

Rangers Open 1964 Campaign in New Mexico Saturday

Coach Gerald Williams' 1964 edition of the Ranger Junior College Rangers get their initial test of the season at Roswell, N. M., Saturday night when they collide with the New Mexico Military Institute Broncos in a non-conference grid battle.

Kickoff time will be 7:30 p.m. (Mountain Standard Time).

Saturday night's tilt will be the second pigskin clash be-

tween the two colleges. In their only other meeting — back in 1958 — the Rangers, tutored by Coach Tom Heslost, 1 tied record, scored a 47-21 triumph over the Broncos.

The New Mexicans, however, are rated favorites this weekend. They boast more weight and more experience than their Texas foes.

The Purple & White squad — 33 strong — will leave for

Roswell by bus Friday at 8 a.m. Late Friday they'll go through a brief limbering-up session in final preparation for the opener.

"Our chief asset, I believe," Gerald Williams, RJC athletic director and head football coach, "is speed. We'll be trying to work some yardage-gaining plays off the wing-T, and, of course, we're going to need some good work by our forward wall.

"Right now I'll classify our line as average. But our linemen certainly do have a potential and we're hoping they shape up as we think they will as the season progresses," Williams added.

Four other members of the new Texas Junior College Football Federation conference cranked up action last weekend.

Tyler Junior College squeaked by Henderson County (Ath-

ens) Junior College, 18-14, and Kilgore Junior College ground out a 20-6 triumph over Texarkana.

Lettermen of '63 on the defensive unit include Tice, White, Ramirez, and Wiggins. The defending eleven averages 198 pounds per man.

ple & White Warriors to Roswell will be Coach Williams and assistants, Chuck Malone and Ronald Butler, and Tom Griffin, trainer, and Jackie Bridges and Dave Wyatt, managers.

After the contest, the Rangers will shower, dress, dine and depart for Ranger. Coach Williams said they plan to be back on campus around 3 a.m. Sunday.

Bulldogs Favored to Win First Tilt of Season Friday

The Ranger High Bulldogs are favored to notch win No. 1 Friday night at Gorman when they collide with the Gorman High Panthers in a non-conference contest.

Opening kickoff of the skirmish between 10-A Ranger and 1-B Gorman is scheduled for 8 o'clock at Brogdon Field. Several hundred supporters of the Maroon & White Bulldogs are expected to follow the RHS crew to Pantherland.

The Gorman aggregation, tutored by Coach Mike Newby, opened their 1964 campaign on their home field last Friday night, grinding out a 7-0 triumph over the Graham Steers "B" team.

The GHS Red & Blue's win was icey in the first two minutes of the initial period when they drove 60 yards to score on four plays. From the Graham 29, Gary Overstreet, 190-pound Gorman powerhouse, slashed around left end for the tally. The big fullback also booted the extra point.

Injuries have dogged the Panthers. Their No. 1 quarterback, Jerry Ormsby, 130, is sidelined, and Overstreet also has been plagued with an ailment which limited him to only part-time action last week.

The Panthers' freshman quarterback, Doyle Hirst, 150, subbing in for Ormsby, complete 2 of 3 passes during the opener.

County Leaders Adopt 8-Point Program For Industry Progress

An eight-point program to provide new payroll jobs was adopted by a group of Eastland County civic leaders last Saturday as they held an organizational meeting to undertake a new industrial expansion plan that has the blessings of the Texas Industrial Commission.

The meeting was held at

Texas Electric Service Company in Eastland with eight men from the towns of Eastland, Cisco, Gorman and Ranger in attendance, along with County Judge Scott Bailey and Larry Milner, West Texas coordinator for the Texas Industrial Commission.

Ranger's representative at the important Saturday con-

ference in Eastland was Mayor Morris Newnam, committee member.

The Saturday meeting agreed that Eastland County should be considered as one economic unit and that everyone should work together in all things.

During the two-hour session, the committee adopted an 8-

point plan of action, as follows:

1. Bring all county brochures of facts and figures up to date with the help of Mr. Bailey and Mr. Milner.
2. Contact all county businesses and industries to determine their problems and if something can be done to help them.
3. Meet at a place to be announced on Nov. 5 for an all-day session that will be held to brief everyone on the facts and figures at hand and to conduct a leadership training program for a year-long campaign for new jobs.
4. Organize an "EC-45" (Eastland County, 1965) group to be composed of the county's most interested 65 citizens willing to donate their time — and if necessary — some money for the program.
5. Form industrial teams composed of informed people on every segment of the economy, including taxes, transportation, natural resources, insurance, utilities, and so forth.
6. Meet with "Allies," defined by Mr. Milner as men from railroads, banks, utilities, the Small Business Administration, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and others who frequently know where industrial prospects can be found.
7. Attend with some 15 people the Texas Industrial Planning Seminar to be held in Austin in the near future.
8. Plan a program of Advertising and promotion.

Social Security Benefits Offered To Three Groups

"Many people who call at our offices throughout the nation continue to surprise our interviewers by thinking of social security as only a one-way form of income insurance," reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene.

"One caller will know only of the retirement benefits; another the disability program; the next the survivorship payments," Tuley went on.

He added that with the retirement part now being over 27 years old, the survivors portion over 24 years old, and the newest, disability, now in its tenth year, such "single-shot" ideas are much more frequent than should be true.

Tuley furnished the following to summarize the three-way family income protection in the Social Security Act.

1. RETIREMENT. At age 62, early retirement amounts range from 80 to 99 per cent of the basic amount calculated as of age 65. At age 65: no reduction in benefit amount if no payments were made before age 65. At age 72: payment of benefits no matter how high current earnings may be.

2. SURVIVORS. Lump sum death benefit. Monthly payments to children under 18 or

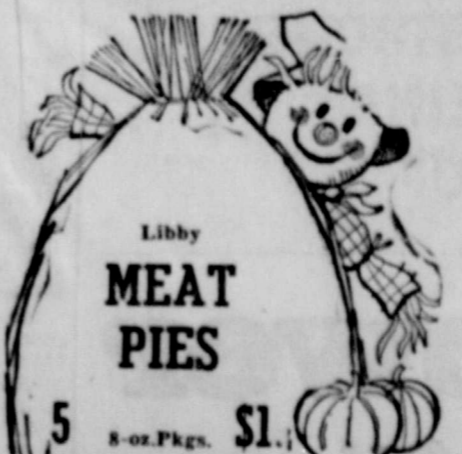

Annual Pecan Orchard Tour Is Planned For Sept. 2th

Six orchards will be visited Community, 10 miles south of Eastland County Pecan Growers Association on Friday, Sept. 25, according to C. E. Smith, Rising Star grower and president of the group.

Starting from the El Rancho Cafe in Ranger at 9 a.m. on the above date the first stop will be at the B. B. Freeman orchard in the Cheaney Community, 10 miles south of that city.

The second scheduled stop will be at the E. A. Walker orchard followed by the orchard of Joe Bob Browning, both south of Gorman.

After lunch and a short business session of the organization at the Brown Jug Cafe in Gorman, the group will inspect the Charley Underwood, the Les Wallace and the C. D. Simmons orchards. All orchards to be visited on the tour are set orchards of paper-shell varieties on deep sandy soils underlain with a red clay subsoil.

All members of the association as well as others interested in the growth and development of the pecan industry in the county and area are invited to participate on the tour.

Purpose of the annual fair, according to County Agent Jim Cooper, is to observe the size and condition of the crop and the nuts in the orchards, learn the fertilizing practices, see the various varieties growing under different conditions, compare spray schedules and dates for insect and disease control, check on the emergence of a population of the pecan weevil.

Deer Hunting Is Set To Open Day Early This Year

AUSTIN — Ranchers in the battle-blitzed big game country have embraced the bonus early opening provision for the fall deer season in regulatory responsibility areas, reports J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Park and Wildlife Department.

The proposal to open the season on Saturday, November 14 rather than the traditional November 16 as provided by state law, got a resounding sanction at the public hearings in early summer.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission, which originally proposed the early opening, promptly acknowledged the support at its next meeting and set the wheels in motion to effect the historic change.

The extra weekend arrangement will be followed in most of the counties where the wildlife resources are managed directly by the Commission.

The 102 counties still under General Law will not be affected by the early opening since the November 16 date is set by law and therefore is unyielding.

Watson said the earlier opening date will not generally affect the usual December 31 closing of the season.

These are two extra days allowed to give the hunters a break and to harvest a greater share of the deer herd which has now grown to saturation proportions in some areas, said Watson.

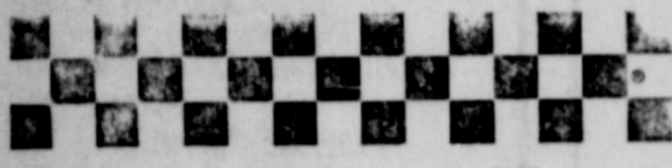

Ranger United Fund Contributions Aid Local Boy Scouting Program

Another youth program in Ranger that benefits from the proceeds of the United Fund is the Scouting program. A total of 135 Ranger boys are serving in the Comanche Trail Council No. 479 Boy Scouts of America which is 8.5 per cent of the 1600 boys serving the council.

Attendance at summer training camp this summer was up 15 per cent above the level of 1963, and 37 per cent of registered Boy Scout members spent at least one week in camp this year.

One of the best measuring devices for the quality of the Scouting program being offered is the number of "rank" advancements qualified for, as boys must participate in good Scouting activities to earn these awards. The council

grants 453 Cub Scout awards, 200 Boy Scout awards, 11 Explorer awards, and 768 Boy Scout merit badges. Included in this number were 17 coveted Eagle Scout Awards. This attainment placed this council 6th among the 35 councils of Region 9 (Texas, Oklahoma, N. Mexico).

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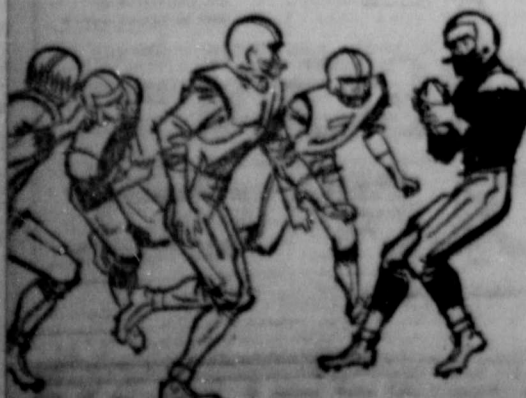

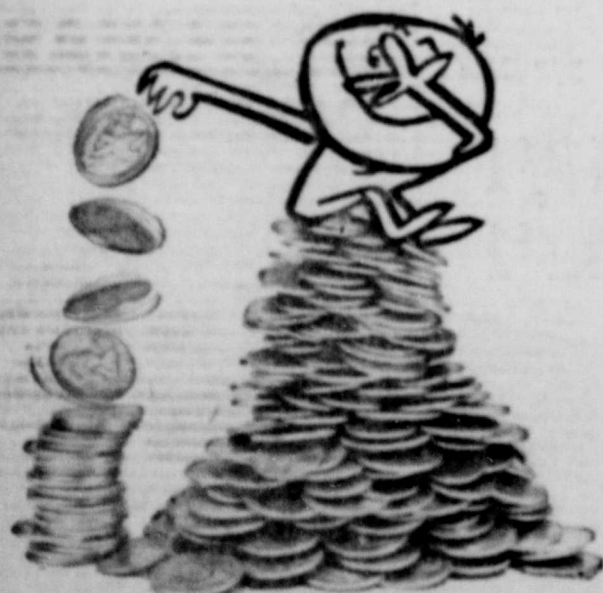

Per Capita Pay Checks Up For Texas Workers

DALLAS—Personal income for the State of Texas rose \$1,782 millions of dollars from 1961 to 1963, from a total of \$19,569 millions in 1961 to \$21,351 millions of dollars in 1963. Major sources of income in 1963 were from Wage and Salary Disbursement \$13,934 millions, Manufacturing \$2,814 millions, Wholesale and Retail Trade \$2,778 millions, Services \$1,469 millions, Government \$2,999 millions, with State and Local Governments accounting for \$1,433 millions, while the Federal Civilian total was \$774 millions. Farm income totalled \$963 millions while Non-farm totalled \$2,077 millions.

Per capita income in Texas rose from \$1,973.00 dollars in 1961 to \$2,068.00 dollars in 1963, according to Harry C. Mayers, Director, Dallas Field Office, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The August 1964 issue of Survey of Current Business published by the Commerce Department's Office of Business Economics, he said, presents data on Personal and Per Capita income by states for 1961, 1962 and 1963.

PILOT INDUSTRY PROJECT BOON TO EASTLAND COUNTY

Eastland County has had the good fortune to be picked as a pilot county for a new industrial development program being instituted by the Texas Industrial Commission.

Gov. John Connally advised County Judge Scott Bailey of the selection late in August, and the first in a series of meetings to develop the program was held at Eastland Tuesday. The second was held there Saturday morning.

The pilot plan is described as "community development program" in which facilities of the individual community and the state will be joined in an effort to provide industrial development, particularly in the smaller cities.

Saturday's session was given to discussing this five-point general program:

1. Coordination of data on each community and the county as a whole.
2. Study organization of a county-wide financing program for industry.
3. Create an industrial sales team for the county.
4. Create a countywide promotional program carried out by a paid staff.
5. Establish local industry.

Harry Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, explained Tuesday that the commission's role would be advisory, leaving the work to local leaders. The value of the commission's advisory function should not, however, be underestimated. It amounts to having expert guidance for free.

Eastland County offers a challenging laboratory for an industrial effort. It has a multiplicity of towns — Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona and Olden — all of which would welcome the diversification that industry would bring.

There already is some small industry in the county with successful records of operation which can be cited. There are junior colleges at Ranger and Cisco which enhance the county's appeal to industries. Lakes Leon and Cisco constitute two good water supplies. All the towns together, and adjacent rural communities, have a trainable labor supply.

This pilot program will not evolve overnight, nor produce results overnight. But it will be watched with interest, both in the immediate area, and statewide. It provides Eastland County with invaluable opportunities for publicity and, more importantly, profitable action.

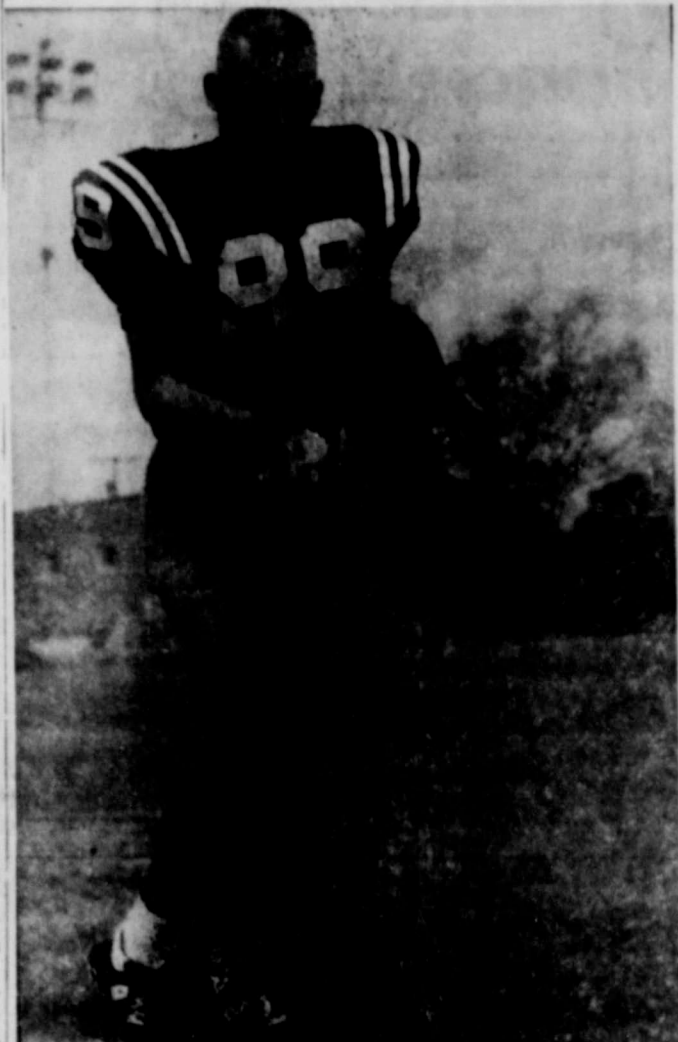
Webb Pierce Is Buried at Gordon On Wednesday

The meeting was held at

Texas Electric Service Company in Eastland with eight men from the towns of Eastland, Cisco, Gorman and Ranger in attendance, along with County Judge Scott Bailey and Larry Milner, West Texas coordinator for the Texas Industrial Commission.

Ranger's representative at the important Saturday conference in Eastland was May-

or Morris Newham, committee member.

The Saturday meeting agreed that Eastland County should be considered as one economic unit and that everyone should work together in all things.

During the two-hour session, the committee adopted an 8-

point plan of action, as follows:

1. Bring all county brochures of facts and figures up to date with the help of Mr. Bailey and Mr. Milner.
2. Contact all county businesses and industries to determine their problems and if something can be done to help them.
3. Meet at a place to be announced on Nov. 5 for an all-day session that will be held to brief everyone on the facts and figures at hand and to conduct a leadership training program for a year-long campaign for new jobs.
4. Organize an "EC-65" (Eastland County, 1965) group to be composed of the county's most interested 65 citizens willing to donate their time — and if necessary — some money for the program.
5. Form industrial teams composed of informed people on every segment of the economy, including taxes, transportation, natural resources, insurance, utilities, and so forth.
6. Meet with "Allies," defined by Mr. Milner as men from railroads, banks, utilities, the Small Business Administration, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and others who frequently know where industrial prospects can be found.
7. Attend with some 15 people the Texas Industrial Planning Seminar to be held in Austin in the near future.
8. Plan a program of Advertising and promotion.

Deer Hunting Is Set To Open Day Early This Year

AUSTIN — Ranchers in the battle-blitzed big game country have embraced the bonus early opening provision for the fall deer season in regulatory responsibility areas, reports J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Park and Wildlife Department.

The proposal to open the season on Saturday, November 14, rather than the traditional November 16 as provided by state law, got a resounding sanction at the public hearings in early summer.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission, which originally proposed the early opener, promptly acknowledged the support at its next meeting and set the wheels in motion to effect the historic change.

The extra weekend arrangement will be followed in most of the counties where the wildlife resources are managed directly by the Commission.

The 102 counties still under General Law will not be affected by the early opener since the November 16 date is set by law and therefore is unyielding.

Watson said the earlier opening date will not generally affect the usual December 31 closing of the season.

"These are two extra days allowed to give the hunters a break and to harvest a greater share of the deer herd which has now grown to saturation proportions in some areas," said Watson.

Ranger United Fund Contributions Aid Local Boy Scouting Program

Another youth program in Ranger that benefits from the proceeds of the United Fund is the Scouting program. A total of 135 Ranger boys are serving in the Comanche Trail Council No. 479 Boy Scouts of America which is 8.5 per cent of the 1600 boys serving the council.

The 1965 budget for the council has been set at \$25,111, with the Ranger budget being \$1400 or 5.5 per cent of the council budget.

The Comanche Trail Council is composed of Eastland, Stephens, Erath, Brown, Comanche, Mills, San Saba and Lampasas counties. Three groups make up the scouting in Ranger. Among the activities of the Council during the past year were the National Jamboree at historic Valley Forge, camporees, swim meets, and Camp Billy Gibbons.

The council provides Camp Billy Gibbons for use as both the summer training camp, and as a year-round facility for the use of all Scout Troops and Explorer units. Attendance at summer training camp this summer was up 15 per cent above the level of 1963, and 37 per cent of registered Boy Scout members spent at least one week in camp this year.

One of the best measuring devices for the quality of the Scouting program being offered is the number of "rank" advancements qualified for, as boys must participate in good Scouting activities to earn these awards. The council

grants 453 Cub Scout awards, 298 Boy Scout awards, 11 Explorer awards, and 768 Boy Scout merit badges. Included in this number were 17 coveted Eagle Scout Awards. This attainment placed this council 6th among the 35 councils of Re-

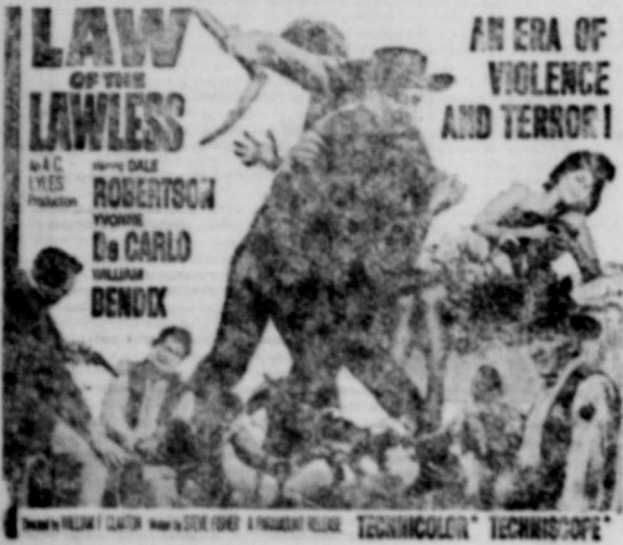

Per Capita Pay Checks Up For Texas Workers

DALLAS—Personal income for the State of Texas rose \$1,782 millions of dollars from 1961 to 1963, from a total of \$19,569 millions in 1961 to \$21,351 millions of dollars in 1963. Major sources of income in 1963 were from Wage and Salary Disbursement \$13,934 millions, Manufacturing \$2,314 millions, Wholesale and Retail Trade \$2,778 millions, Services \$1,489 millions, Government \$2,999 millions, with State and Local Governments accounting for \$1,433 millions, while the Federal Civilian total was \$774 millions. Farm income totalled \$863 millions while Non-farm totalled \$2,077 millions.

Per capita income in Texas rose from \$1,973.00 dollars in 1961 to \$2,068.00 dollars in 1963, according to Harry C. Mayers, Director, Dallas Field Office, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The August 1964 issue of Survey of Current Business published by the Commerce Department's Office of Business Economics, he said, presents data on Personal and Per Capita income by states for 1961, 1962 and 1963.

PILOT INDUSTRY PROJECT BOON TO EASTLAND COUNTY

Eastland County has had the good fortune to be picked as a pilot county for a new industrial development program being instituted by the Texas Industrial Commission.

Gov. John Connally advised County Judge Scott Bailey of the selection late in August, and the first in a series of meetings to develop the program was held at Eastland Tuesday. The second was held there Saturday morning.

The pilot plan is described as "community development program" in which facilities of the individual community and the state will be joined in an effort to provide industrial development, particularly in the smaller cities.

Saturday's session was given to discussing this five-point general program:

1. Coordination of data on each community and the county as a whole.
2. Study organization of a county-wide financing program for industry.
3. Create an industrial sales team for the county.
4. Create a countywide promotional program carried out by a paid staff.
5. Establish local industry.

Harry Clark, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, explained Tuesday that the commission's role would be advisory, leaving the work to local leaders. The value of the commission's advisory function should not, however, be underestimated. It amounts to having expert guidance for free.

Eastland County offers a challenging laboratory for an industrial effort. It has a multiplicity of towns — Janger, Eastland, Cisco, Rising Star, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona and Olden — all of which would welcome the diversification that industry would bring.

There already is some small industry in the county with successful records of operation which can be cited. There are junior colleges at Ranger and Cisco which enhance the county's appeal to industries. Lakes Leon and Cisco constitute two good water supplies. All the towns together, and adjacent rural communities, have a trainable labor supply.

This pilot program will not evolve overnight, nor produce results overnight. But it will be watched with interest, both in the immediate area, and statewide. It provides Eastland County with invaluable opportunities for publicity and, more importantly, profitable action.

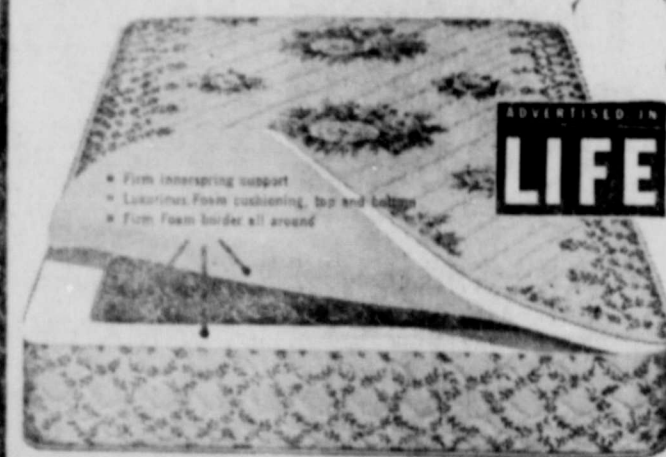
