**Dr. Powell Is Listed In JCC National Book**

Dr. William J. Powell of Richardson, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Powell of Ranger, is one among six young men, graduates of Ranger Junior College, whose names will appear in the 1965 edition of "Outstanding Young Men of America," a biographical-editorial publication sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Powell entered school in Ranger and graduated from Ranger High School in 1940. He completed two years at RJC in 1942 and received a BA degree from the University of Texas in 1946. He graduated from the University of Texas, Medical Branch in Galveston in 1948 and served his internship at the University of Michigan Hospital.

The Ranger man was with the U. S. Navy's V-12 program in 1942, and is a veteran of three years service with the Navy during World War II. He later served as an instructor of anatomy at the University of Texas, Medical Branch, and for five years as resident physician in general surgery.

In 1952-54, Dr. Powell served with the U. S. Air Force. He is a member of Texas Alpha Chapter of Alpha Omega Alpha, honorary medical fraternity.

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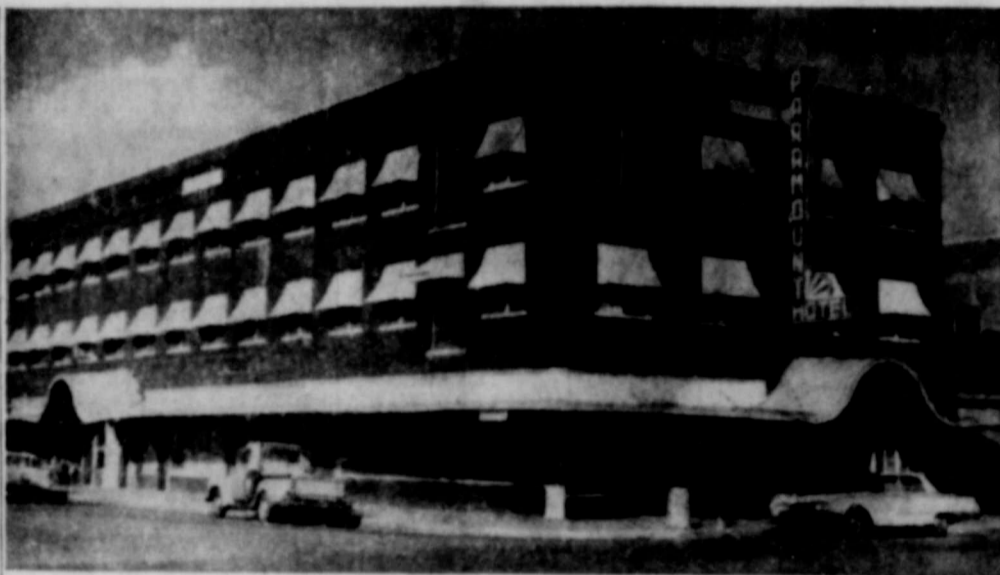

**College Buys Paramount Hotel For Use As Dormitory Facility**

Ranger Junior College has purchased the Paramount Hotel building in downtown Ranger, it was announced Thursday by Roscoe Hopper, president of the institution's board of regents.

The hostelry, a longtime, Ranger landmark, will be used as an auxiliary dormitory for the overflow of students on the RJC campus, according to Dr.

Theodore Nicksick, Jr., president of the college.

Purchase price of the property was not disclosed.

The 50 rooms of the hotel will be utilized for occupancy by married couples and male students. The third floor apartments will be available for wedded students and single men will occupy the rooms on the second floor.

The hotel, closed several months ago, is fully furnished.

Dr. Nicksick said that a hotel-management course will be instituted by the college in the near future with the Paramount to be used as an important training facility.

**Dublin Tops Dogs, 18-6**

Still erring but looking vastly improved, Coach Jack Duval's spirited Ranger High Bulldogs held the highly-rated Dublin Lions — picked to win the 7-AA title — to an 18 to 6 triumph at Bulldog Stadium Friday night.

Players of both clubs were pepped up as a result of the cool front which rolled in prior to the opening kickoff.

Dublin's hard-hitting fullback, 165-pound John Turney was the offensive standout of the night. He was the leading ground-gainer and piled up a total of 133 yards via the terra firma route.

With only three minutes left in the initial quarter, Turney piled over right tackle for the Ranger one-yard stripe for the first tally of the night.

He repeated with another TD plunge from the one in the second quarter and in the final period slashed over from the three-yard line.

One of Dublin's glaring weaknesses was their inability to convert extra points after touchdowns.

Ranger passing, although statistically showing only two completions of 12 attempts, continues to show improvement.

The Bulldogs cashed in their lone score on an aerial with three minutes left in the third quarter. The Maroon & Whites pulled the payoff play from the Dublin 9-yard stripe.

**Ranger Man, Out on Bond, Faces Swindling Charge**

A 41-year-old Ranger man was released under \$500 bond in Fort Worth Thursday after having been jailed in Fort Worth Wednesday on a federal swindling charge.

The Rangerite, in a signed statement to a special agent of the U. S. Secret Service here Tuesday, admitted cutting the ends off a \$5.00 bill and scotch-taping the ends of a \$20.00 bill to the center of the lesser denomination certificate.

In his written confession, witnessed by Ranger Police Chief Bill Ogden, the man admitted passing the fraudulent bill on Friday, Sept. 4, at a local food store in payment for \$3.00 worth of groceries. He was given \$17 in change and a few minutes later the

fraudulent bill was given in change to an elderly Ranger man, also a customer of the grocery firm.

The center section of the original \$20.00 bill — with the numbered ends clipped off but the serial number and other

vital details intact — was given to a local service station in payment for \$1.00 worth of gasoline. The service station attendant gave the man \$19.00 in change.

Sunday the elderly Rangerite who received the altered bill in change contacted Police Chief Ogden. Monday afternoon, following an investigation, Chief Ogden called in the Secret Service.

Special Agent Charles E. Kunkel of Dallas arrived in Ranger and picked up the suspect who lived on a farm near Ranger, at 11 a. m.

He later was released from the Ranger city jail and allowed to spend the night with his family and voluntarily reported to the Federal jail in Fort Worth Wednesday morning.

**Trio Arrested On Break-In Charge Here**

A 31-year-old Fort Worth Negro was charged with breaking and entering Sunday morning following a chain of Fort Worthians as accessories, according to Constable Ralph Veal and Patrolman Bill Bolinger of the Ranger Police Department.

Late Saturday afternoon the two officers were summoned to the Pink House Novelty Shop, Highway 80 east, where Barbara Clay, 31-year-old Negro woman of Fort Worth, was lying unconscious on the floor.

The woman was rushed to Ranger General Hospital where she was revived after brief emergency treatment.

In the meantime, her car, a 1956 Oldsmobile convertible was taken to the Mission Garage for storage.

Saturday night, Lewis broke into the rear of the garage and drove the car out the back door and down the alley.

Two hours later, the woman and her two companions, were apprehended by police officers at Weatherford following a radio pickup order broadcast by Ranger Police Department.

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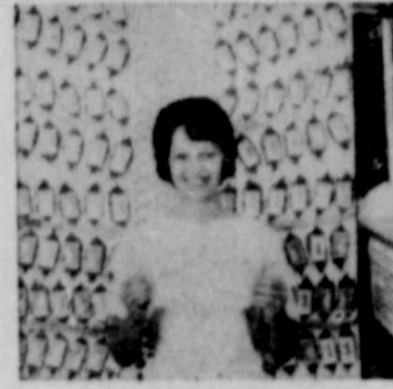

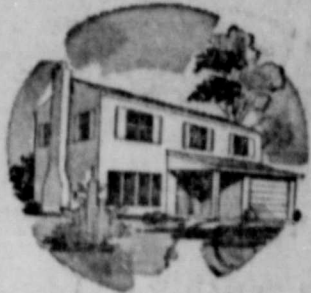

# Ranger Man Will Teach In New Vocational Program

W. A. Robinson, district superintendent for Lone Star Star Producing Company in the Ranger area, will teach a course, "The Charge to a Natural Gasoline Plant," beginning Tuesday, Sept. 15, at Cisco Junior College, according to an announcement by President G. C. Hogue.

This is one of six courses which are included in a series of Natural Gasoline Plant Operations and Technology. The course will be 18 hours in length and will be conducted from 7 to 9 p.m. each evening on Sept. 15, 17, 22, 24, 29, Oct. 1 and 6. Total cost for the course will be \$16. This will include the cost of the manual which will be issued each class member.

The course will be offered by CJC's new technical-vocational division. Meetings will be held in the air conditioned lecture room of the new science building.

## 3 New Engines Are Announced For Evinrude

Individuals who are seeking knowledge in gasoline plant operations for the purpose of improving their possibility for employment are also encouraged to enroll. Specific results for those participating in this study will be a better understanding of complex plant operation, increased confidence by those involved in this work, greater opportunity for promotion, improved safety through a better understanding of plant operation, and a better chance for employment in this type operation by those desiring to enter this field.

Gasoline plant personnel in the Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Breckenridge, Graham and Albany areas are being contacted and advised of the course and given an opportunity to register in advance. If the series is continued to completion, it will require several months of intermittent courses.

This is but one of many programs which the technical-vocational division at CJC plans to offer. Many of the programs will be offered in outlying towns and cities. These programs will be designed to assist those not pursuing a college degree to attain skills and knowledge in a vocation or trade and to improve or upgrade their present skills and knowledges for a better and more secure position in life. Any course will be offered where there is a sufficient number requesting it, Mr. Hogue said.

## McCleskey, Made Rich Overnight By Gusher, Helped Erect His Hotel

Mrs. Charles H. Todd, the former Mary Emma McCleskey came to Ranger from Coryell County, Texas, in 1928. Her father, J. M. McCleskey bought the Culp land which was part of the original Parnell grant. There was nothing on the land except an unfinished one room cabin and a two-room clap-board house.

As soon as possible McCleskey built a neat sturdy house. Flower bordered walks went around the house and on the side was an orchard.

Mrs. Todd saw many changes in Eastland County, the change from ranching to farming, then came the famous McCleskey oil well that changed the country overnight.

Forty-seven years ago—October 17, 1917—Ranger was very quiet, the streets a sea of dust due to the prolonged drought.

The people of the town were quite worried over conditions. Many had moved away, and farmers had sold their land at almost any price. Some had simply abandoned their land. In the late part of the summer a wagon train of Eastland county settlers were camped down by the "Water above in 'Old Mother Cuba Flats at Fort Worth. They were waiting their teams and some stock before traveling back to their old homes.

At this time the great oil excitement was the fact that in August the first well "Nannie Walker" had blown in just a gusher. Gas could not be marketed like oil. It was all the town needed to bring back prosperity, so the "Nannie Walker" was left to spew gas

by day and night.

Soon another well was in the process of drilling, the never-to-be-forgotten McCleskey. The drillers on this job hit the same stratum as in the Nannie Walker. Frank Champion was driller on the afternoon "tower," and Jack Walters was on the morning "tower." The rush of gas was not so great in this well, so they moved the boiler back and went on drilling.

Marston wired Col. Gordon, "Think we have made a mistake. Better quit." Gordon wired "still think we will strike oil," so Warren Wagner, drilling contractor was ordered to continue drilling.

Frank Champion was on afternoon "tower" he had been drilling about one hour and a half, when suddenly there was a faint rumble deep in the earth, rocks were thrown out of the well mouth, drooping back on the derrick floor, then came a spray of "Black Gold," that gained in volume each minute, leaping up until the spray was half way up the old fashioned 8 foot derrick.

Soon after this, the town was startled by a terrible roar, the Nannie Walker had blown itself in. It was a gusher blowing more oil than the McCleskey.

Oil fields have come and gone and will come and go, but there will never be another like the Ranger Oil Field, that almost overnight claim-ed the attention of the world, when Frank Champion and Earl Root, partner, bought the name of the well engine in. McCleskey lived home in his Ford going on fact he could not stop quickly and the

Ford just took the farm gate on with it.

Mr. McCleskey was a brick-mason and an expert stone cutter. He made good wages at his trade and hired Mexicans to clear his farm land. He loved his work as a builder of buildings that would stand the test of time.

He was one of the brick-masons who built the Throckmorton Court House in 1894. By 1906 he had 100 acres in cotton on his farm. Cotton was the big money crop of Eastland County. A picture taken in 1906 shows the main street of Ranger crowded with wagon loads of cotton going to the gins, and loads that had been bailed.

He built an attractive cottage in Ranger, so that he could be close by while the building of the McCleskey hotel was going on. He worked right along with the other brick masons.

The four-story hotel was completed in the spring of 1918. Many famous oil operators, gamblers, writers, artists and politicians signed its register.

Then came the night in 1924 which I well remember. A fire siren was heard amid the roar of guns fired to alert the men of Ranger. Four lost their lives in that fire that started about 3 a. m. One of the men who did rescue work was young Ringold, a nephew of A. E. Ringold. Young Ringold made many trips into the burning building carrying out some one each time until he collapsed.

Mr. Todd's father, John Hill McCleskey was born Sept. 26 in Alabama. He came to Coryell county with his parents when he was sixteen years old. He was a son of John L. and Sarah A. (Sally) Rhoades McCleskey, who was a daughter of a pioneer doctor. She was born Nov. 23, 1859, and died at Ranger.

John Hill McCleskey and wife Sarah are at rest in the historic Merriman Cemetery. Mrs. Todd's grandparents, John and wife Emily are buried in Coryell County.

Mary Emma McCleskey Todd was born Nov. 22, 1876, in Coryell County. Dec. 23, 1894, her marriage to Charles H. Todd was solemnized at the McCleskey home. Mr. Todd was born Jan. 12, 1869 on the land where the town of Dublin now stands. His ancestors came from Ireland to the Carolinas in 1747. Children of Mr. and Mrs. Todd are Willis Wade, Amarillo, and Joe Todd, Ranger. Mrs. Todd's brothers are William and John Tillman born in Coryell County, and Daniel Edward and George Hill born Eastland County. Roy McCleskey of Ranger is a cousin.

George McCleskey, uncle of Mrs. Todd lived on Squaw Creek 5 miles north of Weatherford. He and family lived in the east end of a log cabin and the west end was

headquarters for the Dan Waggoner ranch. In 1873 two Indians were caught in the act of stealing his saddle horse, he shot one, the partner caught the body up on his horse and escaped. Soon after this, George McCleskey was summoned to a trial at Stephenville. As he left the cabin, he turned to give his family some instructions, and an Indian shot him in the back. He died from the wound. Waist high grass concealed the Indian. The cabin was moved to Holland's Lake east of Weatherford, and is a monument to the pioneers. Another uncle, Warren, lived in Parker County. He sold his Dickens County ranch to the Matadors.

Dan Waggoner moved on to Wise County and built a fine home in Decatur which still stands. The Brookes and Waggoner family were friends there. My father, H. H. Brookes, ran the Decatur Democrat at that time.

**ASC Office Ready To Open Winter Legume Crop Plans**

The Eastland County ASCS Office will begin taking applications for winter legume and rye cover crop practices Monday morning, Sept. 1. The cover crop practices are similar to what they have been in the past years.

In making the announcement, Elmer Blackwell, chairman of the County ASC Committee, stated that Federal cost-sharing at 50 per cent of the average cost of seed and fertilizer will be available to

all Eastland County farmers for these practices. The practices are adapted to take care of severe wind erosion, susceptible croplands, and as soil building practices.

Mr. Blackwell stated also that there was a great need for these practices this year due to extreme drought conditions which caused the vegetation cover to be very scarce on much of the county's 167,000 acres of cropland.

Mr. Blackwell said that the Federal cost-share for the rye cover crop practice would be \$1.25 per acre and would be approved in the amount not to exceed a farm's effective peanut allotment for 1964. He added that the winter legume cover crop practice would be available to all other farms in an amount not to exceed 100 acres. Federal cost-share for winter legumes is approximately \$2.55 per acre for Austrian Winter and Dixie Wonder Peas and \$2.30 per acre for vetch including the recommended fertilizer.

Mr. Blackwell emphasized that in order to be eligible for Federal cost-share on these practices, a producer must file a request for Federal cost-sharing prior to starting the practice. Additional instructions and information may be obtained at the County ASCS Office in Eastland.

**Gorman Liquor Election Anticipated For Oct. 10**

Saturday, Oct. 10, is considered most likely date for the election in Gorman at which the legalization of liquor sales will be decided.

The petitions were returned to the county clerk's office Thursday afternoon bearing 138 names. This number had been considered adequate for calling of the election, based on laws pertaining to such election. (In 1960, year used as test in this case, 352 Gorman residents voted, and a fourth of that number is 138.)

However, signatures on the petitions had not been certified by the county clerk Friday afternoon, and aren't expected to be until Monday morning just before the regular monthly county commissioners meet.

The county judge and one commissioner are expected to be absent from the Monday meeting, when Judge Scott Bailey and Commissioner C. B. Dill of Cisco are out of town attending the T&F Railway Co. hearing in Ft. Worth Mon.

If the other three commissioners are present, it will represent a quorum and business can be transacted, however.

Because residences aren't uniformly numbered in Gorman, some question existed as to whether the "addresses" listed on the petitions, which in many cases were "in city limits of Gorman", would be legally qualified. An opinion from the county attorney's office was expected to clarify that matter, it was reported.

If the signatures are qualified as legal voters and if the addresses are accepted as actually being within the corporate limits of Gorman, commissioners are required by law to call the election within 30 days and not less than 20 days, making the 10th of October most likely voting day, it is said.

Proposition to be decided, as spelled out in the petitions, is for or against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only.
