New Wheat Contract Holds Interest Of Castro County Growers

THOMAS EXPLAINS RULES

WHEAT COMMITTEEMEN ATTEND MEETING AND GET INFORMED ON NEW PLAN

The following men attended a meeting at Plainview in regard to the new wheat reduction program, last Thursday: P.H. Dyer, O.C. Astell, E.C. Burks, E.B. Wright, and E.W. Thomas. Instructions for initial work under the new program were given at the meeting. However the application blanks for the new contract have not yet been received. As soon as these blanks are received the new sign-up, together with educational meetings will be started throughout the county. The program in general is similar to the old program and new contracts will be similar in most respects to the old, however one change of great importance to Castro County was made. This change provides for contracts with one and two year basis, that is land which was sowed to wheat for harvest in 1931 or 1932 for the first time will have as their average acreage the average of the two years and the one year respectively. The allotment on these farms will be two-thirds and one-third respectively of the average estimated production for the one or two year periods. Since Castro County has at least 50,000 acres under wheat contracts the new production will be expected to be in the base years will be expected to be of their production of elevator receipts with one or two years of production will be as high as the average yield. Meetings throughout the county will be mailed to producers as soon as the necessary information is available.

JR. STEPHENS IS BURIED MONDAY

PASSES AWAY EARLY SUNDAY MORNING. GREAT CROWD ATTENDS RITES

Dimmitt and the entire county was deeply saddened early Sunday when Junior Stephens, son of Mayor and Mrs. Ozro Stephens, was taken by the still hand of death and placed in his Father's home in the heavens where pain and suffering shall never be. The climax to a brilliant struggle against complications of bone and blood stream infections came at 6:45 at a Lubbock sanitarium where the young man had been since last Wednesday when his condition was pronounced grave.

Ozro Stephens, Jr., was born February 15, 1921, at Lorenzo, Texas. He moved with his family to Dimmitt in 1930 and this city has been his home until his untimely death at the age of 14 years and 7 months. At the age of eight Junior was converted and joined the Baptist Church to which he has been a faithful member. He found his place to serve and was regular in all phases of the church work, where he will be missed in the Sunday school, B. Y. P. U., R. A. and other church services for it was his delight to attend and participate in the activities of all.

The deceased was one of the most popular students in Dimmitt High School where he was a member of the Sophomore class. A good student scholastically, Junior was also one of the most active in the various activities of the school, being a member of the 1935 Bobcat football team.

The huge crowd which attended the final rites Monday afternoon and the lovely floral offerings that banked the rostrum of the Baptist Church attested to the love and esteem with which the young man was held by the community. WATCH OUT FOR COLDS

The near approach of cold weather reminds us to warn readers against the common colds, that many people think is unavoidable. It is nothing to be lightly dismissed because it leads to serious complications very often.

People catch colds but they can be avoided. Build up your system if it is run down, see your doctor and take advantage of medical science in fighting the cold. If you have been susceptible to them in the past it might be a good idea to secure special treatment from your physician.

Parents should not permit their children to run wild during the time they have cold and should not mingle with other people themselves. If you want others to have your infection, if you wish to disregard the health of others and don't care whether somebody dies from your carelessness then, when you catch a cold, forget all precautions and spray your germs as you go. Otherwise carefully avoid infecting other people.

DO YOUR TRADING AT HOME

The commercial growth of a community depends largely upon the extent of the stocks kept by its merchants. People do not come to a town to buy what the merchants do not sell. No merchant can enlarge his stocks until there is a demand for the goods. Merchandise bought from peddlers fails to create any demand.

Every local citizen should buy everything at home that is possible. Dollars sent away by money orders, or checks, seldom get back to home circulation. The carpenter who buys his tools by mail seldom thinks that a better business for the hardware merchant might mean more building activity. Every man and woman, working for a living in Dimmitt, depends upon the money kept at home for payday prosperity.

OFFENSIVE AGAINST SIN

General Evangeline Booth, of the Salvation Army, has issued a manifesto to the members of her organizations in ninety countries declaring a new offensive against sin throughout the world.

It may be interesting to readers of The News to have a list of the sins that General Booth thinks should be wiped out. Here they are: greed, hypocrisy, immorality, gambling, blasphemy, malice, hatred, murders, thefts, cant, jealousy, cowardice, fashion, pride, conceit, selfishness and lying.

WAR DRAWS CLOSER

The actual outbreak of war between Italy and Ethiopia will shortly take place. The Italian preparations, consisting of the transportation of men and supplies, have been going on recently at quickening pace.

The attitude of the Italian Dictator, Mussolini, to avoid the war has been quite positive and followed so far with no serious obstacle from the other nations. Il Duce does not hesitate to declare a firm decision to occupy Ethiopian country, regardless of opposition.

The League of Nations is considering the situation and taking very deliberate action. Many observers believe, however, that the actual outbreak of war will cause the League to definitely set in motion other steps to restrain the Italians. The League, however is handicapped by the fact that the large powers are divided as to what should be done.

The prospects of trouble between Italy and Great Britain are somewhat alarming. The British are not apt to view with favor the establishment of a powerful Italian naval and military base East of the Suez, in a position to interfere with British trade to India and the Orient. When the British began strengthening their forces in the Mediterranean the reply of the Italians was to concentrate submarines and airplanes opposite Malta.

British prestige has been challenged by the unilateral act of Italy. It may not come immediately but sooner or later the British will see to it that the world understands that the British Navy intends to predominate in the Mediterranean and over the Indian trade routes.

CONSTITUTION DAY

Perhaps there has never been another time in the history of the United States when it was so necessary for Americans to assert their faith in the Constitution. That bulwark of our hope and strength as a nation needs to know its friends. It is time for its supporters to come forth unafraid, to stand solidly aligned in the name of freedom, justice, and liberty.

It is wholly fitting that during this week of Constitution Day—Tuesday, September 17—we should rededicate ourselves to upholding the Constitution. Enemies scoff at it, ridicule it, and would destroy it. Destruction of this Magna Charta of our democracy would doom the people to the servile state that we see in practically every nation outside the United States. American want no part of that . . . they paid too dearly for their liberty. Take heed, then, Americans, and defend your Constitution!

Let this, the American's Creed, be our solemn prayer on Constitution Day: I believe in the United States of America as a Government of the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a democracy in a republic; a sovereign nation of many sovereign states; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it; TO SUPPORT ITS CONSTITUTION; to obey its laws, to respect its flag; and to defend it against all enemies.
