We visited Caddo, famed for its "critter," Saturday afternoon and discovered first hand that folks in that area were less concerned about the "critter" than a Dallas-Fort Worth TV station.

"Nothing to it," commented one man.
After traveling several backroads in the area and noticing how parched and dry the land seemed, and changing a flat tire, we returned home, figuring that the trip was worth while since we met some friendly folks.

derived from legal sale of alcoholic beverages goes into the old age assistance fund."
He charged there was "plenty of bootlegging" in the community and that all kinds of alcoholic beverages were available to minors via illegal sale.
The publisher said he understood a survey had been made and liquor and beer purchases of Gorman citizens at Ranger totaled about \$300 a day—or \$1800 a week.

This expenditure for alcoholic beverages, he added, excludes additional sums spent with bootleggers allegedly operating in Gorman.
Baker said he also signed the formal petition, now in circulation, calling for the future election to legalize sale of alcoholic beverages in Gorman.

Defending his action in signing the petition with nine other leading Gorman men, Publisher Baker had this to say in his front page column, "Peanut Hulls," last Thursday —

Evidently I have committed the unardonable sin, but I don't think so. To those who gave me an opportunity to explain, thank you.
I believe the duties of a publisher, weekly or daily, is to serve the community as a whole. This is a tremendous job and one I am not wholly capable of doing to perfection. I do my best.

Folks who read the petition I signed carefully will see that it is a petition asking for a petition to call an election which will require 138 signatures. I know there are more than 138 citizens in this community that partake of alcoholic beverages. Most of these citizens are law abiding, church going people, who pay taxes and live a respectable life. I believe they are entitled to the option of saving whether they want to buy their beverages in Gorman or some other town. If the majority votes against the sale of LEGAL beverages, then they have no cause for complaint.

At first I had no intention of signing the second petition, but a few have been so biased in their opinion I may change my mind. Not that I approve of drinking, but I definitely do not approve of bootlegging which has been going on in Gorman for many years. I have heard a few fine citizens (no disrespect intended) laugh about it. Check your court house records and see how many bootleg cases have been dismissed or let off with a small fine.

As to how you vote on this issue, if the second petition is granted, is strictly your business. My point is, we have lost so many rights as American citizens that I believe you are entitled to express your desire on a ballot. At the rate the Supreme Court is nullifying the rights of American citizens we may not have the privilege of voting much longer.

I repeat a statement I have made in the Progress before this came up.
"I have never carried any type of alcoholic beverage advertising, and as long as I control the policies of your Progress, I will never carry advertising of this type."
However, if enough signatures are gotten for the petition to hold an election, I will carry advertising FOR or AGAINST until the week of the election.

active church worker, conducted a poll on the issue and wrote the following published report —

A permit authorizing circulation of a petition calling for an election submitting the question of legalizing sale of intoxicating liquor to the vote of the people of Gorman has been issued.

Applicants for permit for circulation of petition include three downtown business men, four Highway Six business men, two local law enforcement officers, and three other men.

The election petition does not have to be approved by the City Commission according to Mayor Ross Wilson. It must be returned to the Eastland County Clerk's office by September 5th. With at least 138 signatures of qualified voters.

A poll of business men in the two block area on Kent Street (excepting three heads of businesses who were unavailable, three who reside out of city limits and one who had three customers waiting) was made by this reporter, asking the question "Should the Sale of Liquor (Beer) Be Legalized in Gorman?"

Results show:
22 interviewed interviewed
2 ----- Yes
10 ----- No
10 ----- No opinion expressed

All 22 interviewed were polled with the check record only. No signatures were required. Gorman voted saloons out in 1902, and is reported to have had only a brief period of legal liquor sales in the 1930's, possibly 32 beer or near beer.

Comments from parties favoring legalizing sale of intoxicating liquors in Gorman express the opinion that the sales here would make law enforcement easier, which enforcement has not been achieved because of local bootlegging and the out of town sales to minors.

One objection to legalizing sales rest on the grounds that Gorman would receive undesirable elements. Some would modify this objection of all surrounding towns were wet, thus minimize traffic which would come to Gorman for liquor purchase only.

Again, a comment from one favoring sale "There would be a lot of tax revenue."

Combating the statement in rebuttal, "The little revenue Gorman would get after the federal government and the state takes theirs from the till scarcely pay for additional law enforcement officers; the hiring of which would be a must, it would seem, when two officers cannot take care of a legally dry town."

There are among both the "For" and the "Against" groups those who are earnestly considering how the present

breeding place of the mosquito."
Commenting on the possibility of an epidemic of encephalitis breaking out in this area — such as the outbreak reported in the Houston vicinity along the Gulf Coast — Dr. Watkins said: "At this time it is very improbable that such an epidemic will strike here. Nevertheless," he added, "residents should be vigilant in eliminating possible breeding places for mosquitoes, some of which may carry the disease."

Although recent downpours cut down the number of mosquitoes in the air, standing water from the rains provides new breeding places, and in a few days there'll likely be more of the insect pests.

The disease is not contagious in that it may be transmitted directly from one person to another. But it is spread by the female culex mosquitoes which carry the St. Louis encephalitis virus. They receive the virus from biting birds or reptiles which are infected, passing it on to all persons whom they happen to bite.

Most of the persons infected will suffer no ill effects or will become only mildly sick, but in some cases the disease produces severe illness or death. Many cases are at first diagnosed as aseptic meningitis, which is similar to, but not as severe as encephalitis.
