### Voters favor Gephardt, Bush Smith outpolls Snitker in Pct. 1 Harold Smith, Hart vegetable How we voted grower - processor, outpolled Precinct 1 County Commissioner Curtis Snitker 191-170 in the local Here are Castro County's final, highlight race of the Democratic

Primary Tuesday. Smith will face Republican L. C. McLain for the Precinct 1 post in the November general election.

Republican voters here joined the "Bushwagon" by giving Vice-President George Bush a clear majority of their votes over five other candidates in the presidential preference primary. Bush carried every state participating in the "Super Tuesday" GOP primary.

But local Democrats bucked the state trend in the presidential sweepstakes. Although Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis led the 11-man field statewide, local Democrats gave more votes to Missouri Congressman Dick Gephardt and Tennessee Sen. Al Gore. Jesse Jackson ran a strong third statewide

but polled fourth here. Mel Phillips led the three-person

### The tradition resumes.

Three years ago the Nazareth Swiftettes walked away from the Frank Erwin Center in Austin as Conference A state basketball champions.

Nazareth's five seniors on the 1988 team were just freshmen then -freshmen with dreams of continuing Nazareth's winning tradition as they progressed through their high school careers.

It took three trys, but their dreams were finally realized this year when they walked out onto the floor in the Erwin Center and captured their ninth state title with a 64-28 win over LaRue LaPoyner.

Seniors Traci Hill and Missy Brockman were on the 1985 championship team and have waited for another title for the past three years.

"Wasn't that great? I liked it!," Hill said following the Swiftettes victory. "This is what we've been playing for, for so long. This year is a lot more special to me than my ly feel like I was a factor in the game then," she said.

A 28-year-old Amarillo man was killed Wednesday when the 1982 Cadillac he was driving was struck by a 1987 Lincoln driven by Jose Torres of Hart.

The accident occurred Wednesday south of Hart on FM 168.

According to accident reports, the Cadillac was southbound on FM 168 when the Lincoln, traveling north on the same road, skidded out of control. The Cadillac also slid out of control as Reed sought to avoid a collision.

# HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income-such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer: You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

 By filing a special type of rendition called a report of decreased value, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.



The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.









points seemed small in comparison with Nazareth's 20. As the game progressed, the Swiftettes increased the margin and after two quarters, they held a 35-19 lead.


