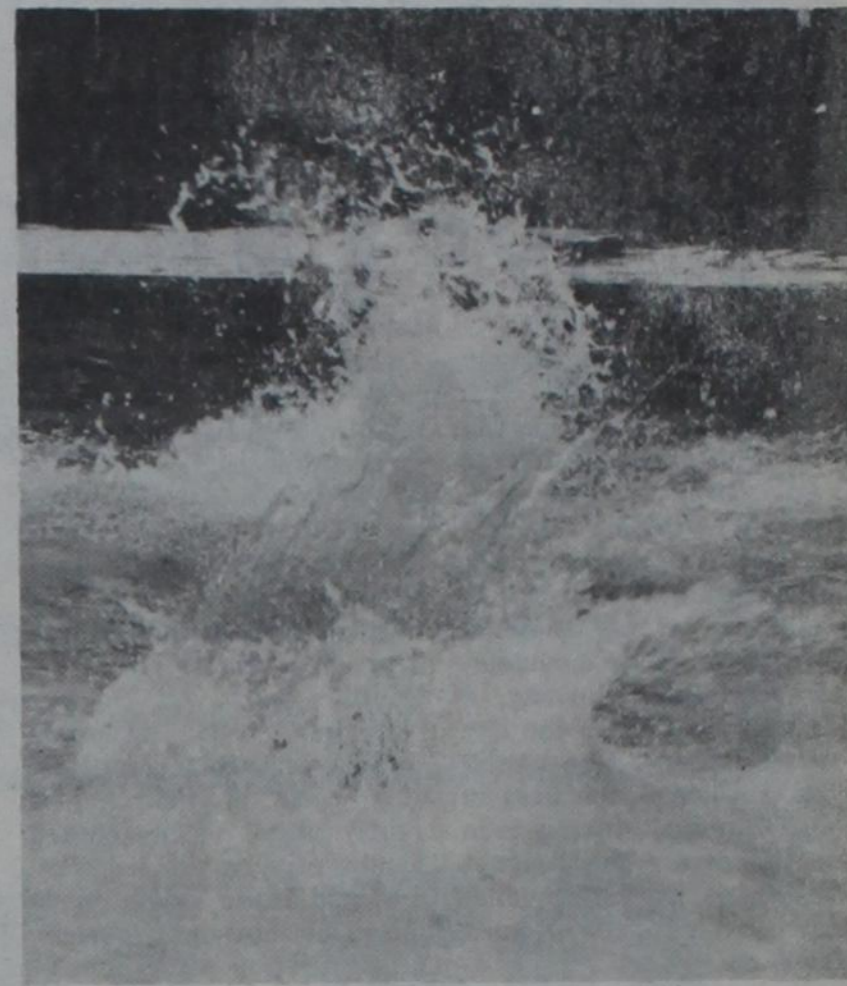

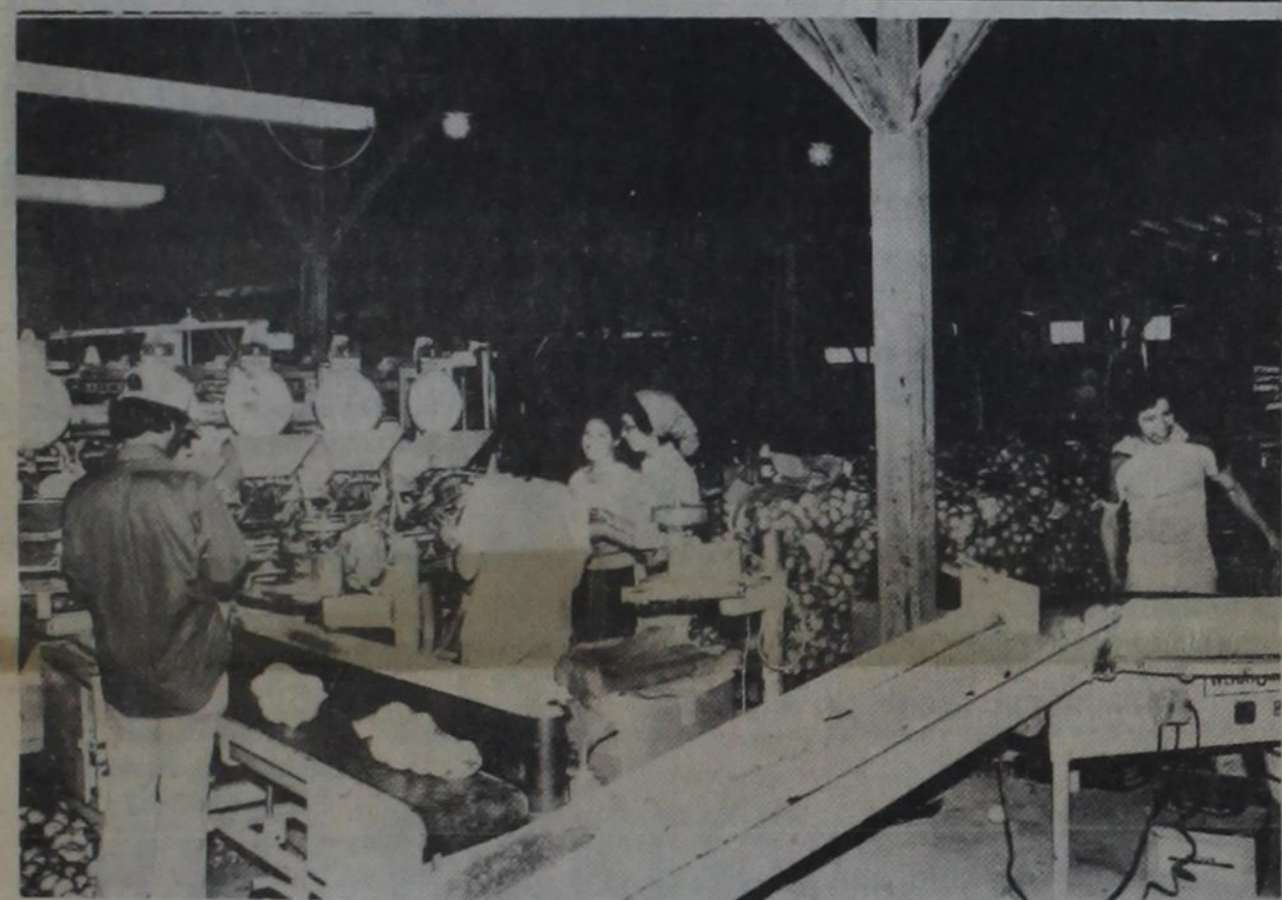

## Amstar to add new product



ONION HARVEST UNDERWAY—Local vegetable processing plants began shipping onions this week and managers at LaMantia, Collum Collier and Co. of Dimmitt, Inc. and

Dimco say quality is "excellent" so far. Neither plant has had any labor problems and harvest is expected to continue through mid-August.

The Amstar Corp. is launching a multimillion-dollar construction project at its Dimmitt plant this week that will add a new-generation liquid sweetener to its line of products in 1982.

The plant's No. 1 refinery—which has been shut down for 2½ years—will be rebuilt and modified to produce 55% high fructose corn syrup. Amstar officials say they already have a firm market for the new product in the soft-drink industry.

This will be the second major remodeling of the Dimmitt Amstar Plant. Originally designed to produce mostly corn starch plus some syrups, the plant was expanded in 1976-77 to produce 42% high fructose corn syrup (HFCS). The liquid sweetener, used mainly by bottlers and canning companies, now accounts for two-thirds of the plant's production.

Addition of 55% HFCS to the plant's line of products not only will reactivate the

No. 1 refinery. It will also add eight to 10 more workers to the payroll, and will increase the plant's grind by more than 1½ million bushels a year, according to Doug Lapins, general manager.

The plant is capable of grinding 30,000 bushels of corn per day, but has been averaging 23-24,000 bushels, Lapins said, "mainly because of the seasonality of the fructose demand."

"We think we'll gain 4,000 to 5,000 bushels per day in the utilization of our grinding capabilities," Lapins said.

The big modification project will be engineered by Mitsubishi Chemical Industries, Ltd., which designs and operates high-technology refineries in Japan.

"Their engineers will be coming in starting this week to survey our No. 1 refinery," Lapins said. "One of the things they'll do is 'size' the old refinery and see how much of our old equipment can be utilized, and what its [See AMSTAR, Page 7]

## Sunday beer, wine sales okayed by city aldermen

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen Monday night revised a city ordinance to allow the sale of beer and wine on Sundays in Precinct 4, but the board refused the request from Ken Williams to permit private clubs in the city to extend their closing time from midnight to 2 a.m.

Two weeks ago, aldermen heard requests from Thomas Falcon and Jim Butler to repeal the city ordinance that prohibits the Sunday sale of beer and wine. However, the aldermen tabled the request until Monday's meeting to allow time for discussion with county officials.

The County Commissioners Court learned in the meantime that it had no jurisdiction over the Sunday sales. The Alcoholic Beverage Commission allows Sunday sales within the state as long as the beer and wine are in a separate building or have a separate entrance away from other liquor.

Until about six months ago when two businesses just outside of Dimmitt city limits began Sunday sales, the businesses had a "gentlemen's agreement" to close on Sundays.

"The only difference now is that everybody isn't playing by the same rules," Alderman Doug Lapins said, adding, "Why should people within the city limits be more restricted than those outside the limits?"

Butler and John King of California told aldermen that the change in the ordinance would not greatly affect the general public since beer and wine is available close by.

"They go where they have to go for their refreshments," King said.

The motion by Alderman Joe Josselet "to leave the city ordinance like it is" drew two votes.

Then Alderman Roy Lilley moved "that we change the ordinance whereby beer and wine can be sold on Sunday," and his motion carried 3-2, with Josselet and Wayne Collins voting against it.

Williams, owner and manager of the Colonial Supper Club, wanted to extend closing time from 12 midnight to 2 a.m. To do so, he must have the city aldermen change an existing ordinance and he must acquire a "late hour permit" costing \$500 per year.

The board learned that a revision of the city ordinance would not only allow all private clubs to remain open the extra two hours, but would also allow alcoholic beverage consumption anywhere in the city after 12:15 a.m. week nights and after 1:15 a.m. Saturday nights.

"I close on Sundays,"

Williams said, adding, "I don't want to hurt the city. Really I don't."

Lapins' motion that the request be denied carried 4-1, with Lilley opposed.

In other action, the city board:

—Decided to challenge the Census Bureau's preliminary population figure for Dimmitt of 4,836.

—Reviewed a report by City Manager Garnett Holland and city personnel concerning the new trash collection fees and possible solutions to bring the fees in line for various businesses sharing one container. The discussion was tabled until the July 21 meeting, when further information will be presented.

—Learned that the amount of Revenue Sharing received for the period from September 1979 through October 1980 may be cut back by as much as \$10,899. Firm information will not be available until Congress takes action in October on the renewal proposal put before it by the Office of Revenue Sharing in Washington, D.C.

—Accepted the resignation of Juanita Welch, who is moving from Dimmitt.

—Approved the motion by Collins to accept in principal, but not in monetary support, the nation-wide Peace through Strength resolution.

—Requested that Brown, Graham & Co. return in two weeks after aldermen have had ample opportunity to review the prepared annual audit report.

## Koeninger gets Sundown post

Dowden Koeninger, Dimmitt High School counselor for the past four years, has accepted a position as principal of the Sundown elementary school.

Koeninger, who has been principal at Springlake-Earth High School and Wilson Elementary, officially began his duties at the class B school July 1.

Koeninger said he wanted to get back into administration. "We've enjoyed the four years here and we think the kids are great," he said.

The Dimmitt School Board is still accepting applications for the vacant counselor's spot, according to Supt. Robert Ryan.

## Woman, son killed in car-truck wreck

A Hereford woman and her six-week-old son died Thursday from injuries sustained in a car-truck accident which occurred earlier that morning at 6:10 at the intersection of Hwy. 385 and FM 2942 south of Hereford.

Killed were Frances Guajardo, 26, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Florencio Vasquez of Dimmitt, and her son Seth.

The car driven by Mrs. Guajardo's husband Richard was southbound on Hwy. 385 when it collided with a truck that had jackknifed just ten minutes earlier at the intersection. The truck, driven by

Marcus Box of Amarillo, jackknifed and overturned after Box missed the turn from FM 2942 onto Hwy. 385 and locked the truck's brakes.

Only one lane of the highway was open for two hours following the mishap.

Mrs. Guajardo died at 7:55 a.m. at Deaf Smith General Hospital. Her infant son was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo and died at 9:45 a.m.

Richard Guajardo was treated and later released for injuries sustained in the accident, as was the driver of the truck.

## Controversial insecticide approved for spider mites

Azdrin, an insecticide once prohibited for use on corn with spider mites, has been temporarily cleared for "emergency use only" as of last week.

The chemical was previously restricted because of the possibility of carcinogenic residues and its toxicity to bees and birds. Shell Chemical Co. has been working for two years on the research of the chemical, and found that the residues are very low level

and do not remain long. "There will be about a 90% usage in our area because of the emergency situation. The most widespread use will be from July 10 to August 10," said County Entomologist Olan Moore.

The label on the chemical restricts usage to 60 days before harvest, not to be used on silage or ensilage corn, and it cannot be used on corn that will be grazed.

"Carl King was very instru-

mental to the clearance of the Azdrin, and he employed the help of Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown and Congressman Kent Hance," Moore said.

King and the Texas Corn Growers Association have been working with Shell Chemical Co. for two years trying to get the insecticide cleared for use. The Environmental Protection Agency studied the results of the testing and ruled in favor of the usage of Azdrin.

## County Fair committee will finalize plans

The Castro County Fair Committee will meet Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. in the community room of the courthouse to finalize plans for the 1980 fair scheduled for Sept. 4-6 in the county exposition building.

This year's fair will feature a parade, old settler's reunion, Castro County Rodeo and carnival.

County residents will compete in baking, clothing, canned fruits and vegetables, crafts, horticulture, farm products, garden products and photography categories.

Booth space for exhibits in the exposition building can be rented by contacting Delores Golden at the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce office. Cost for an eight foot by 12 foot space is \$15 for commercial exhibits. Non-profit organizations will not be charged for booth space.

Large outdoor areas are available for \$25 to commercial exhibitors.

Booths will be open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday, Sept. 5, and Saturday, Sept. 6. Ex-

hibits can be set up Thursday, Sept. 4 after 3 p.m. or early Friday, Sept. 5.

Building materials for the booths will not be furnished, according to Mrs. Golden, but tables will be provided.

Out of 25 indoor booth spaces, there are only six left, Mrs. Golden said.

Entries are now being accepted for the Fair Days Queen who will reign over fair activities instead of the Rodeo Queen chosen in the past.

All civic clubs, organizations and individual business persons can sponsor a candidate for a \$25 entry fee.

The queen and her court will be featured in the downtown parade, and she will be crowned prior to the parade.

Entry deadline is Sept. 1 and entries are being accepted by Luan Ebeling at 647-4197.

The Queen will be chosen by an out-of-town judge, Mrs. Ebeling said.

The Queen Contest is sponsored by the Dimmitt Rodeo Association.

## NHS principal hurt in fall

A Dimmitt man was injured Monday afternoon in Nazareth after he fell 35 feet from the roof of the Nazareth High School gym.

Jim Peggram was assisting in the final waterproofing of the gym roof when he slipped.

He was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital, X-rayed and then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Peggram's left ankle was crushed and his right ankle was sprained in the fall.

He was listed in satisfactory condition after surgery Monday, where three permanent pins were placed in his ankle.

"He is in good shape, still bruised and skinned up a bit, but that's good for a 35 foot fall," said Nazareth school superintendent Johnny Mason. "He will be in the hospital for about a week, then into a wheelchair and on crutches."

Peggram is the principal at Nazareth High School.

## Aldermen challenge city's census figure

Dimmitt's aldermen plan to challenge the Census Bureau's preliminary population figure for Dimmitt of 4836.

The city board learned Monday night that they have 10 days to contest the figures given on the census report which was received earlier the same day. The population figures are used to determine part of the funding Dimmitt receives through tax revenue sharing and to determine eligibility on grants and loans.

City attorney Jack Edwards told the board that he had tried to mathematically find the same total of residents using the Census Bureau figures and their percentages, but he was unable to substantiate their total of 4836 people.

"I think they are between 250 to 2,000 short," Edwards said.

Alderman Fred Annen requested that Edwards take proper action in contesting the figures of the census

## Dimmitt Agri Industries asks \$1.3 million in attorney fees

Dimmitt Agri Industries' attorneys returned to the US District Court last Thursday to ask that the Corn Products Corporation (CPC) pay more than \$1.3 million in attorneys fees.

The court ruled in May that DAI was entitled to \$1.5 million as a result of CPC actions that forced the farmers cooperative cornstarch plant out of business in

1973. DAI's attorneys are now seeking the \$1.3 million to cover the time spent on the case and expenses incurred in its preparation. Nearly 5,000 hours of work went into the preparation of the case.

DAI used two different legal firms to represent it in the case, a Hereford based firm and a San Francisco firm. The defense argues that since

DAI had two legal firms there was an "unavoidable duplication of effort" for which CPC should not be held accountable.

"She (Judge Mary Lou Robinson) has not ruled yet, although it could be any time now. It's one of those things that could take hours or days, but we haven't heard from her," said DAI general manager Billy Clark.

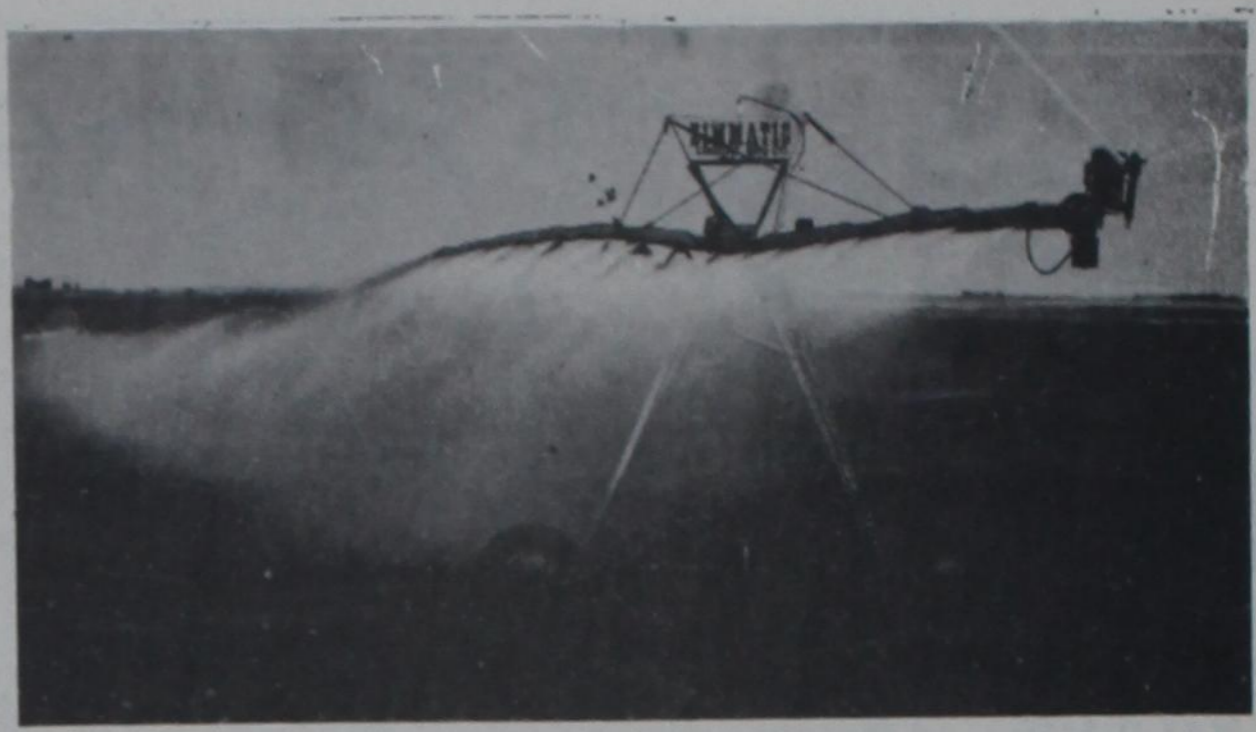

**ASCS notes**  
**Director advises farmers to 'move now' for storage**

By CHARLEY E. HILL  
"Corn on the ground; wheat in the street; nobody likes it," said Stephen Pringle, the Texas State ASCS Office State Executive Director. "But I do remember some pictures of mountains of grain stacked in the open within the past few years."  
"The nation has ample storage space for its crops, but that storage is not always near the places where crops get harvested," Pringle continued.  
Pringle advised elevator operators who have Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) owned grain and who will need space for 1980 crops to request a loading order from the Kansas City Commodity Office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) right away.

Railroads have cars available now, but after August 1 the cars will be needed to haul 1980 crops. Also, ASCS's grain inventory managers in Kansas City need time to process loading orders.  
"Managers must find a place to store CCC-owned grain before they can process an order, and elevators tend to offer less space after August 1," said Pringle.  
During most of July, the managers can process an average order in about two weeks, but when the August rush begins.  
"Move now and avoid the rush," advised Pringle. "CCC foresees that many bushels of corn and wheat may move from the Corn Belt and surrounding states to areas where storage is more available . . . mostly in Texas."

"The census takers did not count any permanent residents in Dimmitt's Labor Camp," Edwards said, adding that he assumes "the city will work some sort of canvas there."

The only other action the city office can make is to check the number of water meter deposits and connections, Edwards said.

He stressed that attempts will be made by the district office to contact those people who did not respond the first time around, but those who did not respond are encouraged to either contact the city office or call the Census Bureau Office in Amarillo at 806-335-1656.

"It's money in their pockets if they report, but they're losing tax dollars by not reporting," Edwards said.

Before the 10 day period allowed ends, a written report will be made to officially contest the figure made by the Census Bureau.

[Continued from Page 1], capacity is for producing the 55% sweetener. The ultimate cost and output of the project will depend on the engineers' findings and recommendations.

Plant Manager George Lamberth, Senior Process Consultant Paul Blanchard and Research Manager Ed Geiger have all been to Japan to meet with the Mitsubishi engineers and observe that company's operating plant which is producing 55% HFCS, Lapins said.

First phase of the modification project will be demolition work—removal of unusable equipment, pouring of new floors, etc.

"This will involve about half a dozen people, and some of our own employees may be doing a lot of this work," Lapins said.

He estimated that the construction force will expand to 30 or so when the major new equipment is installed.

Although Amstar is alloting two years for construction, Lapins said he hopes the project can be completed in 18 months.

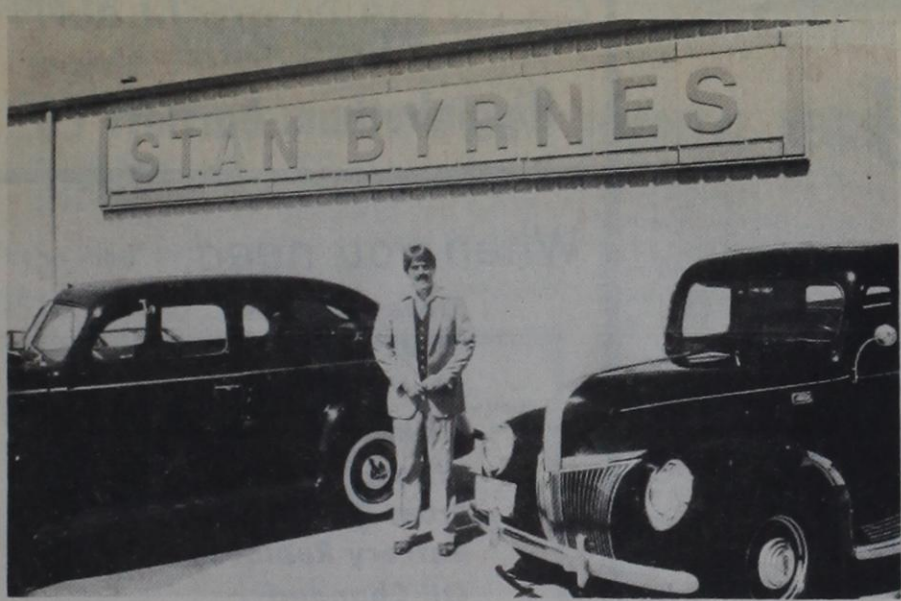

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

July! Half of 1980 is history and we have six months left to accomplish all those New Year's resolutions. Quite a sobering thought, isn't it? Actually, July is a good month for a general review of priorities. This is especially true for people who receive social security checks and who are working. During the first quarter of the year, working beneficiaries reported their previous year's earnings and estimated their 1980 earnings. It may be that a person has earned more or less than he or she expected and this could affect social security checks. The general rule is that a person can receive all checks for the year if earnings do not exceed the annual exempt amount. This year this amount is \$5,000 for people 65 and older, and \$3,720 for people under 65. If earnings exceed the annual exempt amount, the \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the limit. We are able to make adjustments in a person's estimate at almost any time. It is most beneficial if there is a significant variation in the gross (Not net) earnings, because we still have six months to avert possible overpayment or underpayment. Just a couple of reminders, this earnings test applies only to people under 72. Also if this is your first year of retirement, you may be eligible for a check any month you earn less than the monthly limit or do very little work in self-employment. The monthly limit is \$417 for people 65 and over, and \$310 for people under 65. You can report any change in your earnings by calling our toll-free number, 1-800-392-1603. If you have a medicare claim question call 1-800-442-2620. Or if you would like to file a claim call our office collect 293-4371. We will be glad to help you in person, but if a phone call is convenient for you, it can save you time, energy and money.
