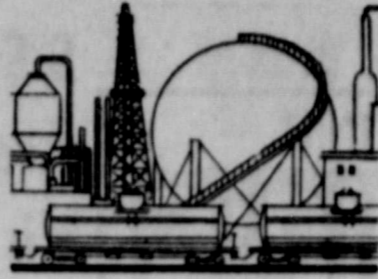

## Ranger Riding Club Will Participate In Opening Of Fort Worth Show Friday

Members of the Lone Ranger Riding Club will appear in the gala opening parade of the 1965 Stock Show and

Rodeo in Fort Worth Friday afternoon, according to John Roberson, Ranger ranchman and president of the organization.

Starting time for the colorful procession through downtown Fort Worth will be at 2 p.m. and Lone Ranger members will be one of the 68 riding groups, 49 bands and 16 horse-drawn vehicles participating in the parade. About 125,000 persons are expected to line the streets to watch the big Western event. Police estimated last year's downtown audience at about that figure.

The Lone Ranger group also will march in Friday night's opening grand entry. The local riders had an impressive year of activity in 1964. In appearances at ro-

### There Is No Such Thing As An 'Off-Election' Year

(An Editorial)

Today is Thursday and citizens have only through Saturday to qualify to vote in 1965 elections.

And poll tax sales are lagging in Eastland County. The tax office is offering a public service in announcing its intention of remaining open Saturday — but that's no reason to wait. Get 'em today. And remember too, that mailed applications must be in the hands of the tax office before the deadline—post marks do not count.

It's every person's own business whether he wants to equip himself to vote this year, but we would at least remind the public that the term "off-election" year is somewhat deceptive. And at no other time have Eastland Counties had more reason to be qualified voters, what with the EC-65 program now in progress. We have no idea what we may be called on to do in the future to help our county expand industrially, and some sort of election might be necessary. You'd want to be prepared to voice your vote.

And too, there's a vacancy in our 91st District Court which may at some time in the future require the casting of a ballot by a qualified voter.

In Eastland, a city election is certain in April, when three members of the City Commission will be chosen for three-year terms. There'll be a school board election with three posts to be voted on.

And what about local option? One never knows and it's best to be prepared to vote — regardless of your convictions.

Through Wednesday morning there had been 837 poll tax receipts and 113 exemptions issued by the tax office. (Most of the 113 exemptions are for 21-year-olds, which represents a goodly-sized new voting group.)

Beyond that, it cannot be predicted in January what other elections will arise before the year is out.

There already are strong signs that there will be a state constitutional election as a result of the legislative session now underway.

For example, Gov. John Connally Monday told the State Democratic Executive Committee he hopes Texas will have the opportunity to vote again this year on a constitutional amendment to repeal the poll tax. Connally urged the committee members to support an all-out drive for poll tax payments this week in anticipation of such an election.

Locally, elections could be called during 1965 on which citizens would want to vote. These could include bond issues or, conceivably, a wet-dry election. We say simply these are possibilities, without having any foreknowledge that such proposals are in the making.

For whatever eventuality may come, citizens will want to be qualified to vote.

Ironic as it might be — remember you'll need a poll tax receipt to vote for the repeal of the poll tax.

## Regional Golden Gloves Tourney Opens Thursday

Entries in novice, open and high school divisions from Ranger and surrounding area — also Sweetwater, Abilene, Weatherford, Fort Worth and Glen Rose — will mix leather in the first Ranger regional Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament to be staged here in the new Ranger Junior College gymnasium Thursday, Saturday and Monday nights — Jan. 28, 30 and Feb. 1.

Fistic action during the three nights of the amateur boxing competition will begin at 7 p.m. But prior to that hour there'll be preliminary exhibitions featuring peewees and other non-entrant boxers, according to Jack Allen, Ran-

ger Junior College business manager and director of the tournament.

Open championship winners of the Ranger regional, he said, will be eligible to compete in the state Golden Gloves meet at Fort Worth Feb. 18 through 22.

The Ranger Golden Gloves tournament is sponsored by the college in cooperation with the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Admission; 75 cents for adults, 25 cents for students.

Eligible to compete in the three nights of fistic action are amateurs from 14 to 26

years of age who desire to enter in one of three classes—open, novice or high school.

To enter the Ranger Golden Gloves tournament, a contestant must be an acceptable amateur who has reached his 14th birthday, Allen explained. He must have a record of good character and conduct and be normal physically and mentally. There are no entry fees.

The open class is for boys and young men who desire to try for the major trophies and a berth in the state tournament at Fort Worth.

## Site-Tour of County Is Feb. 4 EC-65 Seminar

The next seminar for EC-65 will be held on Thursday, February 4, beginning in Cisco and continuing in area towns before concluding with lunch and a briefing session in Rising Star, according to the Texas Industrial Commission.

EC-65, the pilot program for industrial development, is sponsored by leaders from Eastland County in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

This third seminar in a series of five so called "Plant Sites," a panel of experts from around the state will visit various sites in each community throughout the county and then hold a critique on how to improve and sell the properties to manufacturing companies.

The group will meet in Cisco at the Chamber of Commerce office at 8:30 a. m. on February 4. They will board a bus which is being provided by Cisco Junior College and then visit sites in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, and Rising Star. They will have lunch in Rising Star at the American Legion Hall and hold their briefing session there.

Anyone who wishes to join the tour in any town may do so.

The first two sessions were called "Community Betterment" and "Research and Analysis." The fourth and fifth seminars will be held in Gorman and Cisco on the subjects "Industrial Financing" and "How to Find Prospects." There is a possibility that Governor John Connally will attend the last seminar according to a county spokesman.

**SS Field Representative Assists 133 Persons During Visits To Ranger City Hall**

During 1964, H. L. Weatherly, field representative from the Abilene district office, who visits Ranger regularly, assisted 133 of the 725 persons calling on him at the City Hall, in filing applications for some type of social security benefit. District Manager R. R. Tuley, Jr., reported recently. Applying for retirement or disability benefits were 38 wage employees; 11 self-employed persons, including farmers; 65 dependents of living, deceased or disabled workers; plus 19 persons having their retirement benefit amount refigured because of good earnings after original claim filing. Our Abilene office also issued 9,713 social security cards, answered 46,525 inquiries on social security, and distributed free of charge some 35,000 copies of social security literature and pamphlets," Tuley added.

"If you have a question or want assistance on social security matters," Tuley said, "simply get in touch with Mr. Weatherly on one of his regularly scheduled visits to Ranger. He is at the Ranger City Hall twice a month at 10 a.m., and his next visit will be on Feb. 3.

"Or, since there may be quite a few persons to see him at this time of the year, you may prefer to come to the district office at room 2321, Federal Bldg., Abilene. That office is open Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m."

**VETS QUESTIONS & ANSWERS**

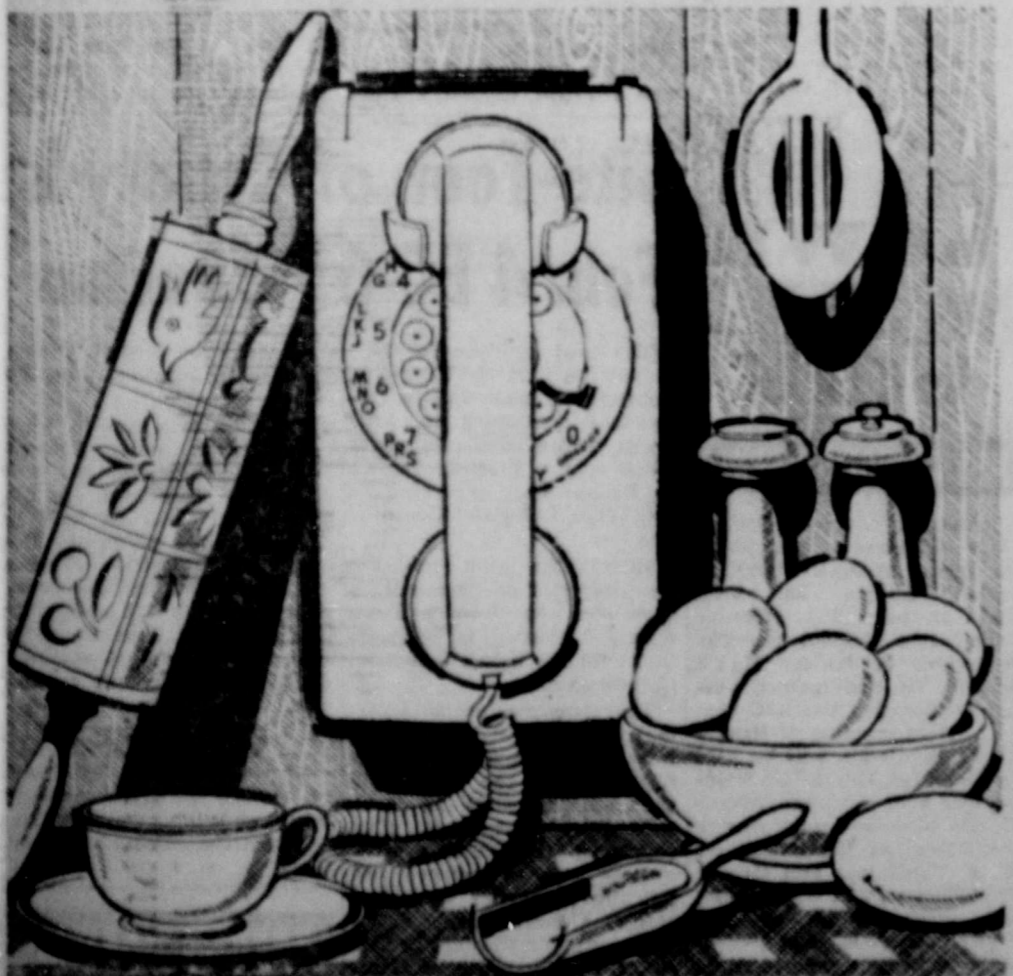

He spent one year in Korea as company commander of the 7th Cavalry Regiment whose colorful tradition and history dates back to the famed commandment of General George Custer who was killed in action back in the 19th century during the never-to-be-forgotten massacre at the hands of the Sioux Indians in the Battle of the Little Big Horn.

During his tour of duty in Korea, Marslender participated in every campaign in that arena of combat action against the Reds and earned six battle stars. In addition, he was awarded the Silver Star, the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart.

Following his return to the United States from Korea following the 38th parallel armistice, Marslender served as company commander of the 29th Airborne parachute unit at Fort Bragg, N. C.

Then — later — he spent two years overseas in Germany with the G-3 Section of 7th Army Headquarters.

Mrs. Marslender is the former Miss Rosellen Brown of Beaumont, Texas. The couple was united in marriage on Aug. 30, 1952.

Their three children are Ramona, 9, and Arden, 8, students at Holmes-Oak Park Elementary School, and Richard Perry, 6, who attends Bobo Kindergarten.

## Former Resident Co-Pilot Set World Helicopter Speed Record

Navy Lt. Commander Robert W. Crafton of San Antonio, former Ranger resident, and his Marine co-pilot, Capt. Louis K. Keck, Seymour, became the world's fastest helicopter pilots in February 1962 when they flew a Navy Sikorsky H52 to a record speed of 210.6 miles per hour near Stratford, Conn. Record had been held by the Russian Mi6 with 199.4 miles per hour.

Lt. Crafton moved to Ranger with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Crafton, in January 1936. They lived 8 miles south of Ranger on the Wichita Falls and Southern Railroad where the father was employed as section foreman. The family moved into Ranger in August 1937, and made their home on Spring Road. Lt. Crafton attended school here from 1937 until 1940, when his father was transferred to San Antonio. Lt. Crafton graduated from high school in San Antonio and attended Junior College for a year. He entered the Naval Reserves and the University of Houston where he graduated 4 years later. Upon graduation he entered Officers Training School in Pensacola, Florida. He was then sent to Helicopter Anti-Submarine Division in Norfolk, Virginia.

Lt. Crafton later became Lieutenant and was credited with saving a nurse's life with the oxygen which he brought by helicopter to the ship which sent out the distress signal.

Lt. Crafton flew over Ranger January 8, 1965 in his helicopter enroute from San Diego, California, to Dallas. He resides with his wife and two sons in San Diego. His parents make their home in San Antonio.

## POLL TAXES (Continued from page 1)

"All persons between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years are subject to a poll tax as a qualification to vote in any state, county, city or school election in 1965.

"Any person who attained his twenty-first birthday any time in 1964 may vote at any general, special, primary or school election by obtaining a certificate of exemption from the county tax collector before Feb. 1, 1965.

"Any person whose twenty-first birthday falls after Feb. 1, 1965, may obtain a certificate of exemption at least 30 days before an election at which he wishes to vote and be deemed a qualified elector.

"But any such person who has failed or refused to obtain such exemption certificate shall not be allowed to vote. Art. 5.17, Texas Election Code.

"Any individual desiring to vote free, because of over-age, must be 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1964. No exemption certificate is required of such person, except in cities of ten thousand population or more.

"Persons desiring to register as a qualification to vote instead of paying a poll tax may vote only in federal elections, or for candidates for federal offices of the United States."

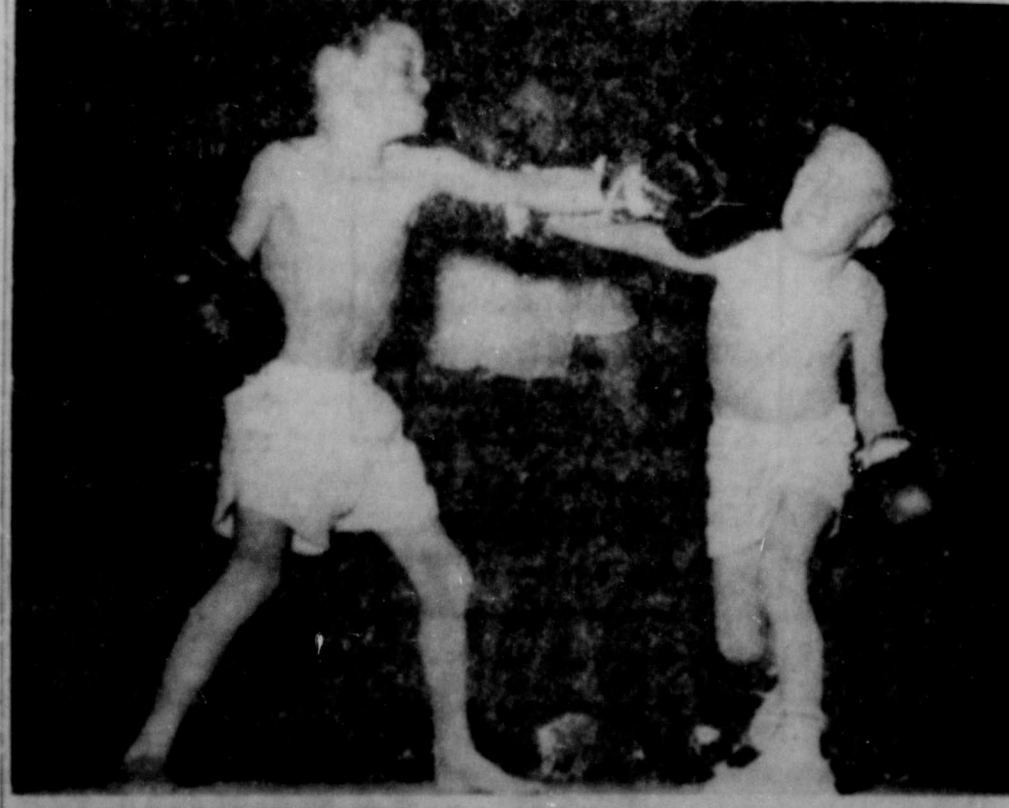
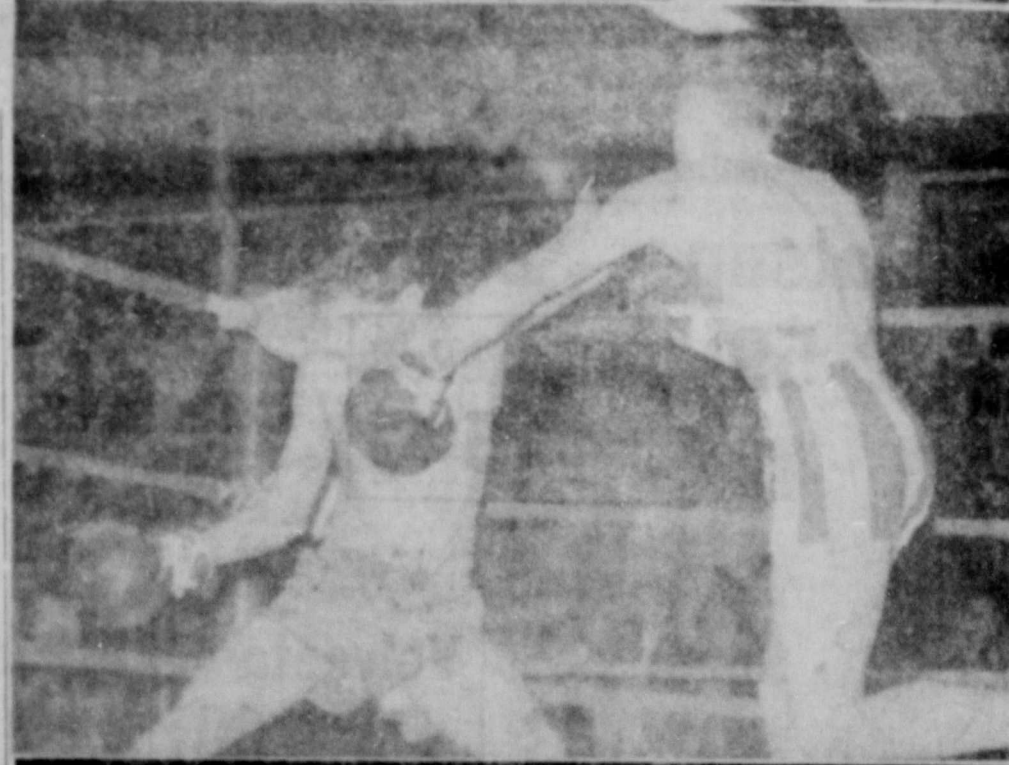

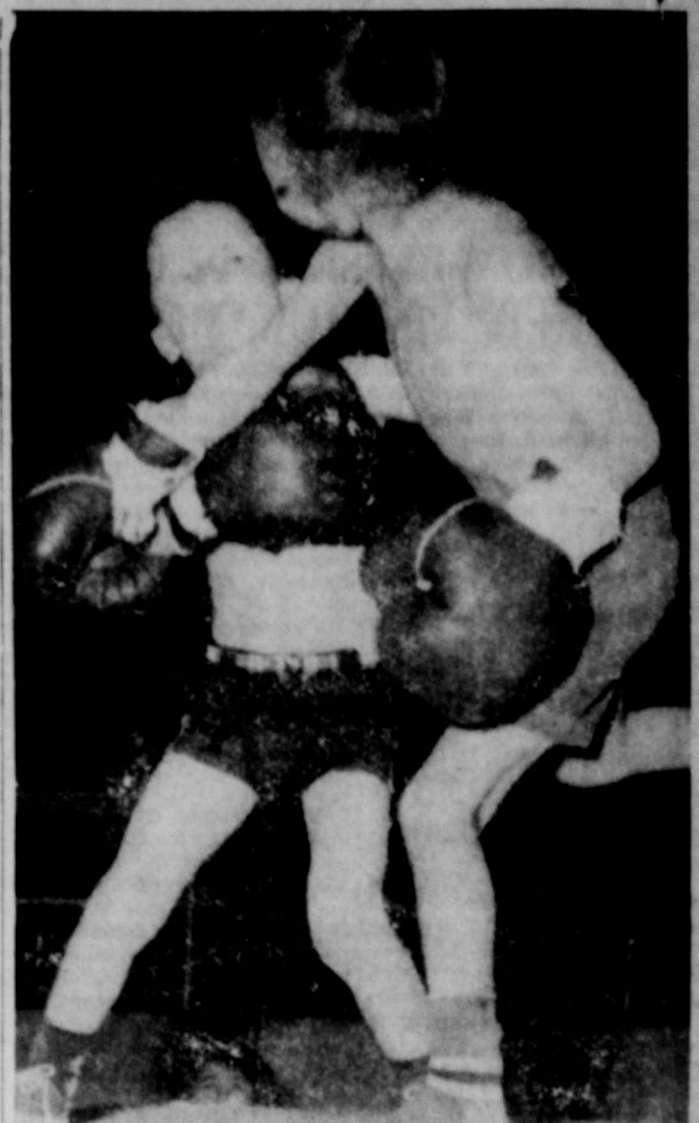
