


Dimmitt's aldermen plan to report challenge the Census Bureau's preliminary population figure for Dimmitt of

The city board learned Monday night that they have 10 days to contest the figures given on the census report which was received earlier the same day. The population figures are used to determine part of the funding Dimmitt receives through tax revenue sharing and to determine eligibility on grants and loans.

City attorney Jack Edwards told the board that he had tried to mathematically find the same total of residents using the Census Bureau figures and their percentages, but he was unable to substantiate their total of 4836

"I think they are between 250 to 2,000 short," Edwards

Edwards phoned the U.S. Census District Office in Amarillo Tuesday, challenging the preliminary working population figure.

District Office Manager William Soule told Edwards the working figure is low because some people failed to respond and the intentional reluctance of some people [See ALDERMEN, Page 7]



Of the top ten counties Castro maintained 1.5% of the total with 197,000 head. In the number of cattle on feed Castro had 6.5% with 123,000 yead.

Total marketing of cattle and calves for the state was 7 billion lbs. earning \$4.9

Marketing of cattle on feed amounted to 4.4 million head. The largest number of cattle on feed were marketed in January, 1979, with the selling of 470,000 head.

In 1979 there were 157,000 cattle and 13,000 milk cow operations in the state.



'Corn on the ground; wheat in the street; nobody likes it," said Stephen Pringle, the Texas State ASCS Office State Executive Director. "But I do remember some pictures of mountains of grain stacked in the open within the past few years.

'The nation has ample storage space for its crops, but that storage is not always near the places where crops get harvested," Pringle

continued. Pringle advised elevator operators who have Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) owned grain and who will need space for 1980 crops to request a loading order from the Kansas City Commodity Office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) right away.

Railroads have cars available now, but after August 1 the cars will be needed to haul 1980 crops. Also, ASCS's grain inventory managers in Kansas City need time to process loading

'Managers must find a place to store CCC-owned grain before they can process an order, and elevators tend August 1," said Pringle.

During most of July, the managers can process an average order in about two weeks, but when the August rush begins.

'Move now and avoid the advised Pringle. 'CCC forsees that many bushels of corn and wheat may move from the Corn Belt and surrounding states to areas where storage is more available . mostly in Texas.

### Mushrooms are answer for low-calorie diet

By TERESA L. CRISWELL County Extension Agent

Havy you been looking for a low calorie food for the summer? Mushrooms may be a vegetable you haven't thought about. A full pound of mushrooms contains only about 125 calories; a cup of sliced, only about 25 calories.

When shopping for fresh mushrooms look for firm, smooth, fresh appearing. mushrooms. The membrane (veil) underneath the cap may or may not be intact. If it is pulled away from the stem it simply indicates some moisture loss. Such mushrooms are actually preferred in England and Europe because they have more concentrated flavor.

Mushrooms will keep in the refrigerator a week to ten days. However, if they become soft, discolored, and have a slippery surface they are not usable.

Mushrooms come in various colors, but inside they are all pearly white. Flavor and texture are the same.

Refrigerate mushrooms in their original container. Holes for ventilation are provided in the overwrap of packaged mushrooms. If you have bought them loose they may be stored in a paper bag.

Canned mushrooms are available in sliced, stems and pieces, and whole button The label shows drained weight, the exact amount of usable mushroom you are buying. There is no waste.

> **HEARTY MUSHROOM** SUPPER SALAD

- 1 pound fresh mushrooms 1/2 cup salad oil
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon minced garlic
- 12 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground black

On a lettuce-lined platter arrange in clusters, mushrooms, ham, cheese, eggs and tomatoes. Sprinkle with remaining dressing from mushrooms.

STIR-UP 1 pound fresh mushrooms or 2 cans (6 to 8 oz. each) sliced mushrooms

6 tablespoons butter or margarine

1 quart sliced cabbage 1 green pepper, sliced




