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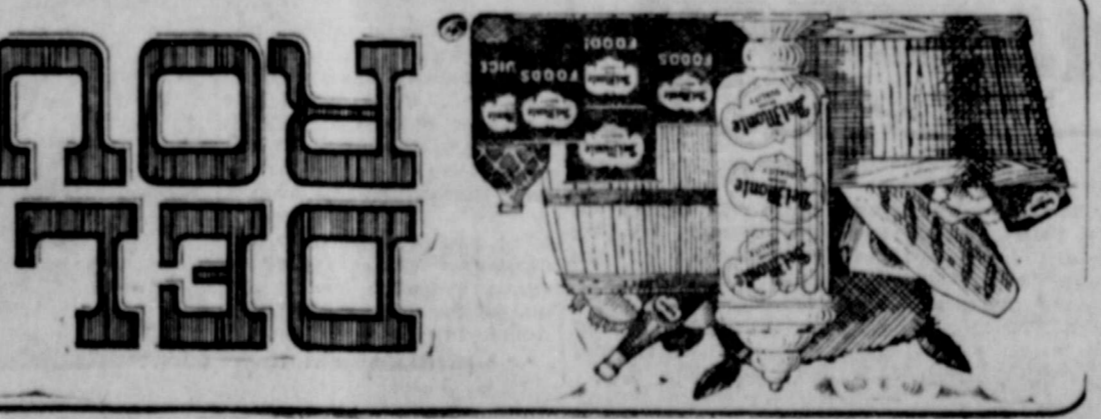
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# Pecan Growers Elect Schaefer; Change Rules

Oscar Schaefer, prominent farmer and rancher in the Cook Community was named President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association at their annual mid-winter meeting in the conference room of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce recently.

Schaefer served several years as head of the group when it was organized in 1956. He replaces C. E. Smith, Rising Star, who will serve as vice-president. Ben McKinnis, Eastland, was re-elected Secretary - Treasurer. McKinnis, agricultural representative of a local utility company has served in this capacity for the past several years.

New directors named included A. D. Ellington, Cisco, retired oil company employee and considered an authority on walnut varieties, and Joe

Bob Browning, Gorman. They will serve two years. They replace W. V. Fenter, Rising Star and Joe Philpott, Cisco.

Hold over directors to serve another year include C. T. Barton, Pioneer and Ben Freeman, Ranger.

The group voted to abide by the recommendation of the grower-business man committee and not hold the annual pecan show in the same town two years in succession. To move the affair around would tend to stimulate interest in pecans and pecan growing, it was explained.

The date for the annual spring field day was set for May 17th. Committees are to be named soon to work out details of the meeting.

(Continued from Page One) (Eastland-Ranger) has six employees, one of whom works a half day, and has six pickup and/or trucks assigned to it by the county.

Commissioner Precinct Two (Gorman, Carbon) has six men employed with seven pickups and/or trucks, one of which is a truck-tractor.

Commissioner Precinct Three (Rising Star) has six employees and eight pickups and/or trucks.

Commissioner Precinct Four (Cisco) has five full-time and one part-time employees with seven pickups and/or trucks.

The expense accounts would cost county tax payers an additional \$3,600 a year.

Other county officials and employees are paid at the rate of 10 cents per mile when it is necessary for them to use their personal vehicles on official business.

Fuel, which includes lubricants, gasoline and diesel for all equipment, cost the county, by precinct, during 1964, as follows:

Precinct One: \$3,190.09.  
Precinct Two: \$5,180.81.  
Precinct Three: \$5,040.38.  
Precinct Four: \$3,525.65.

Opinion from the state attorney general's office is anticipated in from one to two weeks on the matter.
