner of the Little Jim Hotel in Ranger, was indicted on a charge of murder by an Eastland County grand jury which concluded its delibera-

tions at Eastland late Monday afternoon. Prior to the action of the grand jury, he had been freed under \$2,500 bond after having been charged with murder by

Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood in the shooting death of Don Gonzales, 45, in Ranger on July 4.

Battle's arraignment before Judge Turner Collier in 91 District Court has been set for Monday morning, July 27, at 10 o'clock.

At that time Judge Collier will take the defendants' plea and discuss arrangements for legal counsel and set the date of the coming trial.

Prosecutor will be Earl Conner, veteran Eastland County district attorney. The Battle case could be Conner's final murder trial of his career. DA since his term of service ends Dec. 31. Conner was defeated for re-election by Per Brown of Rising Star.

Self-defense or murder will malice apparently was the issue before the grand jury who heard testimony from a large number of witnesses. Had the body been convincingly identified, it was possible would have been no-billed.

The grand jury recessed Monday at 5 p.m. after handing down the murder indictment and three indictments, embezzlement against another Eastland County man.

Battle was taken into custody by Ranger city police officers a few minutes after the slaying took place on Saturday, July 4, at 2:30 p.m. J. Hally, Justice of Peace U. (Continued on Page 2)

Each of the nine home demonstration clubs met twice during June, with the agent presenting one program and members or special speakers giving the second program.

Mrs. Genoa Brown of Eastland, a member of the Flatwood Home Demonstration Club gave a program to her club on Driving Safety. Mrs. Webb presented a program, using her slides from her trip to Europe, to the Lake Cisco Home Demonstration Club in Cisco.

The North Star Home Demonstration Club, in Rising Star, sponsored a heart program for the interested people in Rising Star. Mr. Eddie Burroughs, Area Consultant, Texas Heart Association, from Abilene, presented the program. The club also sent a donation to the Travis State School in Austin, to be used toward the purchase of swings for the school.

The Olden Home Demonstration Club worked toward improving the Community Center during the month, by

securing a piano for the community building.

Scott Bailey, county judge, talked to the Pleasant Hill Club on "Making A Will." During the month the club sent five boxes of clothing to the Abilene State School.

The county judge gave a program to the Ward Home Demonstration Club, located in Cisco, on "County Government." Mrs. Cora Plumlee, a member of the club, just returned from the World's Fair in New York and will give a program to her club on her trip.

Mrs. H. C. Pounds, a member of the Morton Valley Home Demonstration Club gave her club a program on "All About Texas." During the month, the club sent old sheets to the Green Acres Nursing Home in Eastland. This club works with the nursing home and visits and sends gifts to the patients as a club project.

Eight of the Home Demonstration Clubs sponsor an adopted boy in the Travis State School in Austin and each month they send their boy an allowance and remember him on his birthday and on special holidays.

The Morton Valley, Olden, Flatwood and Gorman clubs made plans to sponsor the "Medical Self Help Training Program" for their club members and other interested per-

sons. This program is being planned for September.

Mark is a fourth-grade student at Koller Elementary School and when he's not pitching, you can find him at first base.

Mark's .667 batting average includes 26 hits in 39 official

times to the plate. His home run count stands at six, while five triples and seven doubles add to the slugging chart.

While the mighty mite of the Bees does an outstanding job of striking other people out, he seldom goes down on strikes himself. In fact he has only taken the three-strike count four times.

Besides four strike-outs, Mark has walked only once in 10 games, which must be some sort of Little League record. A total of 16 runs have been scored by the Bees since this season.

Little League baseball is for the youth of the nation, and nine-year-old Mark Pearsall is a true "little man" in the popular summer sport.
