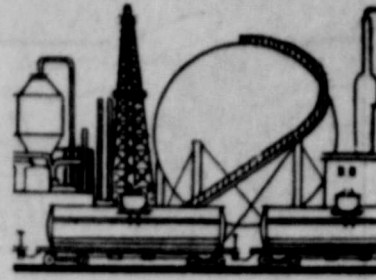

Cozart Is In On Capture Two Thugs

A former Ranger resident was one of the two Texas Highway Patrolmen who apprehended a pair of Fort Worthians who robbed the Iredell State Bank at 9:53 Wednesday morning.

Within minutes after the robbery, approximately 200 peace officers in the central Texas area had been alerted and given the license number and description of the car used by the two thugs in their getaway attempt. Patrolman Dale Cozart and Billy F. Rowe captured the robbers approximately 40 minutes and 40 miles after the holdup.

The chase hit speeds up to 110 miles per hour.

All of the \$16,350 was recovered except \$500.

Cozart, 25, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Cozart of Ranger. A graduate of Ranger High School he joined the Texas Highway Patrol three years ago. He first served at Del Rio and about a year ago was transferred to Cleburne where he is now stationed.

His wife is the former Carole Phillips, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Royce Phillips. The couple has two children, Cindy and Wayne.

Poll Tax Payments Lagging Over County Area As Deadline Nears

Sales of poll taxes over Eastland County were reported lagging yesterday with the deadline — next Saturday, Jan. 30 — only a week away.

Edgar Altom, Eastland County tax assessor and collector, also reminds citizens that Saturday, Jan. 30, also is the final deadline for payment of currently due ad valorem taxes. Effective Monday, Feb. 1, he said, unpaid taxes will be subject to penalty and interest.

In 1964, a presidential election year, 4,747 poll taxes and 597 exemption certificates were issued in the county. Since this is an "off-election" year, substantially fewer polls are expected to be sold.

However, county and city officials remind citizens that there will be a number of important local elections and in order to qualify for voting in city, school and other important referendums a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate is required.

Assessor - Collector Altom has emphasized that over-age persons who are not required to pay their poll tax in order to qualify to vote, or not required either to obtain an exemption certificate to be eligible to vote.

Through Friday at 5 p. m. there had been 687 poll taxes issued at the County Tax Assessor - Collector's office at the courthouse, a report showed.

They plan to keep the office open until 9 p. m. Saturday night. All Ranger citizens are urged to pay their poll taxes before the deadline Saturday night.

The Jaycees will complete their house to house canvass on the poll tax drive Monday night.

Sixteen Jaycees were present at the meeting.

Mingus Liquor Store Robbed Wednesday by Lone Bandit

A 23-year-old Abilene police character was arrested at Ranger Hill Wednesday night about 45 minutes following an armed robbery of Albert and Moon Abraham's Liquor Store in Mingus.

Constable Ralph Veal made the arrest after having been alerted by Palo Pinto County officers. The suspect, however, was later released following extensive interrogation. He had only \$11 in his pocket at the time of his arrest.

A man, described as reddish-blond and six feet tall, pointed an object in his sport pocket at Moon Abraham, who was the only attendant in the store, and demanded money.

The object in the man's coat appeared to be a gun, but it was never removed from the clothing, Albert said.

Moon was ordered to open the cash register and lie on the floor. The robber cleaned out the cash register, fleeing in an automobile with \$350 cash.

Fraudulent Insurance Sales Being Reported

"Beware insurance swindlers and report any recent improperly handled dealings with insurance agents."

That's the warning from County Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, who reported Saturday that numerous fraudulent sales have been reported to his department this week, mostly by elderly, pensioned persons who have been slow in reporting improper handling of their insurance protection purchases.

"Apparently our county had a number of insurance swindlers last summer during June and July," he said, "offering policies and hospitalization protection to older, many of whom are otherwise uninsurable, taking their money and leaving town. We've had several reports from persons who said that they never received their policy, and when they wrote the company, a reputable, established firm, were informed that the agents named were not affiliated with the company."

"We've turned up four different agents names and believe that two of them are correct," he said, "We're checking with bondsmen and have placed holds" on them.

Persons who have bought insurance protection within the past 60 to 90 days and feel that a "reasonable" length of time has elapsed for them to have received their policy, are asked to contact their local law enforcement agency or the sheriff's department, Sublett said.

And in entering into new negotiations for coverage, be sure of your agent, he said. Have him identify himself and prove his company affiliation before turning money over to him.

Preliminary Plans for Museum Completed

Preliminary architectural drawings of the proposed Texas Oil Museum to be built in Ranger — tentatively on a 25-acre site located south of the city on the old hand-laid brick highway once known as the "Broadway of America" — have been completed and are on display in the offices of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce in downtown Ranger.

Charles Fox, executive director of the project, said Wednesday morning that copies of the plans are being shown to oil industry leaders in the Fort Worth-Dallas area this week.

Building site for the museum, now owned by Ranger Chamber of Commerce, would later be deeded to Texas Oil Museum, Inc., an independent, not-for-profit corporation formed here last fall. Plans indicate the Jaycees' rodeo arena would remain in its present location, but the Pony League baseball park would be moved to another location on the plot.

According to the preliminary plans of Earl E. Koeppe, Fort Worth architect, the museum edifice will be 250 feet from end to end with an open entrance 44 feet wide separating two exhibit buildings each 106x50 feet.

A second floor housing an office, lounge, spacious conference room, and large kitchen will be located over the center of the ultra-modern structure.

Outstanding feature of the museum design are the five aluminum oil derricks which will protrude through the flat roof of the building. A large 66-foot derrick with a 28x20-foot base will be in the center over the open entrance area. Stairs to the second floor would be built inside the base of that derrick. Two smaller derricks, each 40-feet high, are shown on each of the two exhibit buildings. Their bases, 10x10 feet, would be glassed in from the floor to ceiling, with flowing water fountains and colorful floral displays inside.

Flood lights will be spaced on the crowns of the five derricks to light the front area.

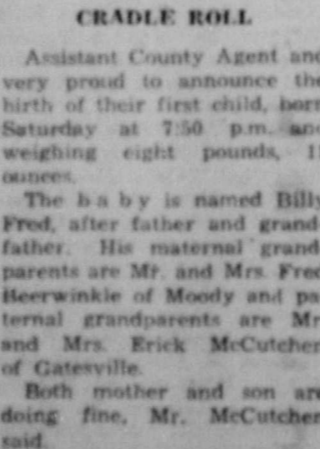

and also the large block-long mall to be located at the rear of the museum. On each side of the mall later will be erected replica buildings of the old roaring oil boom era as were seen in Ranger and neighboring cities and communities in the field, scene of one of the most fabulous and highly-publicized petroleum explosions in the history of the industry.

At the rear of the mall and at the end of the historic boom town block will be an old cable tool rig and other pieces of oil field equipment used during the peak of the early oil play in this area.

Executive Director Fox said that the cost of the oil museum building has not yet been determined. James Van Gorder of Fort Worth, well known engineer, will make a determination of cost in the near future.

First, Fox added, oil industry leaders will be shown the preliminary design plans and as a result some additional changes may be made.

Several of them, he revealed, have expressed enthusiasm in the proposed oil museum and have indicated an interest in financing the project.

He said the cost of the building probably would be in the neighborhood of around half a million dollars.

It is the first major building constructed under New York's City's new zoning regulations providing more sidewalk area with its generous set-back design. There also is a park-like sunken plaza dominated by an unusual abstract sculpture in bronze entitled "Transition."

It was the first time the store had been robbed since it was established 4 1/2 years ago.
