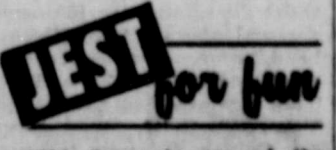

Two 'Tom Sawyers' Attempt 'Travels of Charlie' On Bikes

With muscles, effort, will power and a pair of wheels, two young Yankees snowed up in Eastland Monday to do their wash and see the sites. The improbable situation came about when two boys from Maryland bicycled in, midway through a cross-the-nation bike trip. Johnny Cardinal, 18, and Bill Brandenburg, 17, both of Oxon Hill, Maryland left home on two English racer bikes July 15th, and 19 days later pedaled into Eastland. Nine days from now they plan to meet Johnny's parents in San Bernardino, Calif.

The ride will be by automobile. The duo decided shortly after their spring graduation from Oxon Hill High School, Md., to spend the summer biking across the United States. Their parents first thought they were crazy, but finally decided it might be work. Johnny's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Cardinal of Oxon Hill agreed to meet the two boys in San Bernardino on a leg of their vacation trip, and Bill's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Brandenburg, also of Oxon Hill, agreed.

The boys bought two English racer bikes, 10 - speed Raleighs, and left Oxon Hill July 15th with a month to pedal across the United States to California. They took several pairs of Bermuda shorts, tee shirts, one pair of Levis, a pan and knife and fork, sleeping bags and water canteens, all of which they carried in Brooks Bags on their bicycles.

But the main thing they packed away was a bundle of energy and plenty of determination. They have averaged 100 miles a day so far and the best traveling they have done was 120 miles one day.

The weather has grown increasingly hotter, and they plan to start sleeping during the day and biking at night in the cooler air. Average temperature in Maryland was 90 degrees, and they've run into plenty of weather much hotter than that so far, and are looking for worse in West Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

The two boys, wiry, slender and with calves that are growing increasingly muscled during the trip, have run into very little trouble on their trip. The gear cable in Bill's bike has broken twice, but he watched it repaired the first time and was able to do it himself the second time — one example of the couple's ingenuity.

They ran into six days of steady rain in the eastern United States, but just kept right on pedaling. One boy said a day of rain right now might not be so bad after all the hot weather they have biked through. Eastland Countians would probably heartily agree.

"They've had more good luck than bad, and found that people most everywhere are kind, warm-hearted, generous and understanding. A man in Columbia S. C. took them home with him fed them and gave them a bed to sleep in.

"A bed to sleep in might not sound like much to you," Bill said "but when you've grown accustomed to the ground it's really something."

A Roberts Ga. policeman directed them to a motel owner who gave them an air-conditioned room with television hot shower (which they more than appreciated) and breakfast before sending them on their way with a "few odds and ends to take with us."

A Mississippi man gave them breakfast on the house if they promised to send him a post card.

Coming South from their homes in the North the two boys found Southern hospitality very apparent as evidenced by the examples above. They say that their accents probably sound as strange to Southerners as ours do to them. But it's all part of the experience and they're enjoying every minute of it.

There are disadvantages all right. They both admitted to being a little homesick and they have a strange sensation of being "tired of just constantly moving." "It's kind of depressing having to stop in towns where there's no place for us," Bill said.

COUNTY HAS 19 ACCIDENTS IN JULY; FIVE DEATHS TO DATE

Eastland County had no fatal traffic deaths during the month of July, according to the rural monthly traffic accident summary released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The county had nine personal injury accidents, ten property damage accidents, and ten injured, for a total of nineteen accidents during the month.

EASTLAND Co. ranks 3rd in the Eastland Sergeants area in the amount of property damage with \$6,821.

In the Eastland Sergeants area during the month of July, accidents totaled 78,

with 24 personal injury accidents, 54 property damage, and 32 injuries. Sergeant Roger Sosebee is sergeant for the Eastland Sergeants Area.

A comparison of rural traffic accidents in the Abilene Area of the Texas Department of Public Safety for the first seven months of 1964 with the same period of 1963 shows that Eastland County has had the same number (3) of fatal accidents for 1964 that they had in the same period in 1963.

Property damage accidents are up from 54 for 1963 to 74 for the same period in 1964. Personal injury accidents were 41 for 1964 as compared to 32 for 1963.

Property damage is up from \$61,160 in 1963 to \$88,235 for 1964. The total accidents during the seven month period in 1964 were 120 as compared to 91 for 1963.

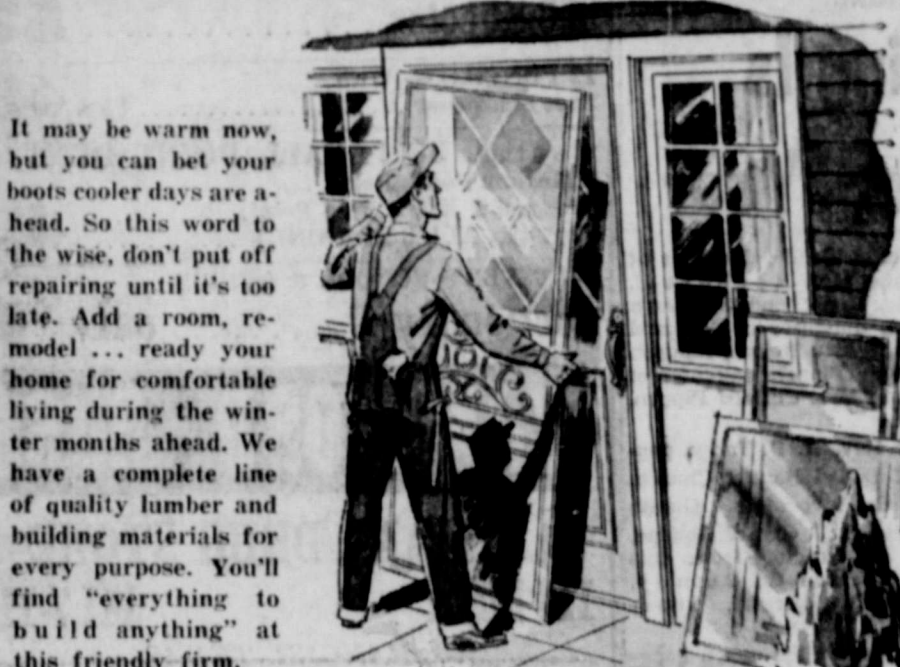

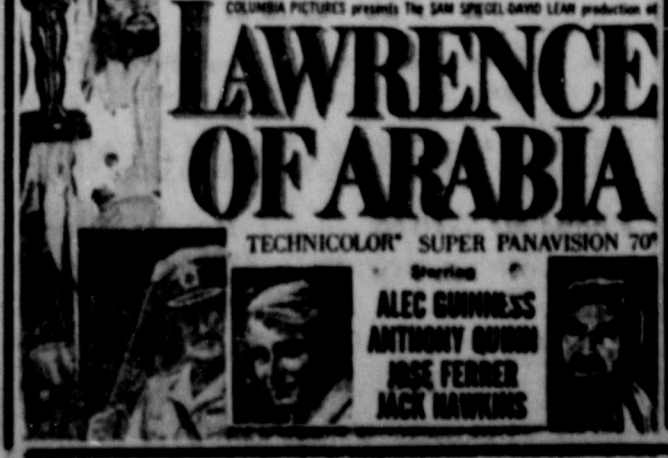
