file tax renditions

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A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

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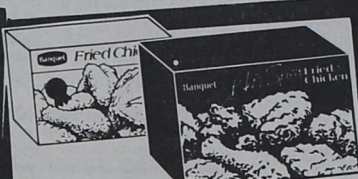
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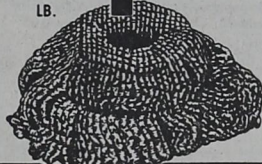

Extension Service to hold child care seminar

Across the Texas South Plains, obtaining child care outside the home is a daily necessity for thousands of families and the need is present in rural as well as urban communities, said a home economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To help persons operating child care facilities, those caring for a few youngsters in their homes, or those thinking about providing such service as a means of earning extra income, the Extension service will conduct a one-day professional conference in Lubbock on March 26.

The conference will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center just north of Lubbock International Airport. The center is on FM 1294, just east of I-17 at the Shallowater exit. Training is from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Registration is \$7.50 and includes lunch. Reservations must be made by today, (Thursday) with any county Extension home economics agent in the South Plains Extension District which includes Bailey, Borden, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Gaines, Garza,

Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Scurry, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum counties.

Training will include questions and answers on licensing and practical sessions on marketing the business, scheduling a child's day, arts and crafts for children, resources to make the job easier, record keeping, discipline, communication, conflict management, cooking with kids, looking great and feeling terrific, and the balancing act of keeping kids in your home. A refresher course on cardiopulmonary resuscitation will also be offered.

Providing the instructions will be Extension home economists, staff members of the Texas Department of Human Services, Lubbock Health Department, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, South Plains Association for the Education of Young Children and several experienced child care providers.

"Around the Lubbock area and in many of counties, Somewhere around 40 to 45% of mothers who have children under the age of six are working outside the home," said Dr. Catherine Crawford, Extension director for home economics in 20 South Plains counties.

"I think a lot of it is because of the economy," she said. She said that many mothers are working to maintain a style and level of living to which the family is accustomed.

"The other thing, though," Crawford said, "is that a large number of

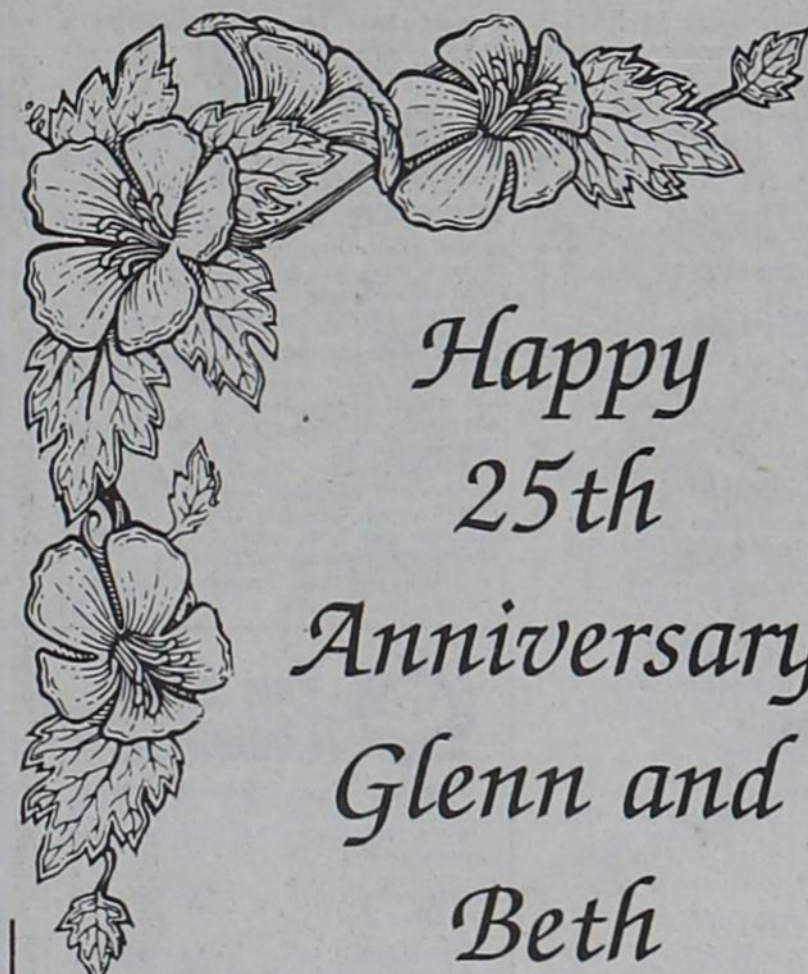
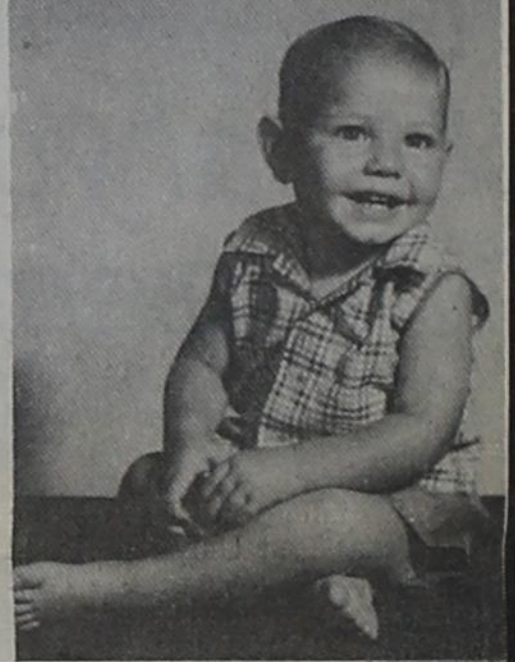
these mothers don't have a husband present. So a lot of these children that are being cared far away from home are children of single-parent households."

The child care provider can be a very important person in the development and life of each child under their supervision, she said.

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Dimmitt firm wins research grant

Al-Chem Fuels, Inc., of Dimmitt, was one of 17 small hi-tech firms in Texas awarded Small Business Innovation Research grants in fiscal year 1987.

Don Ethington, president of Al-Chem Fuels, Inc., states that the corporation received the \$50,000

grant because of the technical efforts of Dr. Richard Tock and Dr. Harry Parker, both professors in the Chemical Engineering Department at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. The grant supported the preliminary development of the Al-Chem De-Toxifier, a small scale

plant for electro-thermally processing liquid hazardous wastes.

Patents have been secured and the corporation is awaiting state and federal permits to become operational.

Fiscal Year 1987 Small Business Innovation Research awards to

small businesses for research and development totaled about \$400 million.

The US Small Business Administration coordinates and supervises the Small Business Innovation Research program through which federal agencies direct a fixed percentage of their research and development contracts to small companies. In this way, over \$1 billion has been awarded during the first five years of the program. The program is designed to encourage scientific and technological innovation, development and application.

Phase I awards support research that determines the scientific or technical merit of a project. Phase II awards fund development of the innovation, and Phase III awards

help bring the idea, product or technology into commercial production.

Federal agencies participating in the Small Business Innovation Research program are the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce,

Education, Energy, Health and Human Services, and Transportation; Environmental Protection Agency; National Aeronautics and Space Administration; National Science Foundation; and Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Absentee voting to begin on proposed annexation

Castro County voters may cast absentee ballots beginning Monday through March 29 to ratify the annexation of a portion of eastern Crosby County into the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

The proposed Crosby County addition includes portions of County Commissioners Precincts 1, 2 and 4

located above the Caprock. The western precinct of Crosby County above the Caprock joined the Water District in April, 1969.

Absentee ballots may be cast during normal business hours at the High Plains Water District Office, 200 Jones in Dimmitt. Dolores Baldrige is the election clerk.

Residents of the Crosby County

annexation area will be asked to approve a maximum tax rate of .05 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, even though the current Water District rate is .007 cents per \$100 valuation. This will provide the same maximum tax rate previously approved by residents of the Water District in 1951. The annual tax rate is set by the Water District's board of directors and levied uniformly throughout the District.

The Water District board called the elections after receiving petitions and hearing testimony from Crosby County landowners in January and February.

Separate elections for the proposed annexation area and for the 15-county area presently served by the Water District are required by the Texas Water Code. A majority vote favoring the annexation in both elections is required before the proposed area can be added to the Water District.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election and review and answer questions about recent and planned PCG activities.

Livestock entries in general were ahead of the previous year with the show posting an overall increase of 7% with over 16,000 head being shown in various animal breeds.

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
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Cats earn Austin trip by a point

The Bobcats had to overcome a lot of adversity before capturing their fifth Region I-AAA championship in six years with a 66-65 victory over the Brownfield Cubs.

It started Friday night, after the Bobcats' 75-50 win over Lampasas in the late game of the regional semifinals.

They didn't get to their motel until after 11 p.m., and after Coach Ken Cleveland handed out the keys, they learned their room reservations had been fouled up. The number of beds and couches per room weren't the same as they had reserved, and one quartet of boys unlocked their room to find a woman sleeping inside.

"We ended up having a team meeting at 1 a.m. because of the motel reservation foul-ups," Cleveland said. "The kids finally got to bed and to sleep sometime after 1, and I think one or two of them ended up sleeping on the floor."

Physical adversity cropped up, too. Warren McDonald had tendonitis and played the championship game with a knee brace. Jim Nelson twisted an ankle in the second

quarter and played the second half with a bad limp and a lot of pain. Jeremy Warren, one of the Bobcats' main players in the stretch, was ejected from the game early in the fourth quarter, along with Brownfield reserve Tim Hope, after a shoving incident.

But they survived, and on the strength of a single point they earned their trip back to Austin.

For the Cubs, a classy run-and-gun team, getting to and through the regional finals wasn't easy, either.

After a come-from-behind 89-85 victory over Littlefield in the area championship game three nights earlier, the Cubs downed the state's No. 2-ranked team, Marlin, 70-67, in an exhausting double-overtime thriller in Friday night's regional semis. Their next assignment: take on the state's No. 1-ranked team Saturday morning.

"It was a tough 24 hours," Cub Coach Ron Holmes commented.

It was just a basket tougher than the Cubs could muster.

Except for Jeremy Warren's game-opening layup, the Bobcats

trailed the Cubs throughout the first period until Mat Bradley sank a jumper at the buzzer to give Dimmitt an 18-17 advantage.

The Cats pulled away in the second by as many as 11 points, 34-23, but the Cubs closed the quarter with an 8-2 rally and it was 36-31 at halftime.

Dimmitt kept the lead throughout the third, but no more than three baskets ever separated the two teams as they traded field goals, free throws, steals and breaks throughout the period. At the end of the third it was 55-48, Dimmitt.

Alexander stretched the lead to nine with a juke up the middle to open the fourth, but at 6:36 came a call that might have been fatal for the Bobcats. Warren was ejected from the game, along with Brownfield's Tim Hope, after a shoving incident that followed some intense contact between the two.

"I don't think there's any place for a call like that in a regional tournament," Coach Cleveland said later. "It really cost us, because Jeremy is the kind of player who will win the game for you in the

stretch. If we had lost the game, I would have blamed that call."

Lance Auburg canned two T-shots and Zayne McPherson completed a three-point play to pull the Cubs within three at 57-54, but an 18-footer by McDonald, a pair of charity tosses by Bradley and four clutch free throws by Alexander helped the Bobcats rebuild their lead to 65-59 with 35 seconds left.

But the Cubs wouldn't stay down. Auburg drove the lane for a layup to cut the lead to 65-61 with 28 ticks left, and 13 seconds later Jay Cantrell sank a free throw to cut it to a dangerous 65-62 margin.

The Cubs, out of time-outs, immediately fouled Emilio Arce and he sank the first of two, but the second one rimmed out. Auburg took it and raced to the top of the key, then canned a three-pointer to cut it to 65-64 with six ticks remaining. At the same time, Brownfield's Kenneth Lawrence was whistled and Bradley went to the free-throw line.

His first shot rimmed out and Cantrell grabbed it and dished it to Auburg, who raced down the floor. But as Auburg attempted to relay the ball he was called for traveling

with one second left, and the Bobcats finally had their victory.

"I'm just tickled pink," the relieved Coach Cleveland said later. "No matter how many times you go to state, it's the greatest feeling in the world. We've got a group of seniors who have worked awfully hard for a lot of years."

He added, "Some people thought it would have been an upset if Brownfield would have won, but I sure don't think so. There are four teams that could have won this thing, and if we played it all over again it might be Brownfield, Marlin or Littlefield going to Austin instead of us."

"Our free throw shooting almost cost us the game," McDonald said. "In practice we shoot free throws rather well. In a game we've got to just step up there, relax and make it."

"Right at the end of the game I got worried," Alexander admitted, "but I thought, 'If we just keep our poise we can win it.' And I think we did keep our poise."

He added, "I think they (Brownfield) are the best AAA team we've played. They had a tough game against Littlefield and a tough one

against Marlin, and I'm sure that had an effect on them."

Alexander and Brownfield's Lawrence shared high-point honors with 23 each. McDonald and Warren had 12 each for Dimmitt, and Bradley also came through with 12 points—his highest individual total this season.

"Mat played the best game of his entire life against Brownfield," Cleveland said. "Without him, we wouldn't be going to Austin. If I had to pick a kid in that game who contributed over and beyond what he's supposed to, it would be Mat. But all the boys carried their share of the load—we couldn't have done it without any of them."

Semi's game close—for a half

As they had done against Idalou in the area championship game, the Bobcats continued to struggle during the first half of their regional semifinals contest against Lampasas Friday night.

But they got their game in gear in the second half and rushed to a decisive 75-50 victory to advance to the regional finals.

Coach Jeff Bell's Badgers played the Bobcats tough in the first two periods. After Dimmitt's Jeremy Warren opened the game with a follow shot, the Badgers—making their first playoff trek in 23 years—went out front by as many as five points before the quarter ended with Lampasas leading 19-16.

The Bobcats regained the lead midway in the second, 26-25, on a basket by Warren McDonald after a steal and feed by Warren, only to be put in the hole again by the sharpshooting of Lampasas' Lorenzo Wynn (21), who racked up 13 first-half points. The Badgers went back on top by as many as six points (32-26) before Dimmitt started its roll.

Then the Bobcats struck for 10 unanswered points to close out the second quarter with a 36-32 lead. Warren scored four points and Emilio Arce, James Alexander and Mat Bradley contributed a basket apiece during the three-minute surge, mostly on fast breaks.

The Badgers saw their hopes disappear in the second half as the Bobcats kept the pressure on and outscored them 22-14 in the third and 17-4 in the fourth, holding the Badgers to four free throws and no field goals in the final period.

Alexander and Warren led Dimmitt's first-half scoring with 13 and 9 points respectively. Warren and

Warren McDonald led the second-half onslaught with 10 points apiece before Coach Ken Cleveland cleared the bench with two minutes remaining.

Warren finished with 19 points, followed by Alexander with 17 and McDonald with 16. Jim Nelson, Mat Bradley and Emilio Arce scored 6 each, John Shultz 3 and Brac Wardlaw 2.

For Lampasas, Wynn was held to four points in the second half and finished with 17, while Louis Snell had 15.

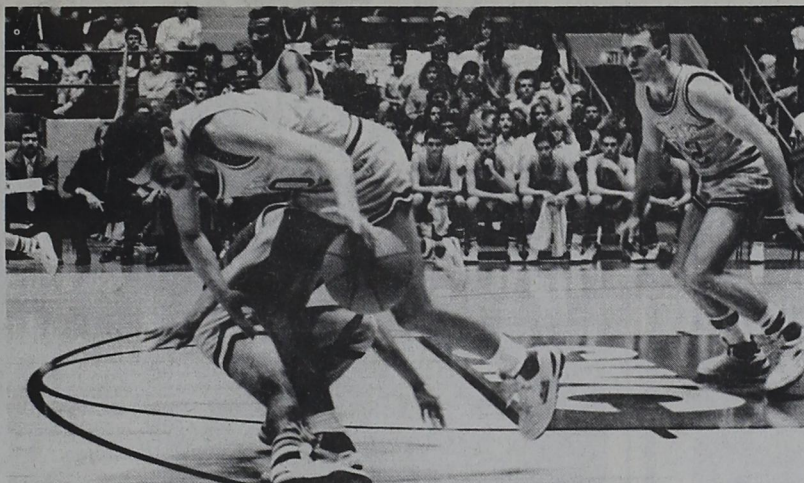

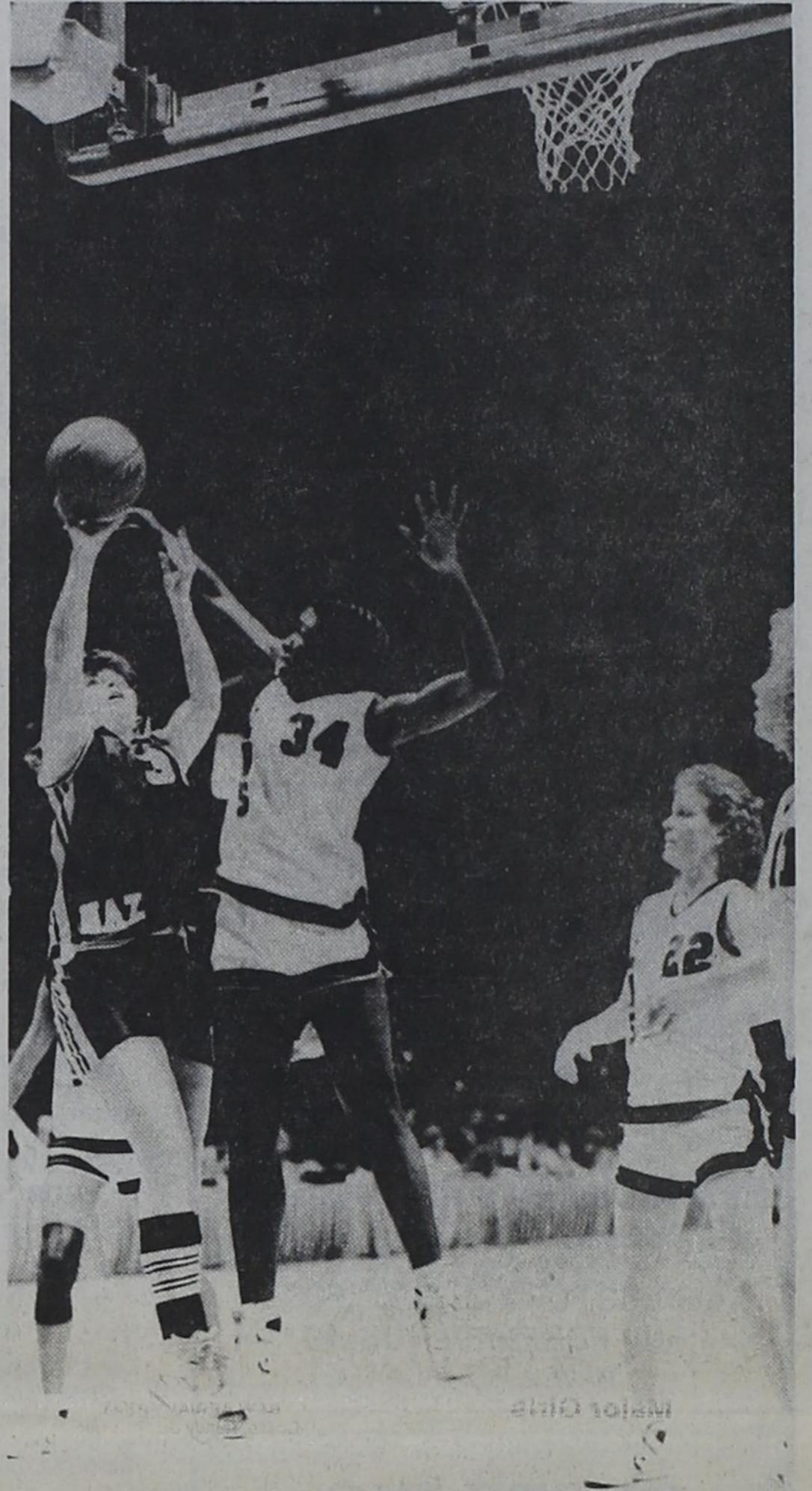

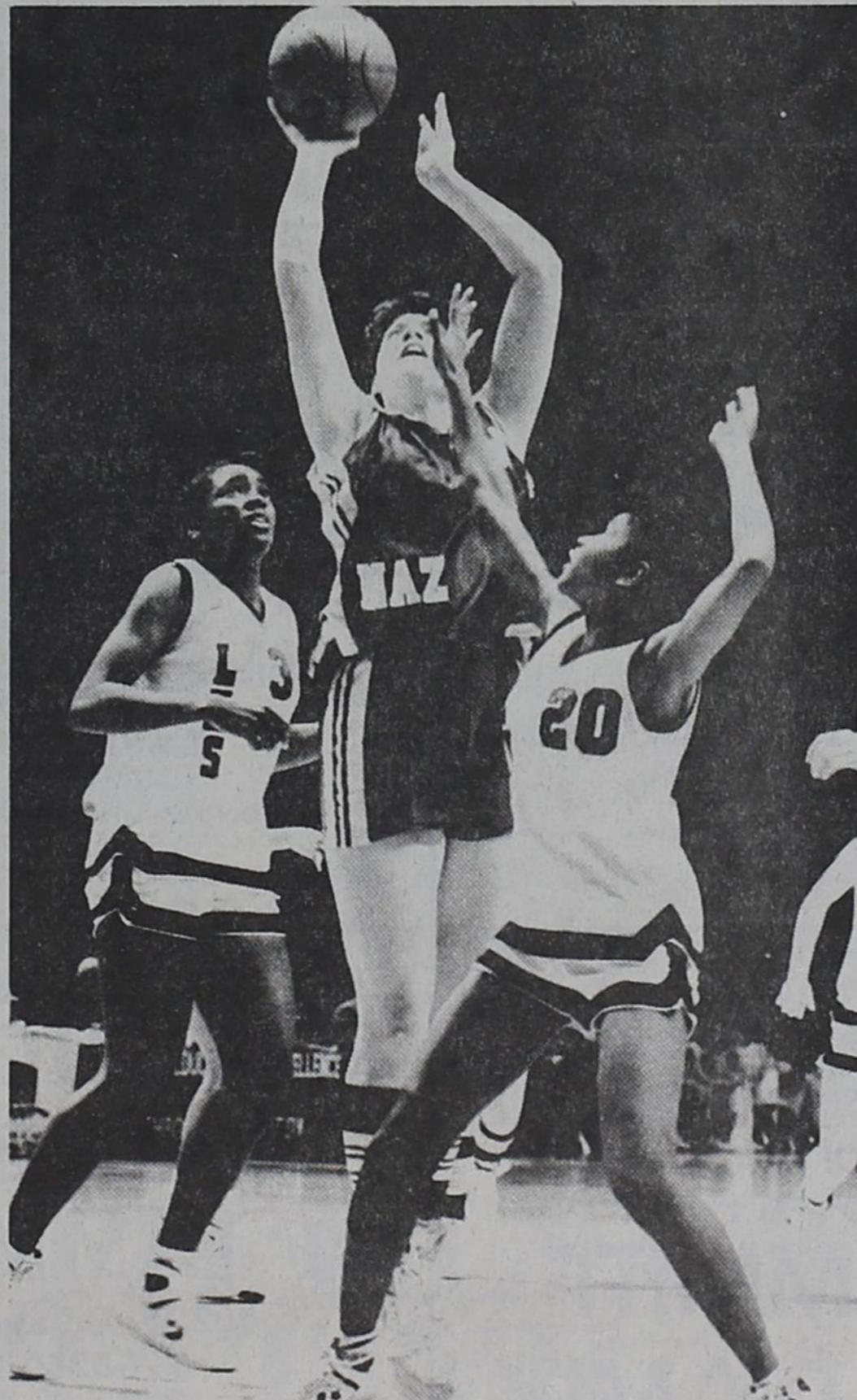
