District Judge Expected To Be Appointed This Week

Gov. John Connally is expected to appoint a judge soon to serve as magistrate of 91st District Court to serve until a special election can be held to fill the vacancy left by the recent death of Judge T. M. Collie.

The appointment is expected this week and veteran Eastland attorney Frank Sparks is considered most likely to receive the governor's appointment.

Judge Collie, who was re-elected to another four-year term this year, died Sunday morning and was buried in Eastland Monday afternoon. He was finishing his third term as presiding officer of the local court.

The County Bar Association met Monday morning, elected officers and a resolution committee was appointed to draft an official resolution from the body in honor of the late Judge

Collie. Virgil Seaberry, Eastland attorney, is chairman and reports that the resolution will probably be released this week.

Bill Hart was elected president and Jack Frost, secretary-treasurer. Both are of Eastland.

Texas election statutes provide that a special election should be called to fill the vacancy because Judge Collie, though duly elected, had not been formally qualified by swearing in, administered at the beginning of each term by a member of the Court of Civil Appeals. Had Judge Collie died after having been sworn in for the new term, it is assumed that the gubernatorial appointment would not have been until the next general election, which will be in 1966.

The consensus in the county appears to be that it would be well for the vacancy to be filled as soon as possible, because the state legislature will convene in January and state-wide redistricting is considered to be a prime subject. The location of the 91st District Court in Eastland County is important not only to the general public it serves, but also to members of the bar throughout the area.

Judge E. H. Griffin of Graham, administrative judge for this the Eighth Judicial District, was in Eastland this week on the 91st bench hearing several scheduled non-contested cases.

This district includes Cooke, Denton, Montague, Clay, Wichita, Archer, Jack, Wise, Young, Stephens, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Palo Pinto, Parker and Tarrant.

DISTRICT JUDGE T. M. COLLIE BURIED IN EASTLAND RITES

Funeral services for District Judge Turner Morris Collie 65, were held at 3:30 p. m. Monday in the Eastland Methodist Church, with burial in Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Arrington-Hammer Funeral Home.

Judge Collie died in Eastland Memorial Hospital at 5:15 a. m. Sunday, after being hospitalized for several days. He had been judge of the 91st District Court for the past 12 years and had been elected to another four-year term in the last election.

Judge Collie was elected to the state Legislature from Eastland County in 1946 and served three terms. He had also served as county clerk in Eastland.

Born March 2, 1899, in Cisco, he attended high school in Gorman and married the former Zula Overby of Eastland. He was a graduate of the Cumberland Law School in Cumberland, Tenn.

The veteran district judge was a member of the Eastland Methodist Church and was a former teacher of the Men's Bible Class. He was also a former scoutmaster for Eastland Boy Scout Troop 103. Judge Collie had membership in the Texas Bar Association, the American Bar Association, Eastland Masonic Lodge, of which he served as master knights of Pythias and the State Judges Association.

Survivors are his wife; one son, the Rev. Robert Morris Collie of Kentwood, La.; one granddaughter; two brothers, W. M. and W. B. Collie, both of Dallas; and four sisters, Mrs. T. F. Morrow, Mrs. J. E. Walker, and Mrs. Don Rogers, all of Gorman, and Mrs. T. J. Haley of Eastland.

Members of the County Bar Association were honorary pallbearers.

The resolution said in part: "... on Dec. 13, 1964, the State of Texas and the County of Eastland lost one of its most beloved and distinguished citizens in the passing of Judge Turner M. Collie... during his long and distinguished career of public service, he (Judge Collie) served as Eastland County Clerk, representative of Eastland County as a member of the Texas House of Representatives for three terms and at the time of his passing was presiding judge of the 91st Judicial District of Texas..."

The resolution, to be sent to Mrs. Collie, was signed by the four county commissioners and the county judge.

Top Orchard Men Attend Annual Pecan Show; Results Announced

Five of the top horticulturists of the state attended the 12th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show at Ranger Saturday, according to C. E. Smith, Rising Star, president of the County Pecan Growers organization.

They included L. D. Romberg and George Madden U. S. Peon Field Station, Brownwood, Romberg who has spent a large part of his adult life in pecan research is credited with the development of such varieties as the Co-

manche, Choctaw, Wichita and Apache that are now so popular with growers.

Other horticulturists include E. G. Hancock of the Agricultural Extension Service of Benton Storey also of A&M. Hancock was one of the original judges of the county show when it began in 1952 in Cisco. His work is principally with county agents on pecan culture and management.

Dr. Storey, a professor in the horticultural department at A&M is also Secretary-Treasurer of the Texas Pecan Grower Association.

The tough was no tough at all, nor was he a burglar. He's Mr. George Westfall of Abilene, owner and associate

trainer of Sabre and other police dogs.

The Westfalls and their trainer, Jane Turner were guests of the association, and appeared in Eastland through arrangements made by Dan Nowlin, Highway Patrol Safety Officer of Abilene.

After the monthly meeting and dinner at the Village Hotel Coffee Shop, the some 20 members and guests went to the courthouse lawn for the demonstration. Miss Turner took Sabre in an auto and Mr. Westfall went to the courthouse lower window to "break in." On command from his trainer, the dog bounded from the auto and pinned the man.

Such a trained dog would cost some \$700, the officers were told, and although there doesn't appear to be any full-time need for such a police aid in Eastland County at this time, it was learned that the dogs can be rented for special needs such as man hunts, etc. The association will meet next in Cisco.

City Master Development Project Pending Approval Of Federal HHFA Agency

The Abilene planning consulting firm of Bruce Clark & Associates has been notified of its selection to do a comprehensive master plan for the City of Ranger, Mayor

Work on the project probably won't get under way for several months, Mayor Newnham said. Approval of the \$15,000 master development plan, \$10,000 of the cost of which is to be paid by state and federal funds, is being awaited from the Housing, Home and Finance Administration of the federal government.

The Abilene firm, according to Bruce Clark, owner, will work on the project in association with Hennington Durham & Richardson, Inc., consulting engineers, Dallas.

The extensive study is expected to take about a year to complete and will include economic surveys, land use, major thoroughfares, zoning, and subdivision regulations.

"A master plan is one good sign of advancement and progress for a city," Clark said. He formerly was planning director for the City of Abilene prior to resigning about a year ago to establish the private planning consultant firm there.

Postmaster Suggests Special Mailing For Christmas Delivery

"It's too early to mail early, so please mail now," Postmaster Max Ohr said today.

"The biggest mail explosion in history is upon us and we need the cooperation of everyone to make sure that the holiday mail is all delivered before Christmas," the Ranger Postmaster said.

Mr. Ohr suggested the use of air mail and special delivery to guarantee pre-Christmas delivery, especially for out-of-town mail.

In all instances, the use of ZIP Codes will be helpful. The codes generally mean that mail moves in a more direct

route and is handed fewer times. Parcels with ZIPPED addresses may be delivered 24 hours or more before others going to the same destination which do not include the five digit code.

Postmaster Ohr announced that all postal operations will be on a holiday schedule Christmas Day. Only special delivery mail will be delivered on December 25.

Mr. Ohr thanked all the citizens of Ranger who cooperated in the "Shop and Mail Early" campaign. However there still is a small mountain of holiday mail which must be delivered, he said.

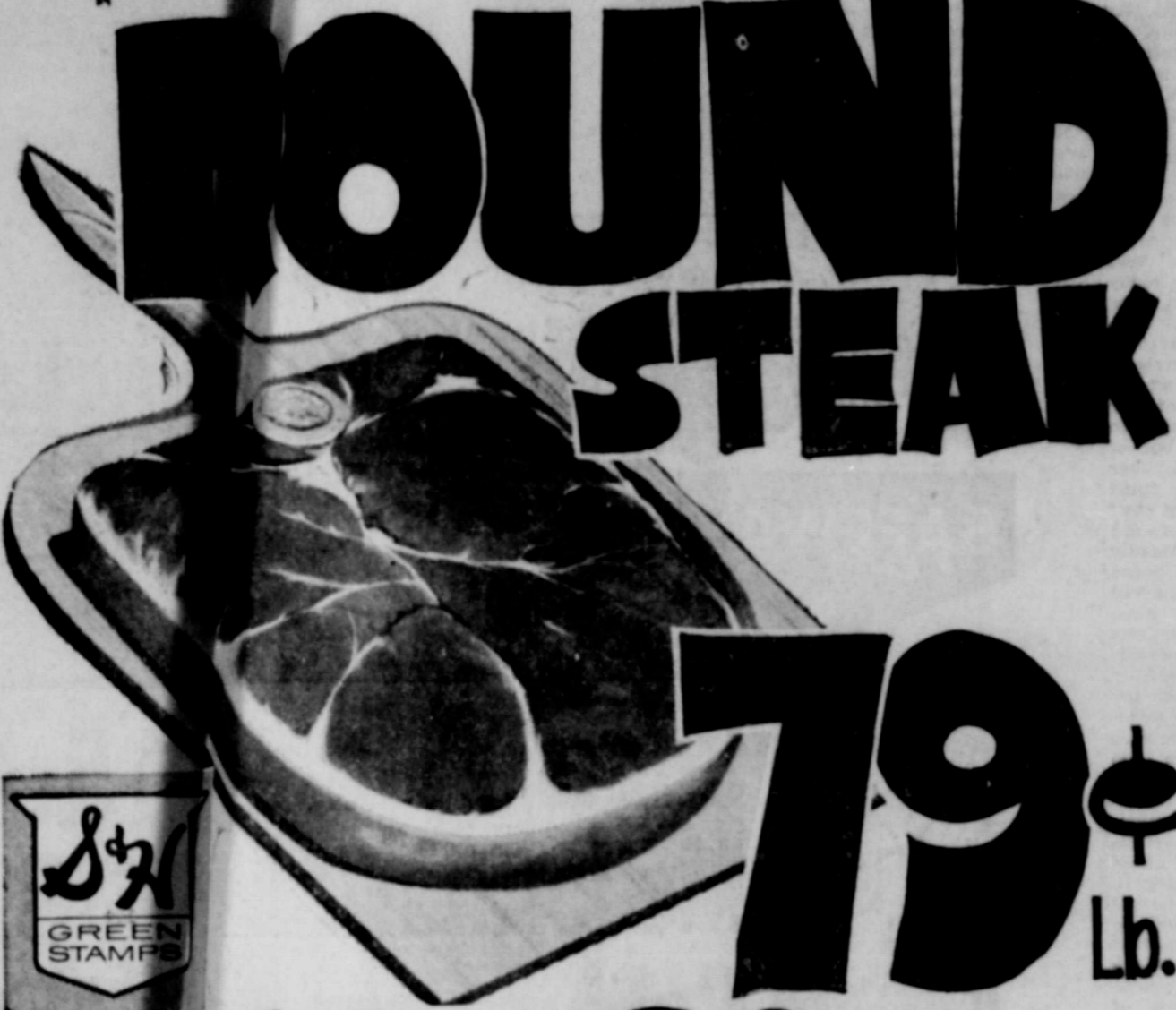

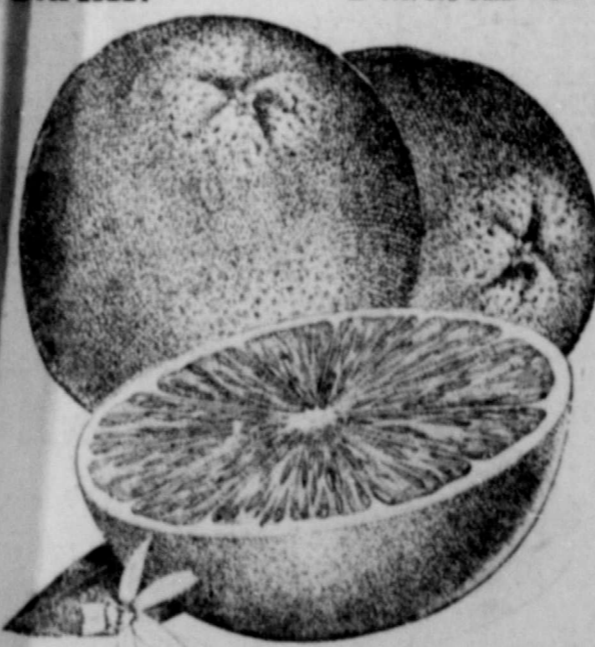

VETS QUESTIONS & ANSWERS
Q — I pay premiums on my GI insurance quarterly, and I am concerned because I have not received my premium due notice. I feel uneasy about waiting any longer to make this payment. Should I wait until I receive this notice?
A — By all means pay your premiums when they become due, even if you do not receive the premium due notice. Remember you have a 31-day grace period from the due date. Be certain to include your policy number with your remittance.

Q — My father is permanently and totally disabled due to service-connected causes. How can I obtain educational or training benefits?
A — Make application to the VA Regional Office and attach the service papers which identify your veteran parent and your own birth certificate. If according to the laws of your state, you are considered to be a minor, your parent should also sign your application.

Q — What evidence of payment of just debts or expenses of last illness and burial should the widow send VA?
A — The widow's certified statement showing the nature, amount, date and person or firm to whom such payments were made will be accepted as evidence of payment unless records later received raise doubt as to the validity of her statement.

Q — My husband died as a result of injuries received in World War II. He obtained a GI loan during his lifetime, which is now paid off. Am I as his widow, also eligible for a loan?
A — Yes. Any widow of a World War II or Korean Conflict veteran may be eligible for a GI loan if the husband's death was service-connected. The fact that the veteran may have obtained a loan does not affect the widow's eligibility.

Q — I am a peacetime veteran with service-connected injuries from an auto accident. I have loss of use of my left limb. Am I eligible for the VA allowance of \$1,600 toward the purchase of an automobile?
A — No. This benefit is provided for war time veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict periods.

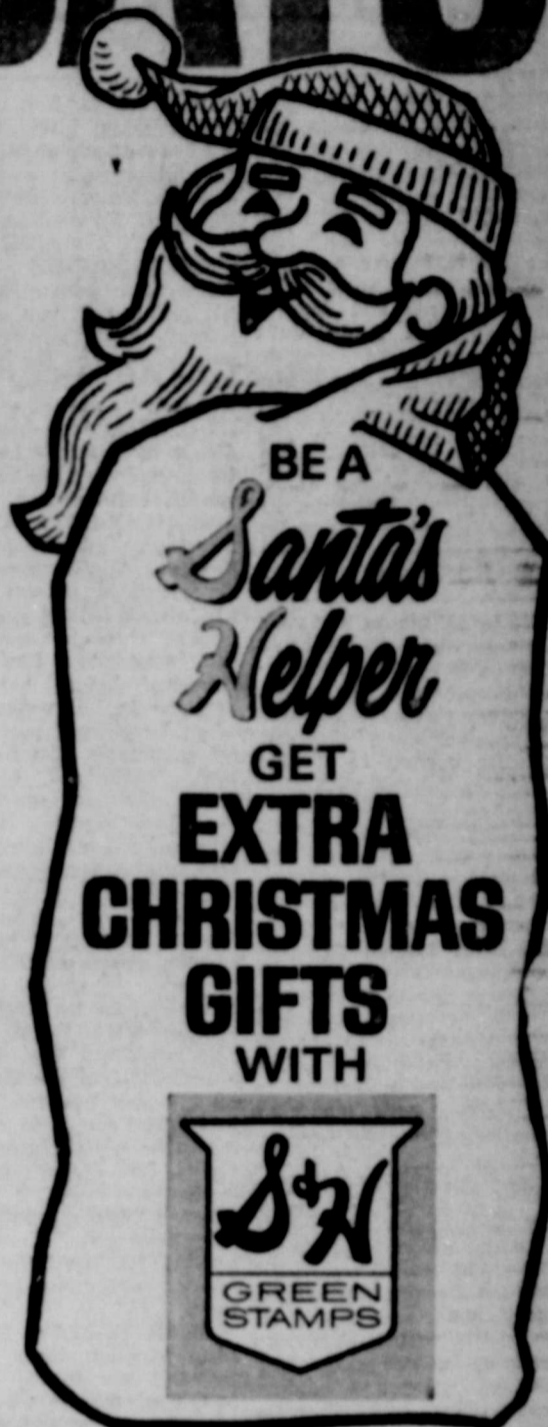

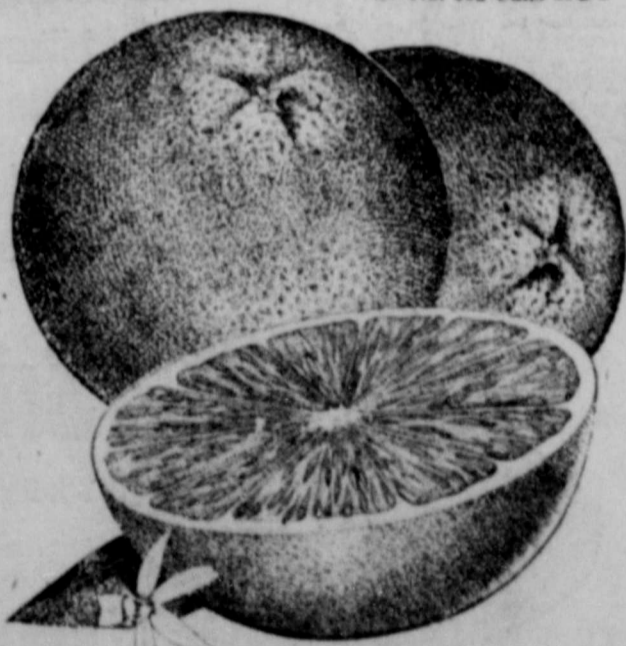

VETS QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q — I pay premiums on my GI insurance—quarterly, and I am concerned because I have not received my premium due notice. I feel uneasy about waiting any longer to make this payment. Should I wait until I receive this notice?

A — By all means pay your premiums when they become due, even if you do not receive the premium due notice. Remember you have a 31-day grace period from the due date. Be certain to include your policy number with your remittance.

Q — My father is permanently and totally disabled due to service-connected causes. How can I obtain educational or training benefits?

A — Make application to the VA Regional Office and attach the service papers which identify your veteran parent and your own birth certificate. If according to the laws of your state, you are considered to be a minor, your parent should also sign your application.

Q — What evidence of payment of just debts or expenses of last illness and burial should the widow send VA?

A — The widow's certified statement showing the nature, amount, date and person or firm to whom such payments were made will be accepted as evidence of payment unless records later received raise doubt as to the validity of her statement.

Holiday Tables Due Plenty Of Good Foods

COLLEGE STATION — Holiday tables will reflect the abundance of food so obvious this Christmas month.

Eight items are especially plentiful. They make up the U. S. Department of Agriculture's December list of plentiful foods, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Turkeys and peanuts, including peanut products like peanut butter, head the list. Also designated plentiful by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, this month, are apples, red tart cherries, cranberries, canned ripe olives, broiler-fryers and beef.

Turkey marketings are expected to run about 6 per cent larger than last year. In early November, farm prices were running 1-1/2 to 3-1/4 cents a pound lower than a year earlier. Marketings of beef and broiler-fryers will continue large, to provide a wide choice of meat entrees.

With current peanut crop estimates at 2.1 billion pounds, it looks like an abundance of these munching favorites. That estimate is 6 percent

larger than in 1963 and 25 per cent above average. Apples will continue plentiful as the harvest is estimated at 141 million bushels, the most since 1937.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I am a member of the police force, and I find that there are some restrictions in commercial life insurance policies because of this. Is this true also of my GI life insurance?

A — The restrictions you mention are those imposed because law enforcement is considered a hazardous occupation. There are no such restriction on GI insurance. The veteran may engage in any occupation, no matter how hazardous, without effect on the terms of the policy.

Q — My \$5,000 U. S. Government Life Insurance is now paid up. However, my wife has just died. I have over a thousand dollars in bills, and twice as much insurance as I need. Can I change my insurance to meet this situation?

A — Yes. You may borrow against your insurance, or you may cash in part of it, retaining the amount of protection you consider necessary. Your beneficiary designation probably should be revised, too.

Q — What assistance can the VA give me in locating my husband who is receiving compensation?

A — The VA may forward mail to veterans. However, the VA is obligated to keep information concerning a veteran confidential and an address may not be revealed without the veteran's consent. Letters sent to the VA to be forwarded should be placed in an unsealed envelope and mailed to the VA Regional Office last known to have handled the veteran's claim.

53 Share \$8,500 As Cornelius Holiday Bonus

Christmas bonuses totaling \$8,500 were distributed Thursday by Victor Cornelius to the 53 employees of his theatrical advertising and menu printing firm. This marked the 20th year for the bonus presentation.

Now in its 29th year, the Cornelius firm has, in the past year, rapidly expanded its menu department.

In his desire to please the variety of requirements of throughout the nation, Cornelius has designed and developed a unique heat-seal machine, has installed a gold-leaf press for printing in gold on leather-like paper, and has purchased additional presses.

The business building itself is at present undergoing the addition of 2100 square feet. The additional space is required to house the expanded printing and art departments.

The heat-seal machine, for which Cornelius has made patent application, was created because of the large number of restaurant owners who desired colored foot pictures on the insides of their menus and who had definite ideas about how the pictures should be arranged. For most, the cost of custom-order, four-color process printing was prohibitive.

The new machine places die-cut pictures in any arrangement on the menu and heat-seals them in place. Later, a laminating process gives the menu page a finished, slightly-embossed appearance.

Some of the most attractive menus now being produced by the firm are those printed in gold on heavy, leather-like paper with parchment inserts, tied with tasseled cords.

Printing on these covers is accomplished with tons of pressure exerted upon tissue-thin gold-leaf coated paper through the newly-acquired machine.

Three new automatic presses have been installed during the past year and a fourth will be delivered within the month.

Is it true that cherries help arthritis... that honey prevents muscle cramps, a stuffy-nose and bed wetting?

These are examples of food facts, fallacies and myths present today—even in such scientific and sophisticated times as the nuclear age.

The old notions that fish and celery are "brain foods," or that oysters increase fertility are harmless. But when garlic pills are promoted for high blood pressure, or grapes for the treatment of ulcers and cancer, the price of ignorance may come high.

Claims may range from a specific food being a "cure-all" to the myth of overprocessing modern-day foods. Health authorities are especially concerned about the promotion of "food supplements" as cure-alls for conditions which require medical attention. Although a quack food remedy may not cause harm itself, the delay in securing proper medical attention could be serious, or perhaps even fatal.

Beware any product — food or patent medicine — advertised as a cure-all, whether you hear about it in an advertisement, from a door-to-door salesman, over the back fence, or in a book.

Be skeptical if you hear or read the myth of modern-day overprocessing of food. This claim is usually followed up by a sale pitch for a food supplement or special cooking utensils sold at greatly inflated prices.

The fact is, that modern food processing methods have been devised to preserve nutritional value or to restore them to food. For example, most fruits and vegetables are canned or frozen at the peak of nutritional perfection. And such products as flour, bread, milk and oleomargarine are normally fortified or restored with vitamins and minerals. Whatever the health quacks or faddists say, the truth of

the matter is that we Americans today have a bigger supply of food, a larger variety of choice and more nutritional value in the food we eat than ever before. By patronizing all departments of a modern food store we can easily supply all our nutritional needs.

Eat cherries and honey — or whatever you like — along with a balanced diet, but don't expect miracles.
