# Swiftettes set new state record

Like a well-oiled machine, Nazareth's precision teamwork manufactured a fourth straight Class B girls' state basketball title Saturday in Austin.

The University of Texas Super Drum housed 3,500 fans for the finale Saturday morning, which pitted "the team," Nazareth, against "individual talent" Weatherford Brock. The result—Nazareth, 56-50.

Both Nazareth and Brock breezed through semifinal games last Thursday morning. Nazareth, led by all-state tourney selections Doretta Ramaekers (with 12 points) and Sharon Gerber (with 11 points), destroyed Port Aransas 53-28 in an 8:30 a.m. contest. Brock eliminated Avinger 51-36 in the next game.

Those wins set up a rematch of last year's championship game, which the Swiftettes had won 46-43. Nazareth clinched that 1979 win when Colleen Gerber sank two clutch free throws in the last minute of the game.

The rematch was similar to last year's finale, with Brock returning all five starters from the 1979 squad, and Nazareth displaying the poise and determination which has earned the Swiftettes their previous three titles.

This time it was Ramaekers who turned back the Brock threat when she sank two foul shots with 42 seconds left in the game to give Nazareth a 54-50 edge. Sophomore Danelle Schmucker made the score final [56-50] with 11 seconds remaining by sinking both ends of a one-and-one situation.

Nazareth utilized its bothersome full-court press and the hot-handed shooting of Ramaekers, Roxane Bir-

kenfeld (an all-tourney selection) and Michele Acker to jump to a 17-8 first-quarter lead.

Ramaekers (who finished with 16 points) ripped the nets with three 15-footers in the second stanza, and the Swiftettes led 30-22 at halftime.

"We knew we had to control the tempo of the game," said second-year Nazareth Coach Joe Lombard. "And we knew we had to keep them from penetrating."

Nazareth did both effectively, as the Swiftettes' 1-2-2 zone defense forced the normally run-and-gun Brock crew to take mostly outside shots.

Nazareth slipped into a more conservative style in the second half, dropping the press and working on offense to get the inside shot.

Birkenfeld (who finished with 12) and 5-8 post Gerber (who had 15 points) kept the Swiftette offense on the move in the third quarter, hitting 13 of Nazareth's 15 points, enabling the Swiftettes to hold a 45-36 lead going into the final stanza.

Brock, led by Kay Hull—who finished with 16 points—unleashed a full-court press near the end of the game which forced two Nazareth turnovers. Brock's Patti Phillips drove in for a layup after the second turnover to narrow the gap to 52-50 with 57 seconds left. Then Ramaekers and Schmucker made their appearances at the foul line to make it final.

The win makes Nazareth the first school in Texas to win four consecutive girls' state titles.

The Swiftettes finished the season 38-2, the best record ever for a Nazareth team.

## Now it's the Swifts' turn

Hoping for a rare "double" for their school, Nazareth's Swifts go into the Class B State Boys' Basketball Tournament in Austin this morning (Thursday).

The Swifts (27-6) will meet West Lamar High School of Petty (32-3) at 10 a.m. today. The live broadcast of the game will be carried by KDHN Radio here.

Other teams in the Class B tourney will be perennial powerhouse Snook (42-1) and the state's top-ranked team, Goree (33-4), who will open the tournament at 8:30 a.m. today in the "Super Drum" on the UT-Austin campus.

Representing North Texas in other classes are Memphis in A, Abernathy in AA and Snyder in AAA.

The Class B state championship game is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

They may not be superstitious, but Coach Bud Birks and his Swifts are using the same school bus and travel schedule that the Swiftettes used last week en route to their fourth consecutive state championship.

The team left Tuesday morning and spent the night at Brownwood, where they held a workout. They're staying at the Villa Capri Motel on the interregional highway east of the UT campus, and were scheduled to have a 30-minute workout in the Super Drum at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Although Nazareth's girls have set a new state record for consecutive titles, this is the first NHS boys' team ever to advance to the state tourney.

The Swifts are among Texas Class B's top four survivors by virtue of three whisker-close victories in the regional tourney at Levelland last weekend. En route to the regional title they knocked off the state's No. 4-ranked team (Spade) in bi-district, and the No. 2-ranked quintet (Greenwood) in the first round of regional.

Spade reportedly defeated Goree (No. 1) by a basket in a pre-playoff practice game.

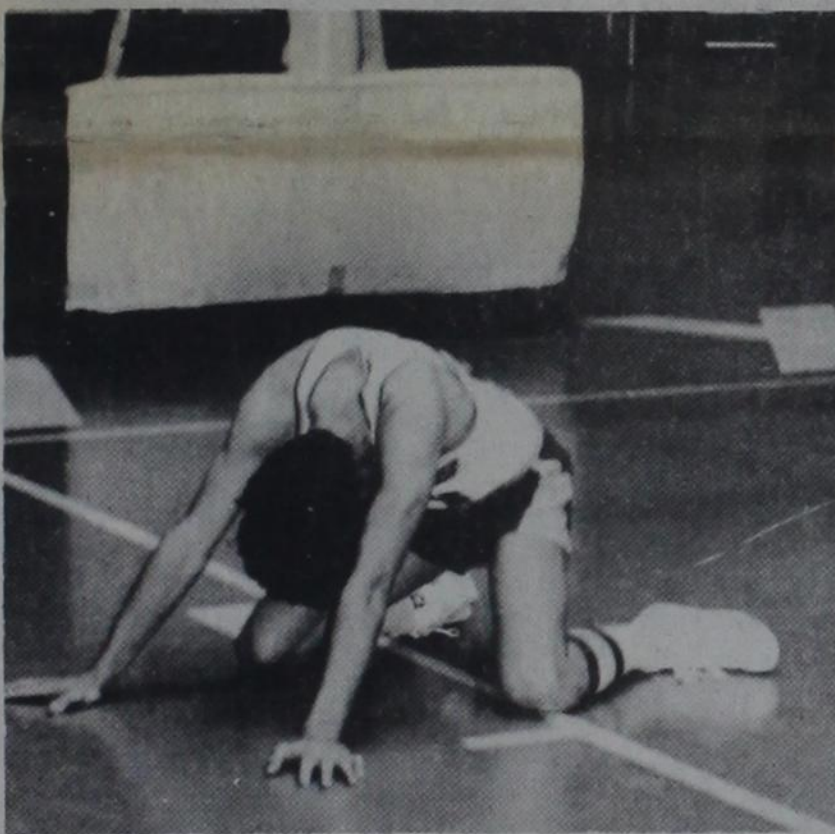

## Candidates added for April 5 races

With a 5 p.m. Wednesday deadline for filing in both city and school elections of April 5, some last-minute filing was reported by mid-morning Wednesday.

Two new names, Don Reeve and Stanley Nelson, were added this week to the list of candidates for the Dimmitt Independent School District board of trustees. Danny Bruton and James Alexander filed earlier, and return to the board is sought by Deanne Clark and Fred Bruegel Jr., whose terms are expiring.

Donald Wright is closing a term of service on the board, and has announced that he is not a candidate for another term.

For the Dimmitt City Board of Aldermen, Roy Lilley has filed for re-election. Robert Daniel, Joe Josselet, Larry Gonzales, Arthur D. Kasher and Fred Annen are also candidates. Terms of J. R. Brown, Chet Brafladt and Lilley will end this year.

In Nazareth, Carroll Gerber has filed for re-election to the office of commissioner. The term of Mayor John Slavik is also expiring.

No one has filed yet in the

Hart City election with the term of Commissioner Bob Bowden expiring.

Cecil Ray Jones is seeking re-election in the Hart ISD election. Jerry Kittrell and Weldon Davis have also filed for the board.

Hubert Backus, president of the Nazareth school board, is a candidate for re-election and Charley Hill and Carl Dean Kleman have also filed in the Nazareth ISD race.

Absentee voting will be held from March 17 to April 1 with the elections being held April 5.

## City hears rate request; sets hearing on RS funds

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen Monday night suspended action for 120 days on a request for a 14.78% rate increase requested by South-

western Public Service Co. Clarence Denton, district manager, and Ralph Glover, manager of the Dimmitt office, said the rate increase was necessary because of inflation, the high cost of borrowing money and the cost of building coal-fired plants as decreed by the federal govern-

ment. fire zone ordinance and agreed to ask the city engineer, McMorris & Associates, to study the current ordinance and make recommendations.

—Voted support of the grassroots campaign to save Buffalo Lake and decided to have petitions available in the city hall for citizens to sign.

## Hart banker James Werner dies Saturday

James Werner, 38, Hart civic leader and president of the Farmers State Bank for the last six years, was found dead in his wrecked vehicle Saturday afternoon east of Hart.

County Judge M. L. Simpson, acting as coroner, ordered an autopsy to determine cause of death.

Werner's vehicle, a 1978 GMC Suburban, was discovered at 5 p.m. Saturday, 4½ miles east of Hart along FM 145. Werner was pronounced dead at the scene.

State Trooper Rick Bentley said that Werner's vehicle ran off the road into a ditch, then into a lake bed. Damage to the vehicle was restricted to the right front, and the frame had been badly bent, Bentley reported.

Judge Simpson said he is withholding a ruling in the death pending the autopsy report.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in Hart's First Baptist Church.

"SPS will borrow \$80 million this year for construction costs," Glover said.

Following the 120-day suspension, if the board does not grant the rate increase, SPS can file an appeal with the Public Utility Commission, and the PUC's decision will be binding.

"The 5,000 people we represent are also having a hard time making ends meet," Mayor Elmer Youts said as the board voted to delay a decision.

Aldermen called a public hearing on use of next year's Revenue Sharing funds for 6:30 p.m. March 17. At this meeting, requests from the public for distribution of Revenue Sharing money will be heard. Following the hearing, the board will begin drawing up next year's budget.

In other action, the board:

—Discussed operation of the swimming pool at the middle school and decided to delay action until after the Revenue Sharing hearing. Aldermen were generally of the opinion that a public swimming pool should be available in Dimmitt.

—Appointed Dr. Bill Murphy as city health officer for the coming year.

—Approved purchase of an ambulance, with the \$15,000 cost to be shared equally by the city and the county.

## City, county agree to buy new ambulance

Purchase of a new 1979 Suburban "high-rise" ambulance was approved by the city and county Monday, and it may be in service by as early as next week.

"To furnish quality service and keep quality people as ambulance drivers, we need good equipment," Hospital Administrator Jack Newsom told the two administrative bodies.

Cost of the ambulance service is shared by the Castro County Hospital District, the City of Dimmitt and Castro County. However, Newsom explained that the hospital district has no funds available to buy an ambulance, and requested the city and county to fund the purchase.

Newsom said he had located a new ambulance for \$15,000, which is approximately \$3,000 less than the current price. It is equipped with everything needed except a radio and cot.

"We can use the cot from our old 1955 Pontiac," Newsom said.

The County Commissioners' Court and Dimmitt Board of Aldermen approved the purchase, with each government unit paying half the cost.

Driver Rex Cowart probably will fly to Duncanville this weekend to pick up the new ambulance.

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen gave a unanimous vote of thanks to the ambulance drivers—Cowart, C. D. Fitzgearld, Raleigh Strother, Keith Mussett, Johnny Hucks and Jackie Gunnels—for the quality of service they provide.

# Game law hearing scheduled Monday

A public hearing to gather information about proposed hunting, fishing and trapping regulations for Castro County is announced by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for 7 p.m. Monday at the courthouse here. Most local interest centers in length of the pheasant season.

was put into effect last year. Views of landowners and hunters are sought after the experience of the last season.

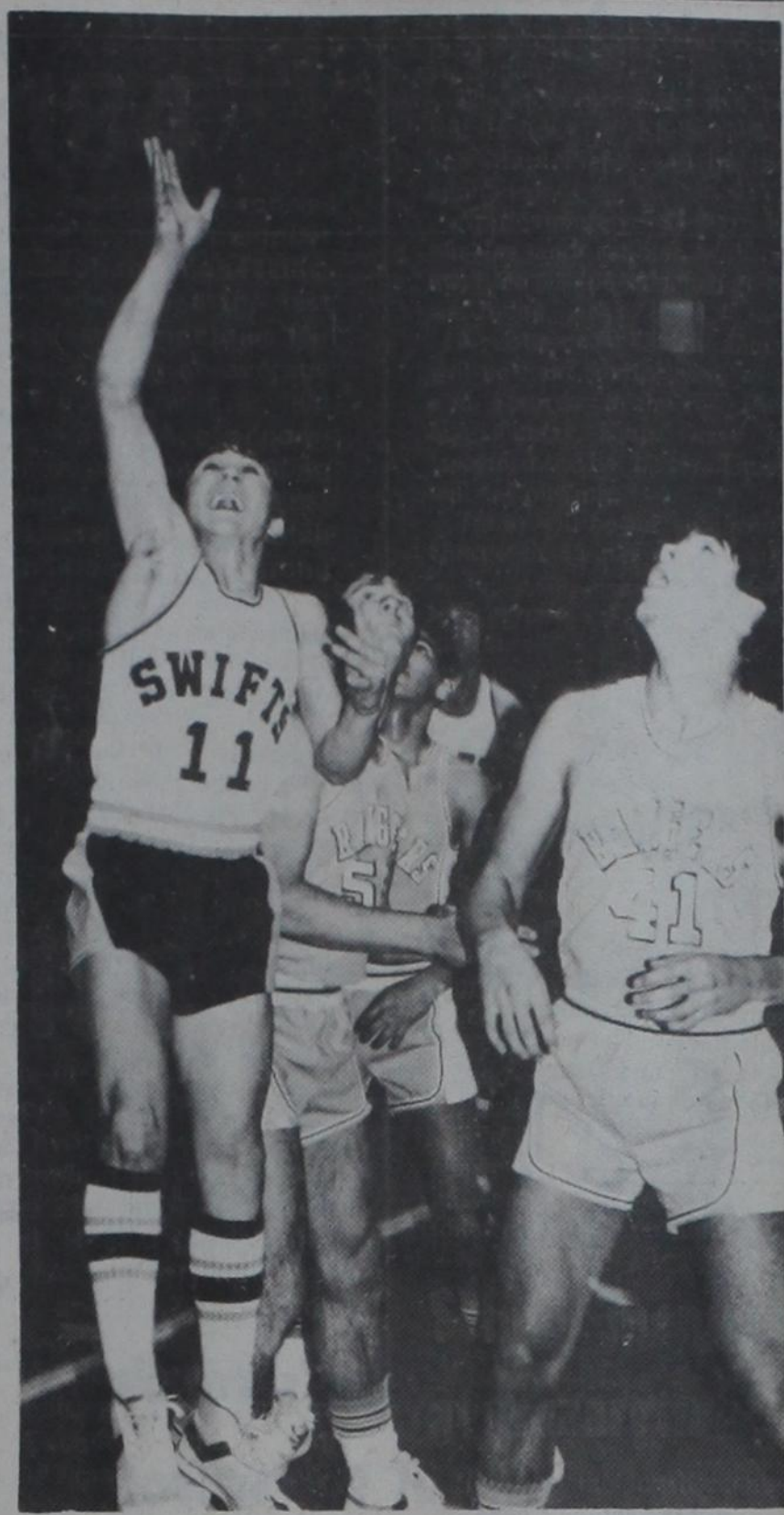

Also to be discussed is a spring season on turkey gobblers and an either-sex fall turkey season in the Panhandle. A longer waterfowl hunting season is another topic expected to be aired.

Recommendations from county hearings will be sent to the TPW Commission for consideration at a hearing at Austin in April, when hunting seasons will be set.

The TPS Commission is responsible for setting seasons, bag limits and means and methods of taking wildlife in Castro County as in other parts of the state.

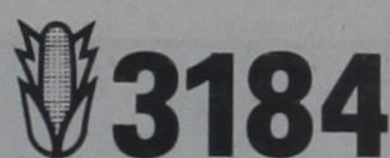

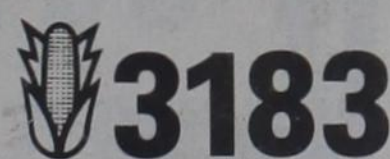

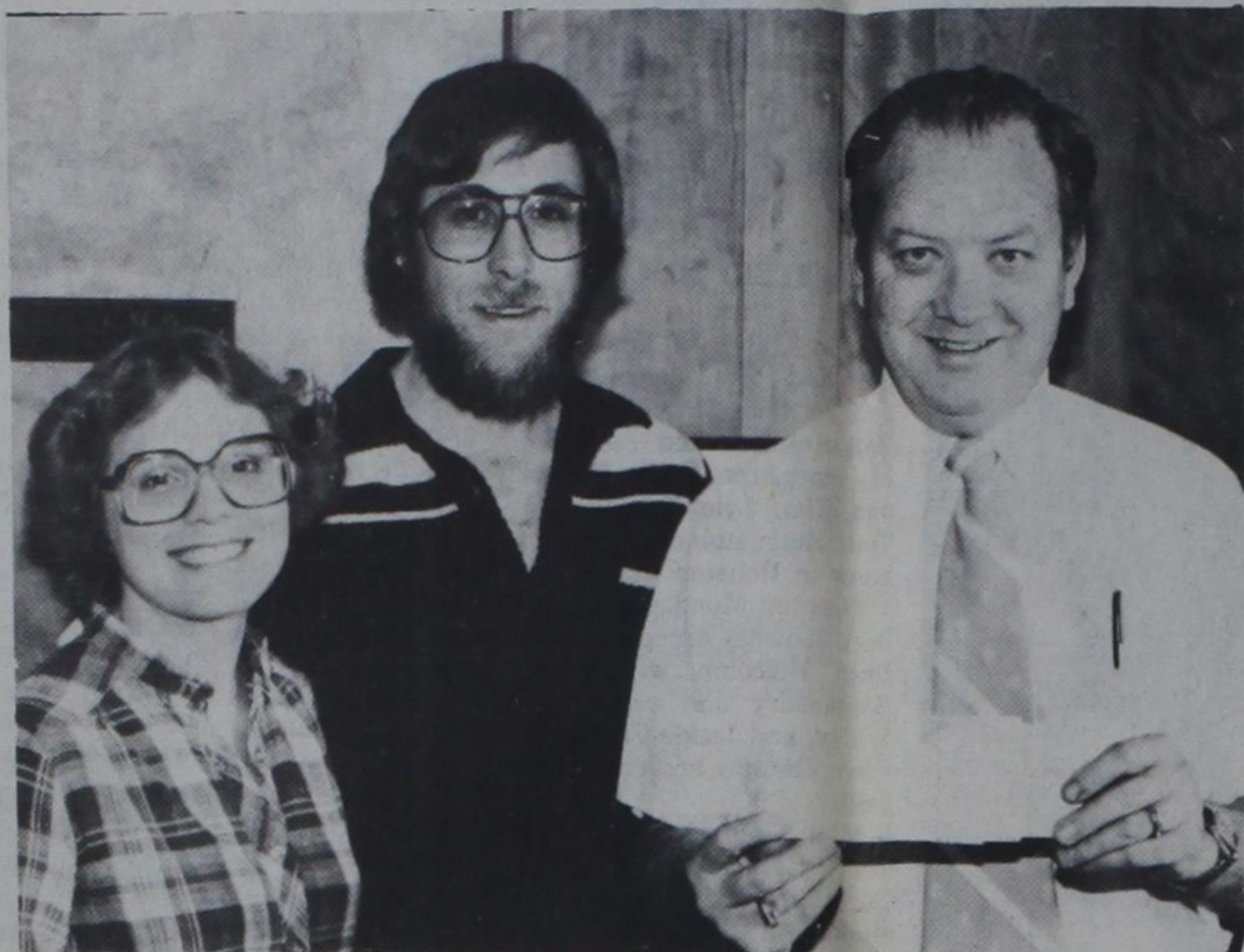
Girls will observe the birthday on March 12 and troop events during the week will include church attendance, ceremonies, and community service.

## Plan A is big plus for Texas schools

Ike Moore, "Plan A" supervisor, spoke to Dimmitt Lions Tuesday on the Texas Plan for Comprehensive Special Education.

Moore traced the development of the present plan to 1968. Twelve to 14 percent of Texas school-age children qualify for special education, he told Lions members. This includes those with different types of learning disabilities, with exceptional gifts, with handicaps of various types or those who are mentally retarded.

The new plan was called "Plan A" and was designed to provide special education programs for exceptional students. The Amarillo ISD had one of the five original pilot programs, "which really helped us here when we started it," Moore said.

Elmer Berryhill designed the Castro County program and Moore directs it. "Each year we work with 450 to 500 people with the goal of minimizing the problems they will have when they

get out into the adult world," he explained.

Most of the students served by Plan A come under the definition of the "learning disabled," in one or more specific subjects. The program also serves pregnant students, homebound students, mentally retarded, multiple handicapped and others. Resource teachers take two to three students at a time for intensive teaching in the area of their deficiency.

"We take kids who have known failure all their lives. We want them to get the taste of success. It can really help them in their 'mainstream' school work," he explained.

We try to get each student to the highest reading level he can attain," Moore said.

"The ultimate goal of our program is to try to make these kids self-sufficient as adults."

"We have a lot of handicapped people working among us right here in town," he said. "That shows our program is succeeding for these people. You may not even realize who they are or what their handicaps are," he added.

One Plan A 'ex' student has gone on to a \$300-a-week job, Moore said.

"We helped a lot of people, although it would be foolish for us to try to claim that our program has succeeded with every student. Unfortunately, it's almost impossible to alleviate the academic disability of some students," he told Lions members.

"We have the personnel, we have the funds and we have the materials," he said.

The only shortage statewide, he said, is in the number of educational specialists in several fields.

"We haven't had the need for some of the money they've been sending us for our program, and I've been sending some of it back," he said. "We get more than we need here, while other districts with more students get less than we do. There is no rhyme or reason to it," he added.

The Plan A concept throughout Texas is extremely beneficial to many, many kids, Moore said.

"I think the program is one big plus for the state of Texas."

A businessman director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. will be elected by Castro County cotton producers and

agribusinessmen at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the community room of the courthouse.

The election will be held in conjunction with an educational cotton meeting sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. James Supak, area cotton agronomist, will speak on seed vigor and the effects of temperature on lint and seed quality.

Dr. James Leser, area entomologist, will discuss cotton insects with emphasis on the boll weevil.

Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under PCG by-laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election, review current events and PCG activities of importance to High Plains cotton producers and agribusinessmen.

A representative of the PCGA will be at the meeting to report on activities of that association and to hold the election.

James Supak, area cotton specialist, and Jim Leser, area entomologist, with the Texas Extension Service, will present the program. Supak will discuss all phases of cotton production and Leser's subject will be insect control.

The program is open to the public, and is planned to close by 10 p.m., according to Charles Hottel, County Agricultural Agent.

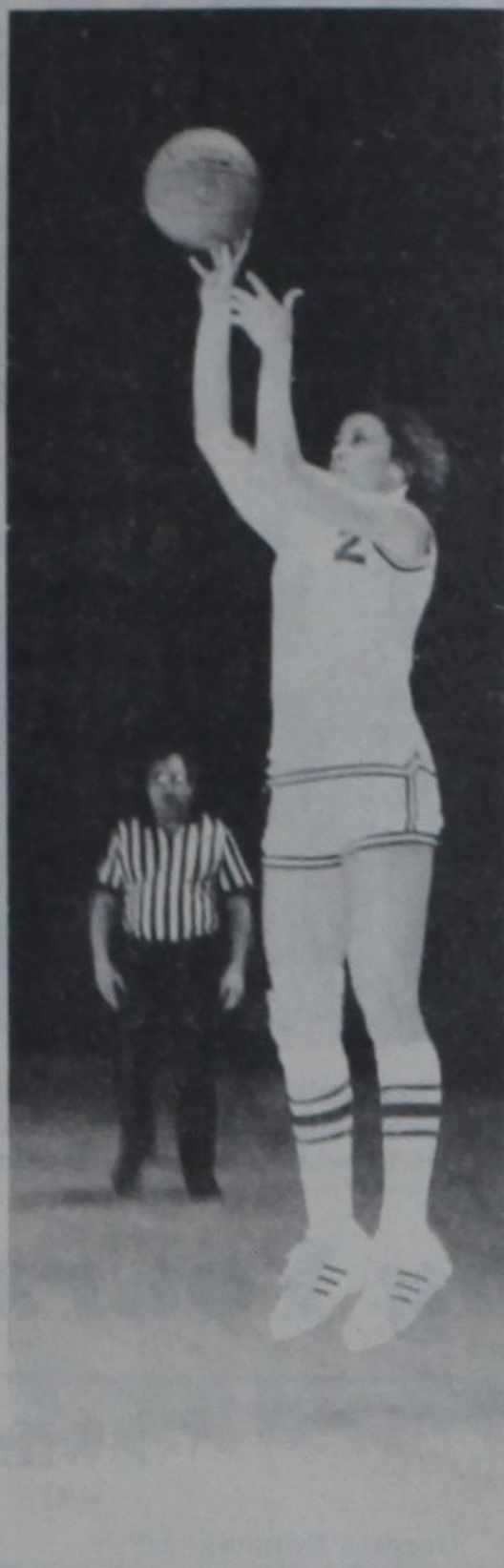

## Hance supports stronger intelligence operations

Congressman Kent Hance has announced he is the co-sponsor of a bill calling for stronger intelligence operations by the United States.

The bill, H.R. 6316 by U.S. Rep. Bill Young (R-Fla.), provides for measures to strengthen the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), mainly in the areas of counter-terrorism.

"This legislation applies primarily to our foreign intelligence gathering abilities and in connection with foreign terrorists inside the United States," Hance said. "As we have seen in recent months, our intelligence network as it concerns foreign affairs has not been as adequate as we would like it. A stronger CIA foreign intelligence program could have helped us tremendously with our present problems in the Middle East."

The bill has three major sections. It will:

- Provide that the CIA report its covert activities only to the House and Senate intelligence committees, instead of to the eight congressional committees which receive that information now.
- Change the law so that foreign agents would no longer have access to information relative to the operation of our government through the Freedom of Information Act.
- Make it a federal crime to reveal the identity of undercover agents or informants of the CIA, intelligence agencies of the Department of Defense, or the foreign counter-intelligence or counter-terrorism components of the FBI.

"I feel it is vital that the American people understand the state of our intelligence operations," Hance said. "And the truth is that the CIA and our other intelligence agencies have nearly been put out of business in recent years. It is time we tell the American people just how serious the political attacks on our intelligence operations have been."

"We need to stress, again and again, that an effective intelligence operation is vital and essential to maintaining a strong America."

"Intelligence activities may not be a nice business, but unfortunately, the game in which we are players is not a nice game. The fact that we allow foreign agents access to

important information relative to our government through the Freedom of Information Act is unthinkable and must be changed."

"To allow those who reveal the identity of intelligence agents to go free while their victims lose their lives, can no longer be tolerated."

"We have just witnessed in the Middle East the problems when we have poor intelligence resources. The CIA simply has not been effective in recent years.

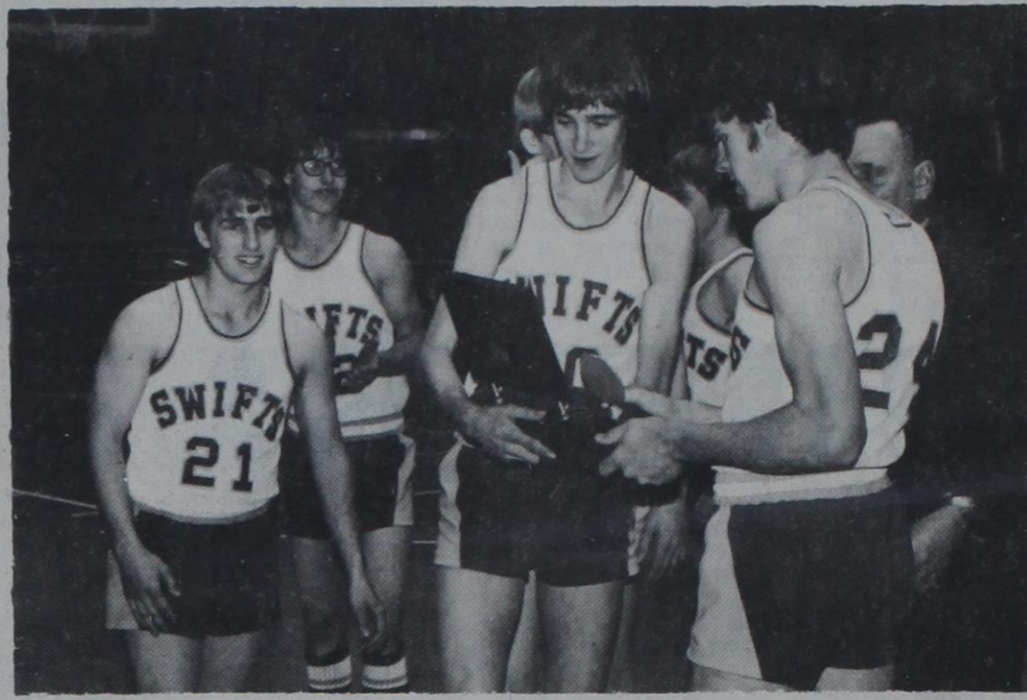

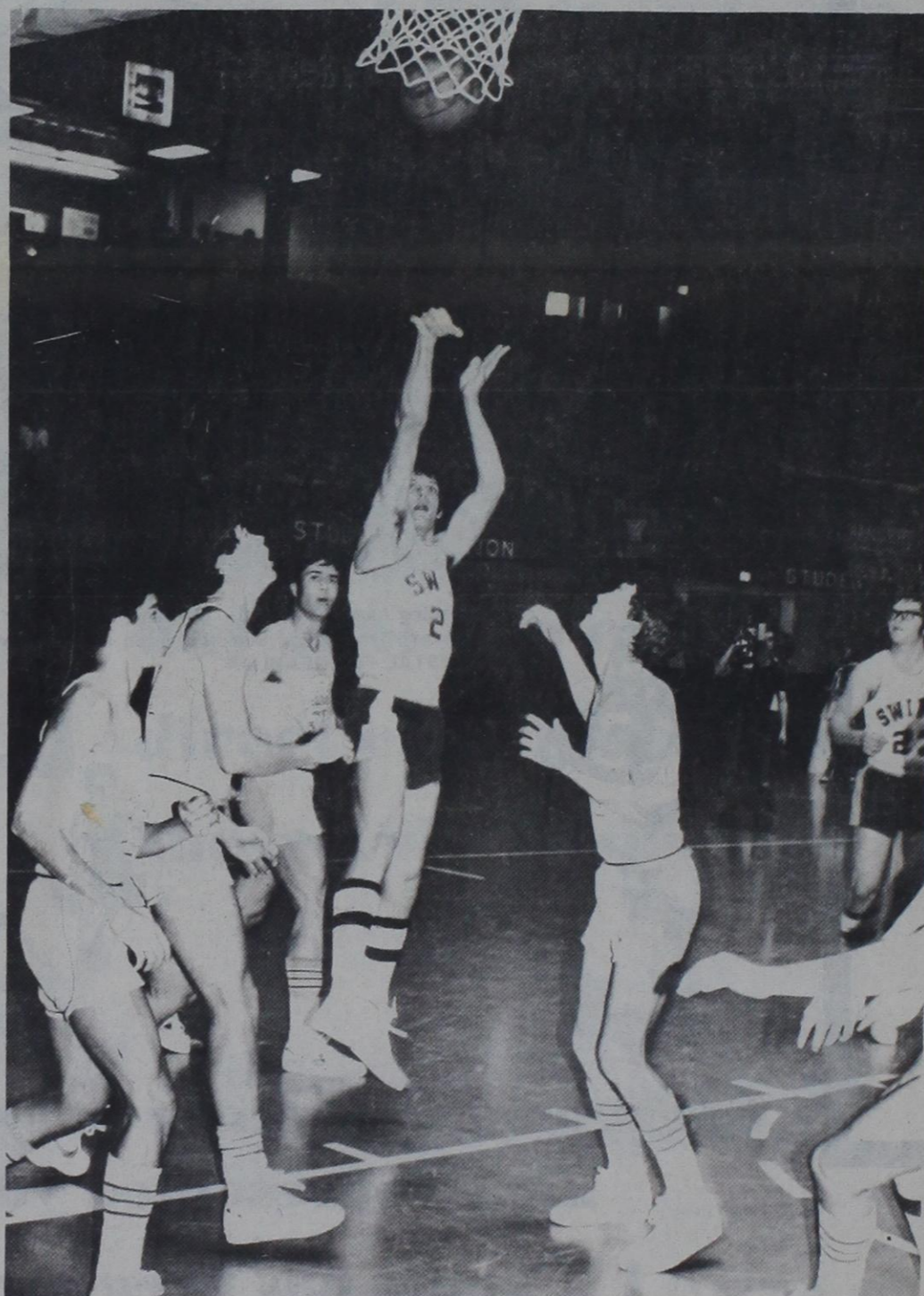

# Swifts stay cool through regional cliff-hangers

Nazareth's Swifts never seemed to lose their cool as they worked their deliberate, full-control game to edge three other contenders and win the Region I-B boys' basketball championship.

But in the Nazareth stands, it was all white knuckles and gritted teeth.

Coach Bud Birks' Swifts won their three regional games by a total of five points.

In the first round, they defeated Midland Greenwood, 46-44, after Bryan Huseman swished a long shot with two seconds left. Greenwood was the state's No. 2-ranked Class B team and listed Class AA regional champion Abernathy among its victims.

The Swifts won their semifinal game 38-36, after a tying shot by Channing's Troy Williams bounced off the front of the rim with three ticks left.

And the championship game was in doubt until the final two seconds, when a Motley County shot rimmed out to seal a 50-49 victory for the Swifts. It was only the second loss of the year for the Matadors, who had defeated a fine San Elizario team in

overtime in the semifinals.

The entire tournament was like that. Six of the seven playoff games were decided by four points or less in what regional athletic director John Wise of South Plains College called "the toughest tournament we've ever had here."

"We were lucky, there's no denying it," Coach Birks said. "Anytime you have that many close games, luck usually is a factor. But that's not to say our boys didn't deserve it, because I think they did. They stayed cool."

The high-flying Greenwood Rangers (27-2) had run up as many as 117 points in one game this season, and had topped the 90-point mark three other times. But they had to settle for three baskets in the first quarter against Nazareth's stingy 2-3 zone defense as the Swifts gained an 8-6 lead in the opening-round game.

The frustrated Rangers fought back to a 16-12 lead midway in the second, but sophomore playmaker Calvin Schulte sank a pair of free throws for Nazareth with two seconds left to deadlock the halftime count at 18-18.

The score was still knotted at 26-26 as the game went into the fourth quarter.

Huseman sank two free throws and Schulte canned a long shot to give the Swifts a 34-30 lead with 4 1/2 minutes left.

Then, with three minutes remaining and Nazareth holding a 34-32 advantage, the Swifts went into their four-corner offense.

Greenwood tied it at 34 on a pair of free throws with 2:01 remaining, but Nazareth went back into its four-corner game and ran the clock down to the final 16 seconds, calling two time-outs in the process.

Huseman's 20-foot shot with two seconds left touched

nothing but net, propelling the Swifts into the semifinals.

"Greenwood fooled us," Birks said. "They had beaten Abernathy with a run-and-gun game, but they changed their style when they played us. I don't understand why they did, unless their coach was afraid of fouls—because in the playoffs they call them much closer—but I'm glad they slowed their pace down."

Huseman scored 12 points and Schulte 10 against Greenwood as the Swifts connected on 53% of their floor shots and 92% of their free throws.

Against Channing in the semifinals Saturday morning, the Swifts' main problem was

6-4 hotshot Tim Price.

"We played a zone defense against Channing except that we put John Steffens on Price, and he did a tremendous job of containing him," Birks said. "I think John's defensive play was one of the main reasons we beat Channing."

The Eagles led by 10-8 after the first quarter, but their shots started rimming out in the second and Jeff Schmucker sank eight points to help the Swifts to a 20-18 halftime lead. The Swifts kept the pressure on and owned a 34-32 lead going into the final period.

After guiding the four-corner stall for a minute,

Schulte sank a pair of clutch free throws with 39 seconds left to give the Swifts their final 38-36 margin.

Channing tried desperately to get a decent shot, but with Schulte and Huseman pressing out front and Gary Book, Schmucker and Steffens keeping the inside shut off, the Eagles had to settle for a long jumper with three seconds left, and it bounced off the front of the rim.

Schmucker, with 14 points, was the only Swift to score in double figures.

The championship game Saturday night was a gripper all the way. The Swifts got into foul trouble early and were forced to shoot from the outside as the Matadors double-teamed Schmucker with a sinking 2-3 zone defense.

Motley County collected eight free throws—six of them from 1-and-1 bonuses—to lead by 18-16 after the first quarter and by 32-28 at halftime. The Swifts scored no free throws in the first half.

But Schulte sank 10 first-half points from the outside and Book, Schmucker, Huseman and Steffens netted four each while Dale Hoelting scored two to keep the Swifts within striking range.

In the second half, Nazareth's defense started cutting off the Matadors' second shots and forced them into several costly turnovers, and the score was tied three times as the Swifts started turning the game around. James Stephens sank a shot at the buzzer to give Motley County a 38-36 lead going into the

final frame.

The Matadors' full-court press paid off early in the fourth as Harvey Lee and Charlie Campbell scored two baskets within five seconds after steals, but Gary Book netted three shots in a row to tie the score again at 42-42.

Book collected his fourth foul at 4:48, then fouled out 11 seconds later while battling for a loose ball. Schulte picked up his fourth foul with 3:38 left.

After Schmucker sank a jumper to give Nazareth a 46-45 lead, the Swifts shifted to their four-corner offense with 2:20 remaining. They hiked their lead to three points, 48-45, when Steffens sank Nazareth's first free throws of the game at 1:19, and again at 50-47 when Schmucker put up a follow shot with 47 seconds remaining.

After sinking a basket with 17 seconds left, MC's Campbell stole the ball and drove for a layup with seven ticks left on the clock, but it was nullified by a foul on Sch-

mucker.

Schmucker's free throw rimmed out, and Motley County rebounded and called time out with six seconds remaining and Nazareth leading 50-49.

Not a seat in the Dome was being used as the Matadors fired their final shot with two seconds left. It rimmed out and Schmucker grabbed it to seal the Swifts' first regional championship.

Book, Schulte and Schmucker shared scoring honors with 12 each in the championship game.

"Motley County had a tremendous ball club," Birks said. "I think the key to our win was that we made them play our game. Still, if they hadn't missed that last shot, they'd have been going to Austin instead of us—and they would have deserved to. But I thought our kids showed a lot of poise and courage."

"And old Lady Luck was with us this time," he said. "We got to the finals last year and didn't have the luck. So I'm not going to look back."



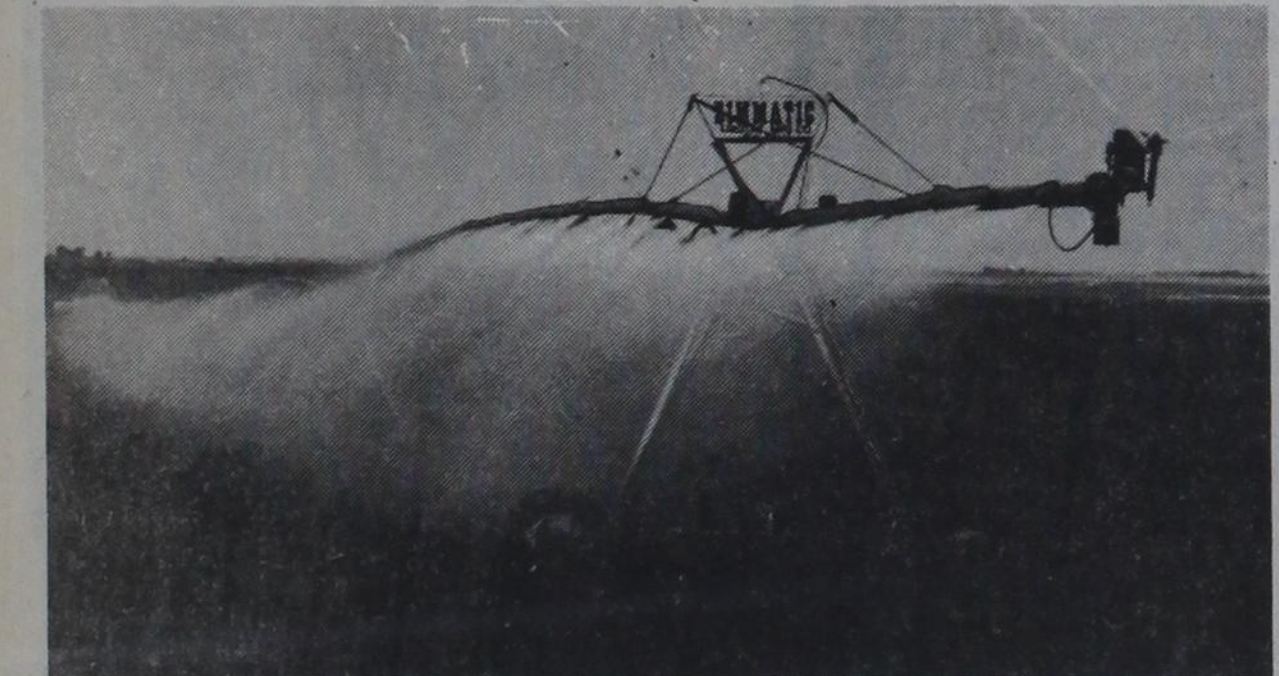

"You're not writing about Jr. because he doesn't like his name in the paper," Marie replied while putting another catalog card in her typewriter. "Besides," she added, "he told me that if his name comes out in the paper again, he'll quit. You know how shy he is."

"He's not shy about his knife wielding skills", I said under my breath. Earlier Jr. showed me his wonderful talent of knife fighting and I thought I would end up without any nostrils.

"Just get to the book re-

views", said the lady at the typewriter.

One of the best best-sellers to come out in a long time is Phil Donahue's autobiography. It is good because Phil Donahue, in first person, describes how he grew from an ordinary Catholic boy in the Midwest to one of America's most popular talk show hosts. It was quite a transformation and not without its growing pains.

A standard rule that seems to have gone by the wayside recently is the rule that if you want a best seller, don't write in first person. Yet, this book and some others have been in first person and they have been very good.
